**FURMAN LAST TIME OUT**

GREENVILLE, S.C. (Nov. 23) -- Hindley Brigham rushed for 114 yards and two touchdowns to power NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 35-7 Southern Conference win over Chattanooga Saturday afternoon at Paladin Stadium.

Brigham, a junior tailback from Birmingham, Ala., scored on runs of 1 and 58 yards to help Furman take control of the contest and post its eighth straight win over Chattanooga. The victory also earned Furman a bid to the NCAA I-AA playoffs — the Paladins' school record fourth straight and 12th overall.

"This was a scary game coming in because Chattanooga had won their last two and had nothing to lose, but I thought we handled it well after a slow start," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We got a big turnover in the third quarter, and that jump started our offense and we played well after that. Our defense played extremely well."

"We couldn't get our rhythm going in the first quarter," said Chattanooga head coach Donnie Kirkpatrick. "The Furman defense played well. I can see why Furman is the No. 1 pass defense in the league. I wish we could have had a better showing."

A 7-yard touchdown pass from Billy Napier to Isaac West on the Paladins' first possession gave Furman a 7-0 lead at the 10:52 mark of the first quarter.

Chattanooga battled back to tie the game after moving 90 yards in 18 plays for a 5-yard touchdown pass from Ryan McCann to Jason Jones at the 6:52 juncture of the second quarter.

Furman, however, regained the lead a short while later after defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling recovered a fumble at the UTC 35. A 19-yard pass from Napier to Isaac West moved the Paladins to the 1 before Brigham ran off right guard into the end zone to give Furman a 14-7 lead with only 37 seconds remaining in the half.

The Paladins capitalized on another Chattanooga turnover in the third quarter to add to its advantage. An interception and 26-yard return by cornerback Rodney Johnson to the UTC 30 led to a 1-yard touchdown run by fullback Corey Tant to make it 21-7.

Furman padded its lead later with a 58-yard run by Brigham off an option pitch and a 5-yard touchdown pass by backup quarterback Bo Moore to split end James Thomas.

Furman outgained Chattanooga 339-219 in total offense and rolled up 240 yards on the ground to the Mocs' 54. The Paladins also recorded a season high three sacks.

Paladin quarterback Billy Napier, who completed 12-of-15 passes for 94 yards and a score, hit sophomore split end Isaac West for six completions for 70 yards. Senior flanker Bear Rinehart, meanwhile, caught five passes for 24 yards to establish a new Furman season receptions record, eclipsing the previous standard of 53 receptions set by Robbie Hahn in 1967. The Seneca, S.C., product now has 58 receptions on the year.

Furman's defense, which did not allow UTC to cross midfield in the second half, was paced by sophomore linebacker Mike Killian with eight tackles.

**NOTING THE PALADINS**

✧ **FACTS ABOUT FURMAN**...Founded in 1826 and located in Greenville, S.C., Furman University, a private liberal art institution, is ranked as one of the 50 finest liberal arts colleges in the country by *U.S. News and World Report*. Furman's 2,600 students, who represent 46 states and 39 countries, enjoy a collegiate experience on a 750-acre campus that was recently listed by the American Society of Landscape Architects as one of America's 362 most beautifully landscaped places. Furman graduates have excelled in many field, and among a few of the notables are **John Broadus Watson**, the "father of behavioral psychology"; **Charles Townes**, Nobel-Prize winning inventor of the laser and maser; **Richard W. Riley**, former United States Department of Education Secretary; **Keith Lockhart**, the conductor of the Boston Pops; **Betsy King** and **Beth Daniel**, LPGA Hall-of-Fame members; and **Mark Sanford**, South Carolina's governor elect. A member of the Southern Conference since 1936, Furman boasts a 17-sport intercollegiate athletics program that ranks among the finest in the country. Within the past year the university's football, men's soccer, women's soccer, men's tennis, women's tennis, and women's golf teams have participated in NCAA Tournament play, and during the 2001-02 school year 29 Furman student-athletes earned All-America honors. On Feb. 13, 1954, Furman's Frank Selvy scored an NCAA record 100 points in a 149-95 win over Newberry.

✧ **PLAYOFF PALADINS**...Furman's trip to the 2002 NCAA I-AA playoffs marks its fourth straight and 12th overall appearance in postseason play: 1982, '83, '85, '86, '88, '89, '90, '96, '99, '00, '01, and '02. Furman won the 1988 national championship, defeating Georgia Southern 17-12 in Pocatello, Idaho.

✧ **HOME-AWAY-NEUTRAL IN PLAYOFFS**...Furman's 14-10 ledger in NCAA I-AA playoff action includes a 9-6 home record and a 4-2 road mark. The Paladins are 1-2 in three neutral site playoff clashes (two against Georgia Southern and one versus Montana in national championship games).

✧ **SOCON RULES SUPREME IN NCAA I-AA PLAYOFFS**...Eight Southern Conference teams have combined to post a league best 66-38 record (.635) in NCAA I-AA playoff competition since the conference was reclassified to I-AA in 1982. In first round games SoCon teams are 29-12 (.707). Overall the league has placed a team in the championship game four straight years (and nine of the last 11) and owns five national championships — tops among NCAA I-AA conferences.

✧ **ELITE COMPANY (OF ONE)**...Furman is the only private school to ever win an NCAA I-AA national championship, which the Paladins captured in 1988 by defeating Georgia Southern 17-12 in Pocatello, Idaho.

✧ **SOCON TITLE TROVE**...Furman has won 11 Southern Conference football championships through the years — more than any school in the conference's 80-year football history. The Paladins' claimed league titles in 1978, '80, '81, '82, '83, '85, '88, '89, '90, '99, and '01.

✧ **FURMAN VERSUS THE ATLANTIC 10**...Furman is 3-2 in NCAA I-AA playoff action versus teams that are now members of the Atlantic 10 Conference. Furman defeated A-10 member Rhode Island 59-15 in the 1985 quarterfinals when the Rams were a member of the now defunct Yankee Conference. Three years later the Paladins trimmed Yankee Conference member Delaware 21-7 in first round action; and, a year later in 1989, Furman knocked off William & Mary 24-10 in a first round contest after the Tribe had emerged from the Yankee Conference. Furman has dropped its last two playoff contests against teams that now comprise the Atlantic 10: a 31-23 overtime loss to Massachusetts in 1999 and 31-24 loss

to Hofstra in 2000, although the Pride at that time was an independent.

🔪 **QUICK HITS: THE UTC GAME**...The 35-7 win over Chattanooga marked Furman's eighth straight win over the Mocs and 16th Southern Conference home victory in its last 17 games. With five receptions for 24 yards against Chattanooga, senior All-Southern Conference flanker **Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.)** set a new Furman single season receptions record, breaking the old standard of 53 catches set by Robbie Hahn in 1967. Furman notched a season high three sacks versus Chattanooga and recorded a pair of interceptions to add to its league lead in pickoffs (17). Redshirt freshman linebacker **William Freeman (Swansea, S.C.)**, who had one of Furman's three sacks, was named SoCon Freshman-of-the-Week, and senior cornerback **Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.)** garnered league defensive player-of-the-week accolades after tallying six tackles and an interception, which he returned 26 yards to set up a third quarter touchdown. Junior tailback **Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.)** rushed for a career high 114 yards and two touchdowns against Chattanooga. Brigham's work against the Mocs marked only the second 100-yard rushing performance of the year for Furman, which last year tallied 13 100-yard efforts. Chattanooga's 54 rushing yards on 27 attempts represented a season low for a Furman opponent. The Mocs failed to cross midfield in the second half against the Paladin defense.

