THE GAME

Fresh from a 27-18 win over Southern Conference rival Wofford on Saturday, Furman (8-2, 5-2 SoCon) can lock up an NCAA I-AA playoff bid and likely first round home playoff contest with a win over Chattanooga (5-5, 3-4 SoCon) in the regular season finale for both teams. Chattanooga, meanwhile, can clinch a winning season with a victory over Furman.

THE SERIES

In a series that got its start in 1928 with a 15-0 Chattanooga win in Greenville, Furman holds a 16-12 advantage.

Furman enters Saturday's game having claimed five straight wins over the Mocs, including a 40-35 cliffhanger last year in Chattanooga that earned the Paladins a share of the 1999 Southern Conference championship. Furman topped the Mocs 31-28 two years ago in Greenville. UTC's last win in the series, a 34-20 verdict, came during the 1994 season in Greenville.

In all games played in Greenville, Furman holds a narrow 7-6 advantage. In Chattanooga, the Paladins sport a 9-6 lead in the series.

Russell's game winning touchdown run with 4:21 left gave Furman a 40-28 lead, and the Paladins held off Chattanooga's upset bid when Trent Sansbury recovered a Mocs' onside kick at the UTC 44-yard line with 1:43 left after Chattanooga had scored to make it a 40-35 game. Furman sophomore cornerback Richie Jackson sealed the win with an interception at the UTC 26 with only 18 seconds remaining.

Furman's victory didn't come easy as the Paladins had to fend off the accurate arm of UTC quarterback Chris Sanders, who completed 41-of-67 passes for a Southern Conference single game record 532 yards and three touchdowns.

Russell finished the game with 101 yards and two touchdowns. His 44-yard scoring run was the second longest of his career.

Tailback Louis Ivory paced Furman's 296-yard rushing attack with 128 yards and a score for his seventh 100-yard game of the season.

Furman jumped out to an 21-7 early second quarter lead before Chattanooga sliced it to 21-14. After both teams traded scores, the Paladins' Des Kitchings delivered one of the game's crucial plays when he fielded a Mocs' kickoff at the 21-yard line and raced 79 yards untouched for a touchdown to give the Paladins a 34-21 advantage with only 16 seconds remaining in the first half.

FURMAN LAST TIME OUT

SPARTANBURG, S.C. (Nov. 11. 2000) -- Quarterback Justin Hill threw for 163 yards and a touchdown and tailback Louis Ivory, the nation's leading rusher, ran for 165 yards to lead nationally fourth-ranked Furman to a 27-18 Southern Conference victory over No. 25 Wofford at Gibbs Stadium.

With the win, Furman dramatically improved its bid for a spot in the NCAA I-AA playoffs, which get underway Nov. 25. Wofford (6-3, 5-3) had its playoffs hopes dashed with the loss, the Terriers' fifth in the last six clashes with Furman.

In rushing for 165 yards in the contest, Ivory upped his season rushing total to 1,872 yards. Ivory needs 61 yards in the Paladins' regular season finale to set a new Southern Conference regular season rushing standard and 128 vards to become the first 2.000-vard regular season rusher in league history

Wofford took the opening kickoff and used 11 plays to cover 86 yards for the game's first score, which came on a 3-yard touchdown run by Melvin Jones with 11:08 left in the first quarter. The PAT attempt failed, leaving the Terriers with a 6-0 lead.

A fumble recovery by Furman's Brandon Poole on the Terriers' next possession gave the Paladins the football at the Wofford 35. After moving to the 18, Danny Marshall put the Paladins on the board with a 35-yard field goal at the 4:32 juncture of the first period.

A little over two minutes later, a short Wofford punt led to Furman's next score when Justin Hill found Bryant Huguley open behind the Terrier secondary for a 38-yard touchdown strike to give the Paladins a 10-6 advantage.

Midway through the second quarter the Paladins took advantage of another Wofford turnover for a score. Shelvis Smith's interception and 22-yard return put Furman's offense in business at its own 48. From there the Paladins covered 52 yards in 12 plays before Derek Russell bulled over from 1 yard out to make it a 17-6 game with 7:07 left in the first half.

After a Terrier field goal closed the gap to 17-9 with a little over two minutes left before intermission, Furman's offense put together its best drive of the game. A 55-yard play action pass from Hill to sophomore wide receiver Bear Rinehart on the drive's first play gave the Paladins the ball at the Wofford 25. Six plays later, on a third and three play from the 8, Rinehart took a reverse handoff from Ivory around right end untouched for the score and a 24-9 Furman lead.

Furman's momentum didn't last long in the second half, however, as Wofford's Will Thomas blocked a Lee Willis punt that was returned by Jeremy Dula to the Paladin 7-yard line. Three plays later, Tony Hudson scored from a yard out to cut the margin to 24-15. The two-point rush attempt failed.

On the ensuing kickoff, a Chris Lowery fumble was recovered by Wofford's Josh Brizendine at the Paladin 20. The Terriers, however, were unable to generate a first down, and Darren Brown missed on a 35-yard field goal.

Brown converted a 22-yard field goal on the next series to pull Wofford within 24-18 with 2:18 left in the third quarter.

From that point both team's defenses stiffened, but Furman's special teams came through with one of the game's biggest plays when junior punter Lee Willis boomed a career best 64-yard punt to the Wofford 11.

