THE GAME

Furman, ranked No. 4 in this week's Sports Network Poll, returns to action and opens Southern Conference play this Saturday when it hosts VMI at Paladin Stadium. A win by Furman over the Keydets would mark the 100th victory in Paladin Stadium history.

ATTRACTION

Saturday's Furman-VMI game, sponsored by The Greenville Hospital System, will highlight Tobacco Free/Education Night at Furman University.

In addition, on Saturday the Furman Athletic Hall-of-Fame will enshrine former football standouts **Tim Sorrells '81**, **Rock Hurst '86**, **Kevin Kendrick '91**, and **Hazel Gilstrap '43**, along with **Will Ertel '92** (baseball) and **Heather VandeBrake '96** (cross country/track & field). **Dan Foster '49**, former sports editor and columnist with *The Greenville News-Piedmont*, will be also be inducted as an honorary member of the Furman Athletic Hall-of-Fame. Tickets to this year's dinner and induction ceremony, which begin at 5:00 p.m. at Timmons Arena, are \$10 and can be purchased by calling the Paladin Club (864) 294-3565.

THE SERIES

Furman holds a 21-8 series advantage over VMI, and the Paladins enter Saturday's game riding a 19-game series winning streak over the Keydets dating back to the 1980 season. VMI's last win over Furman was a 21-20 decision in Lexington in 1979, and the last time the Keydets knocked off the Paladins in Greenville was during the 1977 season by a 31-28 score. Furman's 19-game series winning streak over VMI matches the most consecutive wins by Furman over an opponent first set against Wofford (1919-47). Furman defeated VMI 35-21 last year in Lexington, and the Paladins rolled up the Keydets 58-0 in Greenville in 1999. In all games played in Greenville, Furman holds a 12-3 lead. In Lexington, Furman has posted a 9-5 mark against the Keydets.

FURMAN-VMI LAST MEETING

LEXINGTON, VA. (Sept. 23, 2000) -- Louis Ivory rushed for 135 yards and a touchdown and Furman's defense racked up seven quarterback sacks to lift the nationally sixth-ranked Paladins to a 35-21 Southern Conference win over VMI.

With the win Furman posted its 19th straight series victory over the VMI and matched the program's longest winning streak over an opponent first set against Wofford from 1917-47.

Leading 14-13 at intermission, the Paladins stretched their advantage to 21-13 when Eddie Overdyke scooped up a fumble and returned it 20 yards for a score at the 12:40 mark of the third quarter. Furman's lead didn't last long, however, as VMI's Richard Holland gathered in the ensuing kickoff, shed a couple of tacklers, and outdistanced the Paladin kick coverage unit for a 100-yard kickoff return. A two-point conversion knotted the game at 21-21.

A bobbled catch by Lamar Rembert on the kickoff and penalty put Furman at its own 1-yard line, but from that point the Paladin offense put together its most impressive drive of the contest. A 45-yard run by Louis Ivory moved it to the Furman 46. Eleven plays later, Derek Russell scored on an 11-yard run to give the Paladins a 28-21 lead, and Furman added to it late in the third quarter when quarterback Justin Hill hooked up with James Thomas on a 36-yard scoring strike.

From that point Furman's defense, led by redshirt defensive end Brandon Poole's three sacks, stepped up the pressure on VMI, racking up five of its seven quarterback takedowns and holding VMI to only four rushing yards and 218 total yards.

FURMAN LAST TIME OUT

GREENVILLE, S.C. (Sept. 8, 2001) -- Louis Ivory rushed for 126 yards and two touchdowns to lead the NCAA I-AA nationally sixth-ranked Furman Paladins to a 46-7 win over the visiting Elon Phoenix in front of 10,322 fans at Paladin Stadium.

Ivory, the reigning national offensive player-of-the-year, rushed 19 times and scored on runs of 2 and 8 yards while recording his eighth straight 100-yard performance and 22nd 100-yard outing of his career.