🔪 **COIN FLIP CONUNDRUM**...Furman is only 2-9 in coin flips this year; consequently, the Paladins have only received the football to start the second half in only two games (vs. East Tennessee State and Chattanooga).

🔪 **GETTING THE UPPERHAND EARLY**...Due in some measure to its bad luck on coin flips but also to solid early game defensive work, Furman has proven to be a pretty good first quarter team this year, outscoring the opposition 98-31 over the first 15 minutes. When Georgia Southern scored a touchdown to take a 7-0 lead six minutes into the Nov. 9 game with Furman, it marked the first touchdown yielded by the Paladins in the first quarter since the Richmond game on Sept. 21. Prior to the Georgia Southern contest, Furman had outscored its previous five foes 49-3 in the first quarter.

🔪 **SUCCESSFUL SENIOR CLASS**...Furman's 13 seniors have enjoyed noteworthy success during their four-year tenure, helping the Paladins to a 38-12 overall record (.760) and 26-6 Southern Conference mark (.813). Included in the span are four NCAA I-AA national Top 20 rankings, a school record four I-AA playoff appearances, two league championships (1999 & 01), and a national runnerup finish (2001). Furman's 26 Southern Conference wins since 1999 are the most in any four-year stretch of Paladin football.

🔪 **BLOWOUT AT FULLBACK**...Furman entered the 2002 season with three experienced fullbacks, but season ending injuries have emptied the cupboard and forced the Paladins to convert a former wide receiver and defensive back into new roles. The last of Furman's trio of experienced fullbacks to go down was sophomore **Corey Tant (Easley, S.C.)**, who suffered a concussion while throwing a key block on a 58-yard touchdown run by tailback **Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.)** in last Saturday's 35-7 win over Chattanooga. For Tant the concussion ended his career as it is his fourth in three seasons. Tant's injury came after starting sophomore fullback **Eric Emerson (Newnan, Ga.)** exited the Georgia Southern game on Nov. 9 with a torn anterior cruciate in his right knee. Emerson's departure followed a season ending injury to sophomore **Al Means (Charlotte, N.C.)**, who sustained torn ligaments in this lower right leg versus Appalachian State on Oct. 12. Emerson had started in 24 consecutive games prior to his injury. When considering redshirt freshman **Brandon Mays (Arden, N.C.)** saw some action as a reserve fullback prior to undergoing season and possible career ending surgery for ulcerative colitis in late October, Furman has in all lost four fullbacks this year. Stepping in to fill the void beginning this Saturday versus Villanova will be sophomore **Brandon Berry (Hendersonville, N.C.)**, a converted flanker, and redshirt freshman **David Latimer (Nashville, Tenn.)**, who makes the switch from strong safety after totaling 13 tackles and an interception in action this year.

🔪 **TAILBACK BY COMMITTEE**...After watching two-time All-America tailback **Louis Ivory** run into the record books last year with a Southern Conference leading 1,492 yards and 19 TDs, Furman has filled its high profile backfield slot with three juniors and a redshirt freshman in 2002: **Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.)**, **Lamar Rembert (Ocala, Fla.)**, **Toreico O'Neal (Barnesville, Ga.)**, **Brandon Mays (Arden, N.C.)**. Through 11 games this year, Brigham, Rembert, O'Neal, and the now sidelined Mays have totaled 1,431 yards and seven touchdowns (148.8 ypg).

✎ **NAPIER ON THE NCAA CHARTS**...Quarterback Billy Napier's current 149.17 career passing efficiency rating — if it holds up — would be the sixth highest mark in NCAA history for players with a NCAA established minimum 300 completions.

✎ **"THE DRIVE"**...Holding a 10-0 lead heading into the fourth quarter in its Nov. 16 game at Wofford and with a potential NCAA I-AA playoff bid hanging in the balance, Furman saw its advantage evaporate and turn to a 21-17 deficit following a 41-yard touchdown run by Terrier fullback J.R. McNair with 4:41 left. That's when Furman's offense, led by senior quarterback **Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.)** took over and won the game, moving 74 yards in 11 plays for the game winning score, which came on a 7-yard touchdown pass from Napier to flanker **Brian Bratton (Evans, Ga.)** with 29 seconds left. It was Napier's poise under pressure that proved to be the difference in the decisive drive as he completed all five of his attempts for 63 yards, including a 17-yard strike to split end **Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.)**, three to flanker **Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.)** covering 39 yards, and the game winner to Bratton. Napier's work and the performance of his receiving corps during the game winning drive was even more impressive considering the rain and field that was as muddy and as torn up as many veteran coaches on both sides could ever recall. Napier, who completed all eight of his second half passes (and his last 10 overall), went 14-of-17 for 145 yards and two touchdowns in the contest, including a 31-yard strike to West in the first half to give the Paladins' a 7-0 lead. For his fine work he was named Southern Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Year.

✎ **THE AUGUSTA FACTOR**...Furman's deep and talented receiving corps includes a pair of speedy wideouts from the Augusta, Ga., area. Sophomore **Issac West (Augusta, Ga./Butler H.S.)** is second on the team with 33 receptions for 598 yards and seven touchdowns, including a 7-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter that gave Furman a 7-0 lead. Sophomore **Brian Bratton (Evans, Ga./Lakeside H.S.)** ranks third on the squad with 26 receptions for 361 yards and five touchdowns. Two weeks ago it was his 7-yard touchdown catch with 29 seconds left that lifted the Paladins to the 23-21 win over Wofford. When West was sidelined with a broken collarbone early in the Paladins' 17-7 win over Richmond on Sept. 21, it was Bratton who moved into the starting lineup. Combined the duo has notched 59 catches for 959 yards and 12 scores this year. In addition to his work as a receiver, Bratton has averaged 20.0 yards on 29 kickoff returns. Last year he earned All-America and Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Year honors as a return specialist after leading NCAA I-AA in kickoff returns (37.2 ypa) — three of which went for touchdowns. Prior to his injury in the Richmond game, West had displayed plenty of big play prowess, catching 10 passes for 242 yards and three touchdowns, including three grabs for 160 yards and three scores covering 78, 71, and 11 yards in the Paladins' 57-7 win over Elon on Sept. 14. A year ago as a redshirt freshman he nabbed 20 passes for 277 yards and a pair of touchdowns, both of which came in the Paladins' 28-22 win over then nationally fifth-ranked Appalachian State in Greenville. He also helped key the Paladins come-from-behind, 24-21 win over Western Kentucky in NCAA I-AA first round playoff action with a 21-yard touchdown reception.

