THE GAME

Furman, a 31-13 winner at Western Carolina on Saturday and ranked third in the latest NCAA I-AA Sports Network Poll, returns home to face nationally fifth-ranked Appalachian State, a 33-14 home winner over East Tennessee State on Saturday, in what looms as one of the Southern Conference's top showdowns of the 2001 season.

ATTRACTION

Saturday's Furman-Appalachian State game will highlight Family Weekend at Furman University.

THE SERIES

Furman holds a 19-8-3 series advantage over Appalachian State, and the Paladins enter Saturday's game having claimed wins in three of the last five meetings with the Mountaineers, including a 35-21 triumph two years ago in Greenville. Appalachian State edged Furman 18-17 last year in Boone. In all games played in Greenville, Furman holds an 11-3-1 lead. In Boone, the Paladins own an 8-5-2 record against the Mountaineers.

BOONE, N.C. (Oct. 7, 2000) -- Jerry Beard's two-yard touchdown run with 2:42 remaining in the game gave eighth-ranked Appalachian State its first lead of the contest and an 18-17 win over sixth-ranked Furman.

After DuShon Martin intercepted a pass in the end zone with 6:58 left in the game and ASU trailing 17-11, the Mountaineers went 80 yards in ten plays to complete the comeback.


Furman jumped on top 7-0 on a career long 65-yard run by Hill eight minutes into the game.

ASU took the kickoff after Hill's score and drove 52 yards to set up Mark Wright's 32-yard field goal to make it 7-3.

Furman burned the Mountaineers again on a long play when Hill hit tight end Trent Sansbury for a 60-yard score to go up 14-3 at the half.

After stopping ASU on a fourth-and-one play at the Paladin 19-yard line, Furman was forced to punt and the Mountaineers went 53 yards before quarterback Joe Burchette plowed in from one-yard out with 4:03 left in the third quarter. Burchette completed a pass for the two-point conversion to make it a 14-11 game.

The Paladins tried to put the game away on the next drive, getting a first-and-goal at the ASU six-yard line, but the Mountaineer defense held and forced Furman to settle for a field goal and a 17-11 lead.

A fumbled punt return gave the Paladins the ball on the ASU 23-yard line with 9:31 left, but Furman again couldn't take advantage of a first-and-goal situation when Hill threw an interception in the end zone on third-and-goal play from the two-yard line, leading to ASU's game winning touchdown drive

FURMAN LAST TIME OUT

CULLOWHEE, N.C. -- Louis Ivory rushed for 159 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA fourth-ranked Furman to a 31-13 Southern Conference win over Western Carolina.

lvory scored on runs of 3 and 67 yards to help stake Furman to a 21-0 first quarter lead. The 158-yard effort, his 10th straight 100-yard performance and 24th century rushing outing of his career, upped his career rushing total to 4,697 yards, leaving him just 49 yards shy of Carl Tremble's school career rushing standard.

Furman, which scored on its first four possessions of the game, took a 7-0 lead on a 3-yard run by freshman fullback Eric Emerson that capped a 5-play, 55-yard drive.

On Western Carolina's second possession, Paul Billingsly recorded Furman's third blocked punt in its last two games and recovered it at the Catamount 15-yard line. Three plays later Ivory bulled over from three yards out with 5:55 left in the first quarter to give the Paladins a 14-0 lead.

Furman struck for its third touchdown with only seconds left in the opening period when Ivory took a handoff from quarterback Billy Napier and bolted 67 yards to give the Paladins a 21-0 advantage.

A 20-play, 80-yard drive put Western Carolina on the board with a 2-

yard touchdown run by Donnie Bryant at the 5:10 juncture of the second quarter, but Furman answered with another impressive scoring drive under the direction of true freshman quarterback Bo Moore, who came off the bench for a shaken up Napier.

Using a 26-yard run by Lamer Rembert and a key third down, I 3-yard pass to James Thomas for a first down, Moore moved the Paladins 77 yards in nine plays and connected with Bear Rinehart on a 22-yard strike with only 45 seconds remaining in the first half to make it 28-7.

Napier, who returned to the field on Furman's first possession of the second half, set up the Paladins' final score of the contest when he hooked up with James Thomas on a 41-yard pass to the Catamount 8-yard line midway through the fourth quarter. Three plays later Danny Marshall booted his school record tying 10th straight field goal to give Furman a 31-7 lead.

Paced by senior linebacker John Thrift's two quarterback takedowns, Furman's defense registered four sacks in the contest. Senior All-America linebacker Will Bouton, the 2000 Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Year, led all Paladin tacklers with nine stops.

