NOTING THE PALADINS

✍ **FURMAN AND THE ATLANTIC 10...** While Saturday's encounter with Duquesne will mark the first meeting in basketball between the Paladins and Dukes, Furman has series histories with several current members of the Atlantic 10 Conference. Furman's series records versus current A-10 Conference schools includes: St. Bonaventure (0-1), St. Joseph's (0-2), Fordham (0-1), Xavier (1-0), George Washington (10-12), Dayton (0-2), La Salle (0-3), and Virginia Tech (12-11). The last A-10 Conference team the Paladins faced was St. Bonaventure, which defeated Furman 58-46 in the first round of last year's San Juan Shootout. The Paladins have never faced Temple, Rhode Island, or Massachusetts, and Furman's work against George Washington and Virginia Tech came primarily when the Colonials and Hokies were members of the Southern Conference. Overall Furman is 23-32 (41.8%) versus current Atlantic 10 Conference schools.

✍ **JULIUS' 3-POINTER BEATS MERCER...** Kyle Julius' 3-point shot with 12 seconds left in the game lifted Furman to a 68-67 win over Mercer Wednesday night in Greenville. Julius' game-winning shot helped the Paladins erase a five-point deficit after the Bears' Rodney Kirtz converted a pair of free throws with 34 seconds left to give Mercer a 67-62 lead. Furman's Bubba Smith, however, sliced Mercer's margin to two points with a 3-pointer with 26 seconds remaining and, after Mark Adamson missed the front end of a one-and-one with 23 seconds left, Julius rebounded the ball and seconds later drilled the game winning trey. Furman, which led from the start and by as many as nine points in the second half, fell behind 57-56 with just under six minutes to go when the Bears converted four straight 3-pointers. Stanislav Makshantsev paced Furman with a game high 18 points, and teammate Daniel Quigley added 16 points and 11 rebounds for the Paladins, who outboarded the Bears 50-40 on the game.

HEATING UP IN TIMMONS...Furman's dramatic 68-67 win over Mercer on Wednesday night marked the Paladins' third straight home win this season and fourth straight overall. Furman is now 9-4 in Timmons Arena (69.2%) since moving into the new, on-campus facility midway through the 1997-98 season.

ROAD WINS RARE...Furman's lone road win this year, a 79-67 decision over William & Mary on Nov. 17, marked only the Paladins' third road victory in the last two seasons. Furman, which was 2-10 on the road last year, sports a 3-13 road record (18.8%) under second year head coach Larry Davis. Furman was 7-33 on the road (17.5%) in three seasons under former head coach Joe Cantafio; and, since the start of the 1994-95 campaign, the Paladins have compiled a 10-46 record (17.8%) away from Greenville.

FREE THROW HIGHS AND LOWS...After connecting on 35x50 free throws (70.0%) in an 88-85 win over Charleston Southern in Greenville on Dec. 2, Furman went 1x8 from the line (12.5%) in a 63-47 loss to Georgia in Athens two nights later. In the 68-67 win over Mercer on Wednesday night, Furman knocked down just 13x26 (50.0%) attempts from the charity stripe, making the Paladins a paltry 14x34 from the line (41.1%) in the past two games. The 50 free throw attempts against Charleston Southern were the most by Furman since the 1989-90 season when the Paladins canned 35x51 FTs in 97-76 rout of Davidson in Greenville. Despite its shooting woes in the last two games, Furman has attempted 42 more free throws than its opposition through seven games (176-134).

PERIMETER SHOOTING IMPROVEMENT...Although Furman converted a season low 27.8% of its 3-point attempts (5x18) in Wednesday night's 68-67 win over Mercer, the Paladins still appear to be a much better 3-point shooting team this year as opposed to last year's squad. Heading into Saturday's game against Duquesne, the Paladins are shooting 39.1% from 3-point range (43x110). A year ago Furman converted a Southern Conference low 27.8% of its 3-point attempts. Leading the turnaround this year are three players: senior Bubba Smith, freshman Kyle Julius, and junior Stanislav Makshantsev. Smith, who last year paced Furman's perimeter shooters by connecting on 37.8% of his 3-point attempts (48x127), is 13x31 from 3-point range this year (41.9%). Julius, meanwhile, has given Furman's backcourt a much-needed "second gun" and is connecting on a squad best 46.2% of his 3-pointers (12x26). The bonus has been the 3-point shooting of Furman's starting power forward, Stanislav Makshantsev, who has hit on 6x11 3-point attempts (54.5%) this year. Backup point guard Paul Foster has also proven he can score from outside as he has connected on 4x6 3-pointers (66.7%) this season.

