THE GAME

Furman and Wofford, who in 1889 played the first football game in South Carolina, meet for the 74th time in what looms as a crucial contest for both teams' NCAA I-AA playoff chances. Furman (7-2, 4-2 SoCon) enters the contest in third place in the Southern Conference standings, but the Paladins are coming off an impressive 45-10 domination of previously top-ranked and 2000 Southern Conference regular season champion Georgia Southern last week in Greenville. Wofford (6-3, 5-2 SoCon), meanwhile, is tied with Appalachian State for second place in the league standings following a 35-31 win over East Tennessee State in Johnson City on Saturday.

In a series that got its start in 1889 with a 5-1 Wofford win in Spartanburg in the first football game in South Carolina history, Furman holds a 43-23-7 advan-

Furman enters Saturday's game having claimed wins in four the last five meetings between the two schools, including a 30-3 decision last year in Greenville. Wofford, however, topped Furman 40-20 in Spartanburg in 1998 in the Paladins' first visit there since 1979. Furman has outscored Wofford 149-53 over the last five games, an average of 29.8 ppg to 10.6 ppg.

In all games played in Greenville, Furman holds a commanding 28-8-5 record versus Wofford. In Spartanburg, the Paladins and Terriers are knotted at 15-15-2.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Quarterback Justin Hill rushed for a career high 134 yards and two touchdowns and threw for a third score to lead Furman to a 30-3 victory over Wofford at Paladin Stadium.

Hill connected with flanker Des Kitchings on a 45yard touchdown pass just seconds before halftime to put Furman ahead 7-3, thereby helping to erase the frustration of four first half fumbles.

The second half was a different story, however, as Furman tallied twice in the third period on a 22-yard Jason Wells field goal and on a 49-yard Hill touchdown run to take a 17-3 lead.

The Paladins salted the game away with two more touchdowns in the fourth quarter on a 29-yard run by tailback Louis Ivory and Hill's second scoring run of the day, a 10-yard burst with 1:49 left in the contest.

In rolling up 475 vards on offense and limiting the Terriers to a season low three points, Furman all but locked up a bid to the NCAA I-AA playoffs and, in the process, positioned itself for a share of the 1999 Southern Conference title.

Leading Furman's solid defensive performance against Wofford were free safety John Keith with 17 tackles and linebacker John Thrift, who registered 12 stops and a caused fumble. The Paladins were especially strong against Wofford in short yardage situations, denying the Terriers on all six fourth down attempts.

FURMAN LAST TIME OUT

GREENVILLE, S.C. (Nov. 4, 2000) — Junior tailback Louis Ivory rushed for a career high 301 yards and three touchdowns to lead 11th-ranked Furman to a 45-10 victory over NCAA I-AA top-ranked and 2000 Southern Conference champion Georgia Southern in front of 15,127 homecoming fans Saturday afternoon.

Ivory, the leading rusher in NCAA I-AA coming into the game, reeled off scoring runs of 7, 73, and 37 vards to establish new school single game and season rushing records. His 301 yards eclipsed Mike Glenn's 261-yard record set against Presbyterian in 1980, and his season total of 1,707 yards through nine games shattered Carl Tremble's season rushing standard of 1,555 yards set in 1992.

The victory was Furman's second over a topranked team, and it represented Georgia Southern's most decisive conference loss in the Eagles' eight-year league history, and biggest overall defeat since 1996. Furman totaled 523 yards in offense to Georgia

Southern's 250 and outrushed the Eagles 404 to 114. Georgia Southern came into the game averaging a conference leading 359.2 rushing yards per game. Senior free safety Josh Cooper headlined Furmanís defensive effort with 10 tackles, and the Paladins sacked Eagle quarterback J.R. Revere four times and intercepted two passes in the contest.

Holding a slim 10-7 halftime lead, Furman seized momentum in the first minute of the second half when cornerback Richie Jackson intercepted a J.R. Revere pass and returned it 29 yards for a touchdown at the 14:07 mark to put the Paladins ahead 17-7.

A 73-yard return by the Eagles' Andre Weathers on the ensuing kickoff set up a 41-yard field goal by Rob Bironas that cut the lead to 17-10, but from that point it was all Furman as the Paladins scored touchdowns on their next four possessions.

