<u>THE GAME</u>

Furman, ranked third in the latest NCAA I-AA Sports Network and USA Today/ESPN Polls and a 28-22 winner over fifth-ranked Appalachian State in Greenville last Saturday, travels to Charleston to take on arch-rival The Citadel in a key Southern Conference matchup for both teams. The game will highlight Parents' Day at The Citadel.

THE SERIES

Saturday's game between Furman and The Citadel will mark the 81st renewal of a series that features the most football clashes between two schools in Southern Conference history. Furman, which has played The Citadel every football season since 1919 and holds a commanding 49-28-3 series lead, heads into Saturday's contest having won two straight and five of the last six decisions against The Citadel. The Bulldogs' last win over the Paladins was a 25-24 triumph in Greenville in 1998. Furman has won three straight in Charleston, including a 31-17 verdict in 1999. The last time The Citadel defeated Furman in Charleston was 1993 by a 20-10 score. Furman has compiled a 20-16-2 record in Charleston. In Greenville, the Paladins have posted a 27-12 mark. In three neutral site meetings over the years, Furman has gone 2-0-1 against the Bulldogs.

FURMAN-THE CITADEL LAST MEETING

GREENVILLE (Oct. 14, 2000) -- Backup quarterback Billy Napier passed for 170 yards and a touchdown to lead ninth-ranked Furman to a 33-7 win over The Citadel.

Napier replaced injured starting quarterback Justin Hill on the second series and completed 11-of-16 passes, including a 26-yard touchdown pass to tight end Trent Sansbury in the third quarter, to give the Paladins a 10-7 lead. Sansbury caught five passes for 94 yards in the contest.

Louis lvory ran for 214 yards and scored on a 58-yard run in the third quarter to post his second straight 1,000-yard season.

The Citadel grabbed an early 7-0 lead when Nate Mahoney scored on a I-yard plunge to cap an 8-play, 70-yard drive on the Bulldogs' first possession.

A 39-yard Danny Marshall field goal with 9:34 left in the first half cut The Citadel's lead to 7-3.

Furman took the opening kickoff of the second half and moved 70 yards to grab a 10-7 advantage when Napier split two Bulldog defenders with a 26-yard touchdown pass to tight end Trent Sansbury.

After a fumble halted Furman's next scoring threat, the Paladins bounced back when lvory raced 58 yards for a touchdown to stretch the Paladin lead to 17-7.

A punt by Lee Willis that was downed at The Citadel I led to Furman's next score, which came when cornerback Richie Jackson tackled Nate Mahoney in the end zone to make it 19-7 early in the fourth quarter.

Furman's defense limited Citadel to only 89 yards in the second half and set up the Paladins' last two scores. Free safety Josh Cooper's 35-yard interception return made it 26-7, and Cooper's school record tying third pickoff of the contest set up Furman's final touchdown with just over two minutes left.

FURMAN LAST TIME OUT

GREENVILLE — Billy Napier passed for 159 yards and two touchdowns to lift NCAA I-AA third-ranked Furman to a 28-22 Southern Conference win over fifth-ranked Appalachian State in front of 14,411 fans at Paladin Stadium.

Napier completed 9-of-15 passes and connected with redshirt freshman flanker Isaac West for both scores in the second half on plays covering 39 and 30 yards. West had six pass receptions for 120 yards and five punt returns for 42 yards in the game.

The win was the third straight by Furman over Appalachian State in Greenville and the 11th consecutive conference home win for the Paladins.

Appalachian State, which tallied 81 offensive snaps to Furman's 45, outgained the Paladins 222-194 in total offense, accumulating 105 of its yards late in the fourth quarter after the Paladins had taken a 28-14 lead. But the Mountaineers managed only 2.7 yards per snap to Furman's 4.3

Paladin All-America tailback Louis Ivory, who came into the game only 50 yards short of Furman's career rushing record, was held to 40 yards on 18 carries, snapping his consecutive 100-yard game streak at 10, but Ivory's 18-yard touchdown run with 4:17 left in the first half put the Paladins ahead for good at 14-7.

The Paladins raced to a 7-0 lead on the game's first play when Brian Bratton took the opening kickoff and sprinted 100 yards for a touchdown.

Appalachian State's Jerry Beard tied the game at 7-7 with a 13-yard run with 13:51 left in the second quarter.

Leading 14-7 at intermission, Furman linebacker Will Bouton pounced on an Appalachian State fumble at the Mountaineer 39-yard line, and on the next play Napier hooked up with a streaking West for a 39-yard touchdown strike to stretch the Paladin advantage to 21-7 at the 4:43 mark of the third period.

The Mountaineers made it 21-14 on a Joey Hoover I-yard touchdown run with 11:14 left in the game, but two possessions later a 17-yard punt return by West to the Appalachian State 30 set up the Paladins' final score, which came one play later when Napier found West behind the Mountaineer secondary for a 30-yard touchdown pass with 7:46 left.

After Furman's Richie Jackson intercepted a Joe Burchette pass at the

Paladin I-yard line, Furman punter Lee Willis ran out of the end zone for a safety to make it 28-16 with 3:13 left.