✎ **KEEP THE FLAG IN YOUR POCKET**...Furman heads into Saturday's game against Villanova as the second least penalized team in the Southern Conference (45 penalties, 375 yards). The Paladins were not penalized in their 17-7 win over Richmond — a first for a Furman squad since 1995, when Furman went unflagged in a 24-3 win over The Citadel.

✎ **INTERCEPTION LEADERS**...Furman currently leads the Southern Conference with 17 interceptions, and the Paladins boast the top two interception leaders. Junior free safety **Cam Newton (Bennettsville, S.C.)** has six pickoffs in 10 games to lead the league, and right behind him with six interceptions in 11 games senior cornerback **Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.)**. Newton, who missed the Chattanooga game with a bruised shoulder, is expected to play this Saturday against Villanova.

✎ **THIRD DOWN EFFICIENCY CONTRAST**...Furman leads the Southern Conference in third down efficiency, having converted a strong 51.0 percent of their chances this year (79x155). As good as Furman has been on third down on offense, the Paladins rank next to last in the league in third down efficiency defense, yielding chain movers to the opposition at a 45.5 percent clip (66x145).

✎ **IMPRESSIVE BALANCE**...Furman sports the Southern Conference's most balanced offense, averaging 200.3 yards rushing and 209.9 yards passing per game through 11 games. Currently ranked second in the league in total offense (410.2 ypg), Furman hasn't boasted the kind of offensive balance seen this year since 1996, when the Paladins averaged 175.1 yards per game on the ground and 184.2 yards per game through the air on the way to a 9-4 record and NCAA I-AA playoff appearance.

✎ **BIG BEAR**...Senior All-Southern Conference flanker **Bear Rinehart (Seneca, S.C.)**, the leader of Furman's experienced receiving corps and the Paladins' new single season receptions record holder (58), has fashioned an outstanding 2002 campaign, and that was evidenced in the Paladins' 23-21 win over Wofford on Nov. 16 when he caught seven passes for 60 yards, including three critical receptions for 39 yards on the Paladins' game winning 11-play, 74-yard drive. In a 25-0 blanking of East Tennessee State on Oct. 26 he caught six passes for 57 yards and returned a punt 66 yards for a touchdown to break open a 6-0 game late in the second quarter. In the Paladins' 37-10 win over The Citadel on Oct. 19, he scored on a 47-yard reverse that finished off the Bulldogs, only a week after the Appalachian State game when he caught eight passes for 84 yards, including a key 12-yard touchdown pass with 7.4 seconds left for what could have easily been a Paladin victory before a botched two-point conversion pass led to a 16-15 loss. His work against Appalachian State followed on the heels of a strong outing in Furman's 24-23 win over Western Carolina on Oct. 5, when he caught five passes for a career best 153 yards and a touchdown, which covered 44 yards. Rinehart began the season against Vanderbilt with seven receptions for 127 yards. In the Paladins' 17-7 win over Richmond

on Sept. 21, he came up especially big, catching a career high nine passes for 94 yards while steadying the Paladin receiving corps following the departure of split end **Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.)**, who exited the game with a fractured collarbone. A very accomplished guitarist and singer/songwriter, Rinehart is nicknamed for legendary Alabama coach Paul "Bear" Bryant.

✍ **CLEARING THE WAY UP FRONT**...With a good bit of attention deservedly going to Furman's highly efficient passing game, it should be noted that the Paladins haven't forgotten how to run the football. Despite losing three All-American offensive linemen to graduation, the Paladins head into Saturday's game against Villanova averaging a solid 200.3 yards per game on the ground after tallying 218.9 rushing yards per game last year. Fueling Furman's ground attack this fall have been a pair of proven veterans in All-Southern Conference picks right guard **Trevor Kruger (Moultrie, Ga.)** and right tackle **Steven Cain (Anderson, S.C.)**. Cain, in particular, has already gained the attention on many NFL scouts and checks in as Furman's biggest player at 6-foot-5, 310 pounds. He counts 26 career starts and also ranks as one of the Paladins' strongest players in the weight room with a bench press of 415 pounds, a squat of 500 pounds, and a power clean lift of 352 pounds. Kruger, meanwhile, sports a unit high 38 starts in his career and the squad's best season blocking grades, making him another in a long line of strong SoCon Jacobs Blocking Award candidates.

✍ **NAPIER HEADLINES FURMAN OFFENSE**...Senior All-Southern Conference quarterback and Walter Payton Award finalist **Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.)**, has enjoyed a solid 2002 campaign, displaying strong leadership and impressive efficiency as a passer. In Furman's 23-21 win over Wofford on Nov. 16, Napier put together Southern Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Week performance in pacing the Paladins to the victory, completing 14-of-17 passes for 145 yards and two touchdowns on a muddy Gibbs Stadium field. Most impressively, though, was his work over the game's final four minutes when, with the Paladins trailing 21-17, he engineered an 11-play, 74-yard touchdown drive that ended with a 7-yard touchdown pass to Brian Bratton with 29 seconds left. On the game winning drive Napier completed all five of his pass attempts for 63 yards and, in all, he completed his last 10 attempts en route to setting a new Furman single season passing yards record, breaking the previous standard of 2,035 yards held by Frankie DeBusk (1990). Napier heads into this week's game against Villanova as the Southern Conference's completion percentage leader (.694%) and ranked second nationally in passing efficiency (163.26 rating). Among his other top performances this season are a 15-of-22, career high 252-yard, two-touchdown display in the Paladins' 24-23 win over Western Carolina; a 9-of-11, 222-yard, two-touchdown outing against VMI (55-28 win), against whom he played less than two quarters; and an 8-of-10, 237-yard, career high four-touchdown outing versus Elon (57-7 win). His performance against Elon covered all of 17 snaps and established a new Southern Conference passing efficiency standard of 411.08.

✍ **MORE ON NAPIER**...Prior to the 2001 season senior quarterback

**Billy Napier (Chatsworth, Ga.)** was labeled by one highly respected national I-AA football scribe as the only significant question mark on an otherwise veteran team. Twenty wins, a league title, and a national runnerup finish later, all questions have been answered. A consensus second team All-Southern Conference choice in 2001 and the son of a high school coach, Napier delivered solid play as a junior, completing 62.3 percent of his passes (129x207) for 1,772 yards and 10 TDs in 2001. Included in his campaign was a perfect 12-of-12, 159-yard, TD performance in a 24-17 win over Georgia Southern in NCAA I-AA semifinal playoff action in Statesboro that snapped the Eagles' 39-game home winning streak. He is the latest in a long line of outstanding Furman quarterbacks who, since 1978, have combined to garner 12 all-conference citations, and it's no coincidence that over the past 23 seasons the Paladins have won 11 league championships.

☞ **THE MARSHALL PLAN**...Furman's placekicking chores are handled by junior **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)**, who earned second team All-Southern Conference honors a year ago after converting 10-of-12 field goals (.833). Marshall, who at one last year extended a consecutive made field goals streak to a school record 12 straight, has converted 11-of-14 field goal tries and 34-of-37 PAT attempts this year. In Furman's earlier 55-28 win over VMI, he nailed a career long 46-yarder, and he came back in the third period to hit a 42-yarder. Furman's leading scorer with 67 points, he now ranks second on Furman's career kick scoring chart with 225 points, having surpassed former great Mike Wood (221 points, 19986-89) in last Saturday's 35-7 win over Chattanooga. Marshall has knocked down 34-of-43 field goals (.791) and 118-of-127 PATs (.929) in his career.