- ► FURMAN STREAKING AT HOME VERSUS SOCON...In beating VMI 65-7 two weeks ago, Furman extended its home winning streak against Southern Conference opposition to 10 games dating back to the 1988 season and improved to 53-18-1 (.743) in Paladin Stadium against current Southern Conference member schools. Furman is 14-3 (.823) in its last 17 contests in Paladin Stadium.
- ► FOUR STRAIGHT OVER WCU...Furman's 31-13 win over Western Carolina on Saturday in Cullowhee marked the Paladins' fourth straight win over the Catamounts and sixth triumph in the last seven meetings between the two schools.
- N QUICK STRIKE PALADINS...Furman's 21-point first quarter outburst in the win over Western Carolina came in such quick fashion that by the time the first period ended, the Paladins had racked up only 3:32 of possession time. Furman's first touchdown drive covered 55 yards in

five plays (1:46 TOP), and the second score, which followed a blocked punt deep in Western Carolina territory, covered only 15 yards in three plays (0:43 TOP). The Paladins' last touchdown of the period, which came on a 67-yard sprint by senior All-America tailback **Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.)** capped a lightning fast, three-play, 78-yard drive (1:03 TOP). In the second quarter, Furman only had the football 4:25 but made it count, scoring on a 9-play, 77-yard drive (4:16 TOP) to take a 28-7 lead into halftime despite amassing only 7:57 of possession time over the game's first two quarters. For the game, Furman outgained Western Carolina 349-319 and averaged 7.4 yards per plays despite running 24 fewer plays (71-47) and only 25:08 of clock compared to the Catamounts' 34:52. On the season, Furman ranks next to last in Southern Conference in time of possession (26:52). This week's opponent, Appalachian State, ranks last (24:41).

Note: No series ■ start is the number of big plays turned in by Paladin special teams and defense, and the list grew longer in Saturday's victory over Western Carolina. When sophomore free safety Paul Billingsly (College Park, Ga.) blocked a Catamount punt in the first quarter to set up a touchdown to give the Paladins an early 14-0 lead, it marked the Paladins' third blocked punt of the season. Furman has also returned a pair of kickoffs for touchdowns this year, with redshirt freshman wide split end Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.) taking one back 91 yards and sophomore tailback Lamar Rembert (Ocala, Fla.) the other for 77 yards in a 65-7 rout of VMI. Furman leads the Southern Conference in kickoff returns, averaging 29.3 yards per attempt. In addition, senior free safety Josh Cooper (Cincinnati, Ohio) posted an 85-yard fumble return for a touchdown against VMI. While Furman's special teams and defense have registered their share of big plays this year, the Paladin offense has also gotten into the act. Senior tailback Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.) reeled off a 67-yard touchdown run in Saturday's win over Western Carolina.

MARSHALL ON THE MARK...In knocking down his only field goal try of the evening (25 yards) in Saturday's win over Western Carolina, sophomore placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) tied Furman's consecutive field goals made record set by Andrew Burr in 1991. Marshall, whose current streak includes made field goal tries in his last five attempts a year ago, has knocked down all five tries this year (including three in a 46-7 win over Elon on Sept. 8) and heads into this Saturday's game against Appalachian State leading the Southern Conference in kick scoring with 34 points. As a freshman a year ago, he kicked three field goals in his collegiate debut to lift Furman to a 16-3 win over Elon and, in all, converted 14-of-18 field goals (.777) to finish second only to Chattanooga All-America kicker Matt Vick in kick scoring. He has now made good on 19-of-23 field goals (.826) and 66-of-68 PATs (.971) in his career.

STEPPING INTO THE FIRE...When starting junior quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.) was pulled after absorbing a hit and with the Paladins leading Western Carolina 21-0 in the first half, Furman turned to true freshman Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.) to take over. Moore, who came on after Western Carolina scored to make it 21-7 and with the Catamounts bidding to gain momentum, kept Furman on track by directing the Paladins on a 9-play, 77-yard drive that ended when he connected with flanker Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.) on a 22-yard touchdown strike that put Furman safely ahead 28-7 with seconds left in the first half. Included in the scoring drive was a key third down, 13-yard pass from Moore to split end James Thomas (Marianna, Fla.) for a first down at the Western Carolina 28. The touchdown pass was the first of Moore's young career.

