THE GAME

Saturday's Furman-William & Mary game marks the third of three straight home night games for Furman, which opened the 2000 season with a 16-3 win over Elon on Sept. 2 followed by a 44-10 victory over Newberry last Saturday at Paladin Stadium. Furman plays its first road game of the season on Sept. 23 against VMI.

PROMOTIONS

Saturday's Furman-William & Mary contest will highlight Paladin Club Day at Furman University. Prior to the game six former athletic greats will be inducted into the university's Athletic Hallof-Fame in ceremonies at Timmons Arena. The six inductees include Caroline Peek-Blaylock '95 (golf), Scott Broderick '87 (soccer), Mel Daniel '82 (basketball), Allen Edwards '92 (football), Jack Kay '86 (golf), and Brent Williams '91 (baseball). Complete bios of the six inductees are included later in this release. The game will feature a fireworks show sponsored by Spinx Convenience Stores following the game.

THE SERIES

In a series that started in 1959 with an 8-7 Furman win in Williamsburg, the Paladins and Tribe, a former member of the Southern Conference, have split 14 games, although Furman has won five of the last seven clashes between the two schools, including a 52-6 win last year in Williamsburg. William & Mary, however, captured the last meeting between the two programs in Greenville, taking a 28-26 decision in 1994. In 1989 the Paladins knocked off the Tribe 24-10 in NCAA I-AA first round playoff action in Paladin Stadium. Furman holds a 4-2 advantage over William & Mary in games played in Greenville, but the Tribe is 5-3 versus Furman in Williamsburg. Last year's Furman win was the most decisive by either team in series history and worst home defeat suffered by William & Mary since the 1958 season.

FURMAN-WILLIAM & MARY LAST MEETING

WILLIAMSBURG (Sept. 18, 1999) -- Turning to an old friend, the triple option, Furman rolled up 509 yards rushing and scored on its first four possessions of the game on the way to a 52-6 victory of William & Mary at Zable Stadium.

In claiming the first win by a Southern Conference team in Williamsburg since 1980 and handing William & Mary its worst home loss in five decades, Furman posted the second best single game rushing mark in school history, trailing only the 521 rushing yards the Paladins rolled up in a 55-7 win over Davidson in 1984.

Tailback Louis Ivory spearheaded Furman's potent ground game, rushing for 151 yards and a touchdown, and flanker Des Kitchings added 117 yards and two touchdowns — both on reverses — to become the first Furman wide receiver in history to rush for over 100 yards in a game. Quarterback Justin Hill added 94 yards on the ground and a touchdown run covering 11 yards.

Furman, which built a 24-6 halftime lead, put

the game away with a 35-yard touchdown run by lvory in the third period, and added three more scores in the fourth quarter, including one by redshirt freshman quarterback Billy Napier, who registered his first collegiate action.

The loss was the worst home defeat suffered by William & Mary since the Tribe's 55-6 loss to West Virginia during the 1958 season.

FURMAN LAST TIME OUT

GREENVILLE (Sept. 9, 2000) -- Junior tailback Louis Ivory rushed for 171 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA ninth-ranked Furman to a 44-10 win over visiting Division II member Newberry Saturday night at Paladin Stadium. Ivory, who posted his fifth straight 100-yard

rushing performance and seventh in the Paladins' last eight games, scored on a 16-yard run in the first quarter to tie the game at 7-7 and later added a 16-yard scoring run early in the second period to give Furman a 21-7 lead.

Furman rolled up 385 yards rushing and totaled 520 total yards against the Indians, who accounted for 241 yards in total offense. Ivory's 171 rushing yards moved him from eighth to sixth on Furman's career rushing chart with 2,278 yards.

Leading 21-7 in the second quarter, Furman extended its margin to 28-7 when quarterback Justin Hill hooked up with split end James Thomas on a 17-yard touchdown pass with only 42 seconds left in the half.

Furman made it 35-7 when fullback Derek Russell bulled over on a fourth and goal play from the Newberry 1 at the 10:00 mark of the third quarter.

Russell, who scored three touchdowns in the contest, accounted for the game's final score on a 1-yard dive with only 17 seconds left in the game.