Appalachian State regained possession at the Furman 43 on the ensuing kickoff, and eight plays later Burchette connected with Jose White on a 3-yard touchdown pass to draw the Mountaineers to within six points at 28-22 with 1:26 remaining. Appalachian State's onside kick, however, was recovered by Furman's James Thomas at the 50-yard line, allowing the Paladins to run out the game clock.

NOTING THE PALADINS

► **FURMAN ADDS IITH GAME**...Furman director of athletics Gary Clark announced recently that the Paladin football team has added an 11th game for the 2001 season after having its scheduled Sept. 15 game at Liberty canceled following terrorist attacks on the United States. On Nov. 24 Furman will host Presbyterian at Paladin Stadium in a 2:00 p.m. game. Furman, which holds a 36-11-1 series advantage over PC, defeated the Blue Hose 43-7 in 1992 in the last meeting between the two schools.

► FURMAN STREAKING AT HOME VERSUS SOCON...In beating Appalachian State 28-22 on Saturday and claiming its 11th consecutive home win against Southern Conference opposition, Furman equaled its longest home winning streak against league foes since moving into Paladin Stadium in 1981. From 1987-1990, Furman won 11 straight conference clashes in Greenville before dropping a 38-35 verdict to Marshall in the 1991 home conference season opener.

▶ QUICK STRIKE PALADINS...Furman's quick strike offense continued its work in Saturday's victory over Appalachian State with four touchdown producing possessions that consumed a combined total of 1:34. The Paladins registered their first score on the game's initial play when redshirt freshman Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.) used 14 seconds to return the opening kickoff 100 yards to put the Paladins ahead 7-0. Furman's second touchdown, which came on an 18-yard run by senior tailback Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.) in the second quarter, capped a 2-play, 25-yard drive that burned all of 1:05. The Paladins' third touchdown of the contest, a 39-yard pass from junior quarterback **Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.)** to redshirt freshman **Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.)** ended a 1-play, 39-yard "drive" that took just 0:08 off the clock. And Furman's final touchdown of the game came via a 30-yard strike from Napier to West on a possession that consumed just 0:07 and took just one play. Of the last 12 touchdowns scored by Furman, six of the possessions have taken less than a minute and 10 of the 12 have consumed less than two minutes. The other two possessions that produced touchdowns burned 2:54 (6 plays, 64 yards) and 4:25 (9 plays, 77 yards).

FAST STARTERS...Counting its seven-point first quarter in Saturday's 28-22 win over Appalachian State, Furman has now outscored the opposition 63-3 in the first quarter through five games.

STATISTICAL ODDITIES...One of the results of Furman's efficient, blitzkrieg (lightning war) offensive production this year has been a major time of possession differential with the opposition. Through five games, Paladin opponents are averaging 32:39 in time of possession to Furman's 27:21. The differential was most pronounced at Western Carolina on Sept. 29 when the Paladins raced to a 21-0 lead after the first quarter despite totaling only 3:32 of possession time. In going 4-1 and outscoring the opposition 184-69 through five games, Furman has also seen opponents rack up 79 more offensive snaps (361-282) this season.

▶ **BIG PLAYS** ...One theme underlying Furman's solid 4-1 start is the number of big plays turned in by Paladin special teams and defense, and the list grew longer in Saturday's victory over Appalachian State. When **Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.)** ran back the opening kickoff 100 yards to give the Paladins a 7-0 lead, it marked the longest return in Paladin Stadium history, his second kickoff return for a touchdown of the season, and the third Paladin kickoff return for a score this year. Bratton's first kickoff return for a touchdown of the season, and the third Paladin kickoff return for a score this year. Bratton's first kickoff return for a touchdown covered 91 yards versus VMI and was the first of two by the Paladins against the Keydets that evening, which also featured a 77-yard return by Lamar Rembert (Ocala, Fla.). Besides the three kickoff returns for scores this year, Rembert, Shelvis Smith (College Park, Ga.), and Paul Billingsly (College Park, Ga.) have combined to block three punts — all of which led to scores — and Furman senior free safety Josh Cooper (Cincinnati, Ohio) returned one fumble for a touchdown covering 85 yards against VMI.

► OFFICIALLY IT'S 100...The 100-yard kickoff return by redshirt freshman Brian Bratton (Maritinez, Ga.) against Appalachian State matched the second longest kickoff return in school history. Bratton's return, which equaled a 100-yard return posted by John Popson against The Citadel in 1954, has only been exceeded by Vince Perone, Jr.'s school record 103-yard return against Wofford in 1973. Since the NCAA now only recognizes a maximum of 100 yards on a return, regardless of how deep in the end zone the return starts, Bratton's mark will remain 100, although by most estimates his attempt started three yards deep in the end zone. He currently ranks third in NCAA I-AA in kickoff returns, averaging 43.2 yards per return on six attempts this year. Furman's three kickoff returns for touchdowns this fall ties the school season record set only two years ago (1999) when Des Kitchings accounted for three Paladins kickoff return touchdowns in a 9-3, Southern Conference championship season.