☞ **STREAKS END**...Georgia Southern's 41-21 win over Furman on Nov. 9 ended three impressive Paladin winning streaks: an 11-game home winning streak, a school record 15-game Southern Conference run of success in Paladin Stadium, and a 20-game regular season home winning streak. Prior to the loss to GSU, Furman's last defeat to a league foe had been Georgia Southern during the 1998 season. It's probably fitting that Georgia Southern halted Furman's victory parade at home, as the Paladins

did the same to the Eagles in 2001 with a 24-17 win in NCAA I-AA semifinal action, snapping GSU's 39-game home winning streak and 27-game home playoff run of success.

✎ **THREE PALADINS NAMED VERIZON ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT III**...Furman defensive end **Eddie Overdyke (Lilburn, Ga.)**, linebacker **Andrew Knight (Snellville, Ga.)**, and defensive back **Rodney Johnson (Marion, N.C.)** paced a contingent of seven players from Southern Conference schools named to the Verizon Wireless Academic All-District III squad, which is comprised of all Division I and I-AA schools in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia. To be eligible a player must have cumulative grade point average of 3.2 in the classroom and be a starter or key reserve on the field. All three Paladins are now eligible for the national Academic All-America team, which will be announced on December 2.

✎ **BLOODLINES**...Furman starting junior defensive end **Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.)** is the son of former University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back **George Rogers**.

✎ **KEEPING IT IN THE FAMILY**...Redshirt freshman linebacker **Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.)** is the brother of former Clemson All-America linebacker **Chad Carson**. Andrew's father, **Tom Carson**, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, **Earle Carson**, was an end, three-year letterman, and an honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, **M.A. Carson**, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, **Tom Carson**, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who served as captain of Furman's 1931 squad. Sophomore placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** is the son of former Paladin defensive end **Tommy Marshall (1974-76)**, who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three Southern Conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Redshirt freshman cornerback **Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.)** is the son of former Furman wide receiver **Norman MacDonald (1972-74)**. Sophomore tight end/fullback **Will Keller (Clayton, Ga.)** is the nephew of former Paladins fullback **Elliott Keller (1962-63)**, who led the league in rushing in 1962 with 724 yards.

✎ **FURMAN AND THE NFL**...After starting the preseason with seven Furman products in NFL camps, the Paladins currently have two on active rosters. Linebacker **Orlando Ruff '99** is in his fourth season with the San Diego Chargers, having started in all but one game at middle linebacker last year, where he totaled 60 tackles. Safety **John Keith '00**, resigned by the San Francisco 49ers to their practice squad after being released by the team at the end of preseason camp, was activated to the 49ers roster earlier this month. He worked his way into the starting lineup as a rookie before sustaining a fractured forearm midway through the season, and last year he sustained torn knee ligaments on the opening kickoff in the first game of 2001 campaign. Preseason cuts by NFL teams proved costly for six-year veteran **Luther Broughton '97** (Chicago Bears), wide receiver **Des Kitchings '00 (Indianapolis Colts)**, offensive tackle **Josh Moore '01** (Philadelphia Eagles), linebacker **Will Bouton '02** (Pittsburgh Steelers), and tight end **Trent Sansbury '02** (Carolina Panthers).

NASHVILLE, TENN. -- Quarterback Jay Cutler totaled 322 yards in offense and five touchdown responsibilities to lead the Vanderbilt Commodores to a 42-18 win over NCAA I-AA fourth-ranked Furman in front of 28,568 fans at Vanderbilt Stadium.

Cutler completed 11-of-14 passes for 215 yards and a pair of touchdowns to senior wide receiver Dan Stricker, and also rushed for 107 yards and three touchdowns, including a 61-yard third quarter sprint, to deliver to head coach Bobby Johnson his first victory at Vanderbilt after eight seasons as head coach at Furman.

The loss was the worst suffered by Furman since a 33-0 season opening setback in Clemson in 1998, and the 49 points were the most surrendered by a Paladin squad since a 58-28 loss to East Tennessee State in 1997. Furman committed three fumbles and yielded 557 yards to the Commodores, including 344 on the ground.

Vanderbilt wasted no time in taking the lead, capitalizing on a fumble recovery by Chuck Losey at the Furman 43 to set up a quick strike on the next play — the Commodores' first snap of the game. Cutler connected with Stricker behind the Paladin secondary for a 43-yard touchdown to put Vanderbilt up 7-0 at the 13:15 mark.

Following a 41-yard Bo Moore punt to the Vanderbilt 2, the Commodores' got a key 10-yard run on a third down draw play by Ronald Hatcher to the 15. From there Cutler hit Stricker for 14 yards to the 29 and two plays later zipped his second scoring strike to Stricker for 59 yards to make it 14-0 at the 5:51 juncture.

Furman answered on its next possession, moving 64 yards on 13 plays to the Vanderbilt 14, where Danny Marshall booted a 31-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter to make it 14-3. Marshall's field goal, however, proved to be a mild solace for the Paladins, who failed to convert a first and goal situation at the Vanderbilt 4. Two straight losses backed Furman up to the 9, and a delay of game penalty pushed it back to the 14, where quarterback Billy Napier's fade pass in the end zone failed.

A second Paladin fumble led to the Commodores' third touchdown of the game. Fielding a punt at his own 13, Bear Rinehart raced up the middle and broke outside for a 26-yard return, but Jonathan Straub stripped the ball and it was recovered by Vanderbilt's Nick Getter at the Furman 39. From there, Vanderbilt covered the distance in eight plays before Cutler scored on a 1-yard dive for a 21-3 Vanderbilt advantage.

The Commodores finished off an impressive first half with a 6-play, 78-yard drive that Cutler completed on a 12-yard draw with only 11 seconds left in the half for a 28-3 margin.

The Paladins scored first in the second half, getting a 22-yard Marshall field goal to close the gap to 28-6, but Vanderbilt responded a little over a minute later with Cutler's 61-yard run to give the Commodores a 35-6 advantage.

Furman used a 1-yard touchdown plunge by fullback Al Means and a 2-yard scoring run from Napier to close the gap to 35-18, but Vanderbilt effectively ended any Paladin comeback bid when Noval McKenzie eluded a host of defenders with a 57-yard touchdown run at the 10:49 juncture of the fourth quarter to make it 42-18.

Napier paced Furman offensively, completing 21-of-31 passes for 241 yards. His favorite target was senior flanker Bear Rinehart, who nabbed seven receptions for 127 yards, and sophomore split end Isaac West, who had seven catches for 82 yards. Junior tailback Hindley Brigham headed up Furman's ground game with 70 yards on seven carries.

GREENVILLE -- A two-hour lightning delay didn't faze NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman as quarterback Billy Napier threw for 237 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Paladins to a 57-7 romp over Elon and hand head coach Bobby Lamb his first collegiate victory.