MAKSHANTSEV MAKING HIS MARK...After scoring Furman's first points against Charleston Southern on a 3-pointer but later being benched after picking up his third foul at the 13:17 mark of the first half, hardly anyone could have predicted junior Stanislav Makshantsev's second half explosion. Playing 18 minutes and not committing a foul in the second period, Makshantsev scored 27 points, grabbed eight rebounds, and picked up a steal to ignite Furman's successful second half on the way to the 88-85 win. Makshantsev's 30-point performance was the first 30-point effort by a Paladins since Chuck Vincent tallied 30 in an 87-81 overtime loss to VMI last year. His performance against Charleston Southern included 10x13 FGs, 3x3 3PGs, and 7x10 FTs. A very strong low post player, Makshantsev is also forcing the opposition to respect his perimeter game, as he is 6x11 from three-point range (54.5%) this year.

TURNOVERS STILL A PROBLEM...Although Furman committed 16 turnovers in its 68-67 win over Mercer on Wednesday night, it represented an improvement over the 20.2 turnovers/game the Paladins had been averaging heading into the contest. Still, seven games into the 1998-99 campaign, Furman has suffered 137 turnovers (19.5/game) while forcing opponents into only 101 miscues (14.4/game). A year ago, Furman committed a conference high 514 turnovers (17.7/game).

OFFENSIVE HIGH WATER MARK...Furman's 88 points in its 88-85 win over Charleston Southern on Dec. 2 represented the most points in a game under head coach Larry Davis. The Paladins, who ranked last in the Southern Conference in

scoring offense last year, averaging 61.7 ppg, head into Saturday's game against Duquesne averaging 66.0 ppg, an improvement of +4.3 ppg over last season.

AHEAD OF SCHEDULE...Furman didn't record its fifth win of the 1997-98 season until Jan. 19, when the Paladins topped Wofford 70-61 in Greenville.

FURMAN IN PRE-SEASON POLLS...Furman was a consensus Southern Conference South Division third place pick in a pair of pre-season polls conducted by the league head coaches and media. College of Charleston, which begins Southern Conference play this year, was the consensus first place pick in the south division, and Davidson was the top pick in the Southern Conference North Division in both polls. Furman finished fourth in the league's south division last year with a 9-20 overall record and 5-9 league mark.

PALADINS GO 2-0 IN EXHIBITION CONTESTS...Furman claimed wins in its two pre-season exhibition games, taking a 90-70 decision over CSKA-Ukraine on Nov. 3 and an 87-73 verdict over Upstate AAU on Nov. 9. Senior guard Bubba Smith scored a game high 22 points and connected on 4-of-7 three-pointers in the Paladins' verdict of CSKA-Ukraine. Against Upstate AAU, the Paladins converted 10-of-21 three-point shots and got 25 points and 15 rebounds from senior forward Daniel Quigley. Freshman guard Anthony Thomas added 12 points and 15 boards in the Paladins' win over AAU.

PALADINS SIGN TWO...Furman got its recruiting season off to a fast start by signing two high school standouts to national letters of intent. Darrell Arbaugh, a 6-foot-8 forward from Ashland, Ky., signed with the Paladins first, and two days later Furman inked 6-foot-6 forward Kenny Ziegler from Lithonia, Ga. Ziegler is rated among the nation's top 200 players by Prep Stars Magazine, and recruiting analyst Bob Gibbons called him "the most highly rated player headed to a Southern Conference school -- a player with the talent and work ethic to be the premier newcomer in the league next year."

GARNER OUT...Junior forward Patrick Garner, who was expected to rejoin the Furman basketball team last week after playing tight end on the Paladins football team this fall, sustained a fractured thumb in Furman's 31-28, season ending win over Chattanooga on Nov. 21 and is out indefinitely.

PLAYER UPDATES

#24 BUBBA SMITH, 6-4, G, Sr. Hendersonville, Tenn.