A 37-yard touchdown strike from quarterback

Justin Hill to Bear Rinehart made it 24-10 and, a little over four minutes later, Ivory bounced outside and outran Georgia Southern's defense on a 73-yard touchdown sprint that gave him Furman's single season rushing record.

Fullback Derek Russell's 20-yard touchdown run with 1:43 left in the third period closed out Furmanís 28-point third quarter and gave the Paladins a 38-10 advantage.

lvory finished off his top career rushing performance with a 37-yard scoring run at the 9:21 juncture of the fourth quarter.

Furman quarterback Justin Hill threw for 119 yards and a touchdown in his first game back from injury. Hill did not play in the Paladins' 23-21 loss to East Tennessee State two weeks ago after sustaining a strained rotator cuff in his right shoulder in a win over The Citadel on Oct. 14.

NOTING THE PALADINS

▶ BIG STAKES...Saturday's Furman-Wofford game has a lot at stake for both teams — primarily one or even a pair of possible bids to this year's NCAA I-AA playoffs. A 45-10 winner on Saturday over previously top-ranked Georgia Southern, Furman (7-2, 4-2 SoCon) needs a victory to reach the eight-win plateau and maintain its Top 10 ranking, currently the highest among all Southern Conference schools despite the fact the Paladine are in third place in the league standings. Wofford (6-3, 5-2 SoCon), meanwhile, needs a win over Furman to make a case for its first ever playoff bid and move one step closer to eight wins, which over the years has consistently been the minimum victory total required for

at-large playoff consideration. The Terriers, a 35-31 winner over East Tennessee State on Saturday, head into the Furman contest tied for second place in the league standings.

✓ THE SECOND NO. 1 TO FALL...Furman's 45-10 rout of Georgia Southern on Saturday marked the Paladins' second win over a top-ranked team. Prior to Saturday's triumph, the Paladins' lone win over a No. 1 team had been Idaho, which Furman defeated 38-7 in the semifinals of the 1988 NCAA I-AA playoffs. In addition to wins over the Eagles and the Vandals, other high ranked scalps the Paladins have earned include three No. 2s: Nevada (35-12, 1985); Georgia Southern (17-12, 1988); and Marshall (17-3, 1993). ✔ PALADIN DEFENSE STEPS UP...Fueling Furman's football engine in 2000 has been an improved defense, and the Paladin stop troops certainly had it going on Saturday against Georgia Southern, holding the Eagles to only 10 points, 114 yards rushing, and 250 yards in total offense. In addition, Furman posted four sacks and garnered a pair of interceptions, one of which Paladin junior cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) returned for a touchdown. The Paladins' defensive performance against the Eagles is significant because Georgia Southern came into the game averaging 35.6 ppg, a league leading 359.2 ypg rushing, and 469.4 ypg in total offense. In holding the Eagles to only 114 yards rushing, Furman (which rushed for 404 yards on Saturday) became the first team since 1996 (a streak of 53 games) to outrush Georgia Southern. Furman, incidentally, was the last team to outrush Georgia Southern before the streak began in 1996. Currently the Southern Conference leader in scoring defense (12.9 ppg) and rushing defense (123.9). Furman counts only two seniors on its starting defensive unit, linebacker Marion Martin (Columbia, S.C.) and cornerback Andre Stroman (Plantation, Fla.), and Stroman is only starting due to a knee injury sustained by junior cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.) in the season opener against Elon.

✓ MORE ON FURMAN'S DEFENSE...Furman has surrendered only 106.0 yards per game rushing and 2.9 ypc to the opposition in the last six games, and just eight rushing touchdowns through nine games this season. Furman has not surrendered an individual 100-yard rushing performance to an opponent this year. Marcel Shipp of Massachusetts was the last foe to rush for 100 yards against Furman when he ran for 170 in the Paladins' 30-23 loss to the Minutemen in the first round of last year's NCAA I-AA playoffs. Appalachian State's

Karim Razzak's 82 yards are the most rushing yards by a Paladin opponent this season. Counting its four sacks against Georgia Southern on Saturday, Furman now ranks second in the Southern Conference with 20 sacks. That's six more than the 14 takedowns the Paladins recorded last year in 12 games. While some Southern Conference analysts have singled out Furman's pass defense for criticism, it should be noted that the Paladins lead the league in interceptions (17) and rank a solid third in pass defense efficiency (110.2 rating). Furman's 17 interceptions also represent the most by a Paladin squad since 1990 when Furman collected 22 pickoffs in 13 games. Furman currently ranks third in opponent third down conversion percentage (35.4%) after ranking eighth last year (44.1%).