Napier, a senior from Chatsworth, Ga., connected with split end Issac West on three of his four touchdown strikes, including a 78-yarder on the Paladins' first offensive play to give Furman a quick 7-0 lead. The duo later hooked up on scoring tosses covering 71 and 11 yards to help put the Paladins ahead 35-0 after the first quarter.

"I told the guys in the locker room that we should start every game at 9:00 p.m.," said Lamb after his team was forced to wait two hours before kickoff due to lightning and heavy rains. "I was really proud of the defense after what happened last week (Furman's 49-18 loss to Vanderbilt). Offensively our plan was to go up top. When Billy hit Isaac striding, that really got us going and jump started us for a big first half."

"It was bang, bang, bang so quickly in the first quarter that we really didn't have much of a chance to get in the game," said Elon coach Al Seagraves. "They gashed us and took us to the wood shed early."

Furman's 35-point first quarter matched the highest scoring quarter in school history, and West's three touchdown receptions tied a school record held by two others. Napier, who completed 8-of-10 passes, exited the game along with many of Furman's offensive starters early in the second quarter after fullback Al Means' 1-yard touchdown plunge put the Paladins ahead 42-0 at the 12:11 mark.

The Paladins, who found the end zone on their first six possessions, closed out the first half scoring outburst when backup quarterback Bo Moore connected with Brian Bratton on a 9-yard touchdown pass with 0:36 left to make it 49-0.

Elon avoided the shutout when James Murdaugh hit Kyle Belkoski on a 23-yard touchdown pass with 1:32 left in the game.

Furman, which turned to reserves for the entire second half, rolled up 542 yards in offense, including 327 through the air. West's three receptions went for touchdowns and accounted for 160 yards, and redshirt freshman tailback Brandon Mays paced all rushers with 88 yards on 15 carries.

RICHMOND, VA. -- Billy Napier threw for 219 yards and rushed for 27 yards and a key fourth quarter touchdown to lead NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman to a 17-7 win over 22nd-ranked Richmond at University of Richmond Stadium.

Napier, a senior from Chatsworth, Ga., and the Southern Conference's top rated passer, completed 19-of-26 passes to pace Furman's offense, but it was his 1-yard sneak into the end zone with 10:38 left in the game that broke open a 10-7 contest and gave the Paladins a 17-7 lead. Furman's decisive drive covered 69 yards in 10 plays and included a 32-yard run by tailback Toreico O'Neal to the Spiders 3-yard line.

The key fourth quarter score came two possessions after the Paladins stopped Richmond on downs as the Furman 1. Trailing 10-7, the Spiders' Danny Young picked off a Billy Napier pass and returned it 11 yards to the Paladins 34. Three plays later quarterback D'Arcy Wills connected with Dan McNair for 20 yards to the Furman 8. Two rushes by Lee Williams and a run by Wills moved the ball at the 1, but Wills was stopped a foot short of the goal line on fourth down.

In the first meeting between the Paladins and Spiders since 1977, Furman grabbed an early 7-0 after taking the opening kickoff and moving 71 yards in 11 plays for a 4-yard touchdown run by tailback Hindley Brigham.

Richmond answered on its first possession by marching 81 yards in 15 plays for a 1-yard touchdown plunge by Wills to knot the game at 7-7.

Late in the first quarter Furman suffered a big blow when sophomore split end Isaac West, the Southern Conference's leading receiver, sustained a fractured collarbone. West, who last week caught three touchdown passes in the Paladins' 57-7 win over Elon, will be out from three to six weeks.

With its speedy wide receiver out of the contest, the Paladins turned to senior All-Southern Conference flanker Bear Rinehart, and the Seneca, S.C., native responded with a career high nine receptions for 94 yards, including a pair of catches covering 25 yards to help set up a 39-yard Danny Marshall field goal midway through the second quarter to give Furman a 10-7 advantage.

Furman's goal line stand highlighted a scoreless third quarter that saw the Paladins' offense saddled with poor field position, starting a pair of drives at the 3 and 1 yard lines.

Not until its third possession of the second half was Furman able to grab good field position following a 10-yard punt return by Rinehart to the Paladin 31, which initiated the Paladins' decisive 69-yard touchdown drive.

Furman outgained Richmond 385-249 and displayed solid balance, rushing for 166 yards and passing for 219. Other than one interception, the Paladins played error free football and recorded their first penalty free game since the 1995 season in a 24-3 win over The Citadel in Charleston. Furman has been the least penalized team in the conference over the last three years.

Brigham paced all rushers with 60 yards on 14 carries, and sophomore Brian Bratton stepped in for the injured West to nab five catches for 60 yards. Sophomore linebackers Mike Killian and Cedrick Ritter paced Furman's defensive effort with 11 and 10 tackles respectively, with Ritter also adding a tackle-for-loss, a fumble recovery, and a pass deflection.

LEXINGTON, VA. -- Billy Napier threw two touchdowns and ran for another in a 28-point first quarter scoring outburst to lead Furman to a 55-28 win over VMI Saturday afternoon at Alumni Memorial Stadium in the final meeting between the two longtime Southern Conference rivals.

The victory, Furman's school record 21st straight triumph over VMI since 1980, concludes the conference football series between the Paladins and Keydets, which began in 1946. VMI, a member of the league since 1923, is leaving the conference at the end of the 2002-03 academic year for the Big South Conference.

Napier, a senior from Chatsworth, Ga., and the conference's leading passer, completed all seven pass attempts for 159 yards in the first quarter, including a 2-yard toss to tight end Willis Sudderth and 76-yard strike to split end Brian Bratton to extend a 14-0 Paladin lead.

Tailback Toreico O'Neal gave Furman a quick 7-0 advantage with a 58-yard touchdown run on the game's second offensive play, and Napier later added a 1-yard sneak for a score at the 8:00 mark to push the Paladins' lead to 14-0.

Furman totaled 280 yards on 21 plays in game's first 15 minutes on the way to a 640-yard afternoon, the second most productive offensive performance in school history.

VMI cut Furman's lead to 28-14 in the second quarter with a 51-yard touchdown run by Sean Mizzer and 48-yard interception return by Musa Sarki, but the Paladins effectively quelled any Keydet comeback when Lamar Rembert reeled off a 52-yard scoring run with 3:29 left in the half to make it 35-14.

Then, just before intermission, Furman needed only 26 seconds to cover 63 yards for its final tally of the half. After safety Cam Newton intercepted a pass at the VMI 9, the Paladins used a 38-yard shovel pass from Napier from Toreico O'Neal to move to the Paladin 47. On the next play Napier hit Andy Rump for 25 yards to the VMI 28, where Danny Marshall booted a career long 46-yard field goal as time expired for a 38-14 advantage.

Playing reserves on both side of the football, the Paladins added a pair of scores in the third quarter, getting a 42-yard Marshall field goal and a 6-yard touchdown run by backup fullback Al Means to extend their lead to 48-21.

The two teams traded scores in the fourth quarter, with backup fullback Al Means scoring his second touchdown of the contest on a 38-yard run in the last minute of play.