Heads into the Duquesne game having started at second guard in six of Furman's seven games...scored a season low six points and made only 1x9 FGs in the Paladins' 68-67 win over Mercer, but his only field goal, a 3-pointer with 26 seconds left in the game, pulled Furman to within two points at 67-65, thereby setting up teammate Kyle Julius' game winning 3-pointer with 12 seconds left...poor shooting versus Mercer was offset by a performance that included a game high six assists and no turnovers in 34 minutes...converted 7x8 FTs over the final 40 seconds to help preserve Furman's 88-85 win over Charleston Southern (Dec. 2)...scored all 11 of his points (11x13) against Charleston Southern at the line...was held out of the lineup against Winthrop due to sprained ankle sustained in practice four days prior...did, however, play 31 minutes and score 14 points in the 60-59 loss in Rock Hill...is Furman's second leading scorer (11.1 ppg) and a solid shooter from 3-point range (13x31, 41.9%)...has tallied double figures in five of Furman's seven games, including a season high 16 points in a 79-67 win over William & Mary in Williamsburg...leads the team in free throw shooting (77.1%, 27x35)...tied with backup point guard Paul Foster for the team lead in assists with 18...is Furman's most experienced player, having played in 90 games and started in 85 contests...ranks eighth on Furman's all-time steals ledger with 124...has converted 117x325 3PGs (36.0%) in his career...current percentage would place him seventh all-time at Furman...has the best chance of any current Paladin to become the 30th player in school history to score 1,000 points...currently has 777 points...must average 11.2 ppg over the Paladins final 20 games to reach 1,000...excellent defensive player...joins Daniel Quigley to give Furman two left-handers in the starting five.

#32 DANIEL QUIGLEY, 6-7, C, Sr., Tipton, Ind.

Has earned starts at center in each of Furman's seven games...leads the team in rebounding (8.1 rpg) and is the Paladins' third leading scorer (10.3 ppg)...tallied 16 points and a game high 11 rebounds in the Paladins' 68-67 win over Mercer...had 10 boards in the first half...has tallied double figure scoring performances in four games and double figure rebounding efforts in three games...double-double versus Mercer was his second of the year...had a double-double (13 points, 10 rebounds) in Furman's season opening 66-59 win over Stetson in Greenville...in all has paced the Paladins in rebounding in five games so far...was a perfect 7x7 from the line as part of a season-high 15-point performance against William & Mary (79-67 win) in Williamsburg...has converted 3x8 3-pointers (37.5%) this year and is a career 30.9% shooter from 3-point range (42x136)...averaged a Southern Conference leading 8.5 rpg in 14 league games last year...is on pace to become only the 20th player in Furman history to claim 600 rebounds...has 526 boards heading into the Duquesne game...is one of two left-handers in Furman's starting lineup.

#42 STANISLAV MAKSHANTSEV, 6-8, Jr., F, Alma-Ata, Kazakhstan

Has started a power forward in all six games...is Furman's first junior college transfer (N.E. Nebraska Community College) since 1979...leads Furman in scoring (15.7 ppg), field goal percentage (58.5%), and is second on the squad in rebounding (6.9 rpg) through six games...has converted 6x11 (54.5%) 3-point field goal attempts...scored a game-high 18 points and claimed seven rebounds in Furman's 68-67 win over Mercer...hit on 3x3 3PFGs and scored 30 points (in 25 minutes), including 27 in the second half, in Furman's 88-85 win over Charleston Southern on Dec. 2...30-point performance was the first by a Paladin since Chuck Vincent went for 30 in an 87-81 overtime loss at VMI last year...sparked Furman to a 79-67 win over William & Mary in Williamsburg by scoring 25 points and claiming four rebounds...has led Furman in scoring in four games this year.

#15 MARCUS DILLIGARD, 6-4, So., G, La Belle, Mo.

