**THE SERIES**

In a series that began in 1913 and ranks as the Southern Conference's oldest and longest running rivalry, Furman holds a commanding 51-28-3 lead in its series with The Citadel. The 51 victories and 82 meetings represent the most by the Paladins against any foe. Furman heads into Saturday's game having claimed four straight wins and seven decisions in the last eight meetings with the Bulldogs, including a 37-10 verdict last year in Greenville. Two years ago Furman topped The Citadel 30-7 in Charleston to extend its winning streak at Johnson Hagood Stadium to four games. The Citadel registered its last win over Furman in 1998 by a 25-24 score. Overall the Paladins own a 21-16-2 record in Charleston; in Greenville, Furman is 28-12. The Paladins are also 2-0-1 in three neutral site clashes with The Citadel.

**LAST MEETING**

GREENVILLE, S.C. (Oct. 19, 2002) -- Lamar Rembert's 83-yard touchdown run keyed a powerful rushing attack that propelled NCAA I-AA sixth-ranked Furman to a 37-10 win over arch-rival The Citadel in Southern Conference action at Paladin Stadium.

Rembert's scoring run, which came on the final play of the first quarter, gave Furman a 14-0 lead and keyed the Paladins to their fourth straight win over The Citadel and 15th straight home victory against conference opposition. Rembert finished with a game high 87 yards on five carries as Furman piled up 345 yards on the ground and five touchdowns on the way to 508 yards in total offense.

Furman's defense played a significant role in the victory, limiting The Citadel to only 252 total yards and picking off Bulldog quarterback Jeff Klein four times, including a pair by senior cornerback Rodney Johnson. Klein entered the contest having thrown only one interception in 197 attempts.

Furman took command of the game early, moving 73 yards on 13 plays for a 1-yard touchdown plunge by fullback Eric Emerson and 7-0 lead at the 8:17 mark of the first quarter.

After Rembert's 83-yard touchdown sprint increased the Paladins' advantage to 14-0, a Johnson interception at the Furman 25 led to a 12-play, 75-yard drive that produced another score. After lining up for an apparent 30-yard field goal try, Furman holder Jeremiah Van Dora faked it and rolled around left end 13 yards for a touchdown at the 9:30 juncture.

The Citadel got on the board with a Travis Zobel 21-yard field goal with 3:59 left in the half, but Furman countered by moving 60 yards in 12 plays for 32-yard field goal by Danny Marshall with less than a minute left for a 24-3 advantage.

The Citadel attempted to get back in the game on its first possession of the third quarter when Klein scored on a 2-yard run around right end, but the Bulldogs failed to sustain the momentum on their next possession when Furman linebacker Cedrick Ritter picked off a Klein pass at the Paladin 35 at the 4:40 mark.

The Paladins put the game out of reach early in the fourth quarter when senior flanker Bear Rinehart collected a reverse and, behind a wall of blockers, glided 47 yards untouched into the end zone to complete a seven-play, 80-yard drive.

Furman's Toreico O'Neal closed out the scoring with an 8-yard run with 1:13 left in the contest.

Paladin quarterback Billy Napier connected on 11-of-19 passes for

163 yards, including five for 80 yards to sophomore split end Isaac West, who completed his comeback from a fractured collarbone sustained in the Paladins' 17-7 win over Richmond on Sept. 21.

**NOTING THE PALADINS**

◆ **SEEING RED IN THE RED ZONE...**Two weeks ago Furman had its share of troubles in the red zone, scoring only three times (13 points) in five advances\* inside Western Carolina's 20-yard line, but still managed to take a 19-13 win. On Saturday against Appalachian State, Furman's red zone troubles intensified and ultimately cost the Paladins the game. Five times Furman penetrated the Mountaineers' 20, but only twice did the Paladins come away with points. In the first half, Furman held a 7-3 lead but fumbled away the football at the ASU 2. In the second half the Paladins suffered turnovers at the Mountaineer 10 and 16, and had to settle for a

field goal on another possession after getting to the ASU 1 on second down before being flagged for an illegal substitution penalty. On the season Furman has scored at a 64.0 percent clip (16x25) from the red zone; however, after going 7-for-7 in the first three games, the Paladins are just 9-for-18 (50.0 percent) inside the red zone in the last two contests.

◆ **TURNOVER TROUBLES**...Furman's four fumbles in Saturday's 13-10 loss to Appalachian State continued a recent turnover trend for the Paladins, who over the last three games have committed 12 miscues (8 fumbles, 4 interceptions). On the flip side, the Paladins have forced 13 turnovers (7 fumbles, 5 interceptions) in the same three-game span. Furman's turnover margin through six games is +0.17. A year ago the Paladins produced a +0.58 turnover margin.

◆ **ROAD SUCCESS**...Furman sports winning home, road, and overall series records against every Southern Conference foe except Georgia Southern. That includes a 21-16-2 overall slate versus The Citadel in Charleston, where the Paladins have won straight since 1995 and are 8-2 in their last 10 appearances at Johnson Hagood Stadium. Since 2001, Furman has compiled a 9-3 road record against NCAA I-AA opposition, including a 19-13 decision over Western Carolina two weeks ago in Cullowhee.

◆ **RARE LOSS AT HOME**...Furman's 13-10 setback to Appalachian State on Saturday marked only the second loss at home for the Paladins in their last 17 games (.882). Since 1999, Furman has posted a 26-5 record in Paladin Stadium (.838). That stretch includes a 24-3 regular season worksheet (.889).

◆ **NOT SINCE 1995**...The 10 points Furman scored against Appalachian State on Saturday represented the lowest output by a Furman offense in Paladin Stadium since a 31-6 loss to Marshall in 1995. Appalachian State's 13 points marked the lowest winning point total by an opponent in Paladin Stadium history (opened in 1981). The previous winning total had been 14 (Western Carolina 14, Furman 7, 1983).

