## THE GAME

NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman opens Southern Conference play this Saturday when it travels to Lexington, Va., to take on VMI in the last meeting between the two longtime league rivals. VMI, which will depart the league at the end of the 2002-03 school year, joined the Southern Conference in 1924 and later welcomed Furman to the loop in 1936. Saturday's contest will also highlight Homecoming at VMI, which has dropped 20 straight to Furman since 1980. It will also mark the Paladins' third road game of the 2002 campaign.

## THE SERIES

Furman holds a 22-8 series advantage over VMI, and the Paladins enter Saturday's game riding a 20-game series winning streak over the Keydets dating back to the 1980 season. VMI's last win over Furman was a 21-20 decision in Lexington in 1979. Furman's 20-game series winning streak over VMI is the longest by the Paladins over an opponent in school history. Furman defeated VMI 65-7 last year in Greenville for the 100th win in Paladin Stadium since its opening in 1981. The Paladins topped the Keydets 35-21 during the 2000 campaign in the last clash between the two programs in Lexington. In all games played in Lexington, Furman has posted a 9-5 mark against the Keydets. In Greenville, the Paladins own a 13-3 mark against VMI.

## LAST MEETING

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Free safety Josh Cooper's 85-yard fumble return for a touchdown keyed a 24-point second quarter outburst and helped lead NCAA I-AA nationally fourth-ranked Furman to a 65-7 rout of VMI.

The win, the Paladins' 20th straight over the Keydets, marked Furman's 100th victory in Paladin Stadium history, and the 65 points were the most since Furman routed Piedmont 69-0 in 1935. The triumph was also the Paladins' 10th consecutive home victory against Southern Conference opposition.

The Paladins wasted little time in beginning the scoring parade as Lamar Rembert blocked a Keydet punt on the game's first possession, and teammate James Thomas returned it 38 yards to the VMI 9. Two plays later tailback Louis Ivory covered three yards to put the Paladins ahead 7-0 less than three minutes into the contest.

With Furman leading 14-0, Cooper picked up a fumble by VMI's Pedro Garcia at 15 and raced untouched 85 yards for the touchdown to put the Paladins ahead 21-0 at the 14:15 mark of the second quarter.

An interception by Rodney Johnson on VMI's next possession led to 26-yard field goal by Danny Marshall that extended the lead to 24-0.

A blocked punt by Shelvis Smith at the Furman 43 led to the Paladins'

next score. After quarterback Billy Napier connected on a 41-yard pass to tight end Trent Sansbury to the Keydet 16, Louis Ivory ripped off a 13yard run to the 3, and Napier completed the 3-play, 57-yard drive with a 3yard touchdown run to make it 31-0 with 6:27 left in the half.

Furman capped its 24-point second period explosion with an 11-play, 69-yard drive that ended when backup tailback Toreico O'Neal scored on a 2-yard run of the last play of the first half to make it 38-0.

A 91-yard kickoff return by Brian Bratton to open the second half made it 45-0, and the Paladins later added a second kickoff return for a touchdown when Rembert bolted 79 yards following VMI's only score of the game to give Furman a 58-7 advantage.

Furman, which outgained VMI 435-223, got 100 yards on 10 carries and a touchdown from Ivory, who exited the game midway through the second period in favor of reserves. For Ivory, the 100-yard performance was his ninth straight and the 23rd of his career. Reserve tailback Hindley Brigham paced all Paladin rushers with eight carries for 106 yards and a touchdown.

#### **NOTING THE PALADINS**

▶ VIRGINIA: PART II...Having toppled Richmond 17-7 on Saturday in the first meeting between the Paladins and Spiders since 1977, Furman returns to Virginia for a second straight week to play VMI in the last meeting between the two longtime Southern Conference rivals before the Keydets' departure from the league at the end of this school year. The last time Furman played back-to-back games in Virginia was 1966: vs. George Washington (28-49) and Richmond (14-24).

SUCCESS VERSUS THE OLD DOMINION...Since 1980, Furman has gone 29-2 versus teams from Virginia, and the Paladins are currently riding an 11-game winning streak against teams from the Old Dominion. Over two thirds of Furman's 29 victories over Virginia programs since 1980 have been registered against VMI (20-0), with the others coming over Liberty (3-0), James Madison (2-0), William & Mary (3-2), and Richmond (1-0). The Tribe's 28-26 triumph over the Paladins in Greenville in 1994 marked the last time a team from Virginia downed Furman. Since that contest, Furman has recorded back-to-back wins (52-6 in 1999; 34-10 in 2000) over the Tribe, as well as eight straight victories over VMI to run its winning streak to 11. William & Mary's 38-28 win over Furman in Williamsburg in 1990 marks the last time the Paladins lost a football game

in Virginia.