NOTING THE PALADINS

- ✓ REVENGE FACTOR...When Furman hosts William & Mary this Saturday, the Paladins know the Tribe will be out for some serious revenge following last year's 52-6 loss to Furman in Williamsburg. In absorbing its worst home defeat since the 1958 season, William & Mary surrendered 509 yards rushing to Furman, the second highest single game total in Paladin history. Although last year's loss to Furman dropped William & Mary to 0-3 on the 1999 season, the Tribe rallied behind then-freshman quarterback Dave Corley of Columbia, S.C., to a 6-2 record over its final eight games to finish 6-5.
- ► FU 7-1 VERSUS OLD DOMINION STATE TEAMS UNDER BOBBY JOHNSON...Furman's 52-6 win over William & Mary and 58-0 triumph over VMI last year improved the Paladins' record against Virginia teams to 7-1 under head coach Bobby Johnson. Johnson, who has directed the Paladins to a 6-0 mark against VMI in his tenure at Furman, is 1-1 versus William & Mary, with the only loss, a 28-26 decision in Greenville, coming in 1994, in his first season as head coach of the Paladins.
- ✓ FU VERSUS CURRENT ATLANTIC 10 MEMBERSHIP...Furman owns an 18-23 overall record against current members of the Atlantic 10 Conference, but a majority of those clashes have come against two schools, Richmond and William & Mary, who at the time were members of the Southern Conference along with Furman. Furman's last Atlantic 10 Conference foe was Massachusetts, who downed the Paladins 30-23 in overtime in NCAA I-AA first round playoff action last year.

- ✓ JOHNSON, LAYCOCK SHARE CLEMSON BACKGROUND...Furman head coach Bobby Johnson and William & Mary mentor Jimmye Laycock were once on the same team when the two were at Clemson -- Johnson as a player and Laycock as a graduate assistant coaching during the 1971 season. A three-year letterman as a defensive back, Johnson led Clemson in interceptions in 1971 and '72 prior to graduating in 1972. Laycock, meanwhile, earned a master's degree from Clemson in 1972. Laycock later served three years (1977-79) as offensive coordinator at Clemson before being named coach at William & Mary in 1980. Johnson returned to his alma mater twice -- the first time in 1981 as an athletic counselor, and later in 1993 to serve as defensive coordinator for one season. He was named Furman's head coach in 1994.
- HOME PARADE CONTINUES...Furman's clash with William & Mary this Saturday will mark the third of seven regular season home games for the Paladins this season, and third of four home contests in September following last Saturday's

- 44-10 win over Newberry. Prior to this year, Furman has only played seven regular season home contests once since moving into Paladin Stadium, and that came in 1987 when the Paladins produced a 5-2 record. Furman played an all-time high nine home games in 1989 and went 8-1, but that run included three playoff contests.
- ✓ UNDER THE LIGHTS...Furman's 44-10 win over Newberry on Saturday marked only the 11th night game in Paladin Stadium's 20-year, 121game history. Opened in 1981, Paladin Stadium did not host a night game until the 1991 season when Furman knocked off Liberty 31-7 in the Paladins' home opener. In the 11 games under the lights of Paladin Stadium, Furman has posted a solid 9-2 record (.818) and enters the William & Mary contest having captured six of the last seven night games within its home confines. The Paladins' first night game defeat in Paladin Stadium came to William & Mary in 1994 (28-26), and Elon edged the Paladins in the 1999 season opening night contest (24-22). Since assuming the head coaching reins in 1994, Bobby Johnson has directed the Paladins to a 7-2 record (.778) in home night games, and his first career win as the Paladins' head coach was a 26-21 night verdict over South Carolina State in 1994. Furman sports a 93-27-1 (.773) overall record in Paladin Stadium.