✓ JACKSON PICK SETS TONE...When junior cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) stepped in front of a pass by Georgia Southern's J.R. Revere and returned it 29 yards for a touchdown on Saturday, it helped open the flood gates for the Paladins' 28-point third guarter en route to the 45-10 rout of the top-ranked Eagles. For Jackson, the interception against Georgia Southern was his third of the season, 12th theft of his career, and first interception return for a touchdown. Paladin junior free safety Josh Cooper, who also hails from Cincinnati, is currently tied for the league lead with six interceptions, thanks in large measure to a school record tying three interception performance in the Paladins' 33-7 win over The Citadel on Oct. 14. Cooper's performance against the Bulldogs, which included a 35-yard return for a touchdown, tied a Furman single game interceptions record held by four other Paladins: Joe Watts vs. Presbyterian (1951), Mark Gordon vs. Presbyterian (1975), John Zemina vs. VMI (1982), and Walter Booth vs. Appalachian State (1999).

✓ THEY SAID IT...(Selected quotes from Saturday's Furman-Georgia Southern game):

"It was a pretty good whipping. It's one of the worst loses I've ever experienced, not only at Georgia Southern but as a coach anywhere. We couldn't pass the ball, we couldn't run it, and we couldn' get any first downs. We couldn't get the fullback going at all. They just kind of mashed us."

✓ HEADY STUFF...Starting Paladin linebacker Marion Martin (Columbia, S.C.), a two-year starter and 1999 GTE Academic All-America selection, garnered another prestigious honor last week when he was named a National Football Foundation And College Hall Of Fame Scholar-Athlete. In being named one of 16 national scholar-athletes, Martin will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship and will be honored at a banquet at New York's Waldorf-Astoria on Dec. 12, alongside this year's College Football Hall Of Fame inductees. A member of Phi Beta Kappa who graduated Summa Cum Laude in May with a 3.90 grade point average in chemistry, he is currently pursuing a master's degree in chemistry from Furman and plans to seek his doctoral degree in physical chemistry after that. In the Paladins' 16-3 season opening win over Elon on Sept. 2, he tallied four tackles and a forced fumble in the game's waning seconds that helped the Paladins preserve the victory. On the year he has 57 tackles, four tackles-for-loss, two forced fumbles, and a sack. A year ago he racked up 66 tackles in helping Furman to a 9-3 record and Southern Conference championship.

- ✓ KEEP THAT FLAG IN YOUR POCKET...Furman heads into this Saturday's game against Wofford as the least penalized team in the Southern Conference. Through nine games the Paladins have been flagged only 37 times for infractions totaling a league low 290 yards. Wofford is second behind Furman with 47 penalties for 379 yards.
- ✓ **DEFENDING THE HOME TURF**...Furman's 45-10 win over Georgia Southern on Saturday improved the Paladins' home record this season to 6-0 and ledger against Southern Conference foes in Paladin Stadium to 8-0 dating back to the 1998 season. Furman is now 12-1 in its last 13 home games (.923).
- ✓ CLOSING IN ON 100...Saturday's 45-10 triumph over Georgia Southern marked Furman's 97th victory in Paladin Stadium history. Now in its 20th season of play in the beautiful facility, Furman has compiled a 97-27-1 record (.780) since moving into Paladin Stadium in
- ✓ A CLOSER LOOK...Furman is now 12-3 (.800) in its last 15 Southern Conference clashes and overall is 17-5 (.773) in its last 22 contests.
- ✓ LAST FIVE LOSSES OF THE "TOUGH" VARIETY...Furman's last five losses have been especially tough because they have been decided by two points (Elon, 24-22), three points (Georgia Southern, 41-38), seven points (Massachusetts, 30-23 OT), one point (Appalachian State, 18-17), and two points (East Tennessee State, 23-21), respectively.
- ✓ LARGEST CROWD SINCE 1994...The 15.127 fans in attendance at Saturday's Furman-Georgia Southern game represented the Paladins' biggest home crowd since the 1994 season when 15,673 fans witnessed Furman's 26-21 win over South Carolina State in Bobby Johnson's Paladin head coaching debut. Furman has averaged 11,416 fans through six games this season. Last year Furman averaged 10.897 fans in six home dates, including one playoff game.
- ✔ OFFENSIVE LINE GETTING IT DONE...With four starters returning off last year's offensive line, Furman, as expected, has gotten solid line play in its nine games as evidenced by junior tailback Louis Ivory's 1,707 rushing yards. And if there were any doubts remaining about which team in the league has the best offensive line, they were more than likely erased Saturday in the Paladins' dominating performance against what was reputed to be a solid Georgia Southern defensive front. Furman's 404 rushing yards represented the highest rushing total by a NCAA I-AA opponent against Georgia Southern and highlighted the Paladins' 523-yard total offense effort against the Eagle defense, which came into the game yielding only 15.6 points per game, 133.0 rushing yards per game, and 306.4 total yards per outing.