The win gave Furman (1-1) its 99th victory in Paladin Stadium since moving into the facility in 1981. It also marked the Paladins' second straight decision over Elon (0-2), which committed six turnovers, including four interceptions.

"Elon does such a good job running the football, but they can also hit people with some big passes, so we wanted to do a nice job against the pass, and we did," said Furman head coach Bobby Johnson. "Interceptions are things you can't count on, but when they happen it's nice. It set up our offense and kept them off their game."

"We're going through some growing pains right now, and it showed tonight, but take nothing away from Furman, they are a very good football team and they played an exceptional football game," said Elon head coach Al Seagraves. "They are solid as a rock offensively, defensively, and in the kicking game. I tip my hat to Furman."

Furman outgained Elon 452-180 and got a strong performance from junior quarterback Billy Napier, who connected on 12-of-19 passes for 192 yards and two touchdowns. Tight end Trent Sansbury led all Paladin receivers with five catches for 86 yards and a score.

Furman took advantage of a pair of Elon turnovers in the first quarter to race to a 21-0 lead.

An interception and 23-yard return by strong safety Shelvis Smith gave the Paladins the ball at Elon 19, and four plays later Napier hit Bear Rinehart on an 8-yard touchdown pass to put Furman up 7-0 only three minutes into the game.

On its next possession, Furman moved 58 yards in nine plays to extend its lead to 14-0 following a 2-yard run by Ivory at the 4:53 mark.

A fumble recovery by Paladin defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling at the Elon 42 on the Phoenix's next possession set up another Furman score, which came on the next play when Napier connected with Sansbury on a 42-yard touchdown at the 1:53 juncture.

Elon trimmed Furman's lead to 21-7 with an 11-yard touchdown run by Martin Swindell with 10:38 left in the first half, but the Paladins answered with three Danny Marshall field goals covering 22, 33, and 28 yards to extend the lead to 30-7 by halftime.

Furman upped its margin to 37-7 on its first possession of the second half with an 8-yard scoring run by Ivory before giving way to reserves the rest of the way.

Reserve tailback Hindley Brigham tallied the Paladins' last score on a 65-yard touchdown run on the first rushing attempt of his career.

Headlining the Paladins' strong defensive work against Elon was junior All-Southern Conference defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling, who registered six tackles, a sack, a caused fumble, and a fumble recovery that led directly to a Furman touchdown.

✎ **NOT SINCE 1963...**Prior to the cancellation of last Saturday's game against Liberty, the last time a Furman football game was canceled or postponed was during the 1963 season, when, following the assassination of president John F. Kennedy, the Paladins postponed their regularly scheduled season finale against West Virginia from Nov. 23 to Nov. 28. The Paladins lost the game to the Mountaineers 38-7 to finish 7-4 under head coach Bob King.

✎ **WIN NUMBER 99...**Furman's 46-7 triumph over Elon on Sept. 8 marked the program's 99th win in Paladin Stadium since moving into the facility in 1981. Now in its 21st season of play in Paladin Stadium, Furman has compiled a 99-27-1 overall record (.783) in the beautiful facility and will shoot for win No. 100 this Saturday against VMI. The Paladins, who own a 9-0 record versus VMI in Paladin Stadium, in all sport a 19-game series winning streak against the Keydets.

✧ **MORE PALADIN STADIUM POINTERS...**Furman is 8-1 (.889) in its last nine home games and 13-3 (.813) in its last 16 contests in Paladin Stadium. Furman currently sports a nine-game winning streak against Southern Conference competition in Paladin Stadium dating back to the 1998 season, and the Paladins own a 52-18-1 record (.739) in Paladin Stadium against current Southern Conference member schools.

