# FURMAN-ELON LAST MEETING

GREENVILLE (Sept. 4, 1999) -- The NCAA I-AA independent Elon Fightin' Christians built a two-touchdown lead and held off a second half Furman rally to post a 24-22 upset win over the Paladins in the 1999 season opener for both teams

Trailing 24-10 following a 22-yard field goal by the Fightin' Christians' Jim Willis midway through the third quarter, Furman sliced Elon's lead to 24-16 with a 1-yard touchdown plunge by fullback Derek Russell with 1:38 left in the third quarter.

Furman struck for another touchdown on the final play of the third period when junior defensive end Hershal Pleasant scooped up an Elon fumble and returned it 30 yards for a score, but the Paladins' failure to convert a two-point pass play allowed Elon to maintain a 24-22 lead.

The Fightin' Christians' margin appeared to be in jeopardy in the fourth quarter when Furman drove 62 yards in six plays, but the scoring opportunity slipped away when Elon defensive lineman Jerome Nelson pounced on a fumbled Paladin handoff at the Fightin' Christian 11 yard line. Furman had two other chances to take com-

mand, but one opportunity ended with a punt from the Elon 38, and the other one, which followed a second Fightin' Christian fumble at its own 29yard line, proved unsuccessful when Jason Wells missed a 36-yard field goal with only 38 seconds left in the game.

# FURMAN LAST TIME OUT

GREENVILLE (Nov. 27, 1999) -- Massachu-setts running back Marcel Shipp's 1-yard scoring run in the first overtime period lifted the defending NCAA I-AA national champion Minutemen to a 30-23 win over host Furman in first round playoff action at Paladin Stadium.

Shipp's game winning score, which high-lighted a 170-yard rushing performance, was made possible after Furman's Jason Wells missed a 37-yard field goal with 0:12 left in regulation. The Paladins had used just 1:30 to drive 59 yards in 11

plays to set up Wells' game winning field goal try. Making its first playoff appearance since 1996, Furman built a 14-10 halftime lead on the strength of a pair of Derek Russell touchdown runs.

Massachusetts retook the lead at 16-14 on Shipp's 13-yard touchdown run early in the third quarter, but Furman's Walter Booth blocked the extra point conversion. The Paladins answered with an 8-play, 82-yard scoring drive that ended on Derek Russell's third 1-yard touchdown plunge of the game at the 8:33 mark of the third period Furman, however, could not extend its 20-16 lead when a two-point conversion pass went awry.

A 31-yard touchdown pass from Minutemen guarterback Todd Bankhead to Sean Higgins put UMass up 23-20 later in the quarter, but Furman tied the game with a Jason Wells 39-yard field goal early in the final period.

The game's next five possessions ended in four punts and a turnover before Furman moved to the Massachusetts 19 where Wells' game winning field goal try slid just wide of the left upright.

# NOTING THE PALADINS

✓ FURMAN TO OPEN 95TH SEASON...The 2000 season opener against Elon will mark the start of the 95th season of football at Furman. The first school in South Carolina (along with Wofford) to begin playing football, Furman since 1889 has rolled up a 479-381-38 record. A member of the Southern Conference since 1936, Furman has now captured 10 league championships (1978, '80, '81, '82 '83, 85, '88, '89, '90, '99). The Paladins' 10 conference championships match former league member Duke's league high 10 crowns. Furman claimed outright championships in 1980, '81, '82, '83, '85, '89, and '90 and shared conference titles in 1978, '88, and '99.

✓ FU FOOTBALL NOW SPANS THREE CENTURIES...When Furman takes the field Saturday against Elon, the Paladins will try to do something no Furman squad has done before: win a century opener. The Paladins dropped a 5-1 verdict to Wofford on Dec. 14, 1889, in its inaugural gridiron contest, and Furman tied Wofford 0-0 in the first game of the 20th century (Oct. 26, 1900).

✓ PALADINS IN PRE-SEASON POLLS...A preseason pick by Southen Conference head coaches to win the league and second place selection in the league (behind Georgia Southern) by conference media, Furman emerged with a consensus No. 9 national ranking in both The Sports Network and ESPN-USA Today Top 25 Pre-Season Polls. The Paladins' ninth place pre-season poll put them behind Georgia Southern and, suprisingly, Appalachian State, which Furman outpolled at the conference level and defeated handily 35-21 a year ago in Greenville. Furman was unranked in last year's pre-season polls and finished the season ranked 12th in the Sports Network Poll and 9th in ESPN-USA Today's Poll.