Three plays later the Terriers were forced to punt, but another short kick gave Furman the ball at its own 47. A 19-yard pass from Hill to Huguley on the drive's first play moved the ball to the Wofford 34. Later, after pushing to the 7 yard line, freshman placekicker Danny Marshall delivered a crucial 24-yard field goal with 6:18 left in the contest, giving the Paladins a 27-18 lead.

possession when, after a strong run up the middle, Terrier quarterback Travis Wilson was stripped of the football by Paladin linebacker Keito Whetstone, whose forced fumble was recovered by teammate Richie Jackson at the Furman 26 with 4:01 remaining in the game.

From there, Furman turned to Ivory for seven straight runs, including a game clinching 37-yard burst to the Wofford 33-yard line on a third-and-six play.

All-Southern Conference linebacker Will Bouton headlined Furman's solid defensive effort with a game high 16 tackles and a tackle-for-loss.

NOTING THE PALADINS

- ▶ BIG STAKES: PART III...Having escaped the season's hangman's noose with solid wins over Georgia Southern (45-10) and Wofford (27-18) the last two weeks, Furman has one more hurdle to jump in the form of the Chattanooga Mocs to ensure a bid to this year's NCAA I-AA playoffs and what appears to be at least a first round home game. To get to this point, the Paladins have been forced to defeat Georgia Southern and Wofford, who at the time were ahead of them in the conference standings, with Georgia Southern ranked No. 1 two weeks ago. With a win Saturday over UTC, the Paladins will gain a share of second place in the league standings with Appalachian State at 6-2 in conference play. UTC comes into Saturday's clash needing a victory over Furman for a winning season.
- ✓ EXCLUSIVE COMPANY...Only 10 teams in Furman's 94-season football history have won at least nine games in a regular season, and this year's squad can make it 11 in 95 campaigns with a win over Chattanooga on Saturday. It's worth noting that Bobby

Johnson has had a hand in seven of those squads in the capacities of defensive backs coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. Furman's nine regular season wins a year ago were the most by a Paladin team since 1989 when Furman posted a 10-1 regular season mark on the way to a 12-2 record.

✓ PLAYOFF BOUND PALADINS?...While a win in its regular season finale will lock up a bid to the NCAA I-AA playoffs for Furman, the Paladins may make the 16-team field anyway, and if they do it will mark their second straight postseason invitation and third trip to the playoffs under head coach Bobby Johnson. If Furman makes good on what appears to be a solid playoff candidacy this season, it will mark the 10th time the Paladins have qualified for the playoffs (1982, '83, '85, '86, '88, '89, '90, '96, and '99).

- ✓ THE SECOND NO. 1 TO FALL...Furman's 45-10 rout of Georgia Southern on Nov. 4 marked the Paladins' second win over a top-ranked team. Prior to the win over Georgia Southern, the Paladins' lone victory over a No. 1 team had been Idaho, which Furman defeated 38-7 in the semifinals of the 1988 NCAA I-AA playoffs. In addition to wins over the Eagles and the Vandals, other high ranked scalps the Paladins have earned include three No. 2s: Nevada (35-12, 1985); Georgia Southern (17-12, 1988); and Marshall (17-3, 1993). ✔ PALADIN DEFENSE STEPS UP AGAIN... Fueling Furman's football engine in 2000 has been an improved defense, and the Paladin stop troops certainly had it going again on Saturday in the 27-18 win over Wofford. holding the Terriers well below their season averages in scoring (18 vs. 29.2 ppg), passing offense (68 vs. 126.4 ypg), and total offense (354 vs. 425.2). In addition, Furman forced three Terrier turnovers and, more importantly, stepped up with a pair of big defensive stops deep in its own territory in the second half when Wofford appeared ready to take control of the contest. Headlining the Furman "D" on Saturday was junior linebacker Will Bouton (Greenville, S.C.), a Sports Network Preseason All-America choice and Buck Buchanan Award finalist who tallied a game high 19 tackles, a tackle-for-loss, and a batted pass that led to a Furman interception. The solid work by the Paladin defense against Wofford followed a brilliant outing in Furman's 45-10 thrashing of Georgia Southern two weeks ago when the Paladins limited the Eagles to only 10 points, 114 yards rushing, and 250 yards in total offense. In addition, the Paladins posted four sacks and garnered a pair of interceptions against the Eagles, one of which junior cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) returned for a touchdown. The Paladins' defensive performance against the Eagles was significant because Georgia Southern came into the game averaging 35.6 ppg, a league leading 359.2 ypg rushing, and 469.4 ypg in total offense. In holding the Eagles to only 114 yards rushing, Furman (which rushed for 404 yards against the Eagles) became the first team since 1996 (a streak of 53 games) to outrush Georgia Southern. Currently the Southern Conference leader in scoring defense (13.4 ppg) and rushing defense (140.1), Furman counts only two seniors on its starting defensive unit, linebacker Marion Martin (Columbia, S.C.) and cornerback Andre Stroman (Plantation, Fla.). Stroman, it's worth noting, is only starting due to a knee injury sustained by junior cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.) in the season opener against Elon.

✓ MORE ON FURMAN'S DEFENSE...Furman has surrendered only 131.7 yards per game rushing and 3.2 ypc to the opposition in the last seven games, and just 10 rushing touchdowns this season. When Wofford quarterback Travis Wilson rushed for 106 yards against Furman in Saturday's game, it marked the first 100yard individual rushing effort against the Paladins this season. The yardage, ironically, that carried Wilson over 100 rushing yards against the Paladins came on the Terrier quarterback's fourth quarter fumble, which rolled downfield 11 yards before being recovered by Furman's Richie Jackson at the Paladin 26. Prior to Wilson's 106-vard effort, the last opponent to run for 100 yards against the Paladins was Marcel Shipp of Massachusetts, who rushed for 170 in the Paladins' 30-23 loss to the Minutemen in the first round of last year's NCAA I-AA playoffs. Counting its two sacks against Wofford on Saturday, Furman now leads the Southern Conference with 22 sacks, if ranked by sacks/game (Georgia Southern has 23 sacks in 11 games). That's eight more than the 14 takedowns the Paladins recorded last year in 12 games. While some Southern Conference analysts have singled out Furman's pass defense for criticism, it should be noted that the Paladins lead the league in interceptions (18) and rank a solid third in pass defense efficiency (109.2 rating). Furman's 18 interceptions also represent the most by a Paladin squad since 1990 when Furman collected 22 pickoffs in 13 games. Furman currently ranks third in opponent third down conversion percentage (36.0%) after ranking eighth last year (44.1%).