► DEFENSE, DEFENSE...Furman's defense faced 81 Appalachian State offensive plays but yielded only 222 yards in total offense (2.7 yards

per play), 105 of which came on the Mountaineers' last two possessions of the game after the Paldadins had taken a 28-14 lead. Prior to the aforementioned last two possessions, Furman's defense had yielded only 117 total yards on 62 plays (1.8 yards per play). Furman's 35 net rushing yards against Appalachian State were the fewest by the Paladins since Marshall held Furman to minus nine yards in a 54-0 win over the Paladins in the 1996 NCAA I-AA playoffs and the second lowest total by Furman in Paladin Stadium history, trailing only the 18 yards gained against Western Carolina in a 14-7 loss to the Catamounts in 1983 NCAA I-AA semifinal playoffs. Furman's nine total first downs and 194 yards in total offense represented its lowest totals in Paladin Stadium history. The previous standard had been 12 first downs and 208 yards versus Western Carolina in 1983. Overall, the 194 total yards were the least since the 1998 season when the Paladins were held to 125 total yards in a 33-0 loss at Clemson. The last NCAA I-AA team to hold Furman to less than 194 yards in a game was South Carolina State, which limited the Paladins to 139 yards in 17-16 win over the Paladins in 1997.

NAPIER NOTES...Junior quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.) came up big in the Paladins' 28-22 win over Appalachian State on Saturday, completing 9-of-15 passes for 159 yards and two critical touchdowns to redshirt freshman Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.) after it was apparent the Mountaineers' first defensive priority was in shutting down Furman's running game. Napier's two scoring tosses covered 39 and 30 yards and in both cases gave the Paladins' 14-point leads (21-7, 28-14) during the game. Currently in his first season as Furman's starting signal caller, Napier heads into The Citadel game having completed 45-of-73 passes for 704 yards and four touchdowns (two interceptions). That includes a very fine 61.6 completion percentage and a solid 155.25 pass efficiency rating. During one stretch this year Napier completed 14 straight pass attempts for the second longest such streak in Furman history. Last year against The Citadel, Napier came off the bench on the Paladins' second offensive series (for an injured Justin Hill) and threw for 170 yards and a touchdown to pace the Paladins to a 33-7 victory over the Bulldogs.

▶ **FINDING THE TIGHT END**...If the work turned in by junior quarterback **Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.)** and senior All-Southern Conference tight end **Trent Sansbury (Lilburn, Ga.)** in the first five games continues, it's a safe assumption that the Napier-directed Furman passing attack this fall will continue to showcase the tight end. In the 46-7 win over Elon on Sept. 8, Napier hooked up with Sansbury on five passes for 86 yards and a touchdown, which covered 42 yards. Sansbury, who added a pair of catches for 52 yards in the 65-7 win over VMI, one catch for 15 yards in the 31-13 triumph over Western Carolina, and two catches for 25 yards in Saturday's 28-22 win over Appalachian State, already has 14 catches for 200 yards and a touchdown this year after totaling only 14 receptions and two scores during the 2000 season. Ironically, five of his 14 receptions a year ago came in a 33-7 victory over The Citadel after Napier came off the bench in place of an injured Justin Hill.

COMPETITIVE, EVEN IN DEFEAT...Although Furman owns a solid 23-7 record (.767) in its last 30 games, in the seven losses the Paladins have proven to be tough competition. In fact, over the aforementioned span, Furman's most decisive loss has been seven points (twice), and the seven losses have been by a combined total of 28 points.

NARSHALL ON THE MARK...In knocking down his only field goal try of the evening (25 yards) two weeks ago in the win over Western Carolina, sophomore placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** tied Furman's consecutive field goals made record set by Andrew Burr in 1991. Marshall, whose current streak includes made field goal tries in his last five attempts a year ago, has knocked down all five tries this year (including three in a 46-7 win over Elon on Sept. 8). As a freshman a year ago, he kicked three field goals in his collegiate debut to lift Furman to a 16-3 win over Elon and, in all, converted 14-of-18 field goals (.777) to finish second only to Chattanooga All-America kicker Matt Vick in kick scoring. He has now made good on 19-of-23 field goals (.826) and 70-of-72 PATs (.972) in his career.

► JACKSON EYEING FURMAN INTERCEPTION MARK..Furman senior All-Southern Conference cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) heads into Saturday's game against The Citadel only two interceptions shy of the school career interceptions standard. ▶ IVORY STOPPED SHORT OF RECORD...In rushing for only 40 yards on 18 carries and one touchdowns in Saturday's 28-22 win over Appalachian State, Furman senior tailback Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.) was held to his lowest rushing total in his now two-plus seasons as the Paladins' starting tailback (29 games). Prior to Saturday, his previous low was 58 yards (19 carries) in last year's 18-17 loss at Appalachian State. Ivory, who came into the contest against the Mountaineers needing only 50 yards to break the Furman career rushing record currently held by Carl Tremble (1989-92, 4,746 yards), heads into The Citadel game with 4,737 yards, just 10 yards shy of the new school standard. The 40-yard performance against Appalachian State also snapped his school record consecutive 100-yard games streak at 10. Ivory has rushed for 100 yards in 24 games in his career, just one short of Tremble's career record 25 100-yard games.

STEPPING INTO THE FIRE...When starting junior quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.) was pulled after absorbing a hit and with the Paladins leading Western Carolina 21-0 in the first half two weeks ago, Furman turned to true freshman **Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.)** to take over. Moore, who came on after Western Carolina scored to make it 21-7 and with the Catamounts bidding to gain momentum, kept Furman on track by directing the Paladins on a 9-play, 77-yard drive that ended when he connected with flanker **Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.)** on a 22-yard touchdown strike that put Furman safely ahead 28-7 with seconds left in the first half. Included in the scoring drive was a key third down, 13-yard pass from Moore to split end **James Thomas (Marianna, Fla.)** for a first down at the Western Carolina 28. The touchdown pass was the first of Moore's young career.