◆ **21-POINT PLATEAU**...Furman's 19-13 win over Western Carolina in Cullowhee on Oct. 4 represented only the third time in 34 games since 1991 Furman has prevailed on the road when scoring less than 21 points (3-31, .088); the Paladins are 30-5 (.857) in away games when scoring 21 points or more during that same span.

◆ **PINCHING THE POINTS**...Set up by a blocked punt, Appalachian State's 34-yard field goal marked the first third quarter points surrendered by Furman this season. The Paladins have yielded only 16 second half points in six games this year and head into Saturday's game against The Citadel as the league leader in scoring defense (13.0 ppg).

◆ **STELLAR PALADIN "D"**...For the second straight year, Furman's defense deserved better. In Saturday's 13-10 loss to Appalachian State, the Paladin stop troops time and time again stuffed the Mountaineers and set up scoring opportunities for the Furman offense, which ultimately failed to capitalize. The Paladins limited Appalachian State to 225 total yards, including only 93 in the second half. *Incredibly, almost to the point of nausea, in the fourth quarter Appalachian State couldn't muster a single first down and only 10 total yards in 10 plays against Furman, yet the Mountaineers walked away with the victory.* Saturday's outcome was similar to last year's 16-15 loss to Appalachian State in Boone in that Furman's defense all but dominated the Mountaineers, limiting ASU to 204 yards in total offense and only 19:39 of possession time before a blown two-point conversion attempt with 7.4 seconds left in the game sealed the narrow loss. Furman currently leads the league in total defense (268.2 ypg) and is also first in passing efficiency defense (96.04 rating) and interceptions (9).

◆ **BURANT A FORCE IN THE MIDDLE**...One reason for the strong start by Furman's defense, and in particular the Paladins' solid work against the run (117.2 ypg, second in SoCon) is the strong play of junior nose guard **Michael Burant (Lexington, Va.)**. In a 28-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6, he notched a career high seven stops, including two-for-loss. The seven tackles versus the Tigers were the most by a Paladin nose guard since **B.J. Pate** notched nine stops in a 31-28 win over Chattanooga in 1998. In Saturday's loss to Appalachian State, he registered four tackles and a fumble recovery in helping Furman limit ASU to only 225 yards in total offense. Through six games, he has 24 tackles, which is one more than the 23 stops he collected in an injury plagued 2002 campaign that saw him register action in only eight contests.

◆ **RAVENELL GAINING NOTICE**...Furman redshirt freshman defensive end **Roy Ravenell (Goose Creek, S.C.)** had a major coming out performance against Appalachian State, helping key an impressive Paladin defensive effort. His work against the Mountaineers included a season high 10 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, two forced fumbles, and a sack. In six games he has compiled 25 tackles, a team high four forced fumbles, 2.5 sacks, and an interception. The interception came in a 45-0 win over Gardner-Webb and represented the first pickoff by a Paladin defensive lineman since 1996.

◆ **PRESSURING THE QB**...Furman has seven sacks in six games this year. On the surface that may not appear to be that impressive, but when considering last year the Paladins totaled a league low eight takedowns in 12 games, it marks improvement.

◆ **FURMAN LINEBACKERS MAKING THE PLAYS**...Furman's linebacking corps appears to be living up to its billing as the possibly league's strongest group as through six games the Paladins' three leading tacklers are linebackers. Leading the way is junior **Mike Killian (Atlanta, Ga.)** with a team leading 73 tackles. Next are sophomore **William Freeman (Swansea, S.C.)** and junior All-Southern Conference performer **Cedrick Ritter (Fairfax, S.C.)**, who have contributed 47 and 43 tackles, respectively. Senior All-Southern Conference performer **Keito Whetstone (Orangeburg, S.C.)**, meanwhile, has contributed 21 stops despite being sidelined for two games after sustaining a sprained ankle in the Paladins' 28-

17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6. In his absence, Freeman, in his first career start, stepped in and registered a career high 14 stops, including two tackles-for-loss, in the 31-17 triumph over Richmond on Sept. 20 on the way to earning Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Week honors. All told, the Paladin linebacker corps of Whetstone, Killian, Ritter, and Freeman have accounted for 184 tackles, nine tackles-for-loss, four pass deflections, four forced fumbles, two and a half sacks, an interception, and three fumble recoveries through six games. *Since 1975 Furman has produced 21 first team All-Southern Conference linebackers — the most of any league school.*

◆ **MARSHALL CHASING HISTORY**...Furman senior placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** upped his career kick scoring total to 277 points with a 27-yard field goal and PAT in Saturday's loss to Appalachian State. Currently third in Southern Conference in kick scoring history, he trails only Western Carolina's Kirk Roach (1984-87, 302 points) and Marshall's Dewey Klein (1998-91, 300 points). He also ranks second in Furman overall scoring history, trailing only Louis Ivory (1998-01, 318 points). Two weeks ago he booted a career high four field goals in the Paladins' 19-13 win over Western Carolina. *The league's leading scorer heading into Saturday's game against The Citadel, he has 44 points, having converted 9-of-11 field goals and 17-of-17 PATs. For his career he has drilled 44-of-55 field goal attempts (.800) and 145-of-154 PATs (.942).*

◆ **MARSHALL PICKED FOR ALL-STAR CLASSIC**...Furman senior placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** was recently selected to play in The Football Network (TFN)/Division I-AA All-Star Classic game on Tuesday, Dec. 30 at Lockhart Stadium in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

◆ **SENIOR SCARCITY**...Furman counts only five seniors on its 2003 squad and boasts only two seniors among its starting 22. The Paladins, however, are well stocked with juniors (22) and sophomores (27). Furman's offensive and defensive starting lineup against The Citadel will likely feature two seniors, 14 juniors, and six sophomores.