- ✓ **DES WHO??**...After sporting the Southern Conference's top kickoff return specialist a year ago in All-American Des Kitchings (35.1 ypr, 3 TDs), many figured Furman would not be as formidable at returning kicks this year following Kitchings' graduation to the NFL. After two games, though, Furman is making an early bid to "improve" on last year's numbers as the Paladins are averaging 43.0 ypr on five returns thus far. Leading the way is sophomore Chris Lowery (Knoxville, Tenn.), who has three returns for 157 yards (52.3 ypr). Lowery's 78 yard return at the start of the second half led directly to a Furman field goal in the Paladins' 16-3 season opening win over Elon, and in last Saturday's game against Newberry Lowery reeled off a 59-yard return on the first possession to help set up the Paladins' first score of the game.
- ✓ IVORY ON A ROLL...Furman tailback Louis Ivory's 171-yard, two-touchdown rushing performance in the Paladins' whitewash of Newberry on Saturday represented his fifth straight 100-yard performance, seventh 100-yard outing in the Paladins' last eight games, and 11th century mark rushing performance of his career. In the Paladins' 16-3 season opening win against Elon, Ivory ran for 182 yards, including a career best 75-yard touchdown run in the game's final minute to seal the victory. The 182-yard effort against Elon marked the second highest rushing total of his career, trailing only the 203 yards he rang up against East Tennessee State in 1999 (48-21 win). In rushing for over 100 yards in Furman's last five games, Ivory has totaled 100 carries for 731 yards (146.2 ypg/7.3 ypc) and five touchdowns. Over the past eight games, the Paladin junior has rushed for 1155 yards (144.4 ypg/6.7 ypc) and eight touchdowns.

- ✓ NOT SINCE '92...Louis Ivory's five straight | 100-yard rushing performances is the first by a Paladin running back since Carl Tremble reeled off 100-yard games in the Paladins' final nine games of the 1992 season.
- ✓ CHARTING LOUIS IVORY...In rushing for 171 yards and two touchdowns in Furman's win over Newberry on Saturday, Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.) continued to solidify his standing as one of Furman's all-time leading rushers, moving from eighth to sixth on the school's all-time rushing list with 2,278 yards. Last year Ivory made the switch from fullback to tailback on the way to becoming the first Paladin 1,000-yard rusher since Carl Tremble topped the plateau in 1992. In rolling up 1,519 yards and 14 touchdowns in 1999, Ivory posted the second highest season rushing total in Furman history and tallied 100yard rushing performances in eight games, including a career high 203-yard outing against East Tennessee State (48-21 win). In addition, his 14 rushing touchdowns in 1999 were the second highest season total ever by a Paladin. In a 28-3 victory over North Carolina, Ivory garnered a career high 34 carries for 177 yards — the most yards ever by a Paladin player against and NCAA Í-A opponent. Overall Furman is 10-1 in Ivory's 11 career 100-yard rushing performances.

✓ DEREK RUSSELL: TD MAN...Two games into the 2000 season, senior fullback Derek Russell

left off a year ago when he led Furman in scoring with 90 points on a school single season tying 15 touchdowns despite finishing only fourth in rushing with 337 yards. In Saturday's 44-10 win over Newberry, Russell, in addition to catching the first pass of his career (for seven yards), scored three touchdowns but ran for only 37 yards. Heading into Saturday's clash with William & Mary, Russell has 27 rushing touchdowns despite only having rushed for 840 yards in his career. While he is a proven performer as a blocker and runner in short yardage situations, Russell does have a pair of 100-yard rushing performances to his credit, and both have come against Chattanooga. In the Paladins' 40-35, Southern Conference title-clinching win over the Mocs last year, Russell ran for 101 yards on 15 carries, including a decisive 44yard touchdown run late in the fourth quarter.

✓ GENERAL MARSHALL...No, he's not General George Marshall, but after his three field goal performance in Furman's season opening 16-3 win over Elon on Aug. 2 true freshman Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.), who beat out three other Paladin upperclassmen for the team's placekicking job, has earned a few salutes from his teammates and coaching staff. Appearing in his first game as a Paladin, Marshall accounted for 10 of the Paladins' 16 points by connecting on field goals covering 43, 29, and 34 yards, plus an extra point. In the Păladins' 44-10 victory over Newberry on Saturday. Marshall converted 1-of-2 field goal attempts and five of six PATs to up his scoring total to 18 points. The only freshman among Furman's 24 position starters, Marshall is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship.