► FURMAN PLAYER, TEAM POINTERS...Junior cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.) has turned in very solid play this season after missing virtually the entire 2000 season with a knee injury sustained following a short interception return in the Paladins' 16-3 season opening win over Elon. Johnson is currently tied with senior cornerback Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio) for the team interception lead this year with two. Senior All-Southern Conference nose guard Ryan Spencer (Clover, S.C.) sustained a sprained ankle in Saturday's win over Appalachian State and will miss this Saturday's game against The Citadel, according to head athletic trainer Brian Reese. Spencer was replaced in the lineup against Appalachian State by senior Steve DeBeer (Atlanta, Ga.), a three-year letterman who has played in 39 games and tallied 13 starts in his career at all three defensive line positions (nose guard, defensive tackle, defensive end). In recording six receptions for 120 yards in Saturday's win over Appalachian State, redshirt freshman wide receiver Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.), this week's Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Week, posted the first 100-yard receiving performance by a Paladin since Des Kitchings caught seven passes for 169 yards and two scores in a 28-3 win over North Carolina in 1999. When senior tailback Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.) topped the 100-yard mark on his fifth carry in Furman's 31-13 win over Western Carolina on Sept. 29, it represented the second fastest 100-yard eclipse of his career. Last year, in a 38-14 win over the Catamounts in Greenville, lvory blew through the 100-yard mark on only his third carry of the game on the way to a 187-yard, three-touchdown performance. When senior All-Southern Conference free safety Josh Cooper (Cincinnati, Ohio) returned a fumble 85 yards for a touchdown against VMI two weeks ago, it marked the third longest fumble return for a score in Furman history, trailing only the 94-yard return recorded by Kevin Quinlan in a 35-13 loss to North Carolina in 1980 and an 87-yard fumble return by Ray Zima in an 18-13 win over Marshall in 1936. The 91yard kickoff return by redshirt freshman split end Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.) and 77-yard kickoff return for a score by sophomore tailback Lamar Rembert (Ocala, Fla.) against VMI represented the first time in Furman football history the Paladins returned two kickoffs for touchdowns in a game. The nine PAT attempts by sophomore kicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) against VMI tied the Furman standard for most PAT attempts by a player and team in a single game. When **Lee** Willis (Monticello, Ga.) did not punt in the Paladins' 65-7 rout of VMI, it marked the first time since a 43-7 win over Presbyterian 1992 season that Furman did punt in a game. In rushing eight times for 106 yards and a touchdown against VMI, reserve tailback Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.) became the first Paladin running back since 1999 to rush for more yards than Louis Ivory. Prior to Brigham, the last Paladin running back to top Ivory in game rushing yardage was Stuart Rentz, who rolled up 144 yards (in relief of Ivory) in a 58-0 Paladin whitewash of VMI in Greenville. Furman's win over VMI marked the 20th consecutive victory over the Keydets, thus making it the longest series winning streak ever recorded by Furman over an opponent. The 65 points were the most scored by a Furman team since 1935 when the Hurricane (as Furman was then known) routed Piedmont 69-0. The 58-point margin of victory tied the existing Furman mark for most decisive Southern Conference victory — a standard first set only two years ago (1999) when Furman steamrolled VMI 58-0 in Greenville. In scoring 111 points against Elon (46-7) and VMI (65-7), Furman matched the greatest two-game scoring total in school history first set in 1920 when W.L. Laval's Hurricane routed Oglethorpe (42-3) and Wofford (69-0) on the way to a 9-1 season. Furman's 28-22 triumph over Appalachian State on Saturday represented the Paladins' third straight win over the Mountaineers in Greenville and fourth win overall in the last six meetings between the two schools. Furman now leads its series with Appalachian State 20-8-3 and is 12-3-1 versus the Mountaineers in Greenville.

▶ MINIMIZING THE FLAGS...A year ago Furman ranked as the league's least penalized team in the Southern Conference, picking up only 49 infractions for 422 yards during the regular season. Although flagged seven times for 60 yards in Saturday's 28-22 win over Appalachian State, the Paladins, through five games this year, once again rank as the league's least penalized team with 17 penalties for 159 yards.

▶ **BLOOD LINES**...Furman sophomore defensive end **Brandon Poole** (Columbia, S.C.) is the son of former University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back George Rogers.

KEEPING IT IN THE FAMILY....Sophomore placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Redshirt freshman tight end **Will Keller (Clayton, Ga.)** is the nephew of Elliott Keller former Paladin fullback Elliott Keller (1962-63), who led the Southern Conference in rushing in 1962 with 724 yards. Freshman linebacker **Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.)** is the brother of Clemson All-America linebacker Chad Carson. Andrew's father, Tom Carson, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, Earle Carson, was a three-year letterman and end and honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, M.A. Carson, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, Tom Carson, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who served as captain of Furman's 1931 squad.