Furman rushed for a season high 397 yards and passed for 243. Napier, who didn't play in the second half, finished with 222 yards through the air, completing 9-of-11 attempts. Junior tailback Lamar Rembert paced the Paladin ground attack with a career high 133 yards on 11 carries.

VMI quarterback Joey Gibson completed 22-of-38 passes for 200 yards and a touchdown for the Keydets, but the Keydet senior was picked off three times by Rodney Johnson, David Latimer, and Cam Newton.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Billy Napier passed for a career high 252 yards and two touchdowns as NCAA I-AA fifth-ranked Furman held off Western Carolina for a 24-23 win in Southern Conference action Saturday afternoon in front of 13,125 fans at Paladin Stadium.

Napier, the nation's leader in passing efficiency, completed 15-of-22 passes, including a 15-yard touchdown toss to Brian Bratton and 44-yard scoring strike to Bear Rinehart, who caught five passes for a career high 153 yards. The win was Furman's (4-1, 2-0 SoCon) fifth straight over Western Carolina (3-3, 1-2 SoCon) and the Paladins' 14th-straight home triumph over Southern Conference opposition.

Despite Napier's record setting performance, Furman only managed to escape Western Carolina's upset bid when Chris Vought missed an extra point attempt after Fred Boateng scored on a 4-yard run with 3:43 left to pull the Catamounts to within a point. Instead of attempting and inside kick, the Catamounts kicked deep, and Furman was able to burn most of the remaining time off the clock with a pair of first downs.

The Catamounts regained possession at their 44 with 19 seconds left following a poor 15-yard Furman punt, but a desperation pass by quarterback Brian Gaither was picked off by Furman's Cam Newton to end the game.

Both teams took advantage of miscues to open the scoring. An interception and 36-yard return by cornerback Randy Thompson to the Furman 39 led to a Vought 32-yard field goal that put Western Carolina ahead 3-0 at the 9:39 mark of the first quarter.

Later in the quarter Furman defensive end Eddie Overdyke scooped up a fumble a returned it 14 yards to the Western Carolina 13 to set up a 15-yard touchdown pass from Napier to Bratton to give the Paladins a 7-3 lead with 5:24 left in the first quarter.

Furman extended its lead to 14-3 in the second quarter, using a 33-yard run by tailback Toreico O'Neal and 23-yard option keeper by Napier to the Western 1 before fullback Eric Emerson ran off right tackle into the end zone for the score.

Leading 21-10 after three quarters, Furman watched Western Carolina pull to within four points at 21-17 after quarterback Pat Cilento connected with Lamont Seward on a 34-yard first down pass to the Furman 1, where one play later Cilento scored with 12:45 left.

Furman answered with an 11-play, 83-yard drive for a Danny Marshall 20-yard field goal and a 24-17 lead, but Western Carolina appeared poised to tie the game after covering 62 yards in eight plays for Boateng's 4-yard scoring run. On the PAT, however, the snap bounced to holder Stanton Horne and the bad timing led to Vought's kick missing wide right.

Furman outgained Western Carolina 444-354, rushing for 192 yards to go along with Napier's 252 passing yards. Western Carolina's Fred Boateng led all rushers with 117 yards on 16 carries and scored a pair of touchdowns.

BOONE, N.C. -- Derrick Black took a pitch following an interception by teammate Josh Jeffries on a Furman two-point conversion attempt and completed a 96-yard return for two points with 7.4 seconds left in the game to lift NCAA I-AA nationally fourth-ranked Appalachian State to a 16-15 win over fifth-rated Furman Saturday at Kidd Brewer Stadium.

Appalachian State's improbable last second heroics came after Furman appeared set to finish off the Mountaineers after marching 73 yards in 13 plays for the go-ahead touchdown, which came on a 12-yard strike from quarterback Billy Napier to flanker Bear Rinehart to put the Paladins ahead 15-14. But the Paladins elected to go for two points and Napier's pass was picked off by Jeffries at the 4-yard line. Jeffries ran 20 yards before pitching it to Black, who covered the distance for the game's decisive points.

"I've been a part of some losses over the years but nothing like that," said a despondent head coach Bobby Lamb. "I take full responsibility for what happened. We didn't have a time out and had some confusion about what play to run. We wanted to run a sprint out, but instead we threw the tunnel screen, and they picked it off. Our defense deserved better. They played their rear ends off."

Furman outgained Appalachian State 323-204 and hogged the football for most of the game, piling up 77 snaps and 40:21 of possession to the Mountaineers' 44 offensive plays and 19:39 of possession. Appalachian State only had 17 snaps in the second half and 87 total yards over the game's final 30 minutes, but the Mountaineer defense accounted for nine points on two plays.

The first Appalachian State defensive score came with the Mountaineers trailing 6-0 late in the third quarter and Furman seemingly about to gain the upperhand. Bottled up at its own 2 following a 61-yard Nate McKinney punt, the Paladin offensive line cleared the way for three first downs to the 39, but on the next play Jay Lyles stepped in front of a Napier sideline pass and returned it 43 yards for a touchdown to give the Mountaineers a 7-6 lead with 2:00 to go in the quarter.

Furman then used a 48-yard Brian Bratton kickoff return to set up a 10-play, 33-yard penetration, which resulted in a Danny Marshall 36-yard field goal at the 11:03 mark and a 9-7 Furman advantage.

Appalachian State answered with its only noteworthy offensive possession of the contest, moving 79 yards in 10 plays for a 24-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Joe Burchette to a wide open Joey Hoover that put the Mountaineers ahead 14-9 with 5:39 remaining.

Furman then took over at its own 27 and methodically moved down the field with several between the tackle runs and a pair of 22-yard pass plays to Rinehart and Bratton, with the latter moving the football to the ASU 15. From there, the Paladins lost eight yards on a pair of plays before Napier completed a 16-yard pass to tailback Hindley Brigham to the 7, setting up a fourth-and-two play. A quick pitch to Brigham netted five yards and a first down to the ASU 2, but an incomplete pass and two delay of game penalties pushed the ball back to the 12. The Paladins came back, however, when, on third down, Napier drilled a 12-yard scoring strike to Rinehart to give Furman the short-lived 15-14 advantage.

Rinehart paced Furman offensively with eight receptions for 84 yards and Napier, the nation's passing efficiency leader entering the contest, completed 20-of-29 passes for 170 yards and a score. Brigham ran for 49 yards on 10 carries to lead the Paladin ground attack. ASU quarterback Joe Burchette, who was picked off in the first half by free safety Cam Newton to set up a 29-yard Danny Marshall field goal, completed 11-of-17 passes for 117 yards and score.

Cedrick Ritter led Furman's strong defensive effort with 10 tackles.

GREENVILLE, S.C.-- Lamar Rembert's 83-yard touchdown run keyed a powerful rushing attack that propelled the NCAA I-AA sixth-ranked Furman Paladins to a 37-10 win over arch-rival The Citadel in Southern Conference action at Paladin Stadium.

Rembert's scoring run, which came on the final play of the first quarter, gave Furman a 14-0 lead and keyed the Paladins to their fourth straight win over The Citadel and 15th straight home victory against conference opposition. Rembert, a junior from Ocala, Fla., finished with a game high 87 yards on five carries as Furman piled up 345 yards on the ground and five touchdowns on the way to 508 yards in total offense.