Heading Furman's strong offensive front are three pre-season All-Southern Conference selections: senior tackle Josh Moore (Cross Hill, S.C.), junior guard Marty Priore (Cincinnati, Ohio), and junior center Chris Stewart (Palm Harbor, Fla.). Moore, a consensus 1999 all-conference first team pick, was named to the 2000 Sports Network Pre-Season All-America team. He owns 27 career starts. Priore, meanwhile, has started in 29 consecutive games since moving into the lineup early in 1998 campaign. And Stewart, the team's strongest player (500-pound bench press, 675-pound squat, 357-pound power clean), tallied the highest season blocking grade (89.6%) and winning grades in all 12 games a year ago in helping the Paladins to a 9-3 record and league championship. Furman's other returning starter, junior tackle Donnie Littlejohn, actu-

ally boasts more starting experience (30 games) than | man football history. all Paladin linemen.

✓ EXPERIENCE, EXPERIENCE....Furman's veteran offensive line, which includes only one senior in right tackle Josh Moore, has combined to post 117 starts in their collective careers.

- ✓ SO. YOU'RE LOOKING FOR NOTES ON LOUIS IVORY, HUH??...Well, they are plentiful and we should probably start with the junior tailback and Fort Valley, Ga., native's awesome 33-carry, 301-yard, 3-touchdown performance in Saturday's 45-10 rout of Georgia Southern. Here goes:
- Ivory's 301-yard rushing performance in Furman's 45-10 rout of Georgia Southern established a new Furman modern era single game rushing record. The previous standard was held by Mike Glenn, who rushed for 261 yards in a 28-7 win over Presbyterian in 1980.
- Ivory's 301 rushing yards against Georgia Southern were the most in a regular season game in Southern Conference history. The previous record was 286 set by The Citadel's Gene Brown vs. VMI in 1988.
- Ivory's three touchdowns against Georgia Southern covered 7, 73, and 37 yards. His 73-yard run broke Furman's single season rushing record of 1,555 yards set by Carl Tremble in 1992. Ivory now has 1,707 yards in nine games.
- In scoring three touchdowns against Georgia Southern, Ivory tied Furman's single season rushing touchdowns record of 15 scores also shared by three other players: Robbie Gardner (1986), Carl Tremble (1990), and Derek Russell (1999).
- Southern was his third longest run of the season. He had a career long 88-yard run in a 34-10 win over William & Mary and a 75-yard sprint in a 16-3 victory over Elon. His 88-yard scoring run against William & Mary is the second longest in Furman football history.
- Southern represented his third straight 200-yard game and fourth 200-plus yard outing of the season. Others include 232 (vs. William & Mary), 227 (vs. East Tennessee State), and 214 (vs. The Citadel). He currently owns the first, fourth, sixth, eighth, and 10th best modern era single game rushing performances in Fur-

- Ivory is the leading rusher in NCAA I-AA heading into this Saturday's game against Wofford, averaging 189.7 ypg and a stellar 7.5 ypc.
- Ivory currently leads consensus Georgia Southern All-America and 1999 Walter Payton Award winning fullback Adrian Peterson in all season rushing statistical categories, including 7.5 ypc and 189.7 ypg to Peterson's 5.9 ypc and 151.2 ypg.