- ✓ ACTION JACKSON...When junior cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) pounced on a Wofford fumble late in the fourth quarter to preserve the Paladins' 27-18 win over the Terriers, it marked his second significant defensive play in as many weeks. Two weeks ago, in the Paladins' 45-10 trouncing of Georgia Southern, Jackson stepped in front of a pass by Georgia Southern quarterback J.R. Revere and returned it 29 yards for a touchdown, thereby helping open the flood gates for the Paladins' 28-point third quarter en route to the rout of the top-ranked Eagles. For Jackson, the interception against Georgia Southern was his third of the season, 12th theft of his career, and first interception return for a touchdown.
- ✓ KUDOS FOR KEITO...Redshirt freshman line-backer Keito Whetstone (Orangeburg, S.C.) stepped up big in the Paladins' 27-18 win over Wofford on Saturday, recording three tackles and a forced fumble in 26 plays after starting linebacker John Thrift exited the game in the second half with a sprained neck. Whetstone's forced fumble on Wofford quarterback Travis Wilson was huge, because it ended the Terriers' chances of a comeback and gave Furman the football at its own 26-yard line with 6:18 to go and a nine-point lead. Whetsone has 18 tackles on the season.
- ✓ COOPERINTHE RECORD BOOKS...Paladin junior free safety Josh Cooper (Cincinnati, Ohio) currently ranks second in the Southern Conference with six interceptions, thanks in large measure to a school record tying three interception performance in the Paladins' 33-7 win over The Citadel on Oct. 14. Cooper's performance against the Bulldogs, which included a 35-yard return for a touchdown, tied a Furman single game interceptions record held by four other Paladins: Joe Watts vs. Presbyterian (1951), Mark Gordon vs. Presbyterian (1975), John Zemina vs. VMI (1982), and Walter Booth vs. Appalachian State (1999).
- ✓ FULEADING TURNOVER MARGIN AGAIN...After leading the Southern Conference in turnover margin in 1999 with a +0.75 difference, the Paladins are once again pacing the league with a +1.20 rating through 10 games in the all important category. Heading into Saturday's contest against Chattanooga, the Paladins have been the beneficiary of 30 opponent misuces while committing only 18 turnovers. In the 27-18 win over Wofford last Saturday, the Paladins capitalized on three Terrier turnovers, converting two of them into 10 points. Wofford, meanwhile, failed to cash in on the Paladins' one fumble.
- ✓ THE GOOD AND BAD...Furman's special teams play was either brilliant or poor in Saturday's 27-18 win over Wofford, but when the game was on the line, it was brilliant. After a blocked punt led to a Wofford touchdown that cut Furman's 24-9 halftime lead to 24-15, the Paladins' fumbled the ensuing kickoff at their own 20, but Furman's defense came to the rescue, holding Wofford scoreless with a missed field goal. After that the Furman special teams rallied with two big plays. The first came in fourth quarter on a career long 64-yard

punt by junior **Lee Willis (Monticello, Ga.)** that denied Wofford favorable field postion and pinned the Terriers back at their 15. And then, after a short Wofford punt to its 47, placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** booted a game clinching 24-yard field goal with 6:18 left to give Furman a 27-18 lead. For Willis, his four punts for a 48.3 average against Wofford represented a career single game best. Marshall, meanwhile, contributed nine of the Paladins' 28 points.

- ✓ THE BEAR...Sophomore wide receiver Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.) has started to emerge as a solid member of Furman's receiving corps and offensive weapon over the last several games, and especialy the last two weeks. In Furman's 27-18 win over Wofford on Saturday, Rinehart hooked up with quarterback Justin Hill (Greer, S.C.) for a big 55-yard reception to set up a huge Paladin touchdown just before halftime that gave Furman a 24-9 lead. The player who scored the touchdown was, of course, Rinehart, who took a reverse handoff from Paladin tailback Louis Ivory at the Wofford 8-yard line and raced around right end untouched into the end zone. It was his second reverse touchdown run of the season. Rinehart currently ranks as Furman's leading receiver heading into Saturday's season finale against Chattanooga, having totaled 15 catches for 315 yards (21.0 ypc) and a score this season.
- ✔ HEADY STUFF...Starting Paladin linebacker Marion Martin (Columbia, S.C.), a two-year starter and 1999 GTE Academic All-America selection, garnered another prestigious honor recently when he was named a National Football Foundation And College Hall Of Fame Scholar-Athlete. In being named one of 16 national scholar-athletes, Martin will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship and will be honored at a banquet at New York's Waldorf-Astoria on Dec. 12, alongside this year's College Football Hall Of Fame inductees. A member of Phi Beta Kappa who graduated Summa Cum Laude in May with a 3.90 grade point average in chemistry, he is currently pursuing a master's degree in chemistry from Furman and plans to seek his doctoral degree in physical chemistry after that. In the Paladins' 16-3 season opening win over Elon on Sept. 2, he tallied four tackles and a forced fumble in the game's waning seconds that helped the Paladins preserve the victory. On the year he has 65 tackles, four tackles-for-loss, two forced fumbles, a sack, and three pass deflections. A year ago he racked up 66 tackles in helping Furman to a 9-3 record and Southern Conference championship.
- ✓ KEEP THAT FLAG IN YOUR POCKET...Furman heads into this Saturday's game against Chattanooga as the least penalized team in the Southern Conference. Through 10 games the Paladins have been flagged only 42 times for infractions totaling a league low 331 yards.
- ✓ **DEFENDING THE HOME TURF...**Furman's 45-10 win over Georgia Southern two weeks ago improved the Paladins' home record this season to 6-0 and ledger against Southern Conference foes in Paladin Stadium to 8-0 dating back to the 1998 season. Furman is now 12-1 in its last 13 home games (.923).
- ✓ CLOSING IN ON 100...Furman's 45-10 triumph over Georgia Southern marked Furman's 97th victory in Paladin Stadium history. Now in its 20th season of play in the beautiful facility, Furman has compiled a 97-27-1 record (.780) since moving into Paladin Stadium in 1981.
- ON A RUN VERSUS THE SOCON...Furman is now 13-3 (.812) in its last 16 Southern Conference standard as the chart below indicates:

clashes and is 18-5 (.783) in its last 23 contests.

- ✓ LAST FIVE LOSSES OF THE "TOUGH" VARIETY...Furman's last five losses have been especially tough because they have been decided by two points (Elon, 24-22), three points (Georgia Southern, 41-38), seven points (Massachusetts, 30-23 OT), one point (Appalachian State, 18-17), and two points (East Tennessee State, 23-21), respectively.
- ✓ LARGEST CROWD SINCE 1994...The 15,127 fans in attendance at the Furman-Georgia Southern game two weeks ago represented the Paladins' biggest home crowd since the 1994 season when 15,673 fans witnessed Furman's 26-21 win over South Carolina State in Bobby Johnson's Paladin head coaching debut. Furman has averaged 11,416 fans in six home games this season. Last year Furman averaged 10,897 fans in six home dates, including one playoff game.
- v OFFENSIVE LINE GETTING IT DONE...With four starters returning off last year's offensive line, Furman, as expected, has gotten solid line play in its 10 games as evidenced by junior tailback Louis Ivory's 1,872 rushing yards. And if there were any doubts remaining about which team in the league has the best offensive line, they were more than likely erased in the Paladins' dominating performance the Paladins' triumph over Georgia Southern on Nov. 4. Furman's 404 rushing yards represented the highest rushing total by a NCAA I-AA opponent against Georgia Southern and highlighted the Paladins' 523-yard total offense effort against the Eagle defense, which came into the game yielding only 15.6 points per game, 133.0 rushing yards per game, and 306.4 total vards per outing.

Heading Furman's strong offensive front are three pre-season All-Southern Conference selections: senior tackle Josh Moore (Cross Hill, S.C.), junior guard Marty Priore (Cincinnati, Ohio), and junior center Chris Stewart (Palm Harbor, Fla.). Moore, a consensus 1999 all-conference first team pick, was named to the 2000 Sports Network Pre-Season All-America team. He owns 28 career starts. Priore, meanwhile, has started in 30 consecutive games since moving into the lineup early in 1998 campaign. And Stewart, the team's strongest player (500-pound bench press, 675-pound squat, 357-pound power clean), tallied the highest season blocking grade (89.6%) and winning grades in all 12 games a year ago in helping the Paladins to a 9-3 record and league championship. Furman's other returning starter, junior tackle Donnie Littlejohn (Gaffney, S.C.), actually boasts more starting experience (31 games) than all Paladin linemen.

✓ EXPERIENCE, EXPERIENCE....Furman's veteran offensive line, which includes only one senior in right tackle Josh Moore, has combined to post 122 starts in their collective careers.

- ✓ SO, YOU'RE LOOKING FOR NOTES ON LOUIS IVORY (FORT VALLEY, GA.)??...Well, they are plentiful. Here goes:
- ✓ Ivory needs 128 yards in this Saturday's game against Chattanooga to become the first player in the Southern Conference history (79 years) to rush for 2,000 yards in a regular season.
- Ivory's 301-yard rushing performance in Furman's 45-10 rout of Georgia Southern on Nov. 4 established a new Furman modern era single game rushing record. The previous standard was held by Mike Glenn, who rushed for 261 yards in a 28-7 win over Presbyterian in 1980
- ✓ Ivory's 301 rushing yards against Georgia Southern were the most in a regular season game in Southern Conference history. The previous record was 286 set by The Citadel's Gene Brown vs. VMI in 1988.
- ✓ Ivory's three touchdowns against Georgia Southern covered 7, 73, and 37 yards. His 73-yard run broke Furman's single season rushing record of 1,555 yards set by Carl Tremble in 1992. Ivory now has 1,872 yards in nine games.
- In scoring three touchdowns against Georgia Southern, Ivory tied Furman's single season rushing touchdowns record of 15 scores also shared by three other players: Robbie Gardner (1986), Carl Tremble (1990), and Derek Russell (1999).
- ✓ Ivory's 73-yard touchdown run versus Georgia Southern was his third longest run of the season. He had a career long 88-yard run in a 34-10 win over William & Mary and a 75-yard sprint in a 16-3 victory over Elon. His 88-yard scoring run against William & Mary is the second longest in Furman football history.
- ✓ Ivory's 301-yard performance against Georgia Southern represented his third straight 200-yard game and fourth 200-plus yard outing of the season. The run of consecutive 200-yard games ended on Saturday with his 165-yard performance in the Paladins' 28-17 win over Wofford. Other 200-yard outing this season include 232 (vs. William & Mary), 227 (vs. East Tennessee State), and 214 (vs. The Citadel). He currently owns the first, fourth, sixth, eighth, and 10th best modern era single game rushing performances in Furman football history.
- ✓ Ivory is the leading rusher in NCAA I-AA heading into this Saturday's game against Chattanooga, averaging 187.2 ypg and a stellar 7.3 ypc.
- ✓ Ivory currently leads consensus Georgia Southern All-America and 1999 Walter Payton Award winning fullback Adrian Peterson in all season rushing statistical categories, including 7.3 ypc and 187.2 ypg to Peterson's 5.9 ypc and 151.2 ypg.