◆ **BRIGHAM TOPS 1,500**...Furman senior tailback Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.) paced Furman with 18 carries for 96 yards in Saturday's 13-10 loss to Appalachian State and, in the process, topped the 1,500-yard career rushing plateau (currently 1,533). Two weeks ago in the Paladins'

19-13 win at Western Carolina, he ran a career high 28 times for another career high 137 yards. He has topped 100 yards three times this season, including a pair of 110-yard outings against both Elon (24-7 win) and Richmond (31-17 win). Furman's lone senior starter on offense and SoCon's third leading rusher this year with 541 yards (90.1 ypg), he has rushed for 1,533 yards and 10 touchdowns and has averaged a solid 6.0 yards per carry in his career.

◆ **YOUNG OFFENSIVE LINE SHOWING PROMISE...**With junior center **Craig Morgan (Huntington, W.Va.)** sidelined for Furman's first four games due to a concussion sustained early in preseason practice, the Paladins' offensive line the first month of the season featured only one returning starter from a year ago, junior preseason All-Southern Conference left tackle **Ben Bainbridge (Oklahoma City, Okla.)**, and four sophomores: center **Corey Stewart (Lilburn, Ga.)**, guards **Clayton Dyson (North Augusta, S.C.)** and **Patrick Covington (Charlotte, N.C.)**, and right tackle **Brian Laggis (Stockbridge, Ga.)**. That changed with Morgan's return to the starting lineup in the Paladins' 19-13 win over Western Carolina on Oct. 11. Although Stewart, who entered the preseason as a guard, was bumped from the lineup by Morgan's return, he now counts five career starts, including one at center in the Paladins' 2002 NCAA I-AA playoff contest versus Villanova. Dyson, Covington, and Laggis, meanwhile, now have six career starts. In addition sophomore guard **Andrew Thornburg (Snellville, Ga.)** and redshirt freshman center **Jeff Fambrough (Atlanta, Ga.)** have earned quality playing time through five games, totaling 177 and 90 snaps, respectively, in backup roles. As youthfulness as Furman appears on its offensive front, its worth remembering the Paladin offensive line is under the guidance of **Clay Hendrix**, one of the league's most respected assistant coaches and developer of 20 All-Southern Conference linemen, 10 All-Americans, and four SoCon Jacobs Blocking Award winners in his 15 seasons on the Furman staff.

◆ **MR. VERSATILE...**When junior wide receiver **Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.)** and tight end **Willis Sudderth (Lilburn, Ga.)** were suspended for the Paladins' first three games, junior flanker **Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.)**, already known as one of the team's most versatile performers, stepped up his game even more. Through six games he has caught a team leading 24 passes for 310 yards and three touchdowns, rushed 17 times for 149 yards (8.8 ypc.) and two scores, and averaged 24.6 yards on nine kickoff returns. For his career he now has 55 receptions for 752 yards and eight touchdowns and has registered 25 rushes for 207 yards and three scores. He was named Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Year and All-America as a return specialist in 2001 after leading the nation in kickoff returns (37.2 avg., 3 TDs).

◆ **"SIR CAM" NEWTON...**Furman junior All-Southern Conference free safety **Cam Newton (Bennettsville, S.C.)** got his season off to a quality start in the Paladins' 24-7 win over Elon on Aug. 31, recording seven tackles, an interception, and a forced fumble on the way to earning league defensive player-of-the-week honors. In the Paladins' 19-13 win over Western Carolina two weeks ago, he came up big again with his second interception of the season and subsequent 28-yard return that set up the Paladins' lone touchdown of the game. The pickoff against the Catamounts was his eighth in now 17 career starts. He also blocked a field goal in the second half to help the Paladins preserve a 19-7 lead. He has 32 tackles in five games. A year ago he headlined a Paladin secondary that saw him register 57 tackles, nine pass deflections, and a team leading six interceptions (along with All-America cornerback **Rodney Johnson**). Newton's six pickoffs in 2002, the second highest total in the league, were especially impressive because they came in the face of a Paladin pass rush that netted a conference low eight sacks. His younger brother, **Syvelle Newton**, is a freshman football player this fall at the University of South Carolina.

◆ **A NAME YOU'RE GOING TO HEAR...**Furman is blessed with a number of solid young players, and among them is redshirt freshman strong safety **Shelton Riley (Charlotte, N.C.)**. In the Paladins win over Western Carolina two weeks ago, he registered a pair of tackles and his second interception in as many weeks. He tallied eight tackles and a pass deflection in his first career start in the Paladins' 28-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6 and a 44-yard interception return for a touchdown in the 45-0 win over Gardner-Webb. That pickoff and return for score was the first by a Paladin since the 2000 season when cornerback **Richie Jackson** gathered

in a pass by Georgia Southern quarterback **J.R. Revere** and returned in 29 yards in a 45-10 Furman win in Greenville.

◆ **PALADIN STADIUM PROWESS...**Furman enjoys a true home field advantage at Paladin Stadium (a.k.a. The Dungeon), where since 1981 (now 22-plus seasons) the purple and white have compiled a 113-30-1 record (.788) — the third highest home field winning percentage in NCAA I-AA.

◆ **NEW CENTURY: SAME WINNING TRADITION...**After posting the second most successful record in NCAA I-AA in the 1980s (83-23-4, .773), Furman registered a solid 66-48-1 mark (.578) in the 1990s. Now three-plus seasons into the new century, the Paladins are 33-12 this decade (.733), which ranks seventh among NCAA I-AA scholarship-based programs who compete for the national championship.

◆ **CONSISTENTLY COMPETITIVE...**Furman owns a solid 43-15 record (.741) in its last 58 games, and *in only four of the 14 losses have the Paladins been beaten by more than seven points.*

◆ **STEPPIN' OUT...**The 57-yard punt return for a touchdown by redshirt freshman **Justin Stepp (Pelion, S.C.)** in the 45-0 whitewash of Gardner-Webb on was the second in as many seasons for the Paladins, who last year got a 66-yard return for a score by Bear Rinehart, who led the Southern Conference in punt returns in 2002 with a 14.9 average.