- In his last three games, Louis Ivory has averaged 247.3 ypg, rushing 99 times for 742 yards and six touchdowns.
- Ivory established a new Furman single game rushing attempts standard with 41 carries (227 yards) against East Tennessee State on Oct. 21, breaking the previous standard of 39 set by Carl Tremble (vs. Chattanooga, 1992).
- In rushing for 214 yards in the Paladins' 33-7 win over The Citadel on Oct. 14, Ivory became the fastest player in Furman history reach 1,000 rushing yards. lvory, who topped the plateau in seven games, accomplished a feat that previously had taken the best Paladin runners eight games to accomplish. Interestingly, one of those two runners was Ivory himself, who need eight games in 1999 to surpass 1,000 yards en route to a 1,519-yard campaign.
- ✓ Ivory's 1,707 rushing yards through nine games already represent the third best single season rushing total by a Southern Conference player.

junior tailback Louis Ivory's recording setting 73-yard touchdown run against Georgia Southern on Saturday, Georgia Southern outside linebacker Michael Youngblood met Furman senior fullback Derek Russell (Austell, Ga.), and for Youngblood it wasn't pretty. Blocking ahead of Ivory on the left side on the play, Russell "blew up" Youngblood by literally knocking his helmet off five yards downfield to help spring Ivory on his 73-yard run. The helmet-less Youngblood and a host of other trailing Georgia Southern defenders were captured on film by Furman photographer Charlie Register, whose shot of Ivory's run is currently displayed on Furman's athletic web site and in today's USA Today. Russell, who packs a good wallop as a blocker and who contributed greatly to Ivory's 301yard, three-touchdown game on Saturday, can also dish out punishment as a runner. On a 20-yard scoring run in the third quarter that put the Paladins ahead 38-10, Russell punished would-be Eagle senior free safety Ryan Hadden at Georgia Southern 10-yard line on the way into the end zone. Russell totaled 59 yards and a

- ✓ DEREK RUSSELL: TD MAN...Senior fullback Derek Russell (Austell, Ga.) is once again proving to be a valuable scoring weapon for the Paladins as he has tallied nine touchdowns despite having rushed for only 301 yards this year. A year ago Russell led Furman in scoring with 90 points on a school single season tying 15 touchdowns despite finishing only fourth in rushing with 337 yards. Heading into Saturday's clash with Wofford, Russell has run for 33 touchdowns in a career that includes 1,094 rushing yards. While he is a proven performer as a blocker and runner in short yardage situations, Russell does have a pair of 100yard rushing performances to his credit, and both have come against Chattanooga. In the Paladins' 40-35, Southern Conference title-clinching win over the Mocs last year. Russell ran for 101 yards on 15 carries. including a decisive 44-yard touchdown run late in the fourth quarter.

end on the squad. With only three receptions through five games, junior All-Southern Conference performer Trent Sansbury (Lilburn, Ga.) obviously had had very little contact with the pigskin. Four weeks ago that began to change when Sansbury caught three passes for 94 yards, including a 60-yard touchdown pass in the Paladins' 18-17 loss to Appalachian State. In the Paladins' 33-7 win over The Citadel on Oct. 14, it was more Sansbury as he hooked up with quarterback Billy Napier for five receptions for 94 yards and a touchdown, which came on a beautiful 26-yard strike between two Bulldog defenders to put the Paladins ahead 10-7 in the third quarter. The Paladins' 404 rushing yards in the 45-10 rout of Georgia Southern on Saturday marked the second highest rushing total by a Bobby Johnson-coached Furman squad, and is only exceeded by 1999's 509-yard rushing effort in Furman's 52-6 dismantling of the Tribe in Williamsburg.