✓ JUST WARMING UP...Since 1998, Furman quarterback Justin Hill (Greer, S.C) has taken a couple of games to get into a high efficiency passing groove as the comparison below indicates. In the win over Newberry last Saturday, Hill completed 9-of-15 passes for 88 yards and a touchdown, while also rushing for 43 yards. That was a far cry better than his 2-for-10, 20-yard passing performance in the Paladins' 16-3 season opening win over Elon.

- ✓ IT'S JUSTIN TIME...Much of the optimism surrounding Furman's veteran offense this fall is due to the return of senior quarterback and team co-captain Justin Hill (Greer, S.C.). A second team All-Southern Conference pick in 1999, Hill played a major role in leading Furman to a 9-3 record, Southern Conference championship, and 10) Tim Sorrells 1977-81 2,9

(Austell, Ga.) appears to be picking up where he | trip to the NCAA I-AA playoffs a year ago, throwing for 1,519 yards and nine touchdowns while also rushing for 680 yards and eight scores. During one three-game stretch that included wins over The Citadel, East Tennessee State, and North Carolina, Hill completed a school record 19 straight pass attempts, and he finished the season with a 62.4 completion percentage, the second highest season rate in school history. Hill's 1,363 career rushing yards are the most ever by a Paladin quarterback. Furman is now 19-8 with Hill in the starting lineup. As a freshman in 1997, he paced the Paladins to a 3-0 record in three late season starts. In 1998 Furman went 5-5 with Hill under center (missed one start due to injury), and last season the Paladins forged a 9-3 mark with their veteran quarterback at the controls. The maturity of Hill in 1999 was reflected in the prodigious jump in production by Furman's offense, as the Paladins averaged 36.0 points and 424.3 yards per game after totaling only 24.3 points and 311.1 yards per outing in 1998.

✓ NOTING FURMAN'S OFFENSIVE LINE...Furman's offensive line should be a team strength this year with the return of four starters. Heading the list are three pre-season All-Southern Conference selections: senior tackle Josh Moore (Cross Hill, S.C.), junior guard Marty Priore (Cincinnati, Ohio), and junior center Chris Stewart (Palm Harbor, Fla.). Moore, a consensus 1999 all-conference first team pick, was named to the 2000 Sports Network Pre-Season All-America team and, at 6-foot-5, 306 pounds, is one of the biggest players to ever wear a Paladin uniform. He owns 20 career starts. Prior, meanwhile, has started in 22 consecutive games since moving into the lineup early in 1998 campaign. And Stewart, the team's strongest player (500-pound bench press, 675-pound squat, 357-pound power clean), tallied the highest season blocking grade (89.6%) and winning grades in all 12 games a year ago in helping the Paladins to a 9-3 record and league championship. Furman's other returning starter, junior tackle Donnie Littlejohn, actually boasts more starting experience (23 games) and play participations (1,417) than all Paladin linemen.

✓ GOING FOR A RARE TRIPLE...If tackle Josh Moore, guard Marty Priore, and Chris Stewart make good on their pre-season All-Southern Conference tabs by league head coaches, it will indeed be a rarity. Only twice before, in 1981 and 1990, have three Furman offensive linemen earned first team All-Southern Conference honors in the same year.

✓ SANSBURY PRE-SEASON ALL-AMERICA PICK...Although he caught only eight passes for 87 yards and two touchdowns in 1999, junior tight end Trent Sansbury earned consensus All-Southern Conference honors and was named to the 2000 Sports Network Pre-Season All-America

MARION MARTIN: ATHLETIC, ACADEMIC STAR...Starting weak side linebacker Marion Martin (Columbia, S.C.) is an outstanding student on Furman's football team who contributes in a major way on the field. A year ago Martin racked up 66 tackles in helping Furman to a 9-3 record and Southern Conference championship. After the season he was named to the prestigious GTE Academic All-America second team, joining fellow teammate Stuart Rentz, who earned first team honors, in giving Furman two representatives on the prestigious squad. In May of this year, Martin graduated summa cum laude with a 3.90 grade point average in chemistry. Already closing in on master's degree in chemistry from Furman, Martin opted to return for his final season of eligibility prior to seeking his doctoral degree. In the Paladins' 16-3 season opening win over Elon on Sept. 2, Martin tallied four tackles and a forced fumble in the game's waning seconds that helped the Paladins preserve the victory.