◆ **GUTSY START...**Furman opened its Sept. 20 game against Richmond with a gutsy play — an onside kick, which the Paladins' **Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.)** recovered at the Spiders 48. From that point Furman drove 33 yards to the Richmond 15 for a 32-yard field goal by **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** for an early 3-0 lead.

◆ **NOT YOUR ORDINARY COMEBACK...**When Furman sophomore tailback **Brandon Mays (Arden, N.C.)** underwent surgery on Oct. 30, 2002, for ulcerative colitis and spent two weeks in the hospital, a return to football looked bleak. After having approximately 90 percent of his large intestines removed and dropping from a pre-illness weight of 190 pounds to 140, he endured two more procedures in early 2003, including reconstructive surgery. Unable to take part in spring practice In March due to his condition, he nonetheless attended every practice and offered consistent encouragement to his teammates. Through dedicated rehabilitation and the fortune of advanced medicine, Mays regained 52 pounds (to 192), strength, and endurance, and completed his comeback by rushing 11 times for 49 yards and catching one pass for nine yards in the Paladins' 24-7 win over Elon in the season opener on Aug. 30. Prior to his illness a year ago he had appeared in four games and rushed 18 times for 96 yards. As a prep at T.C. Roberson, he ran for 4,406 and 50 touchdowns in his career and was named *Asheville Citizen-Times* Offensive Player-of-the-Year after totaling 1,961 yards and 20 touchdowns his senior year.

◆ **SOCON MAN...**As head coaching tenures go, **Bobby Lamb**, who is now in his second season at the helm of the Paladin program, certainly doesn't qualify as a veteran, but when factoring in total years of association with Southern Conference schools, he could rightfully be considered a

dean of league head coaches. For Lamb, 40, the 2003 campaign marks his 22nd season at Furman. That tenure includes four seasons as a player (1982-85), 16 years as an assistant coach (1986-01), and one season as head coach (2002). No other league mentor can match that length of service to a league school.

◆ **FAMILY**...Very few coaching staffs can claim to be as close and know the school at which they work better than Furman's. That's because the Paladins' entire coaching staff, with the exception of wide receivers coach **Drew Cronic** and defensive backs coach **Jeff Farrington**, is composed of Furman graduates who enjoyed fine playing careers for the purple and white before entering the coaching ranks. Furman's staff includes defensive ends coach **Julius Dixon '90**, defensive line coach **Allen Edwards '92**, tight ends coach **Ben Hall '00**, offensive line coach **Clay Hendrix '86**, head coach **Bobby Lamb '86**, running backs coach **Tim Sorrells '81**, and defensive coordinator/linebackers coach **Steve Wilson '77**. All told, the Paladins' current coaching staff sports 81 years of collective coaching service at Furman and, counting playing tenures, has combined for 109 seasons of experience at the university.

◆ **FATHER FIGURES**...Junior **Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.)**, Furman's starting quarterback, appears set to carry on the Paladins' well established tradition of producing successful signal callers who are the sons of high school head coaches. Starting with **Tim Sorrells (1977-81)** and also including **Bobby Lamb (1982-85)**, **Philly Jones (1991-95)** and, most recently, **Billy Napier (1999-02)**, Furman has fashioned noteworthy success with quarterbacks who played for their fathers. Sorrells, who starred under his dad, **Fred Sorrells**, at Jefferson County (Tenn.) High School, quarterbacked Furman to Southern Conference titles in 1980 & '81. Lamb, a former standout at Commerce (Ga.) High School under his father, **Ray Lamb**, later helped lead Furman to a conference championship and NCAA I-AA runnerup finish in 1985. Jones, a three-year starter for the Paladins, played for his dad, **Phil Jones**, at Winder-Barrow (Ga.) High School, and Napier enjoyed a solid prep career under his father, **Bill Napier**, at Murray County (Ga.) High School before coming to Furman, where he directed the Paladins to 2001 league title and national runnerup finish. Moore, meanwhile, fashioned a fine prep tenure for his father, **Kenny Moore**, at Morgan County (Ga.) High School before joining the Furman program in 2001.

◆ **BROTHER ACT**...Furman's 2003 squad features three sets of brothers: **Hindley** and **Grant Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.)**, twins **Josh** and **Justin Stepp (Pelion, S.C.)**, and **Lockwood** and **Austin Holmes (Jacksonville, Fla.)**. Hindley, a senior tailback, transferred to Furman in 2001 following two seasons at Baylor and last year paced the Paladins in rushing with 762 yards and five touchdowns. Grant, a sophomore flanker/return specialist, joined the Paladin program this fall after spending the 2002 campaign at Vanderbilt, where he lettered as a true freshman. Josh Stepp, the 2001 Shrine Bowl MVP, is redshirt freshman quarterback who has seen action in two games this year. Brother Justin, meanwhile, is seeing plenty of action at flanker and as a punt return specialist. Lockwood Holmes serves as a reserve cornerback and member of special teams while Austin will likely redshirt this fall, also as a cornerback.

◆ **IMPRESSIVE LINEAGES**...Sophomore linebacker **Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.)** is the brother of former Clemson All-America linebacker **Chad Carson**. Andrew's father, **Tom Carson**, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, **Earle Carson**, was an end, three-year letterman, and an honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, **M.A. Carson**, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, **Tom Carson**, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who served as captain of Furman's 1931 squad. True freshman defensive end **Turner Burton** (Birmingham, Ala.) sports a strong Alabama Crimson Tide heritage. His great-grandfather, **Fred Sington**, was a two-time All-America offensive tackle at Alabama, member of the Tide's 1930 national championship team, 1955 inductee into the National Football Foundation Hall-of-Fame, and member of the Alabama Sports Hall-of-Fame. Two of Burton's uncles, **Dave Sington (1956-58)** and **Fred Sington, Jr. (1958-59)**, also played football for Alabama.

◆ **LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON**...Senior placekicker **Danny Marshall**

(Atlanta, Ga.) is the son of former Paladin defensive end **Tommy Marshall (1974-76)**, who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Sophomore cornerback **Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.)** is the son of former Furman wide receiver **Norman MacDonald (1972-74)**, and sophomore quarterback **Matt Cain (Easley, S.C.)** is the son of former Paladin assistant and current Vanderbilt offensive coordinator **Ted Cain (1971-73)**.