**THE LONG AND WINDING ROAD**...At the rate Furman has logged highway miles this year, the Paladins probably should look into buying a bus company. After rolling up over 700 miles in its season opener against Vanderbilt in Nashville on Sept. 7, the Paladins added over 800 miles to the odometer over the weekend on their trip to Richmond, and this week Furman will travel over 700 miles round trip to take on VMI in the Paladins' Southern Conference season opener. All told, by next Saturday night, Furman will have traveled over 2,200 miles in September to play three away games.

▶ QUICK STARTS IN SOCON...Furman has gone 7-0 in Southern Conference season openers since 1995 and 13-1 in league season inaugurals since 1988. Going back to 1980, the Paladins have compiled a 20-2 worksheet in conference openers. The last setback in a league lid lifter happened in 1994 with a 35-24 loss to Western Carolina in Greenville. Furman's most frequent victim in its 22 league season openers since 1988 has been VMI (11-0). Other Furman season opening opponents over the last 22 years include Marshall (2-0), East Tennessee State (2-0), Appalachian State (1-0), Chattanooga (1-0), Western Carolina (3-2).

▶ NCAA I-AA ROAD WARRIORS...Counting Saturday's 17-7 win over Richmond, Furman is now 6-1 against NCAA I-AA road opposition in its last seven games and an 11-4 against divisional foes since 1999.

► STREAKING AT HOME...Furman's 57-7 triumph over Elon on Sept. 14 extended the Paladins' home winning streak to nine games and also improved the program's regular season home winning streak to 18 games dating back to 1999. Last year Furman went 8-0 at home and, along the way, recorded the 100th victory in Paladin Stadium history with a 65-7 triumph over VMI. Last year's perfect 8-0 slate marked the program's second undefeated home campaign (1988) since Furman moved into Paladin Stadium in 1981. Furman, which sports a 107-28-1 record (.790) in 21-plus seasons of play in the beautiful facility, also owns a school record, 13-game home winning streak against Southern Conference opposition.

**KEEP THE FLAG IN YOUR POCKET**...Furman was not penalized in Saturday's 17-7 win over Richmond. The Paladins' penalty-free outing against the Spiders was the first since 1995, when Furman went unflagged in a 24-3 win over The Citadel in Charleston. The Paladins have been the Southern Conference's least penalized team since 1999.

► **DEFENSIVE IMPROVEMENT**...After being gored for 49 points and 557 yards in its season opening loss to Vanderbilt, Furman's young defense recorded its second straight solid performance against Richmond, yielding only seven points and 249 total yards while also putting up an impressive second half goal line stand that stopped a Spiders' scoring threat at the one-foot line. Through three games Furman is yielding 21.0 points and 356.0 yards per game. The Paladins' defense includes only two seniors in the starting lineup: defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling (Decatur, Ga.) and cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.). A year ago Furman started nine seniors on defense and ranked first in the league in rushing defense (124.8 ypg), second in scoring defense (14.0 ppg), and third in total defense (273.6 ypg).

NAPIER EFFICIENT WITH ARM, PLAYING TIME....Senior All-Southern Conference quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.) had his third straight solid passing outing of the 2002 campaign on Saturday in the Paladins' 17-7 triumph over Richmond, completing 19-of-26 passes for 219 yards. Despite losing speedy sophomore split end Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.) to a fractured collarbone late in the first quarter, Napier and the rest of Furman's receiving corps regrouped to lead the Paladins to the win. Napier's 219-yard passing outing against Richmond (246 yards when including 27 rushing yards and touchdown) followed an outstanding 237-yard, four-touchdown performance in a 57-7 triumph over Elon on Sept. 14 — a contest that saw him register just 17 snaps and complete only 8-of-10 passes before exiting the game early in the second quarter with the Paladins ahead 42-0. His passing efficiency rating against Elon of 411.08 shattered Furman and Southern Conference single game standards. The previous school standard of 318.92 had been held by Justin Hill, who went 9-for-9 for 156 yards and two touchdowns in a 48-21 win over East Tennessee State in 1999. The previous league single game standard or 404.78 had been held by VMI's Tony Scales, who completed 9-of-12 passes for 314 yards and four TDs against William & Mary in 1990. After throwing for a career high 241 yards in the season opener against Vanderbilt, Napier in three games has connected on 48-of-67 pass attempts (71.6%) for 697 yards and four touchdowns, which translates into an outstanding 175.74 efficiency rating.