- ✓ In his last four games, Louis Ivory has <u>averaged</u> 226.8 ypg, rushing 127 times for 907 yards and six touchdowns.
- ✓ Ivory established a new Furman single game rushing attempts standard with 41 carries (227 yards) against East Tennessee State on Oct. 21, breaking the previous standard of 39 set by Carl Tremble (vs. Chattanooga, 1992).
- In rushing for 214 yards in the Paladins' 33-7 win over The Citadel on Oct. 14, Ivory became the fastest player in Furman history reach 1,000 rushing yards. Ivory, who topped the plateau in seven games, accomplished a feat that previously had taken the best Paladin runners eight games to accomplish. Interestingly, one of those two runners was Ivory himself, who need eight games in 1999 to surpass 1,000 yards en route to a 1,519-yard campaign.
- ✓ Ivory's 1,872 rushing yards through 10 games represent the second best season rushing total by a Southern Conference player. He needs only 61 yards in Saturday's season finale against Chattanooga to set a new league regular season single record. The current record of 1,932 yards was set by Georgia Southern's Adrian Peterson in 1998.
- ✓ Ivory has now rushed for at least 100 yards in 12 of his last 13 games and 18 games in his career. Furman's career record for 100-yard games is 25, currently held by Carl Tremble (1989-92).
- In 21 starts at tailback since the beginning of the 1999 season, Ivory has rushed for 3,391 yards and 29 touchdowns. That's an average of 154.1 ypg and 6.7 ypc. Furman is 17-5 in that span.
- ✓ Ivory heads into Saturday's game against Chattanooga currently ranked third on Furman's career rushing chart with 3,797 yards.

Furman offensive linemen earned first team All-Southern Conference honors in the same year.

- ✔ FINDING THE TIGHT END...Five games into the 2000 season many Furman football observers were beginning to wonder if the Paladins knew they even had a Sports Network Pre-Season All-America tight end on the squad. With only three receptions through five games, junior All-Southern Conference performer Trent Sansbury (Lilburn, Ga.) obviously had had very little contact with the pigskin. Shortly thereafter that began to change when Sansbury caught three passes for 94 yards, including a 60-yard touchdown pass in the Paladins' 18-17 loss to Appalachian State. In the Paladins' 33-7 win over The Citadel on Oct. 14, it was more Sansbury as he hooked up with quarterback Billy Napier for five receptions for 94 yards and a touchdown, which came on a beautiful 26-yard strike between two Bulldog defenders to put the Paladins ahead 10-7 in the third quarter. Sansbury now has 13 catches for 247 yards (19.2 ypc) and two touchdowns. Furman's "other" tight end, junior Graham Hunter (Knoxville, Tenn.), meanwhie has two catches for 15 yards this year.
- ✓ OFFENSIVE SUPERLATIVES...Through 10 games this year Furman has added a couple of more offensive statistical superlatives to an expanding list of top performances under head coach Bobby Johnson. The Paladins' 404 rushing yards in the 45-10 rout of Georgia Southern on Nov. 4 marked the second highest rushing total by a Bobby Johnson-coached Furman squad, and is only exceeded by 1999's 509-yard rushing effort in Furman's 52-6 dismantling of the Tribe in Williamsburg.

- ✓ MARSHALL CONTINUING SOLID WORK...No. he's not General George Marshall, but after his three field goal performance in Furman's season opening 16-3 win over Elon on Sept. 2 and continued good work through eight games, true freshman Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.), who beat out three other Paladin upperclassmen for the team's placekicking job, has earned a few salutes from his teammates and coaching staff. Appearing in his first game as a Paladin, Marshall accounted for 10 of the Paladins' 16 points against the Phoenix by connecting on field goals covering 43, 29, and 34 yards, plus an extra point. Marshall, who converted field goals from 35 and 24 yards and three PATs in the Paladins' 27-18 win over Wofford on Saturday, and whose eight-game statistics include 12of-16 FGs and 38-39 PATs, ranks second on the team in scoring with 74 points heading into this Saturday's game against Chattanooga. The only freshman among Furman's 24 position starters, Marshall is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship.
- ✔ HILL RETURNS IN SOLID FASHION...Furman senior quarterback Justin Hill (Greer, S.C), who sat out Furman's 23-21 loss to East Tennessee State on Oct. 21 after sustaining a strained rotator cuff in his right shoulder on the first series of the Paladins' 33-7 win over The Citadel on Oct. 14, played a solid game in the Paladins' 45-10 win over Georgia Southern on Nov. 4, passing for 119 yards and a touchdown. More impressively, though, was Hill's execution of Furman's offense, which piled up 523 total yards against the Eagles. In Saturday's 27-18 Paladin victory at Wofford, Hill was equally effective, especially through the air, where he completed 7-of-10 passes for 163 yards and a touchdown. In two games since returning from injury, Hill is 12-of-22 (54.5%) for 282 yards and two touchdowns (no interceptions). That works out to a strong 192.20 passing efficiency rating in the two games.
- ✓ NOTING QB JUSTIN HILL...Furman quarterback Justin Hill, a second team All-Southern Conference pick in 1999 and accomplished guitar player and singer/songwriter, played a major role in leading Furman to a 9-3 record, Southern Conference championship, and trip to the NCAA I-AA playoffs a year ago, throwing for 1,519 yards and nine touchdowns while also rushing for 680 yards and eight scores. During one three-game stretch that included wins over The Citadel, East Tennessee State, and North Carolina, Hill completed a school record 19 straight pass attempts, and he finished the season with a 62.4 completion percentage, the second highest season rate in school history. Hill, who in the Paladins' 18-17 loss to Appalachian State on Oct. 7 rushed for 115 yards and a touchdown (career long 65-yard run) while throwing for 156 and another score, has now totaled 1,691 career rushing yards — the most ever by a Paladin quarterback — and over 5,000 yards in total offense (5,344), thus becoming one of only five players in