- ✓ MARSHALL CONTINUING SOLID WORK...No. he's not General George Marshall, but after his three field goal performance in Furman's season opening 16-3 win over Elon on Sept. 2 and continued good work through eight games, true freshman Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.), who beat out three other Paladin upperclassmen for the team's placekicking job, has earned a few salutes from his teammates and coaching staff. Appearing in his first game as a Paladin, Marshall accounted for 10 of the Paladins' 16 points against the Phoenix by connecting on field goals covering 43, 29, and 34 yards, plus an extra point. Marshall, whose eight-game statistics include 10-of-14 FGs and 35-36 PATs, ranks second on the team in scoring with 65 points heading into this Saturday's game against Wofford. The only freshman among Furman's 24 position starters, Marshall is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship.
- ✓ HILL RETURNS IN SOLID FASHIONI...Furman senior quarterback Justin Hill (Greer, S.C), who sat out Furman's 23-21 loss to East Tennessee State on Oct. 21 after sustaining a strained rotator cuff in his right shoulder on the first series of the Paladins' 33-7 win over The Citadel on Oct. 14, played a solid game Saturday in the Paladins' 45-10 win over Georgia Southern, passing for 119 yards and a touchdown. More impressively, though, was Hill's execution of Furman's offense, which piled up 523 total yards against the Eagles.
- ✓ NOTING QB JUSTIN HILL...Furman guarterback Justin Hill, a second team All-Southern Conference pick in 1999, played a major role in leading Furman to a 9-3 record, Southern Conference championship, and trip to the NCAA I-AA playoffs a year ago, throwing for 1,519 yards and nine touchdowns while also rushing for 680 yards and eight scores. During one threegame stretch that included wins over The Citadel, East Tennessee State, and North Carolina, Hill completed a school record 19 straight pass attempts, and he finished the season with a 62.4 completion percentage, the second highest season rate in school history. Hill, who in the Paladins' 18-17 loss to Appalachian State on Oct. 7 rushed for 115 yards and a touchdown (career long 65-yard run) while throwing for 156 and another score, has now totaled 1,701 career rushing yards — the most ever by a Paladin quarterback — and over 5,000 yards in total offense (5,190), thus becoming one of only five players in school history to top 5,000 yards in total offense. Furman is 24-9 with Hill in the starting lineup. As a freshman in 1997, he paced the Paladins to a 3-0 record in three late season starts. In 1998 Furman went 5-5 with Hill under center (missed one start due to injury), and last season the Paladins forged a 9-3 mark with their veteran quarterback at the controls.

✓ NAME GAME...Redshirt freshman defensive end Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.), who earned Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Week honors for his three-sack performance in a 35-21 win over VMI on Sept. 23, is the son of former University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers. Sophomore tight end Jon Brown (Duluth, Ga.) is the nephew of Los Angeles Dodgers ace pitcher Kevin Brown.

✓ PREVOST, JOHNSON ON THE SHELF...Redshirt freshman linebacker Todd Prevost (Nashville, Tenn.), who was knocked unconscious on the opening kickoff against Newberry on Sept. 9, has retired following medical recommendations. Junior cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.) underwent reconstructive knee surgery in late September to repair a torn anterior cruciate ligament and damaged medial collateral ligament sustained in the second series of Furman's 2000 season opening game against Elon. Johnson, a starter at right cornerback in all 12 games in 1999, will sit out spring practice next year but anticipates returning to the playing field for the 2001 season as a redshirt junior.

✔ BOBBY JOHNSON: YEAR SEVEN...The 2000 football season marks Furman head coach Bobby Johnson's seventh year at the helm of the Paladin program and 23rd season of service to the university. After suffering through a 3-8 season in 1994 (the program's first losing season since 1979), Furman rebounded in 1995 to finish 6-5. A year later, Johnson, a Columbia native and 1973 Clemson graduate, directed the Paladins to a 9-4 record and into the NCAA I-AA playoffs — the program's first playoff appearance since 1990. Furman went 7-4 in 1997, 5-6 in 1998, and 9-3 last year on the way to claiming the program's 10th league championship and second NCAA playoff appearance under Johnson. Johnson's six-plus year head coaching record is 46-32 (.589) and his last six teams have combined to post a 43-24 mark (.642). Against NCAA I-AA competition, Furman teams under Johnson's direction have gone 43-28 (.606). Johnson's 22-plus year tenure includes work as defensive backs coach, assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. The Paladins' record during that span (1976-80; 82-92; 94-present) is 178-85-7 (.672).