NORE ON NAPIER...A year ago senior quarterback **Billy Napier** (Chatsworth, Ga.) was labeled in the preseason as the only significant question mark on an otherwise veteran team. Twelve wins, a league title, and a national runnerup finish later, questions about Napier's abilities are now extinct. A consensus second team All-Southern Conference choice in 2001 and the son of high school coach, Napier delivered solid play, completing 62.3 percent of his passes (129x207) for 1,772 yards and 10 TDs in 2001. Included in his campaign was a perfect 12-of-12, 159-yard, TD performance in a 24-17 win over Georgia Southern in NCAA I-AA semifinal playoff action in Statesboro that snapped the Eagles' 39-game home winning streak. He is the latest in a long line of outstanding Furman quarterbacks who, since 1978, have combined to garner 12 all-conference citations, and it's no coincidence that over the past 23 seasons the Paladins have won 11 league championships. Heading into the Saturday's game at VMI, Napier ranks 10th on Furman's career passing yardage chart and 12th in career passing touchdowns. His 219-yard passing performance against Richmond moved him ahead of former Paladin standout and current Furman offensive coordinator Tim Sorrells (2,945 yards, 1977-81) on the school's career passing yards ledger.

▶ "AIR" FURMAN...For a program that's made plenty of championship hay over the past 25 years by running the football, and only two years ago produced NCAA I-AA's leading rusher in Walter Payton Award winning tailback Louis Ivory (2,079 yards), it's definitely news to see the Paladins getting it done offensively — and in a big way — through the air, but that's exactly what first year head coach **Bobby Lamb** has signaled a willingness to do this fall with the senior quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.) and a host of talented and experienced receivers led by senior flanker Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.). Last year Furman's run/pass ratio was 69.2% vs. 30.8%. Through three games this year Furman is still running the football more than passing it (62.6% vs. 37.3%), but those figures may be somewhat misleading due to the fact that the Paladins pretty much abandoned the passing game in the second half of its Sept. 14 game against Elon after racing to a 49-0 halftime lead, mainly on the strength of a lethal passing attack that generated 318 yards and five touchdown passes in the game's first two quarters.

BIG CHALLENGE IN RECEIVING CORPS...Furman heads into Saturday's Southern Conference season opener against VMI facing its first big personnel challenge of the season as a result of injury. Sophomore split end Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.) will be sidelined anywhere from three to six weeks after sustaining a fractured collarbone late in the first quarter of Saturday's 17-7 win over Richmond. The loss of West is significant as in Furman's first two games he had accounted for 10 receptions for 242 yards and three touchdowns, including three touchdowns covering 78, 71, and 11 yards in the Paladins' 57-7 dismantling of Elon on Sept. 14. Fortunately for Furman, the team's best depth is located in the receiving corps, where the Paladins sport a pair of experienced seniors in Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.) and James Thomas (Marianna, Fla.). In addition, sophomore speedster Brian Bratton (Evans, Ga.), who had an impressive preseason following an All-America freshman campaign as a return specialist, will likely be West's replacement in the starting lineup. He stepped up with five receptions for 60 yards against Richmond.

**THE BEAR ROARS**...Senior All-Southern Conference flanker **Bear** Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.), who headlines an experienced Furman receiving corps, is off to a solid start in 2002. Against Vanderbilt in the season opener, he caught seven passes for 127 yards. In the Paladins' 57-7 whitewash of Elon he collected four passes for 58 yards and his first touchdown of the season. In Saturday's 17-7 win over Richmond, he came up especially big, catching a career high nine passes for 94 yards while steadying the Paladin receiving corps following the departure of starting split end Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.) to injury. The nine catches represented the fifth best single game total in school history. A very accomplished guitarist and singer/songwriter, Rinehart, who is nicknamed for legendary Alabama coach Paul "Bear" Bryant, appears well on the way to finishing his career ranked among the school's all-time leaders in receptions, receiving yards, and touchdown receptions. He also returns punts for Furman and has averaged a solid 13.5 yards per return on four attempts this year.