◆ **PALADINS AND GAMECOCKS**...Furman starting senior defensive end **Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.)** is the son of 1981 University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back **George Rogers**. Furman true freshman **Ryan McKie (Simpsonville, S.C.)** is the son of **James McKie**, who was also a running back and former teammate of Rogers at USC. McKie's cousin, **B.J. McKie**, was a basketball standout for the Gamecocks.

◆ **PALADINS IN PRESEASON POLLS**...A consensus preseason second place Southern Conference pick by league head coaches and media, Furman also recently earned No. 8 and No. 9 national rankings in Sports Network and ESPN-USA Today NCAA I-AA preseason polls. The Paladins finished the 2002 campaign ranked ninth nationally.

All-South Carolina offensive tackle **Jack Summers '47** and All-America linebacker **Kota Suttle '93**, were joined by All-America golfer **Jen Hanna '98**, All-America soccer defender **Pete Santora '98**, and four-time All-Southern Conference linkster **Todd White '90** in composing this year's class of inductees.

**JACK SUMMERS '47** — Football (1941, 42, 46)...Lexington, N.C....offensive guard/tackle...three-year letterman...first team All-South Carolina selection and honorable mention All-Southern Conference/All-America in 1942 before having career interrupted by WWII...served in Army Air Corps before returning to Furman for 1946 season...'42 Furman team went 3-6 against rugged schedule that included a 6-0 win over South Carolina...lost to Virginia Tech (7-6), Wake Forest (14-6) and Clemson (12-7)...also lost to Georgia, Tennessee, and Miami...'46 team played Alabama, Auburn, South Carolina, Georgia, Clemson, and Georgia Tech, among others, when Southern Conference included many present members of the SEC and ACC...participated in 1946 Blue-Gray All-Star Classic...following graduation served as head football coach at Fountain Inn (1947-48), Cheraw (1949-55), and Sumter (1956-60)...served as elementary school principal in Sumter from 1960-64 and assistant superintendent of School District 17 (Sumter City Schools) from 1964-80...died May 28, 1980.

**JEN HANNA '98** — Golf (1995-98)...Solon, Ohio...four-year letterwinner...1998 NGCA All-America (1st team)...1998 Edna Hartness Female Athlete of the Year...1995 Southern Conference Freshman of the Year and SoCon Player of the Year in '96 and '98...three-time all-conference...played in three NCAA Championships with a top finish of 36th at the '97 event in Columbus, Ohio (team finished 6th, 13th, and 16th)...set Furman season stroke average record (73.63) during 1997-98 campaign...currently member of LPGA Tour...resides in Greenville, S.C.

Besides increasing the school's national visibility and presence in historically one of its top markets for student recruitment, hosting the Falcons has also netted the Paladin football program two completely renovated, irrigated practice fields this year. Furman also hosted Atlanta Falcons training camps from 1971-78.



◆ **PALADINS IN THE PROS**...Furman currently has two former standouts on NFL rosters. Linebacker **Orlando Ruff '99** is beginning his fifth season in the professional ranks and first as a member of the New Orleans Saints following four campaigns with the San Diego Chargers, and safety **John Keith '00** is entering his fourth season with the San Francisco 49ers. Paladin standout tight end **Luther Broughton '97**, meanwhile, was recently cut by the Green Bay Packers, as was wide receiver **Des Kitchings '00** from the St. Louis Rams roster.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Bo Moore passed for 221 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 24-7 Southern Conference win over Elon in front of 9,174 fans at Paladin Stadium in the season opener for both teams.

The game marked the Southern Conference's debut for Elon (0-1, 0-1 SoCon), the league's newest member, and the earliest conference clash for Furman (1-0, 1-0 SoCon) since 1974.

Making his first collegiate start, Moore, a junior from Madison, Ga., completed 15-of-26 passes and added 19 yards rushing in helping the Paladins to the 17th conference home win in their last 18 games. His touchdown passes covered 41 yards to Brian Bratton and 33 yards to Brian Stone.

"We knew it was going to be a battle playing a Southern Conference game right out of the gate," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We handled Elon pretty well the last two years, but we knew they would come in here fighting, and they did. It was battle, but we're very happy right now."

"We came down here to win a ball game, and obviously we didn't get that done," said Elon head coach Al Seagraves. "We made some improvements from last year, and our kids really battled. We'll learn some things from this game, and we'll become a good football team."

Furman rolled up 463 yards in total offense to Elon's 263 and limited the Phoenix to only 56 yards and one first down in the second half.

Furman scored on its second possession of the contest, covering 68 yards on four plays highlighted by Moore's 41-yard strike to Bratton to give the Paladins a 7-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

Elon knotted the game at 7-7 with a 10-play, 66-yard march that culminated with a 32-yard burst up the middle by freshman fullback Chad Nkang at the 10:17 mark of the second period.

The Paladins regained the lead on the last play of the first half when senior Danny Marshall drilled a 41-yard field goal to make it 10-7, capping an efficient 42-yard, seven-play drive that consumed the half's final 43 seconds.

Furman carried its momentum into the second half, taking the opening kickoff and moving 66 yards in five plays for a touchdown. A pair of Moore completions to Bratton covered 26 yards, and another to Grant Brigham for 20 yards gave the Paladins the ball at the Elon 20. On the next play, Stone, a sophomore transfer from the University of Florida, took a reverse around left end for the score at the 12:36 mark of the third period and 17-7 lead.

Moore connected for his second scoring strike of the contest in the fourth quarter when he found Stone open in the corner of the end zone for a 33-yard strike on a fourth-and-16 play at the 10:55 juncture to make it 24-7.

Stone finished the game with six catches for 82 yards, and Bratton registered five receptions for 89 yards. Senior tailback Hindley Brigham headlined Furman's 242-yard ground attack with 18 rushes for 110 yards.