- NAPIER NOTES...When junior quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.) threw an incomplete pass on his seventh attempt in the 31-13 win over Western Carolina, it snapped his consecutive completions streak at 14, which he recorded over three games. Napier, who found the mark on his last three attempts against Elon (46-7 win), completed all five of his passes in limited action against VMI (65-7 win) and his first six throws against the Catamounts. The 14 straight completions represents the second longest such streak in Furman history, trailing only Justin Hill's school record 19 consecutive completions compiled over a three-game span during the 1999 season. Held out of a second quarter series after hitting the turf hard on an option keeper, Napier was cleared by team doctors at halftime and returned to action in the second half. Napier heads into Saturday's game against Appalachian State having completed 62.1 percent of his pass attempts (36-of-58) for 545 yards and two scores this season.
- ► **FAST STARTERS**...Counting its 21-point first quarter outburst against Western Carolina, Furman has now outscored the opposition 56-3 in the first quarter through four games.
- NORY ON THE VERGE OF HISTORY...In rushing for 159 yards and two touchdowns against Western Carolina, senior tailback Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.) registered his 10th straight 100-yard performance. Ivory, who has twenty four 100-yard rushing performances in his career, just one shy of Carl Tremble's school career standard of 25 career 100-yard outings, heads into Saturday's game against Appalachian State needing only 50 yards to break Tremble's career rushing standard of 4,746 yards. The last team to hold Ivory under 100 yards rushing, interestingly enough, was Appalachian State, which limited him to 58 yards on 19 carries in an 18-17 loss to the Mountaineers last year in Boone. Two years ago, in a 35-21 win over Appalachian State in Paladin Stadium, Ivory recorded 13 broken tackles in a contest that saw him run for 135 yards and a pair of scores. Ivory's 67-yard touchdown run against Western Carolina marked the fourth longest touchdown run of his career.
- MORE ON IVORY...When Louis Ivory topped the 100-yard mark on his fifth carry Saturday against Western Carolina, it represented the second fastest 100-yard eclipse of his career. Last year, in a 38-14 win over the Catamounts in Greenville, Ivory blew through the 100-yard mark on only his third carry of the game on the way to a 187-yard, three-touchdown performance.
- ► FURMAN NOTABLES...Senior linebacker John Thrift (Hartwell, Ga.) collected two of Furman's season high four quarterback sacks in the Paladins' win over Western Carolina. Thrift, who in all notched eight tackles against the Catamounts, has has now started in 30 consecutive games and has 267 career tackles. Redshirt freshman Mike Killian (Atlanta, Ga.) posted his third straight start at defensive end against Western Carolina, getting the nod ahead of junior Eddie Overdyke (Lilburn, Ga.). Killian collected a pair of tackles and now has 15 stops and a sack in his first season of action. Junior cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.) has turned in very solid play this season after missing virtually the entire 2000 season with a knee injury sustained following a short interception return in the Paladins' 16-3 season opening win over Elon. Johnson leads Furman with two interceptions this year. When Lee Willis (Monticello, Ga.) did not punt in the Paladins' 65-7 rout of VMI two weeks ago, it marked the first time since a 43-7 win over Presbyterian 1992 season that Furman did punt in a game. In rushing eight times for 106 yards and a touchdown against VMI, reserve tailback Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.) became the first Paladin running back since 1999 to rush for more yards than Louis Ivory. Prior to Brigham, the last Paladin running back to top Ivory in game rushing yardage was Stuart Rentz, who rolled up 144 yards (in relief of Ivory) in a 58-0 Paladin whitewash of VMI in Greenville. Furman's win over VMI two weeks ago marked the 20th consecutive victory over the Keydets, thus making it the longest series winning streak ever recorded by Furman over an opponent. The 65 points were the most scored by a Furman team since 1935 when the Hurricane (as Furman was then known) routed Piedmont 69-0. The 58-point margin of victory tied the existing Furman mark for most decisive Southern Conference victory — a standard first set only two years ago (1999) when Furman steamrolled VMI 58-0 in Greenville. In scoring 111 points against Elon (46-7) and VMI (65-7), Furman matched

the greatest two-game scoring total in school history first set in 1920 when W.L. Laval's Hurricane routed Oglethorpe (42-3) and Wofford (69-0) on the way to a 9-1 season.