THIS 'N THAT...Furman's 327 passing yards versus Elon on Sept. 14 represented the seventh highest single game passing total in school history. Senior quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.) completed 8-of-10 passes for 237 yards and four touchdowns while sophomore backup Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.) hit on 5-of-7 attempts for 90 yards and a score. The five touchdown passes were the most by a Paladin squad since 1991, when Hugh Swilling tossed a school record five scores in a 46-28 win over VMI. Isaac West's three-reception, 160-yard, three-touchdown performance against Elon marked the eighth best single game receiving yards mark in school history and his 78-yard touchdown catch on Furman's first play of the game represented Billy Napier's longest career toss, the 12th longest pass in school history, and longest pass by a Paladin since 1998, when quarterback Justin Hill connected with Des Kitchings on an 87yard scoring strike in 51-24 win over VMI. West's 53.3 yards per catch also marked the third best game per catch average in Southern Conference history. Furman converted its first two-point conversion in five years against Elon when offensive guard John Marks (Fort Mill, S.C.) gathered in a deflected pass by Jeremiah Van Dora (Hartwell, Ga.) with just over four minutes to go in the game. Marks' conversion was the first for the Paladins since tailback Ernest Crosby ran for two points in a 24-22 Furman win over Appalachian State in Greenville during the 1997 season. Furman's 57-7 win over Elon on Sept. 14 marked the first win over head coach Bobby Lamb's career. The two-hour kickoff delay against Elon due to lightning marked the second time in Paladin Stadium history a game had been delayed or interrupted by adverse weather conditions. The Furman-Elon game ended at 11:19 EDT and is believed to be the latest finish to a Furman game played in the eastern time zone. In ringing up the Phoenix for 35 points in the first guarter, Furman matched the most prolific guarter scoring standard in school history first set against Davidson in Greenville in 1982 (63-14 win). Furman's 49-point first half represented the highest first half scoring total in school history.

PALADINS IN PRESEASON POLLS...A consensus preseason

third place Southern Conference pick by league head coaches and media, Furman also earned a No. 7 national ranking in the Sports Network NCAA I-AA football preseason poll. The Paladins entered the 2001 campaign as a consensus No. 2 league pick and a No. 6 national ranking, but Furman managed to top the prognosticators by earning a share of the conference crown on the way to a 12-3 record, NCAA I-AA national runnerup finish, and No. 2 final national ranking.

NINE PALADINS NAMED PRESEASON ALL-SOCON...Nine Furman Paladins have been named to the Southern Conference coaches preseason all-league team. They include first team selections Steven Cain (Anderson, S.C.), offensive guard Trevor Kruger (Moultrie, Ga.), tight end Willis Sudderth (Lilburn, Ga.), cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.), and return specialist Brian Bratton (Evans, Ga.). Second team picks include quarterback Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.), wide receiver Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.), defensive tackle LeByran Sperling (Decatur, Ga.), and placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.).

► **THE EXPERIENCE FACTOR**...With only 11 starters returning off last year's squad that went 12-3, won a share of the Southern Conference championship, and finished as NCAA I-AA national runnerup, Furman has set about filling several shoes — and several quality ones at that. Eleven allconference performers and five All-Americans graduated, including tailback **Louis Ivory**, the school's all-time leading rusher (5,353 yards, 53 TDs, 6.3 ypc) and middle linebacker **Will Bouton** (445 tackles, 50 starts). In addition, three All-American offensive linemen (and 135 career starts) are gone — center **Chris Stewart**, guard **Marty Priore**, and tackle **Donnie Littlejohn**, who garnered the league's Jacobs Blocking Award — as well as two-time all-conference tight end **Trent Sansbury** and three allconference veterans in the secondary: cornerback **Richie Jackson** and safeties **Shelvis Smith** and **Josh Cooper**. The departure of quality is significant, as is the overall level of experience as evidenced by the chart below:

**TAILBACK BY COMMITTEE**...After watching two-time All-America tailback **Louis Ivory** run into the record books last year with a Southern Conference leading 1,492 yards and 19 TDs, Furman fills its high profile backfield slot with three juniors and a redshirt freshman in 2002: Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.), Lamar Rembert (Ocala, Fla.), Toreico O'Neal (Barnesville, Ga.), Brandon Mays (Arden, N.C.). Last year when lvory was forced to the sideline with a knee injury late in the Paladins' 24-20 first round playoff win over Western Kentucky, the trio of Brigham, Rembert, and O'Neal stepped up to combine for 299 yards and three touchdowns the following week in a 34-17 triumph over previously undefeated Lehigh. Through three games, Brigham, Mays, O'Neal, and Rembert have combined to rush for 328 yards and two touchdowns (109.3 ypg). Brigham led all Paladin rushers in the win over Richmond with 14 carries for 60 yards and a touchdown, and he's the Paladins' leading rusher on the season with 158 yards and a solid 6.3 yards per carry average. Counting his 2001 regular season campaign, he's rushed 42 times for 388 yards and three touchdowns, which works out to an outstanding 9.2 yards per carry.

▶ THE CONTRAST IS CLEAR...Last year no fullback in the Furman program could claim one play of experience at the collegiate level heading into the season. This year, the Paladins have three experienced sophomore fullbacks in Eric Emerson (Newnan, Ga.), Al Means (Charlotte, N.C.), and Corey Tant (Easley, S.C.). Emerson started in all 15 games last year and rushed for 218 yards and six touchdowns in the regular season. Means, meanwhile, ran for 129 yards and three scores, including a game winning 19-yard, fourth quarter touchdown burst in a 24-20 triumph over Western Kentucky in NCAA I-AA first round playoff action.

▶ HE'S THE MAN NOW...With the departure of head coach Bobby Johnson, the new top "Johnson" in the Furman program is senior cornerback Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.). As outstanding a person as he is a football player, Johnson is the only returning regular in the Paladin secondary, which graduated three All-Southern Conference performers. Selected by his teammates as a team co-captain. Johnson returned from a season ending knee injury in the first game of the 2000 campaign to reclaim his starting job and proceeded to register 43 tackles, three tackles-for-loss, a pair of interceptions, and seven pass deflections last year. An excellent cover man and preseason all-league pick by conference head coaches, he has already recorded a pair of interceptions this year to up his career pickoffs total to six. He's also a two-time Verizon District III All-Academic selection.

► KRUGER, CAIN CARRY LOAD ON OL...After saying goodbye to 135 career starts from three All-America offensive linemates last year (174 if including tight end Trent Sansbury), senior right guard Trevor Kruger (Moultrie, Ga.) and senior right tackle Steven Cain (Anderson, S.C.) are being counted on heavily this year. A major plus is both players are regarded by Southern Conference head coaches as tops at their respective positions as indicated by their selection to the preseason allleague team. Cain, in particular, has already gained the attention on NFL scouts and checks in as Furman's biggest player at 6-foot-5, 310 pounds. Cain also ranks as one of the Paladins' strongest players in the weight room with a bench press of 415 pounds, a squat of 500 pounds, and a power clean lift of 352 pounds (in spring testing).

► ONE RECEPTION...A year ago Furman tight ends **Trent Sansbury** and **Willis Sudderth (Lilburn, Ga.)** combined to register 37 receptions for 489 yards, and a pair of touchdowns between them. The only problem is Sansbury, a graduated two-time All-Southern Conference performer, accounted for 36 of the 37 receptions and both touchdowns. That left Furman with only one career reception (and no career starts) in its returning tight end corps, which now sports Sudderth, a sophomore, and redshirt freshman John Rust (Burlington, N.C.). Sudderth has started in the Paladins' first three games and is coming off a two-reception performance against Richmond. Rust, meanwhile, had two receptions for 23 yards in the Paladins' win over Elon.

▶ KICK IT DEEP (IF YOU DARE)...A year ago Brian Bratton (Evans, Ga.) earned Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Year and All-America honors after leading NCAA I-AA in kickoff returns, averaging 37.2 yards on 14 returns, three of which he ran back for touchdowns. Bratton recorded his first kickoff return for a score in a 65-7 win over VMI, covering 91 yards. Later, in a key matchup against nationally fifth-ranked Appalachian State, he took the opening kickoff back 100 yards to help propel Furman to a 28-22 win. And in the Paladins' 45-14 whitewash of Wofford, he notched his second 100-yard return (and third touchdown of the season). Bratton was so effective in 2001 that many opponents simply chose to pooch kick it short or out of bounds, often giving the Paladins excellent field position. Bratton's kickoff return exploits follow on the heels of another great Paladin kick returner, Des Kitchings (1996-99), who returned three kickoffs for touchdowns in 1999 on the way to earning All-America honors. All told, Furman has returned seven kickoffs for touchdowns over the last three-plus seasons.