✓ JOHNSON=SUCCESS...Furman's nine wins last year as part of its 9-3 season tied the high water win mark for Bobby Johnson-coached Paladin squad. In 1996, Furman went 8-3 in the regular season and finished with a 9-4 record. The nine regular season wins a year ago were the most by a Furman team since 1989 when the Paladins posted a 10-1 regular season mark on the way to a 12-2 record. Only nine teams in Furman football history (94 seasons) have won at least nine games in a regular season, and Bobby Johnson has had a hand in seven of those squads in the capacities of defensive backs coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach.

✓ FURMAN AND THE NFL...Furman football currently sports three graduates on active NFL rosters and a fourth on a practice squad.

Tight end Luther Broughton '97 (Cainhoy, S.C.) is now in his second season with the Philadelphia Eagles after catching 26 passes for 295 yards and three touchdowns last season. A fifth-round pick of the Eagles in the 1997 draft, Broughton spent the 1997 campaign with the Eagles before signing the Carolina Panthers, with whom he played the entire 1998 season before being traded back to the Eagles prior to the start of the 1999 campaign.

Linebacker Orlando Ruff '99 (Winnsboro, S.C.) is entering his second season with the San Diego Chargers and first as the Chargers' starting middle linebacker. Last year, after signing with San Diego as a free agent, Ruff garnered team special teams MVP honors.

John Keith '00 (Newnan, Ga.), a fourth round pick of the San Francisco 49ers in this year's draft, earned a spot on the 49ers roster and two starts at safety before sustaining a broken arm in a recent game against Oakland.

Wide receiver Des Kitchings '00 (Wagener, S.C.), a seventh round choice of the Kansas City Chiefs in this year's draft, was signed by the Chiefs to their practice squad.

✓ FIRST SAFETY SINCE 1996...When junior cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) tackled The Citadel's Nate Mahoney in the end zone for a safety early in the fourth quarter of the Paladins' 33-7 Paladin win over the Bulldogs on Oct. 14, it marked the first safety for Furman since the 1996 season when Seth Ramaley blocked a punt by Wofford's Brandon Kale out of the end zone in a 33-3 win over the Terriers.

GREENVILLE (Sept. 2, 2000) -- Freshman placekicker Danny Marshall booted three field goals and tailback Louis Ivory rushed for 182 yards and a touchdown to lift nationally ninth-ranked Furman to a 16-3 win over Elon in the season opener for both teams.

Furman, which lost the 1999 season opener to the Phoenix, narrowly avoided a second straight defeat when strong safety Shelvis Smith recovered a fumble by Elon quarterback Derrick Moore at the Paladin 10-yard line with 1:26 left in the game and Furman holding a tenuous 9-3 lead.

Furman scored the game's only touchdown on the next play when, following a 15-yard penalty of the Phoenix, Ivory took a handoff from quarterback Justin Hill and raced 75 yards for the score with 46 seconds

Elon outgained Furman 325 to 236 in total offense, but the Phoenix suffered six turnovers, including four fumbles and two interceptions. Paladin linebacker Will Bouton led Furman's strong defensive effort with 13 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, an interception, and a fumble recovery which he returned for 18 yards.

Playing in his first collegiate contest. Marshall provided Furman with its first points of the game when he converted a 43-yard field goal early in the second quarter. He later added a 29-yard field goal with only 20 seconds left in the first half to make it 6-0.

Chris Lowery's 78-yard kickoff return to start the second half set up Marshall's third field goal, a 34varder, that gave the Paladins a 9-0 lead less than two minutes into the second half.

Elon answered with its only scoring drive of the game, moving 69 yards in 13 plays for a 27-yard field goal by Beau Wegmann with 6:40 to go in the third period. But the Phoenix failed to register points on its last five possessions, including four that ended inside Furman territory.

GREENVILLE (Sept. 16, 2000) -- Junior tailback Louis Ivory rushed 27 times for a career high 232 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 34-10 win over visiting William & Mary.

Ivory, who bested his previous career high rushing mark of 203 yards set last year in a win over East Tennessee State, headlined a Furman ground game that rolled up 389 yards with an 88-yard touchdown run at the 7:59 mark of the third quarter to give the Paladins a 17-0 lead. The 88-yard run marked the second longest in school history.