✓ BOBBY JOHNSON: YEAR SEVEN...The 2000 football season will mark Furman head coach Bobby Johnson's seventh year at the helm of the Paladin program and 23rd season of service to the university. After suffering through a 3-8 season in 1994 (the program's first losing season since 1979), Furman rebounded in 1995 to finish 6-5. A year later, Johnson, a Columbia native and 1973 Clemson graduate, directed the Paladins to a 9-4 record and into the NCAA I-AA playoffs — the program's first playoff appearance since 1990. Furman went 7-4 in 1997, 5-6 in 1998, and 9-3 last year on the way to claiming the program's 10th league championship and second NCAA playoff appearance under Johnson. Johnson's six-year head coaching record is 39-30 (.565) and his last five teams have combined to post a 36-22 mark (.620). Against NCAA I-AA competition, Furman teams under Johnson's di-rection have gone 38-26 (.594). Johnson's 22-year tenure includes work as defensive backs coach, assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. The Paladins' record during that span (1976-80; 82-92; 94-present) is 171-83-7 (.669).

✓ JOHNSON=SUCCESS...Furman's nine wins last year as part of its 9-3 season tied the high water win mark for Bobby Johnson-coached Paladin squad. In 1996, Furman went 8-3 in the regular season and finished with a 9-4 record. The nine regular season wins a year ago were the most by a Furman team since 1989 when the

Paladins posted a 10-1 regular season mark on the way to a 12-2 record. Only nine teams in Furman football history (94 seasons) have won at least nine games in a regular season, and Bobby Johnson has had a hand in seven of those squads in the capacities of defensive backs coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach.

✓ PALADINS LOOKING TO IMPROVE RECORD IN SEASON OPENERS...Furman hasn't had much success in recent season openers, having posting a 1-5 mark in its last six season inaugurals. Furman's opponents, however, have had a lot to do with that lack of success, as four of the Paladins' last six season opening foes have included Clemson (1994, '96, & '98) and Georgia Tech (1995). The other two were Samford (1997) and Elon (1999). Saturday's game against Elon will mark only the second time Furman has played a season opener in Paladin Stadium since 1993. Overall, Furman was just 5-5 in season openers in the 1990s.

✓ UNDER THE LIGHTS...Furman's 2000 season opener against Elon will mark only the 10th night game in Paladin Stadium's 20-year, 119game history. Opened in 1981, Paladin Stadium did not host a night game until the 1991 season when Furman knocked off Liberty 31-7 in the Paladins' home opener. In the nine games under the lights of Paladin Stadium, Furman has posted a solid 7-2 record (.778) and enters the Elon contest having captured four of the last five night games within its home confines, including a 58-0 verdict over VMI last year. The Paladins' only two losses at night in Paladin Stadium came to Will-iam & Mary in 1994 (28-26) and Elon last year (24-22). Since assuming the head coaching reins in 1994, Bobby Johnson has directed the Paladins to a 5-2 record (.714) in home night contests, and his first career win as the Paladins' head coach was a 26-21 night verdict over South Carolina State in 1994. Furman is 91-27-1 (.769) overall in Paladin Stadium.

✓ FIRST OF SEVEN HOME GAMES...Furman's season opening clash with Elon on Saturday will mark the first of seven regular season home games for the Paladins this season, and first of four home contests in September. Prior to this year, Furman has only played seven regular season home contests once since moving into Paladin Stadium, and that came in 1987 when the Paladins produced a 5-2 record. Furman played an all-time high nine home games in 1989 and went 8-1, but that run included three playoff contests.

✓ GETTING OUT OF THE GATE...With nine offensive starters returning off its 1999 Southern Conference championship squad, Furman will look to extend the first quarter efficiency it rang up last year when it outscored the opposition 125-41 in the opening stanza. Last year's numbers marked a notable improvement over 1998, when the Paladins barely edged the opposition 76-75 in first quarter scoring.

✓ PALADINS LOOK FOR CONTINUED 4TH QUARTER SUPREMACY, TOO...As it attempts to match the first quarter efficiency it displayed a year ago, Furman will also try to extend the fourth quarter dominance it demonstrated in 1999 when the Paladins outscored the opposition 112-35 in the final stanza.