▶ SPERLING IS STERLING...Although not blessed with the experienced depth like last year, Furman's defensive front is headed up by senior tackle LeBryan Sperling (Decatur, Ga.), who serves as a team cocaptain. Sperling earned second team All-Southern Conference honors last year, and he's been tabbed by league head coaches to the 2002 preseason all-league team. In 10 regular season starts last year, Sperling tallied 37 tackles, including seven-for-loss, three sacks, and a fumble recovery to help headline a Paladin defense that paced the league in rushing defense (124.8 ypg) and finished second in scoring defense (14.0 ppg).

NEW CROP OF FURMAN LBs...No area in the Furman program was hit harder by graduation than at linebacker, where the Paladins said goodbye to all three starters and a combined 105 career starts, including 50 by All-America and two-time Southern Conference defensive player-ofthe-year **Will Bouton**. While no one expects Furman to be as strong at linebacker as they were a year ago, at least in the early going, the new crop of Paladin linebackers already possess some quality playing time and have the makings of being even stronger athletically than their predecessors. At middle linebacker senior Andrew Knight (Snellville, Ga.) and sophomore Mike Killian (Atlanta, Ga.) are attempting to fill Bouton's shoes. Last year Knight registered 37 tackles while Killian, who played linebacker in high school, notched 42 tackles, a pair of sacks, and a fumble recovery in nine starts at defensive end. Taking over for graduated strong side linebacker John Thrift is junior Keito Whetstone (Orangeburg, S.C.), and at the weak side post sophomore Cedrick Ritter (Fairfax, S.C.) is the heir to Sterling Frierson. Whetstone (30 tackles in '01), a two-year letterman, started for an injured Thrift versus Montana, and Ritter was very impressive in a backup role, totaling 43 tackles four tackles-for-loss, two sacks, and a pair of interceptions in 2001.

► **THE MARSHALL PLAN**...Furman's placekicking chores are handled by junior **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)**, who earned second team All-Southern Conference honors a year ago after converting 10-of-12 field goals (.833). Marshall, who at one point a year ago extended a consecutive made field goals streak to a school record 12 straight, has converted 3-of-4 field goal tries and all nine PAT attempts this year, with his only miss being a 51-yard attempt against Richmond. He already ranks sixth on Furman's career kick scoring chart with 176 points, having knocked down 26-of-33 field goals (.788) and 98-of-104 PATs (.942).

▶ **BLOODLINES**...Furman starting junior defensive end **Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.)** is the son of former University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back **George Rogers**.

**KEEPING IT IN THE FAMILY**...Redshirt freshman linebacker Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.) is the brother of former Clemson All-America linebacker Chad Carson. Andrew's father, Tom Carson, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, Earle Carson, was an end, three-year letterman, and an honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, M.A. Carson, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, **Tom Carson**, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and threeyear letterman who serve as captain of Furman's 1931 squad. Sophomore placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Redshirt freshman cornerback Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.) is the son of former Furman wide receiver Norman MacDonald (1972-74). Sophomore tight end Will Keller (Clayton, Ga.) is the nephew of former Paladins fullback Elliott Keller (1962-63), who led the league in rushing in 1962 with 724 yards.

▶ FURMAN AND THE NFL...After starting the preseason with seven Furman products on NFL rosters, the Paladins are down to two. Linebacker Orlando Ruff '99 is in his fourth season with the San Diego Chargers, having started in all but one game at middle linebacker last year, where he totaled 60 tackles. Safety John Keith '00, was resigned by the San Francisco 49ers to their practice squad after being released by the team at the end of



preseason camp. Keith worked his way into the starting lineup as a rookie before sustaining a fractured forearm midway through the season, and last year he sustained torn knee ligaments on the opening kickoff in the first game of 2001 campaign. Cuts by NFL teams proved costly for six-year veteran **Luther Broughton '97** (Chicago Bears), wide receiver **Des Kitchings '00 (Indianapolis Colts)**, offensive tackle **Josh Moore '01** (Philadelphia Eagles), linebacker **Will Bouton '02** (Pittsburgh Steelers), and tight end **Trent Sansbury '02** (Carolina Panthers).