school history to top 5,000 yards in total offense. Furman is 25-9 with Hill in the starting lineup. As a freshman in 1997, he paced the Paladins to a 3-0 record in three late season starts. In 1998 Furman went 5-5 with Hill under center (missed one start due to injury), and last season the Paladins forged a 9-3 mark with their veteran guarterback at the controls.

- ✓ NAME GAME...Redshirt freshman defensive end Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.), who earned Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Week honors for his three-sack performance in a 35-21 win over VMI on Sept. 23, is the son of former University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers. Sophomore tight end Jon Brown (Duluth, Ga.) is the nephew of Los Angeles Dodgers ace pitcher Kevin Brown.
- ✔ PREVOST, JOHNSON ON THE SHELF...Redshirt

freshman linebacker Todd Prevost (Nashville, Tenn.), who was knocked unconscious on the opening kickoff against Newberry on Sept. 9, has retired following medical recommendations. Junior cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.) underwent reconstructive knee surgery in late September to repair a torn anterior cruciate ligament and damaged medial collateral ligament sustained in the second series of Furman's 2000 season opening game against Elon. Johnson, a starter at right cornerback in all 12 games in 1999, will sit out spring practice next year but anticipates returning to the playing field for the 2001 season as a redshirt junior.

- ✔ BOBBY JOHNSON: YEAR SEVEN...The 2000 football season marks Furman head coach Bobby Johnson's seventh year at the helm of the Paladin program and 23rd season of service to the university. After suffering through a 3-8 season in 1994 (the program's first losing season since 1979), Furman rebounded in 1995 to finish 6-5. A year later, Johnson, a Columbia native and 1973 Clemson graduate, directed the Paladins to a 9-4 record and into the NCAA I-AA playoffs — the program's first playoff appearance since 1990. Furman went 7-4 in 1997, 5-6 in 1998, and 9-3 last year on the way to claiming the program's 10th league championship and second NCAA playoff appearance under Johnson. Johnson's six-plus year head coaching record is 47-32 (.595) and his last six teams have combined to post a 44-24 mark (.647). Against NCAA I-AA competition, Furman teams under Johnson's direction have gone 44-28 (.611). Johnson's 22-plus vear tenure includes work as defensive backs coach, assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. The Paladins' record during that span (1976-80; 82-92; 94-present) is 179-85-7 (.674).
- ✓ FURMAN AND THE NFL...Furman football currently sports three graduates on active NFL rosters and a fourth on a practice squad.

Tight end Luther Broughton '97 (Cainhoy, S.C.) is

now in his second season with the Philadelphia Eagles after catching 26 passes for 295 yards and three touchdowns last season. A fifth-round pick of the Eagles in the 1997 draft, Broughton spent the 1997 campaign with the Eagles before signing the Carolina Panthers, with whom he played the entire 1998 season before being traded back to the Eagles prior to the start of the 1999 campaign.

Linebacker Orlando Ruff'99 (Winnsboro, S.C.) is in his second season with the San Diego Chargers and first as the Chargers' starting middle linebacker. Last year, after signing with San Diego as a free agent, Ruff garnered team special teams MVP honors.

John Keith '00 (Newnan, Ga.), a fourth round pick of the San Francisco 49ers in this year's draft, earned a spot on the 49ers roster and two starts at safety before sustaining a broken arm in a game against Oakland.

Wide receiver Des Kitchings '00 (Wagener, S.C.), a seventh round choice of the Kansas City Chiefs in this year's draft, was signed by the Chiefs to their practice squad.

✓ FIRST SAFETY SINCE 1996...When junior cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) tackled The Citadel's Nate Mahoney in the end zone for a safety early in the fourth quarter of the Paladins' 33-7 Paladin win over the Bulldogs on Oct. 14, it marked the first safety for Furman since the 1996 season when Seth Ramaley blocked a punt by Wofford's Brandon Kale out of the end zone in a 33-3 win over the Terriers.

Elon outgained Furman 325 to 236 in total offense, but the Phoenix suffered six turnovers, including four fumbles and two interceptions. Paladin linebacker Will Bouton led Furman's strong defensive effort with 13 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, an interception, and a fumble recovery which he returned for 18 yards.

Playing in his first collegiate contest. Marshall provided Furman with its first points of the game when he converted a 43-yard field goal early in the second quarter. He later added a 29-yard field goal with only 20 seconds left in the first half to make it 6-0.