"It was very big the way we came out," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb, whose team suffered a crushing 16-15 loss the previous week to Appalachian State on an intercepted two-point conversion pass and return with just over seven seconds left. "I didn't know how we would react psychologically from the loss last week, but we answered that question with the way we came out in the first quarter. We were ready to play."

"Furman is a tremendous team that had a faced a lot of adversity coming into this weekend," said Citadel head coach Ellis Johnson. "I think they did an excellent job of recovering from the loss and coming out here today and taking care of business. We just didn't execute and we missed assignments, reads, passes, and blocks. We didn't do a very good job between the sidelines."

Furman's defense played a significant role in the victory, limiting The Citadel to only 252 total yards and picking off Bulldog quarterback Jeff Klein four times, including a pair by senior cornerback Rodney Johnson. Klein entered the contest having thrown only one interception in 197 attempts.

Furman took command of the game early, moving 73 yards on 13 plays for a 1-yard touchdown plunge by fullback Eric Emerson and 7-0 lead at the 8:17 mark of the first quarter.

After Rembert's 83-yard touchdown sprint increased the Paladins' advantage to 14-0, a Johnson interception at the Furman 25 led to a 12-play, 75-yard drive the produced another score. After lining up for an apparent 30-yard field goal try, Furman holder Jeremiah Van Dora faked it and rolled around left end 13 yards for a touchdown at the 9:30 juncture.

The Citadel got on the board with a Travis Zobel 21-yard field goal with 3:59 left in the half, but Furman countered by moving 60 yards in 12 plays for 32-yard field goal by Danny Marshall with less than a minute left for a 24-3 advantage.

The Citadel attempted to get back in the game on its first possession of the third quarter when Klein scored on a 2-yard run around right end, but the Bulldogs failed to sustain the momentum on their next possession when Furman linebacker Cedrick Ritter picked off a Klein pass at the Paladin 35 at the 4:40 mark.

The Paladins put the game out of reach early in the fourth quarter when senior flanker Bear Rinehart collected a reverse and, behind a wall of blockers, glided 47 yards untouched into the end zone to complete a seven-play, 80-yard drive.

Furman's Toreico O'Neal closed out the scoring with an 8-yard run with 1:13 left in the contest.

Furman quarterback Billy Napier connected on 11-of-19 passes for 163 yards, including five for 80 yards to sophomore split end Isaac West, who completed his comeback from a fractured collarbone sustained in the Paladins' 17-7 win over Richmond on Sept. 21.

The punt return for a touchdown was the first by a Furman player since Andre Worrell returned a fielded punt 70 yards in a 45-14 Furman win over East Tennessee State in 1992.

"The punt return was huge because it gave us a cushion and helped settle us down offensively," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb, whose team snapped a three-game losing streak in Johnson City. "In the second half our offensive line took control up front and we got the running game going, which in turn made our play action more effective. But I was even more impressed with our defense. They continue to improve and make plays, especially in the secondary and in the linebacking corps. They're athletic and a bunch of no names, but they've played some pretty good ball lately."

Leading 12-0 at intermission, Furman took the second half kickoff and moved 76 yards in 11 plays to seize total control of the contest when fullback Eric Emerson bulled over from two yards out at the 10:29 mark.

The Paladins tacked on their final score on a 1-yard sneak by quarterback Billy Napier, capping an 18-play, 80-yard drive that consumed 8:29 of clock.

Furman outgained East Tennessee State 397-290 and displayed impressive balance in the process. The Paladins ran for 208 yards, passed for 188 yards, and converted 9-of-13 third down plays against a Buccaneer defense that entered the contest ranked second in the conference in total defense, yielding only 310.2 yards per game.

The Paladins' junior tailback trio of Hindley Brigham, Lamar Rembert, and Toreico O'Neal combined to rush for 175 yards on 34 carries, and Napier, the nation's passing efficiency leader, continued his strong work in the air, completing 17-of-26 attempts for 188 yards and a touchdown, which covered 19 yards to sophomore wide receiver Brian Bratton on the first play of the second quarter. Bratton finished the contest with four receptions for 75 yards.

Furman's defense, meanwhile, kept Buccaneer wide receiver Cecil Moore from big play territory, limiting him to four receptions for 60 yards while picking off a pair of passes by East Tennessee State quarterback Jatavis Sanders. Interceptions by sophomore cornerback T.J. Wilson, and free safety Cam Newton, who recorded his league leading sixth pickoff of the season, improved the Paladins' interception haul to seven over the past three games.

Junior linebacker Keito Whetstone topped the Paladin tackle chart with eight stops, including one-for-loss, and sophomore nose guard Michael Burant, making his first career start, had four tackles, including two-for-loss, and a pair of pass deflections. East Tennessee State's deepest penetration of the contest was to the Furman 18 yard line in the first half, but that threat ended when the Buccaneers' Wes Sands missed a 35-yard field goal.

**Georgia Southern 41, Furman 21**

GREENVILLE, S.C.-- Quarterback Chaz Williams ran for three touchdowns and threw for another to lead the NCAA I-AA ninth-ranked Georgia Southern Eagles to a 42-21 Southern Conference title game win over the fourth-ranked Furman Paladins in front of 15,794 fans at Paladin Stadium.

Williams rushed 23 times for 110 yards and threw for 84 yards in pacing Georgia Southern to its eighth straight victory and at least a share of the program's seventh conference championship. The sophomore from Apopka, Fla., registered touchdown runs covering 1, 2, and 3 yards and connected with slotback Zzream Walden on a 40-yard strike to help stake Georgia Southern to a 35-0 halftime lead.

Georgia Southern rolled up 409 yards on the ground on the way to 493 yards in offense. Freshman fullback Jermaine Austin joined Williams in topping the 100-yard rushing plateau, totaling 105 yards on 19 carries. Furman, which was held to a season low 68 yards rushing, got 234 yards from senior quarterback Billy Napier, who completed 17-of-28 passes for three touchdowns.

The defeat snapped Furman's 11-game home winning streak and 15-game Southern Conference home winning streak, and marked the Paladins' first regular season home loss since the 1998 season.

The Eagles wasted little time in taking control of the contest, scoring on their first possession by moving 55 yards in eight plays for a 3-yard touchdown run by Williams at the 9:40 mark.

Williams ignited the Eagles' decisive 28-point second quarter with a 1-yard touchdown plunge at the 9:45 juncture to make it 14-0, capping a 10-play, 77-yard drive.

Two possessions later the Eagles needed only four plays to cover 70 yards, with the final 22 coming off a Williams pitch to Zzream Walden to increase the advantage to 21-0.

A fumble by Furman's Brian Bratton on the ensuing kickoff return was recovered by Georgia Southern's Carl Kearney at the Paladin 18, and two plays later Williams tallied his third touchdown of the contest with a 2-yard plunge with 1:41 remaining in the half.