- ▶ KEEP THAT FLAG IN YOUR POCKET...A year ago Furman ranked as the league's least penalized team in the Southern Conference, picking up only 49 infractions for 422 yards during the regular season. Through four games this year the Paladins are once again topping the league as the least penalized team, having only been flagged 10 times for 99 yards.
- NOLDING ON TO THE PIGSKIN...In addition to ranking as the Southern Conference's least penalized team a year ago, Furman also paced the league in turnover margin (+1.09) for the second straight year. The Paladins, who have committed only one turnover in the last 14 quarters of play and only three miscues (one interception, two fumbles) in four games, head into the Appalachian State contest sporting an even better turnover margin (+1.25) than a year ago.
- RECORD BOOK ENTRIES ...When senior All-Southern Conference free safety Josh Cooper (Cincinnati, Ohio) returned a fumble 85 yards for a touchdown against VMI two weeks ago, it marked the third longest fumble return for a score in Furman history, trailing only the 94-yard return recorded by Kevin Quinlan in a 35-13 loss to North Carolina in 1980 and an 87-yard fumble return by Ray Zima in an 18-13 win over Marshall in 1936. The 91-yard kickoff return by redshirt freshman split end Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.) and 77-yard kickoff return for a score by sophomore tailback Lamar Rembert (Ocala, Fla.) against VMI represented the first time in Furman football history the Paladins returned two kickoffs for touchdowns in a game. The nine PAT attempts by sophomore kicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) against VMI tied the Furman standard for most PAT attempts by a player and team in a single game.
- NACKSON EYEING FUR INTERCEPTION MARK..Furman senior All-Southern Conference cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) heads into Saturday's game against Appalachian State only three interceptions shy of the school career interceptions standard. Jackson, who recorded his 15th career pickoff in the Paladins' 46-7 win over Elon on Sept. 8, currently ranks third at Furman in career thefts with 15, trailing only Jerome Norris (1983-86, 18 interceptions) and Vince Perone, Jr., (1972-74, 16 interceptions).

► FU SPORTING OFFENSIVE BALANCE...A year after averaging a school season record 307.5 yards per game on the ground and producing the leading rusher in NCAA I-AA football in tailback Louis Ivory (2,079 yards), Furman is well on its way to achieving more offensive balance this season. Heading into Saturday's game against Appalachian State, the Paladins are averaging 244.3 yards per game rushing and 152.0 yards per game through the air. Last year Furman averaged only 115.3 passing yards per game.

- FINDING THE TIGHT END...If the work turned in by junior quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.) and senior All-Southern Conference tight end Trent Sansbury (Lilburn, Ga.) in the first four games continues, it's a safe assumption that the Napier-directed Furman passing attack this fall will continue to showcase the tight end. In the 46-7 win over Elon on Sept. 8, Napier hooked up with Sansbury on five passes for 86 yards and a touchdown, which covered 42 yards. Sansbury, who added a pair of catches for 52 yards in the 65-7 win over VMI and one catch for 15 yards in Saturday's 31-13 triumph over Western Carolina, already has 12 catches for 175 yards and a touchdown this year after totaling only 14 receptions and two scores during the 2000 season. Ironically, five of his 14 receptions a year ago came in a 33-7 victory over The Citadel after Napier came off the bench in place of an injured Justin Hill. In an 18-17 loss to Appalachian State in Boone last fall, Sansbury caught three passes for 94 yards and a touchdown, which went for a career long 60 yards.
- **COMPETITIVE, EVEN IN DEFEAT**...Although Furman owns a solid 22-7 record (.759) in its last 29 games, in the seven losses the Paladins have proven to be tough competition. In fact, over the aforementioned span, Furman's most decisive loss has been seven points (twice), and the seven losses have been by a combined total of 28 points.

- ▶ BLOOD LINES...Furman sophomore defensive end Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.) is the son of former University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back George Rogers.
- KEEPING IT IN THE FAMILY....Sophomore placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Redshirt freshman tight end Will Keller (Clayton, Ga.) is the nephew of Elliott Keller former Paladin fullback Elliott Keller (1962-63), who led the Southern Conference in rushing in 1962 with 724 yards. Freshman linebacker Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.) is the brother of Clemson All-America linebacker Chad Carson. Andrew's father, Tom Carson, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, Earle Carson, was a three-year letterman and end and honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, M.A. Carson, was a twotime letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, Tom Carson, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who served as captain of Furman's 1931 squad.
- ▼ THE PARKVIEW CONNECTION...Furman senior starting tight end Trent Sansbury and his backup, true freshman Willis Sudderth, are both products of Lilburn, Ga., and Parkview High School.
- NAME GAME...Furman junior wide receiver Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.) is named to legendary Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant.
- NOUNG FULLBACKS...When true freshman Eric Emerson (Newnan, Ga.) started at fullback in the season opener against Wyoming, it marked quite a change from the experience the Paladins possessed at the position last year, when Derek Russell, a three-year starter who rushed for 1,187 yards and 37 touchdowns, occupied the post. Emerson's presence, along with those of redshirt freshmen Corey Tant (Easley, S.C.) and Al Means (Charlotte, N.C.), guarantee the Paladins will have a youthful fullback corps this fall.