✓ OFFENSIVE EXPECTATIONS...One of the keys to Furman's outstanding 1999 season was an offense that registered an impressive turnaround from the 1998 season, and with nine starters and 23 lettermen returning this year, Furman's offense may be in position to post even better numbers this fall.

✓ IT'S JUSTIN TIME...Much of the optimism surrounding Furman's veteran offense this fall is due to the return of senior quarterback and team co-captain Justin Hill (Greer, S.C.). A second team All-Southern Conference pick in 1999, Hill played a major role in leading Furman to a 9-3 record, Southern Conference championship, and trip to the NCAA I-AA playoffs a year ago, throwing for 1,519 yards and nine touchdowns while also rushing for 680 yards and eight scores. During one three-game stretch that included wins over The Citadel, East Tennessee State, and North Carolina, Hill completed a school record 19 straight pass attempts, and he finished the season with a 62.4 completion percentage, the second highest season rate in school history. Hill's

680 rushing yards improved his career rushing total to 1,301 yards — the most ever by a Paladin guarterback. Furman is now 17-8 with Hill in the starting lineup. As a freshman in 1997, he paced the Paladins to a 3-0 record in three late season starts. In 1998 Furman went 5-5 with Hill under center (missed one start due to injury), and last season the Paladins forged a 9-3 mark with their veteran quarterback at the controls. The maturity of Hill in 1999 was reflected in the prodigious jump in production by Furman's offense, as the Paladins averaged 36.0 points and 424.3 yards per game after totaling only 24.3 points and 311.1 yards per outing in 1998.

✓ THE BEST OF HILL...The following are Justin Hill's top single game rushing, passing, and total offense performances.

### ✓ IVORY TO HEADLINE POTENT RUSHING

ATTACK...While Furman's passing attack netted notable improvement in 1999, the biggest turnaround was achieved in the Paladin rushing game, which averaged 284.2 yards per game a year ago after totaling only 185.0 yards per outing in 1998. Expected to again headline the Paladin ground game is junior All-Southern Conference tailback Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.), who last year made the switch from fullback to tailback on the way to becoming the first Paladin 1,000-yard rusher since Carl Tremble topped the plateau in 1992. In rolling up 1,519 yards and 14 touchdowns in 1999, Ivory posted the second highest season rushing total in Furman history and tallied 100yard rushing performances in eight games, including a career high 203-yard outing against East Tennessee State (48-21 win). In addition, his 14 rushing touchdowns in 1999 were the second highest season total ever by a Paladin. In a 28-3 victory over North Carolina, Ívory garnered a career high 34 carries for 177 yards — the most yards ever by a Paladin player against and NCAA I-A opponent. Overall Furman is 8-1 in Ivory's nine career 100-yard rushing performances.

✓ DEREK RUSSELL: TD MAN...Returning senior fullback Derek Russell (Austell, Ga.) proved during the 1999 season that he had a nose for the end zone as he led Furman in scoring with 90 points on 15 touchdowns despite finishing only fourth in rushing with 337 yards. Russell's 15 rushing TDs tied the school season rushing touchdowns standard first set by Robbie Gardner in 1986 and later matched by Carl Tremble in 1990. Three of Russell's scores, all 1-yard dives, came in the Paladins' 30-23 loss to Massachusetts in NCAA I-AA playoff action. While he is a proven performer as a blocker and runner in short yardage situations, Russell does have a pair of 100yard rushing performances to his credit, and both have come against Chattanooga. In the Paladins' 40-35, Southern Conference title-clinching win over the Mocs last year, Russell ran for 101 yards on 15 carries, including a decisive 44-yard touchdown run late in the fourth quarter.

✓ PALADIN OFFENSIVE LINE LOOKING STRONG...Although Southern Conference Jacobs Blocking Award winning guard Ben Hall has graduated, Furman's offensive line should be a team strength this year with the return of four starters. Heading the list are three pre-season All-Southern Conference selections: senior tackle Josh Moore (Cross Hill, S.C.), junior guard Marty Priore (Cincinnati, Ohio), and junior center Chris Stewart (Palm Harbor, Fla.). Moore, a consensus 1999 all-conference first team pick, was recently named to the 2000 Sports Network Pre-Season All-America team and, at 6-foot-5, 306 pounds, is one of the biggest players to ever wear a Paladin uniform. He owns 18 career starts. Prior, mean-while, has started in 20 consecutive games since moving into the lineup early in 1998 campaign. And Stewart, the team's strongest player (500pound bench press, 675- pound squat, 357pound power clean), tallied the highest season blocking grade (89.6%) and winning grades in all 12 games a year ago in helping the Paladins to a 9-3 record and league championship. Furman's other returning starter, junior tackle Donnie Littlejohn, actually boasts more starting experience (21 games) and play participations (1,308) than all Paladin linemen. Expected to fill Ben Hall's vacated starting slot at right guard is sophomore Trevor Kruger (Moultrie, Ga.).