✧ **NOTES FROM THE WIN OVER ELON...**Furman's 46-7 win over Elon represented its second straight triumph over the Phoenix and third victory in the four-game series. Furman's 39-point margin of victory marked its biggest winning spread since the Paladins swamped VMI 58-0 in 1999. Elon's six turnovers (four interceptions, two fumbles) were the most

by a Paladin opponent since the 2000 season opener when Elon committed six miscues (four fumbles, two interceptions) in a 16-3 loss to the Paladins. Furman's four interceptions against the Phoenix were the most by the Paladins since the 1999 campaign when Furman picked off four passes in a 27-19 win at Western Carolina. True freshman quarterback **Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.)** saw the first action of his career against Elon, completing 1-of-3 passes for 14 yards. Reserve tailback **Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.)**, a sophomore transfer from Baylor, reeled off a 65-yard touchdown run in the second half on the first rush of his Furman career. Redshirt freshman defensive end **Mike Killian (Atlanta, Ga.)** gained the first start of his career in place of **Eddie Overdyke (Lilburn, Ga.)**, who logged only seven plays due to a sprained ankle sustained in the season opener against Wyoming. Furman emerged from the Elon contest with two significant injuries. Senior flanker **Adam Ditto (Kennesaw, Ga.)** sustained a fractured fibula in his right leg and, according to head trainer Brian Reese, will miss from 8-10 weeks after undergoing surgery on Sept. 10. Backup fullback **Al Means (Charlotte, N.C.)**, meanwhile, is expected to be sidelined for at least two more weeks after sustaining a sprained medial collateral ligament in his left knee against Elon.

✧ **SWEET REDEMPTION...**Furman junior cornerback **Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.)**, who a year ago sustained a season ending knee injury on an interception return only five plays into the opener against Elon, came back with a solid performance against the Phoenix, totaling three tackles and one of the Paladins' four interceptions to set up a first half field goal. Another interception was recorded by senior cornerback **Richie Jackson (Cincinnati, Ohio)**, who in doing so claimed the 15th pickoff of his career and moved to within three of Furman's career interceptions standard of 18 currently held by Jerome Norris (1983-86). Redshirt freshman strong safety **Daniel South (Snellville, Ga.)** recorded the first pickoff of his career, and senior strong safety **Shelvis Smith (College Park, Ga.)** accounted for the other, which, following a 23-yard return to the Elon 19, set up the Paladins' first touchdown of the game early in the first quarter.

✧ **DOMINATING IN THE OLD DOMINION...**Since 1990, Furman has racked up a 15-2 record (.882) against teams from Virginia. When stretching the time frame back to 1980, the Paladins' mark versus teams from the Old Dominion is an even better 27-2 (.931). Furman carries an eight-game winning streak over Virginia teams into this Saturday's contest against VMI. Included in that run of success is a 19-0 record against VMI; a 3-0 mark versus Liberty; a 2-0 slate against James Madison; and a 3-2 record versus William & Mary.

FURMAN OFFENSE DISPLAYING MORE BALANCE IN EARLY GOING

Although only two games into the 2001 season, it's apparent Furman opponents are determined to slow down the Paladins' vaunted rushing attack this year following a 2000 campaign that produced a school season record 307.5 rushing yards per game highlighted, of course, by Walter Payton Award winning tailback **Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.)**, who rushed for a Southern Conference season record 2,079 yards. In Furman's first two games, Wyoming and Elon keyed heavily on Ivory, helping limit him to 19 carries in each game. While his average number of carries per game is down from last year's figure of just under 27 carries per contest, Ivory has still managed to roll up 136 and 126-yard rushing performances and score three touchdowns thus far while averaging a healthy 6.9 yards per rush. Furman's answer to the opposition's stepped up attempt to slow down its lethal ground attack and Ivory has been to turn to the air, where the Paladins have had good success. In the 46-7 win over Elon, the Paladin offense, under the direction of junior quarterback **Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.)** racked up 452 yards in impressively balanced fashion. It included 246 rushing yards and 206 passing yards. Napier, who completed 12-of-19 passes, including two touchdowns, accounted for 192 yards and did not throw an interception. Heading into Saturday's game against VMI, Furman is averaging 213.0 yards per game rushing and 187.5 yards per game passing — figures that, if continued, will give Furman one of the most balanced offensive attacks in program history. Last year the Paladins averaged only 115.3 yards per game through the air.