▶ PALADIN OFFENSIVE LINE AMONG BEST IN NCAA I-

AA....Based on what Furman's offensive line helped the Paladins accomplish a year ago and the individual honors accorded virtually every member of the unit, the Paladin offensive front, which returned four of five starters, can rightfully be considered one of the best and most experienced in NCAA I-AA. The cast of four returning regulars -- all but one of whom are seniors -- includes a pair of All-Americans in center Chris Stewart (Palm Harbor, Fla.) and Marty Priore (Cincinnati, Ohio), and All-Southern Conference left tackle Donnie Littlejohn (Gaffney, S.C.). In addition, junior right guard Trevor Kruger (Moultrie, Ga.), who started every game a year ago, is back and has been tabbed a preseason all-conference pick by league head coaches. If also considering senior all-conference tight end Trent Sansbury (Lilburn, Ga.) with the offensive front, the Paladins sport five of their six starting linemen from the 2000 team and boast a combined total of 210 games played and 150 starts in their collective careers.

RARE ACCOMPLISHMENT...When three Furman offensive linemen (OT Josh Moore, OG Marty Priore, and C Christ Stewart) earned first team All-Southern Conference honors a year ago, it marked the first time since 1990 and only the third time in school history (1981 being the other) that three Paladin offensive linemen had earned first team all-conference honors. With Priore and Stewart back this fall along with 2000 consensus second team all-conference tackle Donnie Littlejohn, Furman may yet grab three of the five first team all-league offensive line honors for a second consecutive season.

NUSCLE MEN...Playing a key role in the strong work of Furman's offensive line is the unit's impressive physical strength as reflected in some of the numbers posted by unit members in team weight lifting tests. Leading the way for the third consecutive year is senior center Chris Stewart, Furman's strongest player. In spring testing, Stewart bench pressed 505 pounds, squatted 650 pounds, and power cleaned 347 pounds for a combined lift of 1,502 pounds in three exercises. Stewart's nearest competitor in the combined total was senior strong safety Shelvis Smith (1,288 pounds). Among Furman's other top performing offensive linemen in strength tests was junior tackle Steven Cain, who finished fourth on the team with a combined lift of 1,235 pounds: bench press (405 pounds), squat (500 pounds), and power clean (330 pounds). Senior guard Marty Priore, meanwhile, placed ninth with a total lift of 1,191 pounds, included in which was a squat of 590 pounds.

Nous Ivory: "THE Ivory Tower"...Senior tailback Louis Ivory, a consensus All-America choice, reigning Southern Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Year, and NCAA I-AA football's Walter Payton Award recipient for the 2000 season, is nicknamed "The Ivory Tower", in part, because of his prodigious accomplishments last year. Ivory's nickname also works because the most notable landmark on Furman's campus is an ivory bell tower that overlooks the university's scenic 30-acre lake. The tower, which first gained notoriety as an ivy covered landmark on Furman's old campus in downtown Greenville, has gained new fame thanks, in part, to Ivory. Ivory's complete biographical sketch, as detailed in this year's media guide and updated following his 22-carry, 159-yard performance

against Western Carolina on Sept. 29, is included below:

State included a season best, 54-yard touchdown run and represented the most yards by a Furman fullback since the 1989 season...also ran for 80 yards against East Tennessee State (22-19 overtime loss)...other touchdown runs covered 17 yards against Western Carolina (31-7 win) and three yards versus Georgia Southern (45-17 loss)...finished the season as Furman's second leading rusher with 406 yards and four touchdowns.

N BOBBY JOHNSON: YEAR EIGHT...The 2001 football season marks Furman head coach Bobby Johnson's eighth year at the helm of the Paladin program and 24th season of service to the university. After suffering through a 3-8 inaugural season in 1994 (the program's first losing season since 1979), Furman rebounded in 1995 to finish 6-5. A year later, Johnson, a Columbia, S.C., native and 1973 Clemson graduate who starred as a defensive back for the Tigers, directed the Paladins to a 9-4 record and into the NCAA I-AA playoffs -- the program's first playoff appearance since 1990. Furman went 7-4 in 1997 and 5-6 in 1998 before bouncing back to go 9-3 in 1999 on the way to claiming the program's 10th league championship and second playoff appearance under Johnson. Included in the 1999 season was a 28-3 win over North Carolina. Last year Furman reeled off its second straight 9-3 season en route to another playoff appearance. Johnson's seven-year head coaching record is 51-34 (.600), and his last seven teams have combined to post a 47-26 mark (.649). Against NCAA I-AA competition over that span, Furman has gone 47-25 (.653). Johnson' 24-year tenure, which encompasses three stints (1976-80, 82-92, 94-present), includes work as defensive backs coach, assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. The Paladins' record during that span is 183-87-7 (.673).