THE PARKVIEW CONNECTION...Furman senior starting tight end Trent Sansbury and his backup, true freshman Willis Sudderth, are both products of Lilburn, Ga., and Parkview High School.

NAME GAME...Furman junior wide receiver **Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.)** is named to legendary Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant.

▶ YOUNG FULLBACKS...When true freshman Eric Emerson (Newnan, Ga.) started at fullback in the season opener against Wyoming, it marked quite a change from the experience the Paladins possessed at the position last year, when Derek Russell, a three-year starter who rushed for 1,187 yards and 37 touchdowns, occupied the post. Emerson's presence, along with those of redshirt freshmen Corey Tant (Easley, S.C.) and AI Means (Charlotte, N.C.), guarantee the Paladins will have a youthful fullback corps this fall.

FURMAN FULLBACK EXPERIENCE COMPARISON

N PALADIN OFFENSIVE LINE AMONG BEST IN NCAA I-AA....Based on what Furman's offensive line helped the Paladins accomplish a year ago and the individual honors accorded virtually every member of the unit, the Paladin offensive front, which returned four of five starters, can rightfully be considered one of the best and most experienced in NCAA I-AA. The cast of four returning regulars -- all but one of whom are seniors -- includes a pair of All-Americans in center Chris Stewart (Palm Harbor, Fla.) and Marty Priore (Cincinnati, Ohio), and All-Southern Conference left tackle Donnie Littlejohn (Gaffney, S.C.). In addition, junior right guard Trevor Kruger (Moultrie, Ga.), who started every game a year ago, is back and has been tabbed a preseason all-conference pick by league head coaches. If also considering senior all-conference tight end Trent Sansbury (Lilburn, Ga.) with the offensive front, the Paladins sport five of their six starting linemen from the 2000 team and boast a combined total of 216 games played and 156 starts in their collective careers.

RARE ACCOMPLISHMENT...When three Furman offensive linemen (OT Josh Moore, OG Marty Priore, and C Christ Stewart) earned first team All-Southern Conference honors a year ago, it marked the first time since 1990 and only the third time in school history (1981 being the other) that three Paladin offensive linemen had earned first team all-conference honors. With Priore and Stewart back this fall along with 2000 consensus second team all-conference tackle Donnie Littlejohn, Furman may yet grab three of the five first team all-league offensive line honors for a second consecutive season.

▶ **MUSCLE MEN**...Playing a key role in the strong work of Furman's offensive line is the unit's impressive physical strength as reflected in some of the numbers posted by unit members in team weight lifting tests. Leading the way for the third consecutive year is senior center Chris Stewart, Furman's strongest player. In spring testing, Stewart bench pressed 505 pounds, squatted 650 pounds, and power cleaned 347 pounds for a combined lift of 1,502 pounds in three exercises. Stewart's nearest competitor in the combined total was senior strong safety Shelvis Smith (1,288 pounds). Among Furman's other top performing offensive linemen in strength tests was junior tackle Steven Cain, who finished fourth on the team with a combined lift of 1,235 pounds). Senior guard Marty Priore, meanwhile, placed ninth with a total lift of 1,191 pounds, included in which was a squat of 590 pounds.

LOUIS IVORY: "THE IVORY TOWER"...Senior tailback Louis Ivory, a consensus All-America choice, reigning Southern Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Year, and NCAA I-AA football's Walter Payton Award recipient for the 2000 season, is nicknamed "The Ivory Tower", in part, because of his prodigious accomplishments last year. Ivory's nickname also works because the most notable landmark on Furman's campus is an ivory bell tower that overlooks the university's scenic 30-acre lake. The tower, which first gained notoriety as an ivy covered landmark on Furman's old campus in downtown Greenville, has gained new fame thanks, in part, to Ivory. Ivory's complete biographical sketch, as detailed in this year's media guide and updated following his 18-carry,40-yard performance against Appalachian State on Oct. 6, is included below:

scoring on an 8yard run on Furman's first offensive series of the second half and with the Paladins leading 37-7...notched his ninth straight 100-yard performance with a 10-carry, 100-yard outing in ► BOBBY JOHNSON: YEAR EIGHT...The 2001 football season marks Furman head coach Bobby Johnson's eighth year at the helm of the Paladin program and 24th season of service to the university. After suffering through a 3-8 inaugural season in 1994 (the program's first losing season since 1979), Furman rebounded in 1995 to finish 6-5. A year later, Johnson, a Columbia, S.C., native and 1973 Clemson graduate who starred as a defensive back for the Tigers, directed the Paladins to a 9-4 record and into the NCAA I-AA playoffs -- the program's first playoff appearance since 1990. Furman went 7-4 in 1997 and 5-6 in 1998 before bouncing back to go 9-3 in 1999 on the way to claiming the program's 10th league championship and second playoff appearance under Johnson. Included in the 1999 season was a 28-3 win over North Carolina. Last year Furman reeled off its second straight 9-3 season en route to another playoff appearance. Johnson's seven-year head coaching record is 52-34 (.604), and his last seven teams have combined to post a 48-26 mark (.649). Against NCAA I-AA competition over that span, Furman has gone 48-25 (.657). Johnson' 24-year tenure, which encompasses three stints (1976-80, 82-92, 94-present), includes work as defensive backs coach, assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. The Paladins' record during that span is 184-87-7 (.681).

