LAST WEEK

LEXINGTON, VA. — Furman quarterback Justin Hill passed for a career high 215 yards and two touchdowns, and backup signal caller Brent Rickman came off the bench to throw another pair of scoring strikes to lead Furman to a 51-14 Southern Conference rout and the Paladins 17th straight win over VMI.

Hill, who completed 11-of-17 passes on the day, connected with Stuart Rentz on an 8-yard touchown pass early in the second quarter to help the Paladins post a 17-0 halftime lead, and early in the second half the Paladin signal caller hooked up with flanker Desmond Kitchings on an 87-yard scoring toss, the fourth longest passing play in school history, to highlight a 20-point Furman third quarter.

Rickman took over for Hill late in the third period and promptly connected with split end Tyron Berrian on a 60-yard touchdown pass, and later added a 26-yard aerial tally to tight end Trent Sansbury at the 11:16 mark of the fourth quarter to put the Paladins ahead 44-7.

Hill and Rickman combined to throw for 301 yards, and Furman's ground game, which featured nine ball carriers, accounted for 199 yards to give the Paladins 500 yards in total offense against the Keydets.

Led by freshman linebacker Will Bouton's 13 tackles and caused fumble, Furman's defense accounted for three VMI turnovers, including a pair of fumbles and an interception.

Furman's special teams also shined, with punt returner Zach Smerdzinski returning five kicks for 100 yards, including one for 56 yards to the VMI 1-yard line to set up a Furman score.

CULLOWHEE, N.C. — Western Carolina quarterback Justin Cella's 2-yard touchdown run in the second overtime period lifted the Catamounts to a 31-24 upset win over East Tennessee State at in front of 10,166 fans E.J. Whitmire Stadium.

Cella, sophomore transfer from the University of Illinois, also threw for 165 yards and two touchdowns for the Catamounts, who claimed their second league victory in as many weeks.

Fullback Brad Hoover paced Western Carolina's ground game, rushing for 147 yards and one touchdown as the Catamounts rolled up 350 yards in total offense.

The Catamounts' defense, meanwhile, sacked East Tennessee State quarterback Todd Wells five times and limited the Buccaneers' talented offense to only 276 total yards.

LAST MEETING

CULLOWHEE, N.C.. (Oct. 4, 1997) — Western Carolina jumped to an early 10-0 lead, overcame a 13-10 halftime deficit, and held on to a 17-16 upset win over nationally 18th-ranked Furman after Paladin placekicker Jason Wells' 47-yard field goal try sailed just wide of the upright in the game's final seconds.

In a game that included three turnovers by each team, Western Carolina exacted an early

and costly toll on a pair of Furman miscues, as the Catamounts converted an interception into a 27-yard field goal by Ken Hinsley with 7:32 left in the first quarter to take a 3-0 lead. Less than an minute later, the Catamounts' Marcus Bradley gathered in Furman quarterback Brent Rickman's batted pass and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown and a 10-0 lead with 6:44 left.

Furman bounced back in the second quarter by converting three Western Carolina turnovers into 13 points. A pair of interceptions by Furman All-Southern Conference linebacker Orlando Ruff led to a Jason Wells 27-yard field goal and a 15-yard touchdown pass from Brent Rickman to Desmond Kitchings to knot the game at 10-10. Then, just before halftime Furman's Stuart Rentz pounced on a Western Carolina fumble at the Catamount 28. five plays later Furman's Jason Wells kicked a 41-yard field goal to give the Paladins a 13-10 lead.

In the third quarter, Western Carolina put together the game's most impressive offensive series, moving 79 yards in 11 plays to score what proved to be the game winning touchdown on an 18-yard run by Tracy Biggs with 9:06 left in the period.

Furman managed to close to within one point at 17-16 following a 35-yard field goal by Jason Wells, but Wells' fourth field goal attempt of the afternoon with 0:54 remaining in the game missed.

The Catamounts' efficient ground game, led by fullback Brad Hoover's 80 yards, proved to critical as Western Carolina rolled up 236 yards on Furman's defense. The Paladins managed just 127 on the ground and 287 total yards on the afternoon.