Ivory's record setting performance marked his sixth straight 100-yard outing and eighth 100-yard outing in the Paladins' last nine games. Furman's defense, meanwhile, accounted for four turnovers, including three interceptions.

Following a scoreless first quarter, Furman's Danny Marshall connected on a 39-yard field goal to put the Paladins ahead 3-0 with 9:10 left in the first half.

After stopping William & Mary on its next possession, the Paladins moved 80 yards in eight plays to take a 10-0 lead following an 11-yard touchdown run by Ivory with 1:13 left in the second quarter.

A 26-yard Danny Marshall field goal at the 3:32 mark of the third quarter increased the Paladins' lead to 20-0, and a little over a minute later the Paladins struck again when, following a fumble recovery by defensive end Clay O'Daniel at the Tribe 35, Justin Hill connected with Bryant Huguley for a 35-yard touchdown pass to make it a 27-0 game.

Furman's Derek Russell's 5-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter gave Furman a 34-3 lead before William & Mary registered its only touchdown of the contest on a 3-yard touchdown pass from Kevin Carty to Danny Wade on the game's final play.

LEXINGTON, VA. (Sept. 23, 2000) -- Louis Ivory rushed for 135 yards and a touchdown and Furman's defense racked up seven sacks to lift the NCAA I-AA nationally sixth-ranked Paladins to a 35-21 Southern Conference win over VMI.

With the win Furman, posted its 19th straight series victory over the VMI and matched the program's longest winning streak over an opponent first set against Wofford from 1917-47.

Leading 14-13 at intermission, the Paladins stretched their advantage to 21-13 when Eddie Overdyke scooped up a fumble and returned it 20 yards for a score at the 12:40 mark of the third quarter

Furman's lead didn't last long, however, as VMI's Richard Holland gathered in the ensuing kickoff, shed a couple of tacklers, and outdistanced the Paladin kick coverage unit for a 100-yard kickoff return. A two-point conversion knotted the game at 21-21.

A bobbled catch by Lamar Rembert on the kickoff and penalty gave Furman the ball at its own 1-yard line, but from that point the Paladin offense put together its most impressive drive of the contest. Eleven plays later, Derek Russell scored on an 11-yard run to give the Paladins a 28-21 lead, and the Paladins added to it late in the third quarter when quarterback Justin Hill hooked up with James Thomas on a 36-yard scoring strike.

From that point Furman's defense, led by redshirt defensive end Brandon Poole's three sacks, stepped up the pressure on VMI, racking up five of its seven quarterback takedowns and holding VMI to only four rushing yards and 218 total yards.

GREENVILLE (Sept. 30, 2000) — Junior tailback Louis Ivory rushed for 187 yards and three touchdowns to lead the NCAA I-AA nationally sixth-ranked Furman Paladins to a 38-14 win over Western Carolina.

Ivory, who topped the 100-yard rushing mark for the eighth straight game, scored on runs of 65, 25, and 14 yards to highlight a Paladin attack that generated 518 yards in total offense.

GREENVILLE, S.C. (Nov. 4, 2000) — Junior tailback Louis Ivory rushed for a career high 301 yards and three touchdowns to lead 11th-ranked Furman to a 45-10 victory over NCAA I-AA top-ranked and 2000 Southern Conference champion Georgia Southern.

Ivory, the leading rusher in NCAA I-AA coming into the game, reeled off scoring runs of 7, 73, and 37 yards to establish new school and conference single game and season rushing records.

The victory was Furman's second over a topranked team, and it represented Georgia Southern's most decisive conference loss in the Eagles' eight-

year league history.

After Georgia Southern sliced Furman's lead to 17-10, the Paladins scored touchdowns on their next four possessions. A 37-yard touchdown strike from quarterback Justin Hill to Bear Rinehart made it 24-10 and, a little over four minutes later, Ivory bounced outside and outran Georgia Southern's defense on a 73-yard touchdown sprint.

Fullback Derek Russell's 20-yard touchdown run with 1:43 left in the third period closed out the 28-point third quarter and gave Furman a 38-10 advantage.

Ivory finished off his top career rushing performance with a 37-yard scoring run at the 9:21 juncture of the fourth quarter.