► JOHNSON EQUALS SUCCESS...Furman's 9-3 season a year ago matched the high water win mark for a Bobby Johnson-coached Paladin squad first set in 1996 when Furman went 9-4 and later matched in 1999 as part of the Paladins' 9-3 campaign. The nine regular season wins the last two years are the most by a Furman team since 1989 when the Paladins posted a 10-1 regular season mark on the way to a 12-2 record. Only 11 teams in Furman football history (95 seasons) have won at least nine games in a regular season, and Bobby Johnson has had a hand in eight of those squads (1980, '82, '83, '85, '88, '89, '99, and '00), including two as head coach.

► JOHNSON & JOHNSON (& JOHNSON)...It's ironic that of the nine Southern Conference football playing institutions, three schools have head coaches whose last name is Johnson: Furman's Bobby Johnson; Georgia Southern's Paul Johnson; and The Citadel's Ellis Johnson. In terms of coaching seniority in the league, Furman's Bobby Johnson, who took over the Pala-

din program in 1994, ranks first. Paul Johnson (1997) is next, and Ellis Johnson is third (2001).

► FOUR PALADIN FOOTBALL GREATS SELECTED TO FURMAN ATHLETIC HALL-OF-FAME...Former football standouts Tim Sorrells '81, Rock Hurst '86, Kevin Kendrick '91, and Hazel Gilstrap '43 were among seven honorees inducted into the Furman Athletic Hall-of-Fame in ceremonies prior to Furman's football game against VMI on Sept. 22

Sorrells, a four-year letterman and two-time All-Southern Conference selection as a quarterback, helped lead Furman to a pair of conference championships in 1980 and '81. A Greeneville, Tenn., product and two-time Paladin (MVP) Award recipient, he paced Furman to a 20-5-1 record as a starter and currently ranks fourth on Furman's career passing touchdowns chart (31) and 10th in passing yards with (2,945 yards). Furman's current offensive coordinator, he has served as an assistant coach at Furman since 1986, helping direct the Paladins to four league championships and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national title.

A two-sport standout in football and baseball, Hurst was named 1984-85 Southern Conference Athlete-of-the-Year. He served as co-captain and led Furman with 160 tackles in 1984 on the way to earning team MVP and AFCA/Kodak All-America honors as a linebacker. In four seasons of play, the Knoxville, Tenn., product helped the Paladins notch a 35-11-1 record and claim three league championships, and his 364 career tackles rank 11th on the school's career charts. In baseball, Hurst twice earned allconference honors as a catcher, and he batted .382 with 12 home runs and 48 RBI his senior year. Ranked third on the Paladin career charts in home runs (31) and fourth in RBI (117), his .340 career batting average is the third best all-time at Furman, and his .616 career slugging percentage is still a school standard.

Kendrick served as a team co-captain and earned Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Year and consensus All-America honors as a linebacker in 1990 after totaling a team high 179 tackles. A starter on Furman's 1988 NCAA I-AA championship team that posted a 13-2 record and led the nation in scoring defense (9.5 ppg), the Smyrna, Ga., native helped the Paladins to three straight league titles in 1988, '89, and '90 and a 41-12 mark during his career — the winningest four-year stretch in school history. His 574 career tackles ranks second all-time at Furman.

An Easley, S.C. product and three-year letterman as a tackle in 1939, '40, '41, Gilstrap played on Furman squads that posted wins over Georgia, North Carolina State, and South Carolina (twice), among others. A twotime honorable mention All-South Carolina selection and team MVP in 1941, he also played in the Carolinas Lions Bowl his senior year. A successful prep coach at Charleston's St. Andrews High School, where he went 108-48-7 and won two state championships, he later served as president of the Southern Conference, director of athletics at Appalachian State, and as a member of the NCAA Steering Committee.

✓ FURMAN AND THE NFL...Furman football currently sports three graduates on NFL rosters. Tight end Luther Broughton '97 (Cainhoy, S.C.) is now in his second stint with the Carolina Panthers and fifth season overall in the NFL. A fifth-round draft pick of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1997, Broughton spent the 1997 campaign with the Eagles before signing the Carolina Panthers, with whom he played the entire 1998 season before being traded back to the Eagles prior to the start of the 1999 campaign. After playing with the Eagles in 1999 and 2000, during which time he caught 38 passes for 399 yards and four touchdowns, he re-signed with the Panthers earlier this year. Linebacker Orlando Ruff'99 (Winnsboro, S.C.) is in his third season with the San Diego Chargers as a middle linebacker. In 2000 he started in 14 of 16 games for the Chargers and racked up 68 tackles, an interception, and five pass deflections. John Keith '00 (Newnan, Ga.), a fourth round pick of the San Francisco 49ers in 2000, earned two starts at safety and totaled 18 tackles, a sack, and a interception before sustaining a broken arm in an overtime loss to the Oakland Raiders last year. Keith recently sustained a torn anterior cruciate ligament and is out for the entire 2001 season.

LARAMIE,WY. -- Jarvis Wallum booted four field goals, including two in the second half, to lift the Wyoming Cowboys to a 20-14 season opening win over the visiting Furman Paladins in front of 14,167 fans at War Memorial Stadium.