SHARING THE WEALTH...If the work turned in by quarterback Billy Napier in the first two games continues, it's a safe assumption that the wealth of receptions generated by Furman's improved passing attack will be spread around this fall. In the 46-7 win over Elon, Napier hooked up with senior All-Southern Conference tight end **Trent Sansbury (Lilburn, Ga.)** on five passes for 86 yards and a touchdown, which covered 42 yards.

Sansbury's nine catches (108 yards) in two games is already well more than half the 14 receptions he garnered for all of 2000. Besides Sansbury, redshirt freshman split end **Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.)** caught three passes for 42 yards, and junior flanker **Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.)** collected a pair of receptions for 52 yards and a touchdown that covered eight yards. In addition, junior split end **James Thomas (Marianna, Fla.)** has four catches for 46 yards through two games.

THE MARSHALL PLAN...In converting all three of his field goal attempts (22, 33, and 28 yards) in the win over Elon, sophomore placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)**, who knocked down his last five field goal attempts last year, ran his consecutive made field goals streak to eight. Marshall, who converted 14-of-18 field goals and finished second only to Chattanooga All-America kicker Matt Vick in kick scoring a year ago, has now made good on 17-of-21 three pointers (.809) in his still young career. Ironically, a year ago Marshall kicked three field goals in his collegiate debut to lift Furman to a 16-3 win over Elon.

KEEP THAT FLAG IN YOUR POCKET...A year ago Furman ranked as the league's least penalized team in the Southern Conference, picking up only 49 infractions for 422 yards during the regular season. Through two games this year the Paladins have only been flagged four times for 40 yards.

COMPETITIVE, EVEN IN DEFEAT...Although Furman owns a solid 20-7 record (.730) in its last 27 games, in the seven losses the Paladins have proven to be tough competition. In fact, over the aforementioned span, Furman's most decisive loss has been seven points (twice), and the seven losses have been by a combined total of 28 points.

HOLDING ON TO THE PIGSKIN...In addition to ranking as the Southern Conference's least penalized team a year ago, Furman also paced the league in turnover margin (+1.09) for the second straight year. Thanks to Elon's six turnovers on Saturday, the Paladins head into the Liberty game sporting an even better turnover margin (+2.00) than a year ago.

BLOOD LINES...Furman sophomore defensive end Brandon Poole is the son of former University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back George Rogers.

KEEPING IT IN THE FAMILY....Sophomore placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)**, who last year booted three field goals in his first game to lead Furman to a 16-3 win over Elon, is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Redshirt freshman tight end **Will Keller (Clayton, Ga.)** is the nephew of Elliott Keller former Paladin fullback Elliott Keller (1962-63), who led the Southern Conference in rushing in 1962 with 724 yards. Freshman linebacker **Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.)** is the brother of Clemson All-America linebacker Chad Carson. Andrew's father, Tom Carson, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, Earle Carson, was a three-year letterman and end and honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, M.A. Carson, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, Tom Carson, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who served as captain of Furman's 1931 squad.

THE PARKVIEW CONNECTION...Furman senior starting tight end Trent Sansbury and his backup, true freshman Willis Sudderth, are both products of Lilburn, Ga., and Parkview High School.

✎ **NAME GAME**...Furman junior wide receiver Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.) is named to legendary Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant.

✎ **YOUNG FULLBACKS**...When true freshman **Eric Emerson (Newnan, Ga.)** started at fullback in the season opener against Wyoming three weeks ago, it marked quite a change from the experience the Paladins possessed at the position last year, when Derek Russell, a three-year starter who rushed for 1,187 yards and 37 touchdowns, occupied the post. Emerson's presence, along with those of redshirt freshmen **Corey Tant (Easley, S.C.)** and **Al Means (Charlotte, N.C.)**, who was sidelined after suffering a knee sprained against Elon, guarantees the Paladins will have a youthful fullback corps this fall.