Chris Lowery's 78-yard kickoff return to start the second half set up Marshall's third field goal, a 34varder, that gave the Paladins a 9-0 lead less than two minutes into the second half.

Elon answered with its only scoring drive of the game, moving 69 yards in 13 plays for a 27-yard field goal by Beau Wegmann with 6:40 to go in the third period. But the Phoenix failed to register points on its last five possessions, including four that ended inside Furman territory.

GREENVILLE (Sept. 16, 2000) -- Junior tailback Louis Ivory rushed 27 times for a career high 232 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 34-10 win over visiting William & Mary.

Ivory, who bested his previous career high rushing mark of 203 yards set last year in a win over East Tennessee State, headlined a Furman ground game that rolled up 389 yards with an 88-yard touchdown run at the 7:59 mark of the third quarter to give the Paladins a 17-0 lead. The 88-yard run marked the second longest in school history.

With the win Furman, posted its 19th straight series victory over the VMI and matched the program's longest winning streak over an opponent first set against Wofford from 1917-47.

After DuShon Martin intercepted Furman guarterback Justin Hill in the end zone with 6:58 left in the game and ASU trailing 17-11, the Mountaineers went 80 yards in ten plays to complete the comeback.

Furman jumped on top 7-0 in the first guarter on a 65-yard run by Hill, the longest of his career, eight minutes into the game.

ASU took the kickoff after Hill's score and drove 52 yards in ten plays to set up Mark Wright for a 32-yard field goal to get on the board.

Long plays victimized the Mountaineers again as Hill hit tight end Trent Sansbury for a 60-yard score to go into the locker room up 14-3 at the half.

After Wes Hunter blocked a Furman punt on their first drive of the second half, ASU was stopped on a fourth down-and-one at the Paladin 19-yard line. Furman was forced to punt, however, and the Mountaineers went 53 yards in ten plays before quarterback Joe Burchette plowed in from one-yard out with 4:03 left in the third quarter. Burchette completed a pass to Daniel Wilcox for the two-point conversion and a 14-11 margin.

The Paladins tried to put the game away on the next drive, getting a first-and-goal at the ASU six-yard line. The defense, led by linebacker Justin Seaverns, held and forced Furman to settle for a field goal and a 17-11 lead.

A fumbled punt return gave the Paladins the ball on the ASU 23-yard line with 9:31 left. Again Furman had first-and-goal, and again the Mountaineer defense held, forcing Hill into the interception in the end zone on third-and-goal from the two-yard line, leading to the winning score.

GREENVILLE, S.C. (Oct. 14, 2000) -- Backup quarterback Billy Napier passed for 170 yards and a touchdown to lead ninth-ranked Furman to a 33-7 win over arch-rival The Citadel in front of 13.326 fans.

Napier, a sophomore, replaced injured starting quarterback Justin Hill on the second series and completed 11-of-16 passes in the contest, including a 26yard touchdown pass to tight end Trent Sansbury in the third quarter to give the Paladins a 10-7 lead.

Furman tailback Louis Ivory ran for 214 yards and scored on a 58-yard run in the third quarter to post his second straight 1,000-yard season. The win was Furman's fifth in its last six games against The Citadel and fifth straight home victory.

The Citadel grabbed an early 7-0 lead when Nate Mahoney scored on a 1-yard plunge to cap an 8-play, 70-yard drive on the Bulldogs' first possession.

A 39-yard Danny Marshall field goal with 9:34 left

in the first half cut The Citadel's lead to 7-3.

Furman wasted little time in assuming command in the third quarter. Taking the kickoff the Paladins moved 70 yards in six plays to grab a 10-7 advantage when Napier split two Bulldog defenders with a 26-yard touchdown pass to tight end Trent Sansbury.

After a fumble halted Furman's next scoring threat, the Paladins bounced back when Ivory bounced off a pair of Bulldog defenders and raced 58 yards for a touchdown to stretch the Paladin lead to 17-7

A 39-yard punt by Furman's Lee Willis that was downed at The Citadel 1 led to Furman's next score, which came on a safety when linebacker Will Bouton tackled the Bulldogs' Nate Mahoney in the end zone to make it 19-7 early in the fourth quarter.

Furman's défense limited Citadel to only 89 total yards in the second half and set up the Paladins' last two scores. Free safety Josh Cooper's 35-yard interception return for a score made it 26-7, and Cooper's school record tying third interception of the contest set up Furman's final score with just over two minutes left.

JOHNSON CITY, TENN. (Oct. 21, 2000) -- East Tennessee State kicker Con Chelis booted a 26-yard field goal with 1:12 left in the game to lift the Buccaneers to a 23-21 upset win over the nationally seventhranked Furman Paladins at Memorial Center.

Chellis, who moments earlier had missed an extra point that could have tied the contest at 21-21, connected on the game winning field goal following a key 51-yard punt return by the Buccaneers' Keyandre Fenn to the Furman 13.

The defeat, Furman's third straight to East Tennessee State in Johnson City, was especially tough because the Paladins appeared to be ready to take command after assuming a 21-14 lead following a 10yard touchdown run Louis Ivory with 7:51 left in the third quarter.

Two possessions later Furman drove 66 yards in 10 plays to the Buccaneer 1 but, on a second and goal play, Ivory fumbled and East Tennessee State's Lee Neisz recoverd at the Buccaneer 6.

From there EastTennessee State covered 94 yards in impressive fashion to slice Furman's lead to 21-20 following an 8-yard touchdown run by quarterback Todd Wells with 7:43 left.