The Paladin defense got a game high nine tackles from junior line-backer Mike Killian, who also contributed two tackles-for-loss, a forced fumble, and a pass deflection.

CLEMSON, S.C. – Charlie Whitehurst passed for 301 yards and two touchdowns to lead Clemson to a 28-17 win over NCAA I-AA nationally seventh-ranked Furman in front of 70,000 fans at Memorial Stadium.

The victory marked Clemson's 28th consecutive victory over Furman but proved to more difficult than several recent verdicts over the Paladins, the Tigers' oldest football rival. Trailing 28-7 at intermission, Furman battled back with two scores and shutout Clemson in the second half for its closest loss in the series since a 28-21 setback in 1949.

"I was pleased with the effort of our team," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We came here to win the game. I'm not going to sugarcoat it all; we came in here to try to win the football game. We felt like we could, and we got a good effort in the second half. If we had gotten some execution in the first half, then there is not telling what would have happened."

Whitehurst completed 23-of-31 pass attempts, and connected on a 72-yard strike to Airese Curry in the first quarter to stake the Tigers to a 14-0 lead. In addition, he was credited with a freakish nine-yard touchdown pass to Duane Coleman with less than a minute to go in the first half to stretch the Tigers' advantage to 28-7.

On the play Whitehurst's pass was batted by Furman defensive end Travis Jones and gathered in by Clemson offensive tackle William Henry, who advanced the ball five yards before fumbling at the Furman nine. At that point Coleman scooped up the ball and ran it into the end zone with 41 seconds to go in the half.

Coleman's score capped the game's decisive stretch for the Tigers, who earlier took advantage of a Furman fumble to extend their lead to 21-7 lead when J.J. Howard picked up a fumbled option pitch by Furman quarterback Bo Moore and returned it 17 yards for a touchdown at the 4:58 juncture of the second quarter.

After a scoreless third period, Furman made it a 28-14 game with a 12-play, 66-yard drive that ended when Brian Bratton took a quick pitch from Moore and beat the Clemson defense to the corner of the end zone for a three-yard touchdown run at the 12:10 juncture.

After denying the Tigers a first down on the ensuing possession, Furman covered 26 yards on seven plays but on a fourth and seven play settled for a 40-yard Danny Marshall field goal with 7:50 remaining in the game to make it 28-17.

A Derrick Hamilton 66-yard kickoff return gave Clemson the ball at the Furman 32, but the Paladins' defense stiffened and Clemson's Aaron Hunt missed a 48-yard field goal with 6:40 to go.

Furman, however, couldn't maintain its offensive momentum after a 13-yard pass from Moore to Bratton gave the Paladins a first down at their 47. After losing yardage on first and second down, Moore had to cover a bad snap over his head on third down for a 16-yard loss back to the Furman 25, forcing a punt.

Clemson outgained Clemson 425-174 in total offense, but the Tigers were penalized 11 times for 111 yards in the contest. The Tigers managed only 124 yards on the ground on 40 rushing attempts.

Furman broke a 42-year touchdown scoring drought midway through the second quarter when Moore connected with Bratton on a 20-yard scoring strike to get the Paladins on the board. Bratton, who accounted for both Furman scores, finished the game with two receptions for 33 yards and a team high 41 rushing yards on 11 carries.

Mike Killian paced Furman's defense with 11 tackles and an interception, and Cedrick Ritter added 10 tackles and a sack. Cam Newton contributed nine stops for the Paladins, and nose guard Michael Burant recorded a career high seven tackles, including two for loss.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Fullback Al Means scored two fourth quarter touchdowns, including a 47-yard bolt with 1:20 left in the game, to lift NCAA I-AA nationally ninth-ranked Furman to a 31-17 win over Richmond in front of 12,452 fans at Paladin Stadium.

Means, a junior from Charlotte, N.C., snapped a 17-17 deadlock on a 1-yard touchdown plunge with 4:40 left in the game and broke a pair of tackles on the 47-yard run, the longest of his career, to seal the contest. His second score came after Furman stopped Richmond on downs at the Spiders 49 with 2:18 remaining in the game.

The game was the first between Furman (2-1) and Richmond (0-2) in Greenville since 1976, when the Spiders were then a member of the Southern Conference.

"It certainly took a long time before we got this one in the barn," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "Richmond battled us all the way, but we were very inconsistent offensively until our final two possessions. I thought our defense played well after the first series when they ran it down our throats. We got after them pretty good after that."

"We really didn't seem to stop them when we needed to," said Richmond head coach Jim Reid. "I thought we played hard but weren't physical enough. This was a very physical game."

Furman outgained Richmond 383-278 and totaled 244 yards on the ground behind senior tailback Hindley Brigham's 20-carry, 110-yard performance. Means finished the game with 74 yards on 10 carries. Paladin placekicker Danny Marshall, meanwhile, contributed seven points and, in the process, become Furman's all-time kick scoring leader with 251 points.

Furman opened the game with a little deception, recovering its own onside kick at the Richmond 48 and advancing the ball to the Spider 15, where Marshall booted a 32-yard field goal to give the Paladins a 3-0 lead.

Richmond came right back with an impressive 15-play, 84-yard drive that included a critical 29-yard leaping reception by Stacy Tutt at the Furman 17. Four plays later Kenny Dantzler scored on a 6-yard run to give the Spiders a 7-3 lead at the 4:29 mark of the first half.

A 21-yard punt return by Justin Stepp to the Richmond 36 set up Furman's next score. Two plays into the second quarter Paladins quarterback Bo Moore connected with Brian Bratton for a 20-yard touchdown pass to make it 10-7.

After stopping the Spiders on a fourth-and-nine play at the Furman 35, the Paladins put together an 11-play, 65-yard drive that resulted in a 1-yard touchdown run by Brigham for a 17-7 lead with 3:35 remaining in the half.