✎ **PALADIN OFFENSIVE LINE AMONG BEST IN NCAA I-AA**...Based on what Furman's offensive line helped the Paladins accomplish a year ago and the individual honors accorded virtually every member of the unit, the Paladin offensive front, which returns four of five starters, can rightfully be considered one of the best and most experienced in NCAA I-AA. The cast of four returning regulars -- all but one of whom are seniors -- includes a pair of All-Americans in center **Chris Stewart (Palm Harbor, Fla.)** and **Marty Priore (Cincinnati, Ohio)**, and All-Southern Conference left tackle **Donnie Littlejohn (Gaffney, S.C.)**. In addition, junior right guard **Trevor Kruger (Moultrie, Ga.)**, who started every game a year ago, is back and has been tabbed a preseason all-conference pick by league head coaches. If also considering senior all-conference tight end **Trent Sansbury (Lilburn, Ga.)** with the offensive front, the Paladins sports five of their six starting linemen from the 2000 team and boast a combined total of 198 games played and 138 starts in their collective careers.

✎ **RARE ACCOMPLISHMENT**...When three Furman offensive linemen (OT Josh Moore, OG Marty Priore, and C Christ Stewart) earned first team All-Southern Conference honors a year ago, it marked the first time since 1990 and only the third time in school history (1981 being the other) that three Paladin offensive linemen had earned first team all-conference honors. With Priore and Stewart returning this fall, along with 2000 consensus second team all-conference tackle Donnie Littlejohn, Furman may yet grab three of the five first team all-league offensive line honors for a second consecutive season.

✎ **MUSCLE MEN**...Playing a key role in the strong work of Furman's offensive line is the unit's impressive physical strength as reflected in some of the numbers posted by unit members in team weight lifting tests. Leading the way for the third consecutive year is senior center Chris Stewart, Furman's strongest player. In spring testing, Stewart bench pressed 505 pounds, squatted 650 pounds, and power cleaned 347 pounds for a combined lift of 1,502 pounds in three exercises. Stewart's nearest competitor in the combined total was senior strong safety Shelvis Smith (1,288 pounds). Among Furman's other top performing offensive linemen

in strength tests was junior tackle Steven Cain, who finished fourth on the team with a combined lift of 1,235 pounds: bench press (405 pounds), squat (500 pounds), and power clean (330 pounds). Senior guard Marty Priore, meanwhile, placed ninth with a total lift of 1,191 pounds, included in which was a squat of 590 pounds.

✎ **FURMAN'S IVORY FEATURED IN SPORTS ILLUSTRATED, USATODAY**...Furman senior consensus All-America tailback **Louis Ivory (Fort Valley, Ga.)** was featured in *Sports Illustrated* Magazine's August 13 College Football Preview issue. Ivory, the reigning Walter Payton Award winner, was profiled and quoted extensively in the magazine's two-page NCAA I-AA preview story. Furman's heralded running back was also featured in the August 13 edition of *USA Today*, as part of an extensive story on Furman's outlook for the 2001 season.

✎ **LOUIS IVORY: "THE IVORY TOWER"**...Senior tailback Louis Ivory, a consensus All-America choice, reigning Southern Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Year, and NCAA I-AA football's Walter Payton Award recipient for the 2000 season, is nicknamed "The Ivory Tower", in part, because of his prodigious accomplishments last year. Ivory's nickname also works because the most notable landmark on Furman's campus is an ivory bell tower that overlooks the university's scenic 30-acre lake. The tower, which first gained notoriety as an ivy covered landmark on Furman's old campus in downtown Greenville, has gained new fame thanks, in part, to Ivory. Ivory's complete biographical sketch, as detailed in this year's media guide and updated following his 19-carry, 126-yard performance against Elon on Sept. 8, is included below:

✎ **LINEBACKERS LOOKING STRONG**...Although Furman's only graduation loss on defense occurred at linebacker (Marion Martin), the Paladin linebacking corps appear set for another excellent year due to the return of All-America and reigning Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Year performer **Will Bouton (Greenville, S.C.)** at middle linebacker and three-year starter **John Thrift (Hartwell, Ga.)** at the strong side post. Bouton, who finished sixth in balloting for last year's Buck Buchanan Award recognizing the top defensive player in the NCAA I-AA football, led Furman with 134 tackles in 2000 and has now started in every game (37) of his Paladin career on the way to 392 tackles, good for eighth all-time at Furman. Thrift, meanwhile, has totaled 258 career stops in 37 games (28 starts) while demonstrating solid consistency. Bouton and Thrift are only the latest in an impressive line of outstanding Furman linebackers as evidenced by the school's 20 first team all-conference linebacker selections since 1975. Bouton's complete biographical sketch, as detailed in this year's media guide and updated through his six-tackle performance in Furman's 46-7 win over Elon on Sept. 8, is included below:

✎ **BOBBY JOHNSON: YEAR EIGHT**...The 2001 football season marks Furman head coach Bobby Johnson's eighth year at the helm of the Paladin program and 24th season of service to the university. After suffering through a 3-8 inaugural season in 1994 (the program's first losing season since 1979), Furman rebounded in 1995 to finish 6-5. A year later, Johnson, a Columbia, S.C., native and 1973 Clemson graduate who starred as a defensive back for the Tigers, directed the Paladins to a 9-4 record and into the NCAA I-AA playoffs -- the program's first playoff appearance since 1990. Furman went 7-4 in 1997 and 5-6 in 1998 before bouncing back to go 9-3 in 1999 on the way to claiming the program's 10th league championship and second playoff appearance under Johnson. Included in the 1999 season was a 28-3 win over North Carolina. Last year Furman reeled off its second straight 9-3 season en route to another playoff appearance. Johnson's seven-year head coaching record is 49-34 (.590), and his last seven teams have combined to post a 46-26 mark (.639). Against NCAA I-AA competition over that span, Furman has gone 45-25 (.642). Johnson' 24-year tenure, which encompasses three stints (1976-80, 82-92, 94-present), includes work as defensive backs coach, assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and head coach. The Paladins' record during that span is 181-87-7 (.671).

✎ **JOHNSON EQUALS SUCCESS**...Furman's 9-3 season a year ago matched the high water win mark for a Bobby Johnson-coached Paladin squad first set in 1996 when Furman went 9-4 and later matched in 1999 as part of the Paladins' 9-3 campaign. The nine regular season wins the last two years are the most by a Furman team since 1989 when the Paladins posted a 10-1 regular season mark on the way to a 12-2 record. Only 11 teams in Furman football history (95 seasons) have won at least nine games in a regular season, and Bobby Johnson has had a hand in eight of those squads (1980, '82, '83, '85, '88, '89, '99, and '00), including two as head coach.

✧ **JOHNSON & JOHNSON (& JOHNSON)**...It's ironic that of the nine Southern Conference football playing institutions, three schools have head coaches whose last name is Johnson: Furman's Bobby Johnson; Georgia Southern's Paul Johnson; and The Citadel's Ellis Johnson. In terms of coaching seniority in the league, Furman's Bobby Johnson, who took over the Paladin program in 1994, ranks first. Paul Johnson (1997) is next, and Ellis Johnson is third (2001).

✧ **FOUR PALADIN FOOTBALL GREATS SELECTED TO FURMAN ATHLETIC HALL-OF-FAME**...Former football standouts **Tim Sorrells '81, Rock Hurst '86, Kevin Kendrick '91, and Hazel Gilstrap '43** are among seven honorees who will be inducted into the Furman Athletic Hall-of-Fame in ceremonies prior to Furman's football game against VMI this Saturday.

Also selected for induction are **Will Ertel '92** (baseball) and **Heather VandeBrake '96** (cross country/track & field). **Dan Foster '49**, former sports editor and columnist with *The Greenville News-Piedmont*, will be inducted as an honorary member of the Furman Athletic Hall-of-Fame.