# Vanderbilt 49, Furman 18

September 7, 2002

GAME I

Attendance: 28,568

NASHVILLE, TENN. -- Quarterback Jay Cutler totaled 322 yards in offense and five touchdown responsibilities to lead the Vanderbilt Commodores to a 42-18 win over NCAA I-AA fourth-ranked Furman in front of 28,568 fans at Vanderbilt Stadium.

Cutler completed 11-of-14 passes for 215 yards and a pair of touchdowns to senior wide receiver Dan Stricker, and also rushed for 107 yards and three touchdowns, including a 61-yard third quarter sprint, to deliver to head coach Bobby Johnson his first victory at Vanderbilt after eight seasons as head coach at Furman.

The loss was the worst suffered by Furman since a 33-0 season opening setback in Clemson in 1998, and the 49 points were the most surrendered by a Paladin squad since a 58-28 loss to East Tennessee State in 1997. Furman committed three fumbles and yielded 557 yards to the Commodores, including 344 on the ground.

Vanderbilt wasted no time in taking the lead, capitalizing on a fumble recovery by Chuck Losey at the Furman 43 to set up a quick strike on the next play — the Commodores' first snap of the game. Cutler connected with tricker behind the Paladin secondary for a 43-yard touchdown to put Vanderbilt up 7-0 at the 13:15 mark.

Following a 41-yard Bo Moore punt to the Vanderbilt 2, the Commodores' got a key 10-yard run on a third down draw play by Ronald Hatcher to the 15. From there Cutler hit Stricker for 14 yards to the 29 and two plays later zipped his second scoring strike to Stricker for 59 yards to make it 14-0 at the 5:51 juncture.

Furman answered on its next possession, moving 64 yards on 13 plays to the Vanderbilt 14, where Danny Marshall booted a 31-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter to make it 21-3. Marshall's field goal, however, proved to be a mild solace for the Paladins, who failed to convert a first and goal situation at the Vanderbilt 4. Two straight losses backed Furman up to the 9, and a delay of game penalty pushed it back to the 14, where quarterback Billy Napier's fade pass in the end zone failed.

A second Paladin fumble led to the Commodores' third touchdown of the game. Fielding a punt at his own 13, Bear Rinehart raced up the middle and broke outside for a 26-yard return, but Jonathan Straub stripped the ball and it was recovered by Vanderbilt's Nick Getter at the Furman 39. From there Vanderbilt covered the distance in eight plays before Cutler scored on a 1-yard dive for a 21-3 Vanderbilt advantage.

The Commodores finished off an impressive first half with a 6-play, 78-yard drive that Cutler completed on a 12-yard draw with only 11 seconds left in the half for a 28-3 margin.

The Paladins scored first in the second half, getting a 22-yard Marshall field goal to close the gap to 28-6, but Vanderbilt responded a little over a minute later with Cutler's 61-yard run to give the Commodores a 35-6 advantage.

Furman used a 1-yard touchdown plunge by fullback AI Means and a 2-yard scoring run from Napier to close the gap to 35-18, but Vanderbilt effectively ended any Paladin comeback bid when Noval McKenzie eluded a host of defenders with a 57-yard touchdown run at the 10:49 juncture of the fourth quarter to make it 42-18.

Napier paced Furman offensively, completing 21-of-31 passes for 241 yards. His favorite target was senior flanker Bear Rinehart, who nabbed seven receptions for 127 yards, and sophomore split end Isaac West, who had seven catches for 82 yards. Junior tailback Hindley Brigham headed up Furman's ground game with 70 yards on seven carries.

# Furman 57, Elon 7

September 14, 2002

Paladin Stadium

GAME

Attendance: 4,680

GREENVILLE -- A two-hour lightning delay didn't faze NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman as quarterback Billy Napier threw for 237 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Paladins to a 57-7 romp over Elon and hand head coach Bobby Lamb his first collegiate victory.

Napier, a senior from Chatsworth, Ga., connected with split end Issac West on three of his four touchdown strikes, including a 78-yarder on the Paladins' first offensive play to give Furman a quick 7-0 lead. The duo later hooked up on scoring tosses covering 71 and 11 yards to help put the Paladins ahead 35-0 after the first quarter.

"I told the guys in the locker room that we should start every game at 9:00 p.m.," said Lamb after his team was forced to wait two hours before kickoff due to lightning and heavy rains. "I was really proud of the defense after what happened last week (Furman's 49-18 loss to Vanderbilt). Offensively our plan was to go up top. When Billy hit Isaac striding, that really got us going and jump started us for a big first half."