✓ GOING FOR A RARE TRIPLE...If tackle Josh Moore, guard Marty Priore, and Chris Stewart make good on their pre-season All-Southern Conference tabs by league head coaches, it will indeed be a rarity. Only twice before, in 1981 and 1990, have three Furman offensive linemen earned first team All-Southern Conference honors in the same year.

✓ SANSBURY BACK AT TIGHT END...Although he caught only eight passes for 87 yards and two touchdowns in 1999, junior tight end Trent Sansbury earned consensus All-Southern Conference honors and was recently named to the 2000 Sports Network Pre-Season All-America Team. A solid blocker, Sansbury will is expected to anchor the tight end slot for Furman this fall along with junior Graham Hunter (Knoxville, Tenn.), who has been limited in the pre-season with a strained hamstring.

✓ RECEIVING CORPS BY COMMITTEE...The departure of Des Kitchings, Furman's All-American return specialist, receiver (48 catches, 911 yards, 5 TDs in 1999), and seventh round draft pick of the Kansas City Chiefs, has left a huge void in the Paladin receiving corps, and it appears it will be filled by a number of players. Senior Bryant Huguley (Valley, Ala.) is expected to take over for Kitchings at flanker after catching six passes for 84 yards and one score in 1999. Also slated to see plenty of action at flanker is sophomore Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.). At split end the Paladins welcome the return of senior Zach Smerdzinski (Vienna, Va.). Last year, in his first season as a starter, Smerdzinski caught 30 passes for 367 yards and a touchdown. He will be backed up by sophomore James Thomas (Marianna, Fla.), who nabbed six catches in 1999 for 109 yards and a touchdown. With the exception of Smerdzinski, virtually the entire Furman receiving corps, including Huguley, Thomas, and Rinehart, was slowed in the pre-season due to hamstring strains.

✓ JUNIORS RULE...A quick check of Furman's probable two-deep reveals the Paladins will likely start only five seniors in this Saturday's season opener against Elon. The remainder of Furman's starting cast is likely to include 13 juniors and four sophomores. Four of the five seniors are on offense, and the one lone senior defensive starter will linebacker Marion Martin (Columbia, S.C.).

✓ SPENCER, SPERLING, DEBEER HEAD-ING UP DEFENSIVE FRONT...Furman's defensive line will be looking for improved play this year, and expected to lead the way are tackles Ryan Spencer (Clover, S.C.), LeBryan Sperling (Decatur, Ga.), and end Steve DeBeer (Atlanta, Ga.). Spencer, a junior with eight career starts, and Sperling, a sophomore who started in six games as a true freshman in 1999, have looked solid in the pre-season, and DeBeer, a junior who earned starts in the final three games last season, made the switch from interior line to end after missing over a week of pre-season practice with a concussion.

✓ WILL BOUTON: PRE-SEASON ALL-AMERCIAN...One of the most experienced junior defensive players in the Southern Conference, Paladin middle linebacker Will Bouton (Greenville, S.C.), a starter 23 straight games, heads into the 2000 season regarded as one of the best linebackers in NCAA I-AA. Named to the Sports Network Pre-Season All-America squad, Bouton, who earned consensus all-conference honors after totaling 130 tackles a year ago, already counts 241 tackles in his career.

MARION MARTIN: ATHLETIC, ACADEMIC STAR...Projected starting weak side linebacker Marion Martin (Columbia, S.C.) is an outstanding student on Furman's football team who contributes in a major way on the field. A year ago Martin racked up 66 tackles in helping Furman to a 9-3 record and Southern Conference championship. After the season he was named to the prestigious GTE Academic All-America second team, joining fellow teammate Stuart Rentz, who earned first team honors, in giving Furman two representatives on the prestigious squad. In May of this year, Martin graduated summa cum laude with a 3.90 grade point average in chemistry. Already closing in on master's degree in chemistry from Furman. Martin opted to return for his final season of eligibility prior to seeking his doctoral degree.