Richmond used an interception and 11-yard return by linebacker Kyle Kupchak to the UR 44 to set up the final score of the first half. After three plays netted only four yards, the Spiders got a break when Furman was flagged for roughing the kicker, giving Richmond a first down at the Paladins 44. Four plays later Joseph Fore drilled a 47-yard field goal on the final play of the half to make it 17-10.

After a scoreless third quarter, the Spiders knotted the game at 17-17 when Richmond quarterback and University of Virginia transfer Bryson Spinner hit David Edwards on a 4-yard scoring strike at the 7:41 mark, capping a 13-play, 68-yard drive.

Furman, however, answered by covering 66 yards in six plays, helped along by a 21-yard run by Moore and a 32-yard pass from Moore to tight end John Rust to the Richmond 1, setting up Means' go-ahead score.

The Paladins got a game high 14 tackles each from linebackers Mike Killian and William Freeman. Richmond paced by linebacker Lance Gray's 13 stops.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Hindley Brigham rushed for two touchdowns and propelled a ground attack that rolled up 389 yards in leading NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 45-0 win over Gardner-Webb.

Brigham, a senior tailback from Birmingham, Ala., scored on runs of 4 and 6 yards to help Furman take a 14-0 lead, and the Paladins rode a strong defensive effort, limiting Gardner-Webb (3-2) to 220 total yards, to notch the program's second shutout in the last nine games.

Furman's punishing rushing performance came despite six turnovers, including five in the second half after building a 24-0 halftime lead. The Paladins, however, also forced six Bulldog miscues.

"We won a game with six turnovers; I didn't that was possible," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "I thought in the first half we played pretty well, particularly on defense, but the second half was really sloppy with all the turnovers. We made several big plays when we needed them and rushed for almost 400 yards. That's pretty good, but we've still got plenty of work to do."

"We stopped them on their first possession, but a penalty on fourth down gave them a first down and they took advantage," said Gardner-Webb head coach Steve Patton. "You just can't make the number of mistakes we did against a Top 10 team and expect to win."

Furman jumped out front on its first possession, taking advantage of a fourth down offsides penalty on Gardner-Webb for a first down on a 9-play, 79-yard march that ended on a 4-yard touchdown run by Brigham.

The Paladins increased the advantage to 14-0 on Brigham's second score of the contest, a 6-yard run with less than a minute into the second quarter, to cap a 6-play, 51-yard drive.

Furman reeled off 10 straight running plays on its next possession, including a 24-yard sprint by quarterback Bo Moore to the Gardner-Webb 16, to set up a 10-yard scoring run around left end by backup tailback Lamar Rembert that made it 21-0 with 8:40 to go in the first half.

A Danny Marshall 24-yard field goal 14 seconds before intermission extended the Furman margin to 24-0.

Both teams committed a pair of third quarter turnovers before Furman's Brian Bratton took an option pitch and bolted 52 yards for a touchdown at the 2:13 juncture of the quarter for a 31-0 lead.

The Paladins added two more scores in the fourth period, including a 44-yard interception return by Shelton Riley and Justin Stepp 57-yard punt return.

Furman's ground attack, which featured 12 ballcarriers, was paced by junior quarterback Bo Moore with 12 rushes for 84 yards. Moore also threw for 96 yards, completing 10-of-17 passes but with two interceptions. His favorite target was Bratton, who collected a game high six receptions for 50 yards while also rushing for 58 yards.

Gardner-Webb was paced offensively by quarterback Nick Roberts, who completed 14-of-23 passes for 100 yards. The Bulldogs entered the game averaging 30.8 points per game.

Junior linebacker Mike Killian topped Furman's defense with 13 tackles and a fumble recovery, and sophomore linebacker William Freeman, the league's reigning defensive player-of-the-week, tallied 10 stops, a tackle-for-loss, and a sack.

CULLOWHEE, N.C. - Danny Marshall kicked a career-high four field goals to lead NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman to a 19-13 victory over Western Carolina at E.J. Whitmire Stadium.

Marshall made field goals of 42, 30, 43 and 22 yards to move into third place on the Southern Conference all-time kick scoring list with 273 points, and tailback Hindley Brigham highlighted a Paladin ground attack with a career high 137 yards in helping Furman to its sixth straight triumph over the Catamounts and third consecutive win in Cullowhee.

"It's always good to win, especially on the road in conference play," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb, whose team moved into first place in the league play with the victory. "It's never easy up here. We had a number of chances to put the game out of reach, but we let Western Carolina hang around, and that forced us to make some big plays in the last few minutes to win the game. I thought our defense was outstanding."

Bo Moore, Furman's junior quarterback from Madison, Ga., completed 14-of-18 passes for 219 yards in the contest and ran for the Paladins' lone touchdown, but it was his 43-yard pass to Brian Stone on a third-and-17 play from the Furman 33 with 2:30 to go that sealed the outcome.

The Paladins outgained Western Carolina 389-230 and limited the Catamounts to only 59 rushing yards on 21 attempts. Furman's defense, meanwhile, contained Western Carolina quarterback Brian Gaither, limiting him to only 16 completions in 34 attempts while picking off two passes. Furman hogged the football for 38:51 to Western Carolina's 21:09.

Furman fell behind early when a fumbled option pitch was recovered by Western Carolina's Rod Dunlap at the Paladin 30. From there the Catamounts covered the distance in seven plays and scored on a 4-yard run by Manny DeShauteurs to grab a 7-0 lead.

Furman answered with an eight-play, 55-yard scoring drive that included a 31-yard run by Brigham. Six plays later, Marshall hit the first of his four field goals, from 42 yards, to make it 7-3.

Furman regained possession following the Cats next offensive possession when free safety Cam Newton intercepted a Gaither pass and returned it to the WCU 7. Moore capped the short drive with a four-yard touchdown run at the 5:20 mark, giving the Paladins a 10-7 lead.

Furman extended its advantage to 13-7 with a 30-yard Marshall field goal with 1:46 to go in the first half, capping a 13-play, 74-yard drive.