Sorrells, a four-year letterman and two-time All-Southern Conference selection as a quarterback, helped lead Furman to a pair of conference championships in 1980 and '81. A Greenville, Tenn., product and two-time Paladin (MVP) Award recipient, he paced Furman to a 20-5-1 record as a starter and currently ranks fourth on Furman's career passing touchdowns chart (31) and 10th in passing yards with (2,945 yards). He has served as an assistant coach at Furman since 1986, helping direct the Paladins to four league championships and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national title.

A two-sport standout in football and baseball, Hurst was named 1984-85 Southern Conference Athlete-of-the-Year. He served as co-captain and led Furman with 160 tackles in 1984 on the way to earning team MVP and AFCA/Kodak All-America honors as a linebacker. In four seasons of play, the Knoxville, Tenn., product helped the Paladins notch a 35-11-1 record and claim three league championships, and his 364 career tackles rank 11th on the school's career charts. In baseball, Hurst twice earned all-conference honors as a catcher, and he batted .382 with 12 home runs and 48 RBI his senior year. Ranked third on the Paladin career charts in home runs (31) and fourth in RBI (117), his .340 career batting average is the third best all-time at Furman, and his .616 career slugging percentage is still a school standard.

Kendrick served as a team co-captain and earned Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Year and consensus All-America honors as a linebacker in 1990 after totaling a team high 179 tackles. A starter on Furman's 1988 NCAA I-AA championship team that posted a 13-2 record and led the nation in scoring defense (9.5 ppg), the Smyrna, Ga., native

helped the Paladins to three straight league titles in 1988, '89, and '90 and a 41-12 mark during his career — the winningest four-year stretch in school history. His 574 career tackles ranks second all-time at Furman.

An Easley, S.C., product and three-year letterman as a tackle in 1939, '40, '41, Gilstrap played on Furman squads that posted wins over Georgia, North Carolina State, and South Carolina (twice), among others. A two-time honorable mention All-South Carolina selection and team MVP in 1941, he also played in the Carolinas Lions Bowl his senior year. A successful prep coach at Charleston's St. Andrews High School, where he went 108-48-7 and won two state championships, he later served as president of the Southern Conference, director of athletics at Appalachian State, and as a member of the NCAA Steering Committee.

✓ **FURMAN AND THE NFL**...Furman football currently sports three graduates on NFL rosters.

Tight end **Luther Broughton '97 (Cainhoy, S.C.)** is now in his second stint with the Carolina Panthers and fifth season overall in the NFL. A fifth-round draft pick of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1997, Broughton spent the 1997 campaign with the Eagles before signing the Carolina Panthers, with whom he played the entire 1998 season before being traded back to the Eagles prior to the start of the 1999 campaign. After playing with the Eagles in 1999 and 2000, during which time he caught 38 passes for 399 yards and four touchdowns, he re-signed with the Panthers earlier this year. Linebacker **Orlando Ruff '99 (Winnsboro, S.C.)** is in his third season with the San Diego Chargers as a middle linebacker. In 2000 he started in 14 of 16 games for the Chargers and racked up 68 tackles, an interception, and five pass deflections. **John Keith '00 (Newnan, Ga.)**, a fourth round pick of the San Francisco 49ers in 2000, earned two starts at safety and totaled 18 tackles, a sack, and a interception before sustaining a broken arm in an overtime loss to the Oakland Raiders last year. Keith recently sustained a torn anterior cruciate ligament and is out for the entire 2001 season.

Former Paladin wide receiver **Des Kitchings '00**, a seventh round draft pick of the Kansas City Chiefs in 2000, was among the final players released by the New York Jets last week. Offensive tackle **Josh Moore '01** was released earlier by the Philadelphia Eagles.

LARAMIE, WY. -- Jarvis Wallum booted four field goals, including two in the second half, to lift the Wyoming Cowboys to a 20-14 season opening win over the visiting Furman Paladins in front of 14,167 fans at War Memorial Stadium.

In posting the victory, Wyoming, an NCAA I-AA member of the Mountain West Conference, snapped an eight-game losing streak dating back to the 2000 season. The loss was the second for NCAA I-AA sixth-ranked Furman in its last three season openers.