"It was bang, bang, bang so quickly in the first quarter that we really didn't have much of a chance to get in the game," said Elon coach Al Seagraves. "They gashed us and took us to the wood shed early."

Furman's 35-point first quarter matched the highest scoring quarter in school history, and West's three touchdown receptions tied a school record held by two others. Napier, who completed 8-of-10 passes, exited the game along with many of Furman's offensive starters early in the second quarter after fullback AI Means' 1-yard touchdown plunge put the Paladins ahead 42-0 at the 12:11 mark.

The Paladins, who found the end zone on their first six possessions, closed out the first half scoring outburst when backup quarterback Bo Moore connected with Brian Bratton on a 9-yard touchdown pass with 0:36 left to make it 49-0.

Elon avoided the shutout when James Murdaugh hit Kyle Belkoski on a 23-yard touchdown pass with 1:32 left in the game.

Furman, which turned to reserves for the entire second half, rolled up 542 yards in offense, including 327 through the air. West's three receptions went for touchdowns and accounted for 160 yards, and redshirt freshman tailback Brandon Mays paced all rushers with 88 yards on 15 carries.

# Furman 17, Richmond 7

September 21, 2002

University of Richmond Stadium Attendance: 7,189

RICHMOND,VA. -- Billy Napier threw for 219 yards and rushed for 27 yards and a key fourth quarter touchdown to lead NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman to a 17-7 win over 22nd-ranked Richmond at University of Richmond Stadium.

Napier, a senior from Chatsworth, Ga., and the Southern Conference's top rated passer, completed 19-of-26 passes to pace Furman's offense, but it was his 1-yard sneak into the end zone with 10:38 left in the game that broke open a 10-7 contest and gave the Paladins a 17-7 lead. Furman's decisive drive covered 69 yards in 10 plays and included a 32-yard run by tailback Toreico O'Neal to the Spiders 3-yard line.

The key fourth quarter score came two possessions after the Paladins stopped Richmond on downs as the Furman I. Trailing 10-7, the Spiders' Danny Young picked off a Billy Napier pass and returned it 11 yards to the Paladins 34. Three plays later quarterback D'Arcy Wills connected with Dan McNair for 20 yards to the Furman 8. Two rushes by Lee Williams and a run by Wills moved the ball at the I, but Wills was stopped a foot short of the goal line on fourth down.

In the first meeting between the Paladins and Spiders since 1977, Furman grabbed an early 7-0 after taking the opening kickoff and moving 71 yards in 11 plays for a 4-yard touchdown run by tailback Hindley Brigham.

Richmond answered on its first possession by marching 81 yards in 15 plays for a 1-yard touchdown plunge by Wills to knot the game at 7-7.

Late in the first quarter Furman suffered a big blow when sophomore split end Isaac West, the Southern Conference's leading receiver, sustained a fractured collarbone. West, who last week caught three touchdown passes in the Paladins' 57-7 win over Elon, will be out from three to six weeks.

With its speedy wide receiver out of the contest, the Paladins turned to senior All-Southern Conference flanker Bear Rinehart, and the Seneca, S.C., native responded with a career high nine receptions for 94 yards, including a pair of catches covering 25 yards to help set up a 39-yard Danny Marshall field goal midway through the second quarter to give Furman a 10-7 advantage.

Furman's goal line stand highlighted a scoreless third quarter that saw the Paladins' offense saddled with poor field position, starting a pair of drives at the 3 and 1 yard lines.

Not until its third possession of the second half was Furman able to grab good field position following a 10-yard punt return by Rinehart to the Paladin 31, which initiated the Paladins' decisive 69-yard touchdown drive.

Furman outgained Richmond 385-249 and displayed solid balance, rushing for 166 yards and passing for 219. Other than one interception, the Paladins played error free football and recorded their first penalty free game since the 1995 season in a 24-3 win over The Citadel in Charleston. Furman has been the least penalized team in the conference over the last three years.

Brigham paced all rushers with 60 yards on 14 carries, and sophomore Brian Bratton stepped in for the injured West to nab five catches for 60 yards. Sophomore linebackers Mike Killian and Cedrick Ritter paced Furman's defensive effort with 11 and 10 tackles respectively, with Ritter also adding a tackle-for-loss, a fumble recovery, and a pass deflection.