The Georgia Southern second quarter onslaught continued after the Eagles forced a Paladin punt and regained possession at Furman 45. Following a five-yard run by Walden to the 40, Williams hit Walden in strike for a 40-yard touchdown strike with only 32 seconds left to give the Eagles a 35-0 halftime advantage.

Furman finally got on the board on its first possession of the second half, covering 64 yards in eight plays for a 21-yard touchdown pass from Napier to split end Isaac West.

Georgia Southern, however, quickly extinguished any Furman comeback attempt when slotback Mark Myers bolted 71 yards for a score midway through the third quarter to make it 42-7.

**Furman 23, Wofford 21**

November 16, 2002

SPARTANBURG, S.C. -- It was billed by the Wofford faithful, coaches, and players as the most important football game in the history of the program, and that goes back to 1889.

On Thursday, a pep rally was held and Wofford head coach Mike Ayers guaranteed a win for his team. Furman quarterback Billy Napier was hung and burned in effigy. But Napier recovered nicely from his scorching by grabbing the gas can and matches and lighting up Wofford with a 7-yard touchdown pass to Brian Bratton with 29 seconds left to lift the NCAA I-AA ninth-ranked Paladins to a 23-21 win Saturday at rain-soaked Gibbs Stadium.

The victory, Furman's fourth straight over Wofford and seventh in its last eight meetings with its oldest rival, denied the Terriers a share of their Southern Conference championship since joining the league in 1997.

Napier, a senior All-Southern Conference performer, engineered the Paladins' game winning 11-play, 74-yard drive after Wofford's J.R. McNair scored on a 41-yard run to put the Terriers ahead 21-17 with 4:41 left in the game. Completing all five of his pass attempts for 63 yards on the Paladins' final possession, Napier methodically moved the Furman offense down the field on the strength of a 17 pass to Isaac West, three completions to Bear Rinehart for 39 yards, and the game winning 7-yard strike to a slanting Brian Bratton. Furman's signal caller connected on all eight of second half pass attempts and his last 10 overall. For the contest the nation's second highest rated passer was 14-of-17 for 145 yards and two touchdowns.

Furman took advantage of a pair of first half Wofford turnovers to grab a 10-0 lead.

A fumble on a punt return by Wofford's Drew Hill on the first play of the second quarter was recovered by Furman's Keith Johnson at the Terrier 31, and on the next play, Isaac West beat a pair of Terrier defensive backs on a post route for a 31-yard touchdown catch to give the Paladins a 7-0 lead.

Later in the second quarter Furman defensive end Eddie Overdyke scooped up a fumble by Wofford senior running back Jesse McCoy at the Terrier 32 and rambled 21 yards to the Wofford 11. Three plays later the Southern Conference's top kicker, Danny Marshall, drilled a 28-yard field goal to give the Paladins a 10-0 lead with 3:50 left in the first half.

A scoreless third quarter proved to be only a prelude to a thrilling final period, as Wofford got on the board with a 1-yard touchdown run by fullback J.R. McNair at the 12:12 mark to complete a 17-play, 86-yard drive and make it 10-7.

Furman answered with a 5-play, 67-yard drive that featured a 45-yard touchdown run by junior tailback Hindley Brigham, who took a quick pitch from Napier, avoided a Terrier defender with a cut, and outran the Wofford defense to the end zone to stretch the Paladins' lead to 17-7.

Wofford came back with 9-play, 80-yard possession that ended with a 1-yard touchdown plunge by quarterback Jeff Zolman to make it 17-14 at the 6:21 juncture.

A partially blocked punt by the Terriers' Alex Love put Wofford in business at the Furman 46 with 4:54 left in the game, and two plays later J.R. McNair raced up the middle for 41 yards into the end zone to give the Terriers their first lead of the game, 21-17, with 4:41 to go.

Wofford's joy, however, lasted only a few minutes as the Paladins, starting at their own 26 covered the 74 yards to the end zone, where Bratton gathered in a Napier laser for the game winning score.

Wofford was held almost 100 yards below its season rushing average, but the Terriers still managed 259 yards on the ground on the way to 375 yards in total offense. Furman, meanwhile, compiled 263 yards in offense and got 80 yards on 16 carries from Hindley Brigham.

Bear Rinehart paced the Paladins' passing game with seven catches for 60 yards and, in the process, tied Robbie Hahn's Furman single season receptions record of 53 catches set in 1967.

Napier's work against Wofford made him Furman's new single season passing yardage leader with 2,071 yards, thereby surpassing former standout Frankie DeBusk (1987-90), who threw for 2,035 yards in 1990.

# Furman 35, Chattanooga 7

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Hindley Brigham rushed for 114 yards and two touchdowns to power NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 35-7 Southwestern Conference win over Chattanooga Saturday afternoon at Paladin Stadium.

Brigham, a junior tailback from Birmingham, Ala., scored on runs of 1 and 58 yards to help Furman take control of the contest and post its eighth straight win over Chattanooga. The victory also earned Furman a bid to the NCAA I-AA playoffs — the Paladins' school record fourth straight and 12th overall.

"This was a scary game coming in because Chattanooga had won their last two and had nothing to lose, but I thought we handled it well after a slow start," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We got a big turnover in the third quarter, and that jump started our offense and we played well after that. Our defense played extremely well."

"We couldn't get our rhythm going in the first quarter," said Chattanooga head coach Donnie Kirkpatrick. "The Furman defense played well. I can see why Furman is the No. 1 pass defense in the league. I wish we could have had a better showing."

A 7-yard touchdown pass from Billy Napier to Isaac West on the Paladins' first possession gave Furman a 7-0 lead at the 10:52 mark of the first quarter.

Chattanooga battled back to tie the game after moving 90 yards in 18 plays for a 5-yard touchdown pass from Ryan McCann to Jason Jones at the 6:52 juncture of the second quarter.

Furman, however, regained the lead a short while later after defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling recovered a fumble at the UTC 35. A 19-yard pass from Napier to Isaac West moved the Paladins to the 1 before Brigham ran off right guard into the end zone to give Furman a 14-7 lead with only 37 seconds remaining in the half.

The Paladins capitalized on another Chattanooga turnover in the third quarter to add to its advantage. An interception and 26-yard return by cornerback Rodney Johnson to the UTC 30 led to a 1-yard touchdown run by fullback Corey Tant to make it 21-7.

Furman padded its lead later with a 58-yard run by Brigham off an option pitch and a 5-yard touchdown pass by backup quarterback Bo Moore to split end James Thomas.

Furman outgained Chattanooga 339-219 in total offense and rolled up 240 yards on the ground to the Mocs' 54. The Paladins also recorded a season high three sacks.

Paladin quarterback Billy Napier, who completed 12-of-15 passes for 94 yards and a score, hit sophomore split end Isaac West for six completions for 70 yards. Senior flanker Bear Rinehart, meanwhile, caught five passes for 24 yards to establish a new Furman season receptions record, eclipsing the previous standard of 53 receptions set by Robbie Hahn in 1967. The Seneca, S.C., product now has 58 receptions on the year.

Furman's defense, which did not allow UTC to cross midfield in the second half, was paced by sophomore linebacker Mike Killian with eight tackles.