N JOHNSON EQUALS SUCCESS...Furman's 9-3 season a year ago matched the high water win mark for a Bobby Johnson-coached Paladin squad first set in 1996 when Furman went 9-4 and later matched in 1999 as part of the Paladins' 9-3 campaign. The nine regular season wins the last two years are the most by a Furman team since 1989 when the Paladins posted a 10-1 regular season mark on the way to a 12-2 record. Only 11 teams in Furman football history (95 seasons) have won at least nine games in a regular season, and Bobby Johnson has had a hand in eight of those squads (1980, '82, '83, '85, '88, '89, '99, and '00), including two as head coach.

In terms of coaching seniority in the league, Furman's Bobby Johnson, who took over the Paladin program in 1994, ranks first. Paul Johnson (1997) is next, and Ellis Johnson is third (2001).

▼ FOUR PALADIN FOOTBALL GREATS SELECTED TO FURMAN ATHLETIC HALL-OF-FAME...Former football standouts Tim Sorrells '81, Rock Hurst '86, Kevin Kendrick '91, and Hazel Gilstrap '43 were among seven honorees inducted into the Furman Athletic Hall-of-Fame in ceremonies prior to Furman's football game against VMI on Sept. 22

Also inducted were **Will Ertel '92** (baseball) and **Heather VandeBrake '96** (cross country/track & field), as well as **Dan Foster '49**, former sports editor and columnist with *The Greenville News-Piedmont*, who went in as an honorary member of the Furman Athletic Hall-of-Fame.

Sorrells, a four-year letterman and two-time All-Southern Conference selection as a quarterback, helped lead Furman to a pair of conference championships in 1980 and '81. A Greeneville, Tenn., product and two-time Paladin (MVP) Award recipient, he paced Furman to a 20-5-1 record as a starter and currently ranks fourth on Furman's career passing touchdowns chart (31) and 10th in passing yards with (2,945 yards). Furman's current offensive coordinator, he has served as an assistant coach at Furman since 1986, helping direct the Paladins to four league championships and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national title.

A two-sport standout in football and baseball, Hurst was named 1984-85 Southern Conference Athlete-of-the-Year. He served as co-captain and led Furman with 160 tackles in 1984 on the way to earning team MVP and AFCA/Kodak All-America honors as a linebacker. In four seasons of play, the Knoxville, Tenn., product helped the Paladins notch a 35-11-1 record and claim three league championships, and his 364 career tackles rank 11th on the school's career charts. In baseball, Hurst twice earned all-conference honors as a catcher, and he batted .382 with 12 home runs and 48 RBI his senior year. Ranked third on the Paladin career charts in home runs (31) and fourth in RBI (117), his .340 career batting average is the third best all-time at Furman, and his .616 career slugging percentage is still a school standard.

Kendrick served as a team co-captain and earned Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Year and consensus All-America honors as a linebacker in 1990 after totaling a team high 179 tackles. A starter on Furman's 1988 NCAA I-AA championship team that posted a 13-2 record and led the nation in scoring defense (9.5 ppg), the Smyrna, Ga., native helped the Paladins to three straight league titles in 1988, '89, and '90 and a 41-12 mark during his career — the winningest four-year stretch in school history. His 574 career tackles ranks second all-time at Furman.

An Easley, S.C., product and three-year letterman as a tackle in 1939, '40, '41, Gilstrap played on Furman squads that posted wins over Georgia, North Carolina State, and South Carolina (twice), among others. A two-time honorable mention All-South Carolina selection and team MVP in 1941, he also played in the Carolinas Lions Bowl his senior year. A successful prep coach at Charleston's St. Andrews High School, where he went 108-48-7 and won two state championships, he later served as president of the Southern Conference, director of athletics at Appalachian State, and as a member of the NCAA Steering Committee.

✓ FURMAN AND THE NFL...Furman football currently sports three graduates on NFL rosters.

Tight end Luther Broughton '97 (Cainhoy, S.C.) is now in his second stint with the Carolina Panthers and fifth season overall in the NFL. A fifth-round draft pick of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1997, Broughton spent the 1997 campaign with the Eagles before signing the Carolina Panthers, with whom he played the entire 1998 season before being traded back to the Eagles prior to the start of the 1999 campaign. After playing with the Eagles in 1999 and 2000, during which time he caught 38 passes for 399 yards and four touchdowns, he re-signed with the Panthers earlier this year. Linebacker Orlando Ruff '99 (Winnsboro, S.C.) is in his third season with the San Diego Chargers as a middle linebacker. In 2000 he started in 14 of 16 games for the Chargers and racked up 68 tackles, an interception, and five pass deflections. John Keith '00 (Newnan, Ga.), a fourth round pick of the San Francisco 49ers in 2000, earned two starts at safety and totaled 18 tackles, a sack, and a interception before sustaining a broken arm in an overtime loss to the Oakland Raiders last year. Keith recently sustained a torn anterior cruciate ligament and is out for the entire 2001 season.