A fumbled punt return by Western Carolina and recovery by Brad Bell at the Catamount 30 set up the Paladins' next score, which came four plays later when Marshall knocked through a 43-yard field goal with 1:43 left in the half to make it 16-7.

Western Carolina drove to the Furman 24 on its second possession of the second half, but Paladin defensive end Brandon Poole halted the scoring threat when he blocked a 41-yard field goal try by Chris Vought.

Furman padded its lead to 19-7 in the final seconds on the third quarter on a 22-yard Marshall field goal.

The Paladins appeared to be set to put the game away after redshirt freshman strong safety Shelton Riley intercepted a pass at the WCU 27, but, after advancing to the Catamount 9, a bad snap from center and incomplete pass attempt by holder Jeremiah Van Dora gave the Cats the ball on downs.

From there Western Carolina put together its most impressive drive of the contest, moving 91 yards in eight plays for a 22-yard touchdown pass from Gaither to Xavier Godard with 10:28 left in the game. The PAT was blocked and Furman led 19-13.

The Paladins came right back with a nine-play, 72-yard possession that included a 54-yard Moore strike to Isaac West to the Western Carolina 3, but three running plays lost nine yards, and Danny Marshall's 26-yard field goal was blocked by Albert Reid with 3:22 to go.

The Cats, however, could not take advantage and were forced to punt five plays later with 5:40 still left in the game.

Starting at its own 27, Furman turned to Brigham, who broke off a 13-yard run to get to the Furman 40. Later, facing a third-and-17 situation at its own 33, Moore connected with Stone for a 43-yard pass and a first down to the Western Carolina 24, enabling Furman to run out the clock.

Mike Killian, the league's leading tackler coming into the contest, led Furman with eight tackles and tackle-for-loss, and Cedrick Ritter tallied six stops for the Paladins. Newton added four stops, an interception, and pass deflection while nose guard Michael Burant continued to play solid ball with a pair of stops, including one-for-loss, and pass deflection.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Erik Rockhold booted two field goals and defensive end K.T. Stovall recorded nine tackles, three sacks, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery to lift Appalachian State to a 13-10 win over NCAA I-AA nationally fifth-ranked Furman at Paladin Stadium.

Rockhold's 42-yard field goal gave the Mountaineers an early 3-0 lead, and his second effort, from 34 yards in the final minute of the third quarter, put Appalachian State ahead 13-7, but it was poor execution by Furman in the red zone that delivered the win to the Mountaineers.

Five times in the second half Furman initiated possessions in Appalachian State territory, but the Paladins managed only three points. Two drives ended in fumbles at the ASU 10 and 16, and a third possession netted a 27-yard Danny Marshall field goal with 2:40 to go in the game, but only after Furman, trailing 13-7 at the time and with backup quarterback Josh Stepp on the field, had driven to the Mountaineer 1 before being penalized for illegal substitution on second down.

Both teams lost four fumbles, but it was Appalachian State that took most advantage of the turnovers.

A Stovall sack and fumble recovery at the Furman 40 helped put the Mountaineers on the board. After a 13-run by Alan Atwater to the 27, Rockhold's 42-yard field goal gave Appalachian State a 3-0 lead less than four minutes into the game.

In the second half, with the Mountaineers nursing a 10-7 lead, Jon Chasteen blocked a punt by Furman's Jeremiah Van Dora at the Paladin 23, and the Mountaineers turned it into a Rockhold 34-yard field goal with 39 seconds left in the third quarters and 13-7 advantage.

"The bottom line is we didn't execute offensively," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "Defensively we played great and kept getting the ball over and over with a chance to do something, but we just couldn't get over the hump and get it in the end zone. We stepped out of bounds at the six going in on our next to last possession; we fumbled at the 1-yard line; we dropped a touchdown pass in the end zone; and we screwed up with the substitution penalty. When you miss opportunities like we had that's how you lose games."

Furman forged a 253-225 advantage in the defensive struggle and appeared set to grab command in the game's first seconds when Brian Bratton returned the opening kickoff for a touchdown, but it was called back when the Paladins were penalized for an illegal block. Three plays later Stovall sacked Furman quarterback Bo Moore, leading to Rockhold's 42-yard field goal.

A 51-yard run by tailback Hindley Brigham to the Mountaineer 25 and 19-yard burst by Lamar Rembert to the Mountaineer 6 keyed Furman's first score of the game, which came three plays later when quarterback Bo Moore connected with Isaac West on a 6-yard scoring strike to make it 7-3 lead with 9:03 in the first quarter.

Furman's problems in the red zone began shortly thereafter when the Paladins failed to capitalize on a fumble recovery by Cedrick Ritter at the Appalachian State 24. A 20-yard pass from Moore to Bratton moved the Paladins to the Mountaineer 2, but ASU's Daniel Traylor stripped Furman fullback Al Means of the ball, and it was recovered by Corey Lynch at the line of scrimmage to end the Paladin threat.

Midway through the second quarter Appalachian State mounted its most impressive drive of the game, covering 80 yards in 10 plays for a 1-yard touchdown plunge by quarterback Richie Williams and a 10-7 lead with 4:26 to go in the half.

Furman's frustration continued in the third period when the Paladins failed to take advantage of a Roy Ravenell fumble recovery at Mountaineer 14-yard line. Two plays later ASU's Corey Lynch claimed his second recovery of the game at the Mountaineer 10.

From there Appalachian State drove to the Furman 39, but a Williams fumble halted the advance. The Mountaineers, however, came up with a decisive special teams play when Chasteen broke in from the left side and blocked Van Dora's punt to set up what proved to be Rockhold's game winning 34-yard field goal.

Furman's offensive woes overshadowed a strong Paladin defensive effort that limited the Mountaineers to no first downs and 10 total yards in the fourth quarter. Freshman defensive end Roy Ravenell tallied a season high 10 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, two forced fumbles, and a sack.