Despite the fumble, Furman had two prime opportunities to win the game with ball control but could not come up with needed first downs on its last two possesions prior to the Buccaneers' game winning field goal.

Louis Ivory topped Furman's offensive effort with 227 yards and two touchdowns on a school record 41 carries. Buccaneer quarterback Todd Wells, meanwhile, passed for 336 yards and two scores and accounted for 401 yards in total offense

FURMAN 45, GA. SOUTHERN 10

GREENVILLE, S.C. (Nov. 4, 2000) — Junior tailback Louis Ivory rushed for a career high 301 yards and three touchdowns to lead 11th-ranked Furman to a 45-10 victory over NCAA I-AA top-ranked and 2000 Southern Conference champion Georgia Southern.

Ivory, the leading rusher in NCAA I-AA coming into the game, reeled off scoring runs of 7, 73, and 37 yards to establish new school and conference single game and season rushing records.

The victory was Furman's second over a topranked team, and it represented Georgia Southern's most decisive conference loss in the Eagles' eightyear league history.

Furman totaled 523 yards in offense to Georgia Southern's 250 and outrushed the Eagles 404 to 114. Senior free safety Josh Cooper headlined Furman's defensive effort with 10 tackles, and the Paladins sacked Eagle quarterback J.R. Revere four times and

intercepted two passes in the contest.

Holding a slim 10-7 halftime lead, Furman seized momentum in the first minute of the second half when cornerback Richie Jackson intercepted a J.R. Revere pass and returned it 29 yards for a touchdown at the 14:07 mark to put the Paladins ahead 17-7.

After Georgia Southern sliced Furman's lead to 17-10, the Paladins scored touchdowns on their next four possessions. A 37-yard touchdown strike from quarterback Justin Hill to Bear Rinehart made it 24-10 and, a little over four minutes later, Ivory bounced outside and outran Georgia Southern's defense on a 73-yard touchdown sprint.

Fullback Derek Russell's 20-yard touchdown run with 1:43 left in the third period closed out the 28-point third quarter and gave Furman a 38-10 advantage.

Ivory finished off his top career rushing performance with a 37-yard scoring run at the 9:21 juncture of the fourth quarter.

SPARTANBURG, S.C. (Nov. 11. 2000) -- Quarterback Justin Hill threw for 163 yards and a touchdown and tailback Louis Ivory, the nation's leading rusher, ran for 165 yards to lead nationally fourthranked Furman to a 27-18 Southern Conference victory over No. 25 Wofford at Gibbs Stadium.

With the win, Furman dramatically improved its bid for a spot in the NCAA I-AA playoffs, dashed Wofford's playoffs hopes, and handed the Terriers' their fifth loss to Furman in the last six clashes.

Wofford took the opening kickoff and used 11 plays to cover 86 yards for the game's first score, which came on a 3-yard touchdown run by Melvin Jones with 11:08 left in the first quarter for a 6-0 lead.

A fumble recovery by Furman's Brandon Poole on the Terriers' next possession gave the Paladins the football at the Wofford 35. After moving to the 18, Danny Marshall put the Paladins on the board with a 35-yard field goal at the 4:32 juncture of the first period.

A little over two minutes later, a short Wofford punt set up a 38-yard Justin Hill touchdown pass to Bryant Huguley that give the Paladins a 10-6 lead.

Midway through the second quarter the Paladins took advantage of another Wofford turnover for a score. A Shelvis Smith interception return led to a 52-yard scoring drive tha ended when Derek Russell bulled over from 1 yard out to make it a 17-6 game.

After a Terrier field goal closed the gap to 17-9 with a little over two minutes left before intermission, Furman's offense put together its best drive of the game. A 55-yard play action pass from Hill to sophomore wide receiver Bear Rinehart on the drive's first play gave the Paladins the ball at the Wofford 25, and six plays later, on a third and three play from the 8, Rinehart took a reverse handoff from Ivory around right end untouched for the score and a 24-9 Furman lead.

Furman's momentum didn't last long in the second half, however, as Wofford's Will Thomas blocked a Lee Willis punt that was returned by Jeremy Dula to the Paladin 7-yard line. Three plays later, Tony Hudson scored from a yard out to cut the margin to 24-15. The two-point rush attempt failed.

On the ensuing kickoff, a Chris Lowery fumble was recovered by Wofford's Josh Brizendine at the Paladin 20. The Terriers, however, were unable to generate a first down, and Darren Brown missed on a 35-yard field goal.

Brown converted a 22-yard field goal on the next series to pull Wofford within 24-18 with 2:18 left in the third quarter.

From that point both team's defenses stiffened, but Furman's special teams came through with one of the game's biggest plays when junior punter Lee Willis boomed a career best 64-yard punt to the Wofford 11.

Three plays later the Terriers were forced to punt, but another short kick gave Furman the ball at its own 47. A 19-yard pass from Hill to Huguley on the drive's first play moved the ball to the Wofford 34. Later, after pushing to the 7 yard line, freshman placekicker Danny Marshall delivered a crucial 24-yard field goal with 6:18 left in the contest, giving the Paladins a 27-18 lead.

Wofford saw its chances dashed on its next possession when, after a strong run up the middle, Terrier quarterback Travis Wilson was stripped of the football by Paladin linebacker Keito Whetstone, whose forced fumble was recovered by teammate Richie Jackson at the Furman 26 with 4:01 remaining in the game.

From there, Furman turned to Ivory for seven straight runs, including a game clinching 37-yard burst to the Wofford 33-yard line on a third-and-six play.

All-Southern Conference linebacker Will Bouton headlined Furman's solid defensive effort with a game

high 16 tackles and a tackle-for-loss.
