FURMAN-WILLIAM & MARY SERIES INFORMATION

- ✓ Tuesday's Furman-William & Mary game will mark the 50th meeting in basketball between the Paladins and Tribe, but only the second clash in the past 20 seasons. William & Mary holds a 26-23 series advantage
- ✓ William & Mary captured the last meeting with Furman, routing the Paladins 80-57 a year ago in Greenville behind guard Randy Bracy's 17 points and forward Jim Moran's 17 points. Chuck Vincent led Furman with 17 points, and Daniel Quigley added 14 points and four rebounds for the Paladins.
- ✓ Furman's last win over William & Mary was an 88-83 verdict in Greenville during the 1976-77 season. Furman's last visit to Williamsburg was during the 1975-76 campaign. William & Mary captured that contest, 70-57.
- ✓ William & Mary is 15-4 versus Furman in Williamsburg. In Greenville, the Paladins sport an 18-6 series advantage. The Tribe is 4-1 against Furman in five neutral site clashes.

NOTING THE PALADINS

✓ **SUCCESSFUL SEASON OPENER...**Furman opened its 1998-99 season on Saturday night with a 66-59 win over Stetson in Greenville, thereby avenging a 75-73 overtime loss to the Hatters a year ago in DeLand, Fla. Furman displayed a balanced attack in the win over Stetson, with guards Bubba Smith and Marcus Dilligard, and forward Daniel Quigley all scoring 13 points for the winning Paladins. Quigley also grabbed a game high 10 rebounds for the Paladins, who shot 48.0% from the field (24x50) and 75.0% from the line (12x16), while also outrebounding the Hatters 36-33. The season opening win was the first for Furman since the 1995-96 campaign and only the third in nine season lid lifters this decade. A year ago the Paladin suffered an embarrassing 70-69 loss to NCAA Division II Newberry in the season opener at tiny Herman W. Lay Physical Activities Center on campus.

✓ **WHAT'S THIS?...**Furman converted 6x12 three-point attempts in Saturday's 66-59 win over Stetson — a noteworthy achievement when considering the Paladins shot only 50.0% from three-point range in one of 29 games a year ago and ranked dead last in the Southern Conference in three-point shooting (27.8%). Furman's perimeter shooting, an area head coach Larry Davis and his staff firmly addressed in recruiting, should be much better this year with the return of guard Bubba Smith and the addition of sharpshooting freshman guards Anthony Thomas and Kyle Julius. Smith was the Paladins' lone three-point shooting weapon a year ago (48x127, 37.8%) and was Furman's top gun (3x4) from long range in the win over Setson.

✓ **NOTING A COUPLE OF STREAKS...**While the Paladins converted 6x12 treys in the win over Stetson, Furman shut down the Hatters on the perimeter, as Stetson went 0x13 from three-point range, thus breaking a Hatter streak of 272 consecutive games with at least one made three-pointer. Ironically, a year ago William & Mary, in an 80-57 win over the Paladins in Greenville, halted Furman's streak of consecutive made three-pointers (0x9) at 317 games — a streak that had stretched back to the advent of the modern three-point shot during the 1986-87 season. Furman's three-point shooting was so woeful last year that the Paladins actually failed to connect on a three-pointer in three contests (vs. William & Mary, South Carolina, and The Citadel).

✓ **JUST IN TIME...**Senior Will Coles was sidelined for much of the pre-season with a sprained ankle, but the 6-foot-8 Paladin center returned to action just in time to help spark the Paladins to the 66-59 win over Stetson, scoring eight points and adding seven rebounds and two key blocks in 24 minutes of action. "We don't win the game without Will Coles," said Furman head coach Larry Davis following the game. Coles' performance against the Hatters was huge because it allowed the Paladins to weather starting forward Stanislav Makshantsev's foul trouble (five fouls in 16 minutes of action). Coles averaged 4.8 ppg and 4.5 rpg a year ago in 23 contests. He also paced the Paladins in blocks (24) for the second consecutive season.

✓ **A YEAR'S EXPERIENCE REAPS DIVIDENDS...**A year ago starting point guard Marcus Dilligard didn't score his first collegiate point until the fourth game of the year, and he didn't tally his 13th point until the seventh game of the campaign (71-62 loss at Clemson). In the Paladins' 66-59 win over Stetson on Saturday, Dilligard registered a team high 13 points by converting 4x7 FGs and 5x7 FTs. In addition, he added three assists and a steal (and only two fouls) in 34 minutes of action and played excellent perimeter defense, thereby helping throttle the Hatters' outside attack (0x13 3PFG). Named to the 1997-98 Southern Conference All-Freshman Team, Dilligard started in all 29 games and averaged 5.8 ppg and 2.7 rpg last season.