Former Paladin wide receiver **Des Kitchings '00**, a seventh round draft pick of the Kansas City Chiefs in 2000, was among the final players released by the New York Jets at the conclusion of the preseason. Offensive tackle **Josh Moore '01** was released earlier by the Philadelphia Eagles.

LARAMIE, WY. -- Jarvis Wallum booted four field goals, including two in the second half, to lift the Wyoming Cowboys to a 20-14 season opening win over the visiting Furman Paladins in front of 14,167 fans at War Memorial Stadium.

In posting the victory, Wyoming, an NCAA I-A member of the Mountain West Conference, snapped an eight-game losing streak dating back to the 2000 season. The loss was the second for NCAA I-AA sixth-ranked Furman in its last three season openers.

Trailing 14-7 at halftime, Furman tied the score at 14-14 when tailback Louis Ivory, the reigning Walter Payton Award winner in NCAA I-AA, broke loose on a 44-yard touchdown run with 3:23 left in the third quarter. Wyoming, however, answered on its next possession by moving 75 yards in 10 plays to set up Wallum's third field goal of the game, from 22 yards out, to give the Cowboys a 17-14 advantage with less than a minute remaining in the third period.

Wallum added his fourth field goal, a 28-yarder with 10:00 to go in the contest, to stretch the Cowboys' lead to 20-14.

On the ensuing possession, Furman drove from its 35 to the Wyoming 7, where on a third and four play Paladin wide receiver Bear Rinehart was tackled for a three-yard loss on a reverse. Instead of kicking the field goal, Furman went for a touchdown, but quarterback Billy Napier's pass to a slanting and open Rinehart in the end zone was low and incomplete.

Taking over possession with 6:10 remaining, Wyoming ground up the game clock by moving 73 yards in 12 plays to the Furman 17, where Wallum missed a 34-yard field goal attempt with only 17 seconds left in the game.

The Cowboys, who racked up 87 offensive plays to Furman's 58, amassed 422 yards in offense in the contest and were paced by sophomore quarterback Casey Bramlet, who completed 30-of-48 passes for 331 yards. Bramlet, who scored Wyoming's lone touchdown of the game on a 1-yard run in the second quarter to give the Cowboys a 14-7 lead, connected with sophomore wide receiver Ryan McGuffey on 10 passes for 134 yards.

Furman was paced offensively by Ivory, who rushed 19 times for 136 yards and one touchdown. Furman netted 349 yards in offense, including 169 from quarterback Billy Napier, who completed 12-of-24 passes in the contest, but the Paladins suffered two turnovers, including a fumble at the Cowboy 38 and an interception that led to a Wyoming field goal. Bear Rinehart paced all Paladin receivers with four receptions for 97 yards.

Furman 46, Elon 7

Paladin Stadium Attendance: 10,322

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Louis Ivory rushed for 126 yards and two touchdowns to lead the NCAA I-AA nationally sixth-ranked Furman Paladins to a 46-7 win over the visiting Elon Phoenix at Paladin Stadium.

Ivory rushed 19 times and scored on runs of 2 and 8 yards while recording his eighth straight 100-yard performance and 22nd 100-yard outing of his career.

The win gave Furman (I-I) its 99th victory in Paladin Stadium since moving into the facility in 1981. It also marked the Paladins' second straight decision over Elon (0-2), which committed six turnovers.

Furman outgained Élon 452-180 and got a strong performance from junior quarterback Billy Napier, who connected on 12-of-19 passes for 192 yards and two touchdowns. Tight end Trent Sansbury led all Paladin receivers with five catches for 86 yards and a score.

Furman took advantage of a pair of Elon turnovers in the first quarter to race to a 21-0 lead.

An interception and 23-yard return by Shelvis Smith gave the Paladins the ball at Elon 19, and four plays later Napier hit Bear Rinehart on an 8-yard scoring strike to put Furman up 7-0 only three minutes into the game.

On its next possession, Furman moved 58 yards in nine plays to extend its lead to 14-0 following a 2-yard run by Ivory at the 4:53 mark.

A fumble recovery by Paladin defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling at the Elon 42 on the Phoenix's next possession set up another Furman score, which came on the next play when Napier connected with Sansbury on a 42-yard touchdown at the 1:53 juncture.