✓ JUNIORS RULE...Even with the exit of junior cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.) from the starting lineup due to a season ending knee injury in the Paladins' season opener against Elon, a quick check of Furman's probable two-deep reveals the Paladins will likely start only six seniors in this Saturday's game against William & Mary. The remainder of Furman's starting cast should include 12 juniors and four sophomores. Four of the six seniors are on offense, and the only two senior defensive starters are linebacker Marion Martin (Columbia, S.C.) and cornerback Andre Stroman (Plantation, Fla.), Johnson's replacement.

✓ BOBBY JOHNSON: YEAR SEVEN...The 2000 football season marks Furman head coach Bobby Johnson's seventh year at the helm of the Paladin program and 23rd season of service to the university. After suffering through a 3-8 season in 1994 (the program's first losing season since 1979), Furman rebounded in 1995 to finish 6-5. A year later, Johnson, a Columbia native and 1973 Clemson graduate, directed the Paladins to a 9-4 record and into the NCAA I-AA playoffs—the program's first playoff appearance since 1990. Furman went 7-4 in 1997, 5-6 in 1998, and 9-3 last year on the way to claiming the program's 10th league championship and second NCAA playoff appearance under Johnson. Johnson's six-year head coaching record is 41-30 (.578) and his last five teams have combined to post a 38-22 mark (.633). Against NCAA I-AA competition, Furman teams under Johnson's direction have gone 39-26 (.600). Johnson's 22plus year tenure includes work as defensive backs coach, assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. The Paladins' record during that span (1976-80; 82-92; 94present) is 173-83-7 (.672).

✓ JOHNSON=SUCCESS...Furman's nine wins last year as part of its 9-3 season tied the high water win mark for Bobby Johnson-coached Paladin squad. In 1996, Furman went 8-3 in the

regular season and finished with a 9-4 record. The nine regular season wins a year ago were the most by a Furman team since 1989 when the Paladins posted a 10-1 regular season mark on the way to a 12-2 record. Only nine teams in Furman football history (94 seasons) have won at least nine games in a regular season, and Bobby Johnson has had a hand in seven of those squads in the capacities of defensive backs coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach.

FURMAN AND THE NFL...Furman football currently sports three graduates on active NFL rosters and a fourth on a practice squad.

Tight end Luther Broughton '97 (Cainhoy, S.C.) is now in his second season with the Philadelphia Eagles after catching 26 passes for 295 yards and three touchdowns last season. A fifthround pick of the Eagles in the 1997 draft, Broughton spent the 1997 campaign with the Eagles before signing the Carolina Panthers, with whom he played the entire 1998 season before being traded back to the Eagles prior to the start of the 1999 campaign.

Linebacker Orlando Ruff '99 (Winnsboro, S.C.) is entering his second season with the San Diego Chargers and first as the Chargers' starting middle linebacker. Last year, after signing with San Diego as a free agent, Ruff garnered team special teams MVP honors.

John Keith '00 (Newnan, Ga.), a fourth round pick of the San Francisco 49ers in this year's draft, has earned a spot on the 49ers roster following a strong pre-season as nickel back and member of special teams.

Wide receiver Des Kitchings '00 (Wagener, S.C.), a seventh round choice of the Kansas City Chiefs in this year's draft, was recently resigned by the Chiefs to their practice squad.

✓ FURMAN TO INDUCT SIX INTO HALL-OF-FAME SEPT. 16...Former football All-American and current Paladin assistant coach Allen Edwards '92 is among six greats who will be inducted into the Furman University Athletic Hall-of-Fame in ceremonies prior to this Saturday's game against William & Mary. Also slated for induction are Caroline Peek Blaylock '95 (golf), Scott Broderick '88 (soccer), Mel Daniel '82 (basketball), Jack Kay '86 (golf), and Brent Williams '91 (baseball).