War Memorial Stadium

In posting the victory, Wyoming, an NCAA I-A member of the Mountain West Conference, snapped an eight-game losing streak dating back to the 2000 season. The loss was the second for NCAA I-AA sixth-ranked Furman in its last three season openers.

Trailing 14-7 at halftime, Furman tied the score at 14-14 when tailback Louis lvory, the reigning Walter Payton Award winner in NCAA I-AA, broke loose on a 44-yard touchdown run with 3:23 left in the third quarter. Wyoming, however, answered on its next possession by moving 75 yards in 10 plays to set up Wallum's third field goal of the game, from 22 yards out, to give the Cowboys a 17-14 advantage with less than a minute remaining in the third period.

Wallum added his fourth field goal, a 28-yarder with 10:00 to go in the contest, to stretch the Cowboys' lead to 20-14.

On the ensuing possession, Furman drove from its 35 to the Wyoming 7, where on a third and four play Paladin wide receiver Bear Rinehart was tackled for a three-yard loss on a reverse. Instead of kicking the field goal, Furman went for a touchdown, but quarterback Billy Napier's pass to a slanting and open Rinehart in the end zone was low and incomplete.

Taking over possession with 6:10 remaining, Wyoming ground up the game clock by moving 73 yards in 12 plays to the Furman 17, where Wallum missed a 34-yard field goal attempt with only 17 seconds left in the game.

The Cowboys, who racked up 87 offensive plays to Furman's 58, amassed 422 yards in offense in the contest and were paced by sophomore quarterback Casey Bramlet, who completed 30-of-48 passes for 331 yards. Bramlet, who scored Wyoming's lone touchdown of the game on a 1-yard run in the second quarter to give the Cowboys a 14-7 lead, connected with sophomore wide receiver Ryan McGuffey on 10 passes for 134 yards.

Furman was paced offensively by lvory, who rushed 19 times for 136 yards and one touchdown. Furman netted 349 yards in offense, including 169 from quarterback Billy Napier, who completed 12-of-24 passes in the contest, but the Paladins suffered two turnovers, including a fumble at the Cowboy 38 and an interception that led to a Wyoming field goal. Bear Rinehart paced all Paladin receivers with four receptions for 97 yards.

Furman 46, Elon 7

September 8, 2001

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Louis Ivory rushed for 126 yards and two touchdowns to lead the NCAA I-AA nationally sixth-ranked Furman Paladins to a 46-7 win over the visiting Elon Phoenix at Paladin Stadium.

lvory rushed 19 times and scored on runs of 2 and 8 yards while recording his eighth straight 100-yard performance and 22nd 100-yard outing of his career.

The win gave Furman (1-1) its 99th victory in Paladin Stadium since moving into the facility in 1981. It also marked the Paladins' second straight decision over Elon (0-2), which committed six turnovers.

Furman outgained Elon 452-180 and got a strong performance from junior quarterback Billy Napier, who connected on 12-of-19 passes for 192 yards and two touchdowns. Tight end Trent Sansbury led all Paladin receivers with five catches for 86 yards and a score.

Furman took advantage of a pair of Elon turnovers in the first quarter to race to a 21-0 lead.

An interception and 23-yard return by Shelvis Smith gave the Paladins the ball at Elon 19, and four plays later Napier hit Bear Rinehart on an 8yard scoring strike to put Furman up 7-0 only three minutes into the game.

On its next possession, Furman moved 58 yards in nine plays to extend its lead to 14-0 following a 2-yard run by lvory at the 4:53 mark.

A fumble recovery by Paladin defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling at the Elon 42 on the Phoenix's next possession set up another Furman score, which came on the next play when Napier connected with Sansbury on a 42-yard touchdown at the 1:53 juncture.

Elon trimmed Furman's lead to 21-7 with an 11-yard touchdown run by Martin Swindell with 10:38 left in the first half, but the Paladins answered with three Danny Marshall field goals covering 22,33, and 28 yards to extend the lead to 30-7 by halftime.

Reserve tailback Hindley Brigham tallied the Paladins' last score on a 65-yard touchdown run on the first rushing attempt of his career.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Josh Cooper's 85-yard fumble return for a touchdown keyed a 24-point second quarter outburst and helped lead NCAA I-AA nationally fourth-ranked Furman to a 65-7 rout of VMI.

Paladin Stadium

The win, Furman's 20th straight over the Keydets, marked Furman's 100th victory in Paladin Stadium history, and the 65 points were the most since 1935. The triumph was also the Paladins' 10th consecutive home victory against Southern Conference opposition.

With Furman leading 14-0, Cooper picked up a fumble by VMI's Pedro Garcia at the Furman 15 and raced untouched 85 yards for the touchdown to put the Paladins ahead 21-0 at the 14:15 mark of the second quarter.

An interception by Rodney Johnson on VMI's next possession led to 26-yard field goal by Danny Marshall that extended the lead to 24-0.

A blocked punt by Shelvis Smith at the Furman 43 led to the Paladins' next score. After quarterback Billy Napier connected on a 41-yard pass to tight end Trent Sansbury to the Keydet 16, Louis lvory ripped off a 13-yard run to the 3, and Napier completed the 3-play, 57-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown run to make it 31-0 with 6:27 left in the half.