Furman's starting point guard in all seven games...is averaging 7.0 ppg and 2.4 rpg...shooting 41.3% from the field, up from 29.1% as a freshman a year ago...ranks second on the team in assists (14)...scored six points and added three rebounds, two assists, and two steals in Furman's 68-67 win over Mercer...tallied 13 points in Furman's season opening 66-59 win over Stetson...excellent defensive player...turned a brilliant defensive performance against William & Mary All-CAA guard Randy Bracy in the Paladins' 79-67 win in Williamsburg, fouling Bracy out after 25 minutes with only 10 points on 3x10 FGs...has started in every game (36) since coming to Furman...named to the Southern Conference All-Freshman team a year ago...will look to post-up his defender due to prep experience as a small forward.

#3 ANTHONY THOMAS, 6-4, Fr., G/F, Atlanta, Ga.

Has earned starts at small forward in all seven games...is the only freshman in Furman's starting five...heads into the Duquesne contest averaging 6.3 ppg and 4.1 rpg...fashioned a solid performance in Furman's 68-67 win over Mercer, scoring eight points and adding seven rebounds, five assists, and two steals in 30 minutes...connected on only his third 3-pointer of the year in the win over the Bears...had three steals in Furman's 63-47 loss to Georgia, giving him five theft in the past two games...registered nine points and had a season high six rebounds in Furman's 79-67 win over William & Mary in Williamsburg...also tallied nine points and had four boards in a season high 34 minutes in a 60-59 loss to Winthrop in Rock Hill...connected on his first eight free throws this year before missing...playing time has been enhanced due to the departure of returning starting small forward Andre Kerr prior to the start of the season...registered 12 points and 15 rebounds in

Furman's 87-73 exhibition win over Upstate AAU...starred at Atlanta's Woodward Academy, where he was a two-time all-state performer and state AAA player-of-the-year as a junior.

#13 PAUL FOSTER, 6-0, Fr., G, Mt. Olive, N.C.

Furman's first substitute at the point guard slot behind Marcus Dilligard...has averaged 21.7 mpg and 4.0 ppg in seven games...tied with Bubba Smith for the team lead in assists with 17...connected on a 3-pointer and added an assist in 15 minutes of action in the Paladins' 68-67 win over Mercer...recorded his first double figure scoring performance (11 points) in Furman's 88-85 win over Charleston Southern on Nov. 2...went 8x13 at the free throw line and hit his only field goal attempt (3-pointer) in the win...is 4x6 (66.7%) from 3-point range this season...had a team high five assists in a 62-55 loss to Northwestern in Evanston...starting point guard on North Carolina's state AA championship Wallace-Rose High School team that went 31-0.

#4 WILL COLES, 6-8, Sr., C, Nashville, Tenn.

Furman's first substitute inside at both center and power forward...is averaging 20.0 mpg, 3.6 ppg, and 5.9 rpg...scored two points but claimed eight rebounds, a block, and a steal in 15 minutes in Furman's 68-67 win over Mercer...leads the team in blocks with five...had seven points (7-10 FTs) and eight rebounds in 25 minutes in Furman's 88-85 win over Charleston Southern...has paced the Paladins in rebounding in two contests...missed virtually all of the pre-season with an ankle sprain but came back to contribute significantly in the Paladins' season opening, 66-59 win over Stetson, scoring eight points, pulling down seven rebounds, and blocking two shots in 24 minutes of action...has paced Furman in blocked shots each of the past two seasons...ranks seventh on the school's career blocked shots list with 65.

#23 KYLE JULIUS, 6-3, Fr., G, Thunder Bay, Ontario

Comes off the bench in relief of Bubba Smith at second guard...is averaging 10.7 mpg and 6.7 ppg on the season...has averaged 10.5 ppg and has shot 46.9% (15x32) from the field, including 11x21 (52.3%) from 3-point range, over the last four games...knocked home the game winning 3-pointer with 12 seconds left in Furman's 68-67 win over Mercer...game winning shot followed his key rebound of a missed Mercer free throw with 23 seconds remaining...finished with nine points and four rebounds against Mercer...performance against the Bears followed a solid outing in a 63-47 loss to Georgia where he paced Furman's offensive effort with 14 points, connecting on 5x10 FGs (4x8 3PFGs)...led Furman with a 17-point performance in the Paladins' 62-55 loss to Northwestern in Evanston...performance against the Wildcats included 5x8 3PFGs...leads Furman in 3-point shooting (12x26, 46.2%)...helped Cathedral High School go 33-0 and claim the Ontario Provincial Championship his senior year.