NOTING THE PALADINS

✓ STREAKING PALADINS...Furman's 51-14 rout of VMI on Saturday extended the Paladins' season winning streak to three games and improved Furman's series winning streak over the Keydets to 17 games dating back to the 1980 season. The victory was also Furman's eighth straight win in Lexington.

✔ HOME HOT STREAK TO GET TEST...When Western Carolina pays a visit to Paladin Stadium this Saturday, Furman is sure to receive a stern test in its bid to extend its four-game home winning streak. For the Paladins, who in all have won 12 of their last 13 home games dating back to the 1996 season. Western Carolina is unique in its ability to play on equal terms in Paladin Stadium, as the Catamounts own the best record (5-4) of any Furman opponent in Paladin Stadium history. That's quite a peg to hang one's hat on because Furman has fashioned an 85-23-1 record (.784) in Paladin Stadium since moving into the facility in 1981, having claimed seven Southern Conference championships along the way. Against all other current and past Southern Conference foes who have played in Paladin Stadium, Furman has posted a 41-13 record (.759). While Western Carolina's success in Greenville is well documented, the Paladins have had similar success in

- ✓ HIGH ANXIETY...There is a strong probability this Saturday's Furman-Western Carolina game will be a close, down-to-the-wire affair. That's because in the 25 previous meetings between the two schools 14 games have been decided by a touchdown or less, including last year's 17-16 result that saw Furman placekicker Jason Wells' 47-yard game winning field goal attempt sail just wide of the upright in the game's final minute.
- ✔ PASSING GAME COMES ALIVE...After throwing for only 203 yards and one touchdown in its first three games, Furman quarterbacks Justin Hill (Greer, S.C.) and Brent Rickman (Rome, Ga,) combined to throw for 301 yards and four touchdowns in Saturday's 51-14 win over VMI. For Hill, who completed 11-of-17 passes for 215 yards and two touchdowns, his performance against VMI marked a career high and included a career long 87-yard touchdown pass to junior flanker Desmond Kitchings (Wagener, S.C.). Rickman, meanwhile, came off the bench in the second half and completed 2-of-4 passes for 86 yards and two touchdowns against the Keydets, including a career tying 60-yard scoring strike to junior split end Tyron Berrian (Tallahassee, Fla.). Rickman, who started in six contests and passed for 943 yards as a true freshman in 1997, has now passed for 1,029 yards and nine touchdowns in his career. Hill, in seven career starts, has thrown for 630 yards and four touchdowns.
- ✓ INTO THE RECORD BOOKS...Furman's 301 passing yards against VMI marked the eighth best passing total and ninth 300-yard passing effort in school history. Ironically, big passing performances haven't resulted in many wins for Furman, which is a combined 3-6 in the nine games it has totaled at least 300 yards through the air.
- ✓ KITCHINGS, BERRIAN MAKING THE "BIG" **PLAYS**...Furman's two starting receivers, junior flanker Desmond Kitchings (Wagener, S.C.) and junior split end Tyron Berrian (Tallahassee, Fla.), don't have an abundance of catches through Furman's first four games, but they do have some that have gone for big yardage. In Furman's 51-14 win over VMI, Kitchings caught five passes for 102 yards, including one that went for a career long 87 yards and a touchdown. Kitchings, a preseason All-Southern Conference pick, leads Furman in receiving with 11 catches for 203 yards (18.5 yards/catch) and a touchdown, and is the Paladins' leader in all-purpose yardage with 419, including 175 yards in kickoff returns (21.9/return) and 41 yards rushing (8.2/rush). Berrian, meanwhile, is coming off the best performance of his career after totaling four receptions for 136 yards and a touchdown against VMI. Berrian, who two weeks ago caught a 55-yard touchdown pass in a 34-24 win over Samford, hooked up with backup quarterback Brent Rickman for a 60-yard scoring strike against VMI. He has seven catches for 205 yards (29.3 yards/catch) and two touchdowns

through four games.