✓ EXPERIENCED CORNERS...Next to its linebacking corps, the most experienced part of Furman's defensive unit is cornerback, where juniors Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) and Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.) return following solid 1999 campaigns. Rated by head coach Bobby Johnson as two of the better cornebacks in the Southern Conference, Jackson and Johnson count 36 starts and 2,477 career snaps between them. Jackson leads the way with 23 starts, nine interceptions, and 17 pass deflections in his career. Last year he tallied 67 tackles, four pickoffs, 12 pass deflections, four forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries. In the Paladins' 40-35 conference title clinching win over Chattanooga, Jackson added to his big game, big play reputation by registering eight tackles, an interception, and a fumble recovery that led directly to a score. Johnson, meanwhile, has more quietly assumed a position as perhaps the Paladins' best cover corner, thanks in part to his 4.45 second speed in the 40-yard dash. Last year in his first full season as a starter, he totaled 59 tackles, an interception, and six pass deflections.

✓ NEW SAFETIES...Furman will lean heavily on returning cornerbacks Richie Jackson and Rodney Jackson this fall due, in part, to the fact that at the Paladins graduated consensus All-American free safety John Keith, a fourth round draft pick of the San Francisco 49ers, and All-Southern Conference strong safety Walter Booth. Expected to step in at free safety is junior Josh Cooper (Cincinnati, Ohio), and at strong safety Shelvis Smith (College Park, Ga.) appears ready to take over. While Cooper and Smith are both two-year lettermen, the duo has no starting experience and only 268 total play participations between them. ✓ FOLLOWING IN FOOTSTEPS...It appears freshman Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) has won the battle for squad placekicking duties. The only freshman to capture a starting role among Furman's 24 positions this year, Marshall is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. The younger Marshall tallied 148 points in a solid career at Marist High School.

✓ FRESHMAN IMPACT...Due to the large number of returning veterans on this year's squad, few true freshmen, other than perhaps placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.), will be counted on for serious playing time, at least in the early going. In addition to Marshall, five other true freshmen are expected to dress for Saturday's season opener against Elon, and they include wide receiver Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.), center Craig Morgan (Morgantown, W.Va.), free safety Cam Newton (Bennettsville, S.C.), defensive tackle Michael Burant (Lexington, Va.), and linebacker Cedrick Ritter (Fairfax, S.C.).

✓ FURMAN AND THE NFL...Furman football sports three graduates on active NFL rosters following recent squad cuts.

Tight end Luther Broughton '97 (Cainhoy, S.C.) is now in his second season with the Philadelphia Eagles after catching 26 passes for 295 yards and three touchdowns last season. A fifthround pick of the Eagles in the 1997 draft, Broughton spent the 1997 campaign with the Eagles before signing the Carolina Panthers, with whom he played the entire 1998 season before being traded back to the Eagles prior to the start of the 1999 campaign.

Linebacker Orlando Ruff '99 (Winnsboro, S.C.) is entering his second season with the San Diego Chargers and first as the Chargers' starting middle linebacker. Last year, after signing with San Diego as a free agent, Ruff garnered team special teams MVP honors.

John Keith '00 (Newnan, Ga.), a fourth round pick of the San Francisco 49ers in this year's draft, has earned a spot on the 49ers roster following a strong pre-season as nickel back and member of special teams.

Wide receiver Des Kitchings '00 (Wagener, S.C.), a seventh round choice of the Kansas City Chiefs in this year's draft, was waived by the Chiefs on Sunday. Slowed in pre-season camp with a strained hamstring, Kitchings, according to team sources, has a solid chance to make the Chiefs' practice squad.

✓ FURMAN TO INDUCT SIX INTO HALL-OF-FAME SEPT. 16...Former football All-American and current Paladin assistant coach Allen Edwards '92 is among six greats who will be inducted into the Furman University Athletic Hallof-Fame in ceremonies Sept. 16. Also slated for induction are Carolina Peek Blaylock '95 (golf), Scott Broderick '88 (soccer), Mel Daniel '82 (basketball), Jack Kay '86 (golf), and Brent Williams '91 (baseball).