Trailing 14-7 at halftime, Furman tied the score at 14-14 when tailback Louis Ivory, the reigning Walter Payton Award winner in NCAA I-AA, broke loose on a 44-yard touchdown run with 3:23 left in the third quarter. Wyoming, however, answered on its next possession by moving 75 yards in 10 plays to set up Wallum's third field goal of the game, from 22 yards out, to give the Cowboys a 17-14 advantage with less than a minute remaining in the third period.

Wallum added his fourth field goal, a 28-yarder with 10:00 to go in the contest, to stretch the Cowboys' lead to 20-14.

On the ensuing possession, Furman drove from its 35 to the Wyoming 7, where on a third and four play Paladin wide receiver Bear Rinehart was tackled for a three-yard loss on a reverse. Instead of kicking the field goal, Furman went for a touchdown, but quarterback Billy Napier's pass to a slanting and open Rinehart in the end zone was low and incomplete.

Taking over possession with 6:10 remaining, Wyoming ground up the game clock by moving 73 yards in 12 plays to the Furman 17, where Wallum missed a 34-yard field goal attempt with only 17 seconds left in the game.

The Cowboys, who racked up 87 offensive plays to Furman's 58, amassed 422 yards in offense in the contest and were paced by sophomore quarterback Casey Bramlet, who completed 30-of-48 passes for 331 yards. Bramlet, who scored Wyoming's lone touchdown of the game on a 1-yard run in the second quarter to give the Cowboys a 14-7 lead, connected with sophomore wide receiver Ryan McGuffey on 10 passes for 134 yards.

Furman was paced offensively by Ivory, who rushed 19 times for 136 yards and one touchdown. Furman netted 349 yards in offense, including 169 from quarterback Billy Napier, who completed 12-of-24 passes in the contest, but the Paladins suffered two turnovers, including a fumble at the Cowboy 38 and an interception that led to a Wyoming field goal. Bear Rinehart paced all Paladin receivers with four receptions for 97 yards.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Louis Ivory rushed for 126 yards and two touchdowns to lead the NCAA I-AA nationally sixth-ranked Furman Paladins to a 46-7 win over the visiting Elon Phoenix at Paladin Stadium.

Ivory rushed 19 times and scored on runs of 2 and 8 yards while recording his eighth straight 100-yard performance and 22nd 100-yard outing of his career.

The win gave Furman (1-1) its 99th victory in Paladin Stadium since moving into the facility in 1981. It also marked the Paladins' second straight decision over Elon (0-2), which committed six turnovers.

Furman outgained Elon 452-180 and got a strong performance from junior quarterback Billy Napier, who connected on 12-of-19 passes for 192 yards and two touchdowns. Tight end Trent Sansbury led all Paladin receivers with five catches for 86 yards and a score.

Furman took advantage of a pair of Elon turnovers in the first quarter to race to a 21-0 lead.

An interception and 23-yard return by Shelvis Smith gave the Paladins the ball at Elon 19, and four plays later Napier hit Bear Rinehart on an 8-yard scoring strike to put Furman up 7-0 only three minutes into the game.

On its next possession, Furman moved 58 yards in nine plays to extend its lead to 14-0 following a 2-yard run by Ivory at the 4:53 mark.

A fumble recovery by Paladin defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling at the Elon 42 on the Phoenix's next possession set up another Furman score, which came on the next play when Napier connected with Sansbury on a 42-yard touchdown at the 1:53 juncture.

Elon trimmed Furman's lead to 21-7 with an 11-yard touchdown run by Martin Swindell with 10:38 left in the first half, but the Paladins answered with three Danny Marshall field goals covering 22, 33, and 28 yards to extend the lead to 30-7 by halftime.

Furman upped its margin to 37-7 on its first possession of the second half with an 8-yard scoring run by Ivory before benching its first team offense and defense in favor of reserves.

Reserve tailback Hindley Brigham tallied the Paladins' last score on a 65-yard touchdown run on the first rushing attempt of his career.