Elon trimmed Furman's lead to 21-7 with an 11-yard touchdown run by Martin Swindell with 10:38 left in the first half, but the Paladins answered with three Danny Marshall field goals covering 22,33, and 28 yards to extend the lead to 30-7 by halftime.

Furman upped its margin to 37-7 on its first possession of the second half with an 8-yard scoring run by Ivory before benching its first team offense and defense in favor of reserves.

Reserve tailback Hindley Brigham tallied the Paladins' last score on a 65-yard touchdown run on the first rushing attempt of his career.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Josh Cooper's 85-yard fumble return for a touchdown keyed a 24-point second quarter outburst and helped lead NCAA I-AA nationally fourth-ranked Furman to a 65-7 rout of VMI.

The win, Furman's 20th straight over the Keydets, marked Furman's 100th victory in Paladin Stadium history, and the 65 points were the most since 1935. The triumph was also the Paladins' 10th consecutive home victory against Southern Conference opposition.

With Furman leading 14-0, Cooper picked up a fumble by VMI's Pedro Garcia at the Furman 15 and raced untouched 85 yards for the touchdown to put the Paladins ahead 21-0 at the 14:15 mark of the second quarter.

An interception by Rodney Johnson on VMI's next possession led to 26-yard field goal by Danny Marshall that extended the lead to 24-0.

A blocked punt by Shelvis Smith at the Furman 43 led to the Paladins' next score. After quarterback Billy Napier connected on a 41-yard pass to tight end Trent Sansbury to the Keydet 16, Louis Ivory ripped off a 13-yard run to the 3, and Napier completed the 3-play, 57-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown run to make it 31-0 with 6:27 left in the half.

Furman capped its 24-point second period explosion with an 11-play, 69-yard drive that ended when backup tailback Toreico O'Neal scored on a 2-yard run of the last play of the first half to make it 38-0

A 91-yard kickoff return by Brian Bratton to open the second half made it 45-0, and the Paladins later added a second kickoff return for a touchdown when Lamar Rembert bolted 79 yards following VMI's only score of the game to give Furman a 58-7 advantage.

Furman, which outgained VMI 435-223, got 100 yards on 10 carries and a touchdown from All-America tailback Louis Ivory, who exited the game midway through the second period in favor of reserves. For Ivory, the 100-yard performance was his ninth straight and the 23rd of his career. Reserve tailback Hindley Brigham paced all Paladin rushers with eight carries for 106 yards and a touchdown.

CULLOWHEE, N.C.-- Louis Ivory rushed for 159 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA fourth-ranked Furman to a 31-13 Southern Conference win over Western Carolina.

lvory scored on runs of 3 and 67 yards to help stake Furman to a 21-0 first quarter lead. The 158-yard effort, his 10th straight 100-yard performance and 24th century rushing outing of his career, upped his career rushing total to 4,697 yards, leaving him just 49 yards shy of Carl Tremble's school career rushing standard.

Furman, which scored on its first four possessions of the game, took a 7-0 lead on a 3-yard run by freshman fullback Eric Emerson that capped a 5-play, 55-yard drive.

On Western Carolina's second possession, Paul Billingsly recorded Furman's third blocked punt in its last two games and recovered it at the Catamount 15-yard line. Three plays later Ivory bulled over from three yards out with 5:55 left in the first quarter to give the Paladins a 14-0 lead.

Furman struck for its third touchdown with only seconds left in the opening period when Ivory took a handoff from quarterback Billy Napier and bolted 67 yards to give the Paladins a 21-0 advantage.

A 20-play, 80-yard drive put Western Carolina on the board with a 2-yard touchdown run by Donnie Bryant at the 5:10 juncture of the second quarter, but Furman answered with another impressive scoring drive under the direction of true freshman quarterback Bo Moore, who came off the bench for a shaken up Napier.

Using a 26-yard run by Lamer Rembert and a key third down, I 3-yard pass to James Thomas for a first down, Moore moved the Paladins 77 yards in nine plays and connected with Bear Rinehart on a 22-yard strike with only 45 seconds remaining in the first half to make it 28-7.

Napier, who returned to the field on Furman's first possession of the second half, set up the Paladins' final score of the contest when he hooked up with James Thomas on a 41-yard pass to the Catamount 8-yard line midway through the fourth quarter. Three plays later Danny Marshall booted his school record tying 10th straight field goal to give Furman a 31-7 lead.

Paced by senior linebacker John Thrift's two quarterback takedowns, Furman's defense registered four sacks in the contest. Senior All-America linebacker Will Bouton, the 2000 Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Year, led all Paladin tacklers with nine stops.