✍ **QUIGLEY ON THE BOARDS...** Senior Daniel Quigley appears to be picking up where he left off when it comes to rebounding. A year ago the 6-foot-7 Paladin forward averaged 7.4 rpg in 28 games, but in 14 Southern Conference contests he paced all league rebounders (8.5 rpg). In the 66-59 win over Stetson on Saturday, Quigley pulled down a game high 10 boards and matched teammates Marcus Dilligard and Bubba Smith for team high scoring honors with 13. He also canned 1x2 three-point attempts in the win.

✍ **A COMPLETE PLAYER...** Senior guard Bubba Smith has yet to get Southern Conference-wide recognition for his solid all-around play, but if you want to know his value to the Furman squad, just ask head coach Larry Davis. Davis, who has recruited and coached some noteworthy guards in his young coaching career, including Minnesota All-American Bobby Jackson, rates Smith one of the top perimeter defenders in the country. While specializing as a defender is a ticket to recognition oblivion in the eyes of many, Smith is certainly more than one-dimensional. He simply does many things well, including play defense, pass, score, and lead. In the season opening, 66-59 win over Stetson, Smith matched teammates Marcus Dilligard and Daniel Quigley with a team high 13 points. Included in the outing was 3x4 three-pointers and a perfect 4x4 at the line. While Smith's offensive numbers against the Hatters were good, his defense on Stetson's guards was even better. Teaming with Marcus Dilligard and Anthony Thomas, Smith helped limit starting Hatter guards Shamar Johnson and Kenneth Johnson to two points and 1x14 FGs. A year ago Smith averaged 10.8 ppg and paced the Paladins in assists (75) and steals (47). He was also Furman's leading three-point shooter (37.8%). Smith currently ranks 10th on the school's all-time steals chart with 118, and he has the best shot of any active Paladin to become the 30th player in school history to score 1,000 points (currently 710).

✍ **PALADIN POINTERS...** Furman's second win a year ago came on Dec. 23 over Puerto Rico-Mayaguez (61-57) in the San Juan Shootout...four Paladin freshmen registered their first collegiate action in Saturday's 66-59 win over Stetson: guards Anthony Thomas, Kyle Julius, and Paul Foster, and center Stevan Petrovic...forward Stanislav Makshantsev also saw his first action as a Paladin after becoming the school's first junior college transfer in almost 20 years (Tobe Jackson, 1979)...William and Mary sophomore guard Alex Klein's grandfather, Dick Klein, is a Greenville, S.C., resident and regular presence at Furman home games, where he scouts for the Phoenix Suns. The elder Klein is also a former owner of the NBA's Chicago Bulls.

✍ **FURMAN IN PRE-SEASON POLLS...** Furman was a consensus Southern Conference South Division third place pick in a pair of pre-season polls conducted by the league head coaches and media. College of Charleston, which begins Southern Conference play this year, was the consensus first place pick in the south division, and Davidson was the top pick in the Southern Conference North Division in both polls. Furman finished fourth in the league's south division last year with a 9-20 overall record and 5-9 league mark.

✍ **PALADINS GO 2-0 IN EXHIBITION CONTESTS...** Furman claimed wins in its two pre-season exhibition games, taking a 90-70 decision over CSKA-Ukraine on Nov. 3 and an 87-73 verdict over Upstate AAU on Nov. 9. Senior guard Bubba Smith scored a game high 22 points and connected on 4-of-7 three-pointers in the Paladins' verdict of CSKA-Ukraine. Against Upstate AAU, the Paladins converted 10-of-21 three-point shots and got 25 points and 15 rebounds from senior forward Daniel Quigley. Freshman guard Anthony Thomas added 12 points and 15 boards in the Paladins' win over AAU.

✍ **PALADINS SIGN TWO...** Furman got its recruiting season off to a fast start this week by signing two high school standouts to national letters of intent. Darrell Arbaugh, a 6-foot-8 forward from Ashland, Ky., signed with the Paladins on Wednesday, and on Friday Furman inked 6-foot-6 forward Kenny Ziegler from Lithonia, Ga. Ziegler is rated among the nation's top 200 players by Prep Stars Magazine, and recruiting analyst Bob Gibbons called him "the most highly rated player headed to a Southern Conference school -- a player with the talent and work ethic to be the premier newcomer in the league next year."