Furman capped its 24-point second period explosion with an 11-play, 69-yard drive that ended when backup tailback Toreico O'Neal scored on a 2-yard run of the last play of the first half to make it 38-0

A 91-yard kickoff return by Brian Bratton to open the second half made it 45-0, and the Paladins later added a second kickoff return for a touchdown when Lamar Rembert bolted 79 yards following VMI's only score of the game to give Furman a 58-7 advantage.

Furman, which outgained VMI 435-223, got 100 yards on 10 carries and a touchdown from All-America tailback Louis Ivory, who exited the game midway through the second period in favor of reserves. For Ivory, the 100-yard performance was his ninth straight and the 23rd of his career. Reserve tailback Hindley Brigham paced all Paladin rushers with eight carries for 106 yards and a touchdown.

CULLOWHEE, N.C.-- Louis Ivory rushed for 159 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA fourth-ranked Furman to a 31-13 Southern Conference win over Western Carolina.

lvory scored on runs of 3 and 67 yards to help stake Furman to a 21-0 first quarter lead. The 158-yard effort, his 10th straight 100-yard performance and 24th century rushing outing of his career, upped his career rushing total to 4,697 yards, leaving him just 49 yards shy of Carl Tremble's school career rushing standard.

Furman, which scored on its first four possessions of the game, took a 7-0 lead on a 3-yard run by freshman fullback Eric Emerson that capped a 5-play, 55-yard drive.

On Western Carolina's second possession, Paul Billingsly recorded Furman's third blocked punt in its last two games and recovered it at the Catamount 15-yard line. Three plays later lvory bulled over from three yards out with 5:55 left in the first quarter to give the Paladins a 14-0 lead.

Furman struck for its third touchdown with only seconds left in the opening period when lvory took a handoff from quarterback Billy Napier and bolted 67 yards to give the Paladins a 21-0 advantage.

A 20-play, 80-yard drive put Western Carolina on the board with a 2yard touchdown run by Donnie Bryant at the 5:10 juncture of the second quarter, but Furman answered with another impressive scoring drive under the direction of true freshman quarterback Bo Moore, who came off the bench for a shaken up Napier.

Using a 26-yard run by Lamer Rembert and a key third down, I3-yard pass to James Thomas for a first down, Moore moved the Paladins 77 yards in nine plays and connected with Bear Rinehart on a 22-yard strike with only 45 seconds remaining in the first half to make it 28-7.

Napier, who returned to the field on Furman's first possession of the second half, set up the Paladins' final score of the contest when he hooked up with James Thomas on a 41-yard pass to the Catamount 8-yard line midway through the fourth quarter. Three plays later Danny Marshall booted his school record tying 10th straight field goal to give Furman a 31-7 lead.

Paced by senior linebacker John Thrift's two quarterback takedowns, Furman's defense registered four sacks in the contest. Senior All-America linebacker Will Bouton, the 2000 Southern Conference Defensive Playerof-the-Year, led all Paladin tacklers with nine stops.

GREENVILLE, S.C. — Billy Napier passed for 159 yards and two touchdowns to lift NCAA I-AA third-ranked Furman to a 28-22 win over fifthranked Appalachian State in front of 14,411 fans at Paladin Stadium.

Napier completed 9-of-15 passes and connected with freshman flanker Isaac West for both scores in the second half on plays covering 39 and 30 yards. West had six pass receptions for 120 yards and five punt returns for 42 yards.

The win was the third straight by Furman over Appalachian State in Greenville and the 11th consecutive league home win for the Paladins.

Appalachian State, which tallied 81 offensive snaps to Furman's 45, outgained the Paladins 222-194 in total offense, but the Mountaineers managed only 2.7 yards per snap to Furman's 4.3

All-America tailback Louis Ivory, who came into the game 50 yards shy of Furman's career rushing record, was held to 40 yards on 18 carries, but Ivory's 18-yard touchdown run with 4:17 left in the first half put the Paladins ahead for good at 14-7.

The Paladins raced to a 7-0 lead on the game's first play when Brian Bratton took the opening kickoff and sprinted 100 yards for a touchdown.

Appalachian State's Jerry Beard tied the game at 7-7 with a 13-yard run with 13:51 left in the second quarter.

Leading 14-7 at the half, Furman linebacker Will Bouton pounced on an Appalachian State fumble at the Mountaineer 39-yard line, and on the next play Napier hit a streaking West for a 39-yard touchdown strike to stretch the Paladin advantage to 21-7 at the 4:43 mark of the third period.

The Mountaineers made it 21-14 on a Joey Hoover I-yard touchdown run with 11:14 left in the game, but two possessions later a 17-yard punt return by West to the Appalachian State 30 set up the Paladins' final score, which came one play later when Napier found West behind the Mountaineer secondary for a 30-yard touchdown pass with 7:46 left.

After Furman's Richie Jackson intercepted a Joe Burchette pass at the Paladin I-yard line, Furman punter Lee Willis ran out of the end zone for a safety to make it 28-16 with 3:13 left.

Appalachian State regained possession at the Furman 43 on the ensusing kickoff, and eight plays later Burchette connected with Jose White on a 3yard touchdown pass to make it 28-22 with 1:26 remaining. Appalachian State's onside kick, however, was recovered by Furman's James Thomas at the 50-yard line, allowing the Paladins to run out the game clock.