- ✓ MAKING 'EM PAY...For the second straight week Furman made an opponent pay dearly for turning the ball over. In forcing three VMI miscues (two fumbles and an interception), Furman converted the two Keydet fumbles into 14 points. The interception (in the end zone) halted a VMI scoring threat. In its last two games against VMI and Samford, Furman has been the recipient of nine turnovers, which it has converted into 45 points. That's quite a turnaround from the Paladins' first two games, where three Furman turnovers led directly to 20 points for Clemson (33-0 loss) and South Carolina State (27-19 win). Furman heads into the Western Carolina game leading the Southern Conference in turnover margin (+1.25), having forced 11 opponent turnovers while suffering six miscues through four games.
- ✓ WHEREHAVE THE SACKS GONE?...A year ago Furman's veteran defense, led by All-America defensive end Bryan Dailer's 17.5 sacks, paced the Southern Conference with 32 quarterback takedowns. This year, with an all new defensive front and nine new starters on defense, the Paladins have managed only three sacks through its first four games, and head into this Saturday's Western Carolina game ranked sixth in the league in that category. The Catamounts, meanwhile, are displaying a strong pass rush in the early going, having racked up 11 sacks in their first three games to rank second in the league.
- ✓ NOTING **FURMAN'S OFFENSIVE** LINE...Redshirt freshman guard Marty Priore (Cincinnati, Ohio) gained the first career start of his career in Saturday's 51-14 win over VMI, taking over for sophomore Mark Batluck (Carlisle, Pa.), who sustained a season ending knee injury early in the Paladins' 34-24 win over Samford on Sept 19. Redshirt freshman tackle Donnie Littlejohn (Gaffney, S.C.) gained his second straight start at left tackle, stepping in ahead of junior Ryan Kineard (Blakely, Ga.). Kineard, who missed the Samford game with an ankle sprain, returned as a backup against VMI and logged 18 plays en route to a winning performance. Littlejohn also garnered a winning grade if 1.90 (.804%) on 41 plays. Three Paladin regulars, tackle Josh Moore (Cross Hill, S.C.), guard , and center Mark Fos-
- ter (Williamston, S.C.), each earned "exceptional" grades in the win over VMI. Moore led the way with a mark of 2.04 (.936%) on 47 plays; Foster registered a 2.03 (.891%) on 37 plays; and Hall polled a 2.00 (.931%) on 37 plays. All 11 Furman offensive linemen who dressed for the VMI game saw action.
- ► FRESHMEN CORNERS CONTINUING TO DELIVER...After starting redshirt freshman cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) picked off a pair of passes in a 27-19 win over South Carolina State on Sept. 12, Furman's other starting redshirt freshman cornerback, Daniel Roberson (Plant City, Fla.) upped the ante the

next week by earning league freshman-of-theweek honors after totaling three tackles and two interceptions, including one he returned 40 yards for a touchdown, in the Paladins' 34-24 win over Samford.

Not to be overshadowed, Richie Jackson picked up his third interception of the year in the win over Samford (to set up Furman's first touchdown of the second half), and he also made perhaps the biggest defensive play of the game when, early in the fourth quarter and with Samford driving (trailing 27-17), he stripped the ball from Bulldog receiver Jon Pointer at the Furman 22 after a 17-yard gain and it was recovered by John Keith.

"The turnover on the first drive of the fourth quarter really hurt," said Samford head coach Pete Hurt. I thought if we could have taken that on in the game could have gone down to the wire. But, that fumble took the wind out of us."

This past Saturday, in the Paladins' 51-14 win over VMI, Jackson and Roberson continued their surprising seasons with another strong outing, where they combined for five tackles, a fumble recovery, and a pass deflection.

In four games, Furman's two starting redshirt freshmen cornerbacks have accounted for 25 tackles, five of the Paladins' six interceptions, four pass deflections, a fumble recovery, and one forced fumble. Jackson and Roberson were not even listed as probable starters in Furman's preseason depth chart, but injuries to projected starters Andre Stroman (Plantation, Fla.) and Bryant Huguley (Valley, Ala.) forced Jackson and Roberson into the starting lineup.

✔ RENTZ TO THE RESCUE...When Stuart Rentz (Pickens, S.C.) joined Furman's football program two years ago as a walk-on, the coaching staff didn't even ask him to have a mug shot taken for TV games, believing he had little, if any, chance to play. A little over two years later, Rentz once again demonstrated that early assumptions are often times wrong. Stepping in ahead of senior tailback Ernest Crosby (Greenville, S.C.) in the Samford game, Rentz rushed 22 times for 133 yards in helping the Paladins to the 34-24 win over the Bulldogs. The 100-yard rushing performance was the third of his career, which now covers five starts. In Saturday's 51-14 win over VMI, Rentz led Furman's nine-man rushing effort, running eight times for 61 yards and a touchdown, which covered 20 yards. Rentz also scored the Paladins' second touchdown of the game on an 8yard pass from quarterback Justin Hill.