Caroline Peek-Blaylock '95 - Women's Golf (1992-95)...Three-time winner of the National Golf Coaches Association Long Drive Championship and three-time All-American selection...named Southern Conference Female Athlete of the Year in 1994 and Southern Conference Player of the Year in 1995...two-time All-Southern Conference selection (SoCon Championship began in 1994)...placed third at the 1994 NCAA Championship and sixth in 1995...tied an NCAA record with a career-low 65 in the second

round of the 1995 NCAA Championships...posted a 76.1 career stroke average, which ranks fourth on Furman's all-time list...ended her career with 21 Top 10 finishes and three tournament victories...currently plays on the LPGA tour and has over \$70,000 in career earnings...finished 10th at the 1999 LPGA Corning Classic.

Scott Broderick '88 -- Men's Soccer (1984-87)...Three-time All-Southern Conference selection who ranks as Furman's second all-time leading scorer (44 goals, 16 assists, 104 points)...shares Furman's single game goals record (4) with four others...1988 GTE Academic All-America second team selection...member of three Southern Conference championship teams (1984, '86, '87)...helped Furman compile a 47-19-4 record during his four-year career...as program's leading scorer, played a significant role in Furman's transition to regional soccer power...as a junior helped Paladin post first-ever wins over Clemson (3-1) and South Carolina (3-0) in the same season.

FURMAN 16, ELON 3

GREENVILLE (Sept. 2, 2000) -- Freshman placekicker Danny Marshall booted three field goals and tailback Louis Ivory rushed for 182 yards and a touchdown to lift nationally ninthranked Furman to a 16-3 win over Elon in the season opener for both teams.

Furman, which lost the 1999 season opener to the Phoenix, narrowly avoided a second straight defeat when strong safety Shelvis Smith recovered a fumble by Elon quarterback Derrick Moore at the Paladin 10-yard line with 1:26 left in the game and Furman holding a tenuous 9-3 lead.

Furman scored the game's only touchdown on the next play when, following a 15-yard penalty of the Phoenix, Ivory took a handoff from quarterback Justin Hill and raced 75 yards for the score with 46 seconds left.

Elon outgained Furman 325 to 236 in total offense, but the Phoenix suffered six turnovers, including four fumbles and two interceptions. Paladin linebacker Will Bouton led Furman's strong defensive effort with 13 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, an interception, and a fumble recovery which he returned for 18 yards.

Playing in his first collegiate contest, Marshall provided Furman with its first points of the game when he converted a 43-yard field goal early in the second quarter. He later added a 29-yard field goal with only 20 seconds left in the first half to make it 6-0.

Chris Lowery's 78-yard kickoff return to start the second half set up Marshall's third field goal, a 34-yarder, that gave the Paladins a 9-0 lead less than two minutes into the second half.

Elon answered with its only scoring drive of the game, moving 69 yards in 13 plays for a 27yard field goal by Beau Wegmann with 6:40 to go in the third period. But the Phoenix failed to register points on its last five possessions, including four that ended inside Furman territory.

FURMAN 44, NEWBERRY 10

GREENVILLE (Sept. 9, 2000) -- Junior tailback Louis Ivory rushed for 171 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA ninth-ranked Furman to a 44-10 win over visiting Division II member Newberry Saturday night at Paladin Stadium.

Ivory, who posted his fifth straight 100-yard rushing performance and seventh in the Paladins' last eight games, scored on a 16-yard run in the first quarter to tie the game at 7-7 and later added a 16-yard scoring run early in the second period to give Furman a 21-7 lead.

Furman rolled up 385 yards rushing and totaled 520 yards against the Indians, who accounted for 241 yards in total offense. Ivory's 171 rushing yards moved him from eighth to sixth on Furman's career rushing chart with 2,278 yards.

Leading 21-7 in the second quarter, Furman extended its margin to 28-7 when quarterback Justin Hill hooked up with split end James Thomas on a 17-yard touchdown pass with only 42 seconds left in the half.

Furman made it 35-7 when fullback Derek Russell bulled over on a fourth and goal play from the Newberry 1 at the 10:00 mark of the third quarter.

Russell, who scored three touchdowns in the contest, accounted for the game's final score on a 1-yard dive with only 17 seconds left in the game.