One of Furman's finest students, Rentz, a double major in business and Spanish who sports a 3.92 GPA, burst on the scene as a freshman two years ago when, in his first career start, he rushed for a Furman freshman record 166 yards and a touchdown in a 31-14 win over VMI in Lexington. The following week he ran 18 times for a 125 yards in a 45-30 win over Western Carolina. Not blessed with great speed, the 5-foot-8, 185-pound Rentz does, however, run with impressive desire. He is averaging 6.5 yards per rush in his career (100 att., 651 yds., 5 TDs).

✓ KEITH ON TRACK TO RETURN...On Monday Furman head athletic trainer Brian Reese upgraded junior All-Southern Conference strong safety John Keith's status to "probable" for this Saturday's clash with Western Carolina. Keith, who sustained a sprained foot late in the the Paladins' 34-24 win over Samford on Sept. 19, did not dress in Saturday's win over VMI after totaling a team leading 36 tackles in Furman's first three games. Keith's return would be a huge boost to Furman's defense, as he ranks alongside senior All-Southern Conference linebacker Orlando Ruff as one of the squad's top defensive performers. Keith opened the year with a career high 19 tackles in a 33-0 loss at Clemson, and in his last action against Samford, he totaled eight tackles, a sack, a caused fumble, a fumble recovery, and a pass deflection.

In Keith's absence against VMI, the Paladins moved senior **Rocco Adrian** (Deltona, Fla.) from free safety to strong safety, and junior started junior **Walter Booth** (Hartwell, Ga.) at the free safety slot.

✓ DITTO FOR IVORY...In rushing 23 times for 161 yards and two touchdowns in Furman's 27-19 win over South Carolina State on September 12, freshman fullback Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.) fashioned the finest rushing performance by a Furman fullback since the 1989 season when Dwight Sterling ran for 166 yards in a 42-7 win over Wofford. Ivory, whose scoring runs against the Bulldogs covered 54 and 25 yards, captured Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Week honors for his work against South Carolina State but sustained a mild ankle sprain early in the Paladins' 34-24 win over Samford on Sept. 19. Ivory, who rushed for 3,100 yards and 37 touchdowns at Peach County High School and who was a participant in the Georgia-Florida All-Star Game this past summer, did not dress for the VMI game, but he is expected back for this Saturday's game against Western Carolina.

✔ BOBBY JOHNSON: YEAR FIVE...The 1998 season marks Furman head coach Bobby Johnson's fifth year at the helm of a Paladin program and 21st season of service to the university. After suffering through a 3-8 season in 1994 (the program's first losing season since 1979 and worst record since 1972), Furman rebounded in 1995 to finish 6-5. A year later Johnson directed the Paladins to a 9-4 record and into the NCAA I-AA playoffs — the program's first playoff appearance since 1990. Furman went 7-4 last year and finished third in the Southern Conference for the third consecutive year. Johnson's four-year head coaching record is 28-22 (.560), and his last three teams have combined to post a 25-14 slate (.641). Johnson's 21-year tenure at Furman includes work as defensive backs coach, assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. ✓ SEVEN PALADINS NAMED PRE-SEASON ALL-SOCON...In balloting by Southern Conference head coaches, seven Paladins were selected to the pre-season all-league team. They include senior center Mark Foster (Williamston, S.C.), junior offensive guard Ben Hall (Royston, Ga.), junior placekicker Jason Wells (Lawton, Okla.), senior linebacker Orlando Ruff (Winnsboro, S.C.), and junior strong safety John Keith (Newnan, Ga.), who were named to the first team. ✓ FOSTER PRE-SEASON ALL-AMERICA...Furman senior center Mark Foster (Williamston, S.C.) was selected to the Sports Network Pre-Season All-America team. ✓ CROSBY SETS SIGHTS ON 2,000...Senior tailback Ernest Crosby (Greenville, S.C.) came into the 1998 season bidding to become only the ninth player in Furman history to rush for 2,000 yards in a career.
