first met in Greenville on Oct. 31, 1896 (Clemson won 14-6), and the Tigers hold a commanding 39-10-4 series advantage. While the early years of the series were competitive, the Tigers have dominated the Paladins ever since, winning 27 straight games, including a 33-0 decision in 1998 in the last meeting between the two schools. Furman's last win over Clemson, which was registered in a snowstorm, came in 1936 in Clemson by a 12-0 score.

LAST MEETING

CLEMSON, S.C. (Sept. 5, 1998) -- Clemson rolled up 414 yards in total offense and converted a pair of first quarter Furman turnovers into 10 points on the way to a 33-0 win over the Paladins in front of 70,000 fans at Memorial Stadium.

Leading 7-0 following a 1-yard run by Clemson's Javis Austin at the 6:42 mark of the first quarter, the Tigers struck for another score two minutes later after Furman quarterback Justin Hill fumbled following a sack by Adrian Dingle at the Paladin 13. David Richardson's 25-yard field goal extended the advantage to 10-0.

On its next offense series the Paladins turned it over again when a high snap from center was recovered in the end zone by Chris Jones at the 3:37 juncture to make it 17-0.

Clemson added points in each of the final three quarters and rode a strong defensive effort, limiting Furman to 125 total yards, to take the win, its 27th straight over the Paladins, who got a career high 19 tackles from safety John Keith.

NOTING THE PALADINS

◆ **SUCCESSFUL START...**Furman's 24-7 victory over Elon marked a successful start to the 98th season of football at Furman. The first school in South Carolina (along with Wofford) to play football, Furman since 1889 has rolled up a 509-387-38 record. A member of the Southern Conference since 1936, Furman has captured a record 11 league championships (1978, '80, '81, '82, '83, '85, '88, '89, '90, '99, & '01). In 1988 the Paladins became the first Southern Conference team and only private school to ever win an NCAA I-AA national title by defeating Georgia Southern 17-12 in Pocatello, Idaho.

◆ **EARLIEST WIN EVER...**Saturday's season opening win over Elon represented the earliest game ever played by Furman and the Paladins' first Southern Conference clash in an opener since 1974.

◆ **FURMAN VS. NCAA I-A...**Since being reclassified in football from NCAA I-A to I-AA in 1982 (along with the rest of the Southern Conference), Furman has proven to be more than a pushover for many I-A foes, as the Paladins have posted a credible 5-14-1 record against bigger I-A competition over the past 21 seasons. From 1982-86, Furman went 4-1-1 against I-A teams, registering wins over South Carolina (28-23, 1982),

Georgia Tech (17-14, 1983), a pair of victories over North Carolina State (34-30, 1984; 42-20, 1985), and a tie against Georgia Tech (17-17, 1986). Since 1987, however, the Paladins have gone only 1-13 against I-A competition, although Furman's 1999 foe, North Carolina, felt the lance, losing 28-3. In fairness, four of Furman's 13 losses to I-A competition since 1987 have come at the hands of nationally ranked teams, including Florida State (1987, AP 4th), Clemson (1988, AP 3rd; 1999, AP 12th), and Florida (1990, AP 20th). Against defending UPI national champion Georgia Tech in 1991, Furman was leading 17-16 and in possession of the football before a fumble at its own 22 with 1:41 left set up a 37-yard **Scott Sisson** field goal in the final seconds of play that lifted the Yellow Jackets to victory. Georgia Tech went on to defeat Stanford in the Aloha Bowl.

◆ **THIS IS HOW IT'S DONE...**While only three members of Furman's current program — linebacker **Keito Whetstone (Orangeburg, S.C.)**, defensive end **Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.)**, and tailback **Lamar Rembert (Ocala, Fla.)** — were around in 1999 (as redshirt freshmen) when the Paladins' last defeated an NCAA I-A team (North Carolina, 28-3), head coach **Bobby Lamb**, during his playing days, certainly compiled an impressive background of success against I-A competition. In 1983, his sophomore year, Lamb started in place of injured starting quarterback **David Charpia**, and engineered Furman to a 17-14 win over Georgia Tech, passing for 140 yards and a touchdown. A year later he completed 9-of-16 passes for 210 yards and two touchdowns in leading the Paladins to a 34-30 triumph over N.C. State. And, as a senior, in 1985 he torched N.C. State again, connecting on 9-of-15 passes for 167 yards and four touchdowns in a 42-20 rout of the Wolfpack.

◆ **FAMILIAR FACE...**There have been many interesting ties between Furman and Clemson over the years, which is not surprising when considering the two schools are only 30 miles apart, have competed against each other in football for over 100 years, and at one time shared membership in the Southern Conference. When the Paladins take to the field Saturday against the Tigers, facing them across the field will be recently graduated Paladin standout quarterback **Billy Napier '03**, now in his first year on the Tigers' staff. A year ago the Chatsworth, Ga., native engineered Furman to an 8-4 record and program record fourth straight NCAA I-AA playoff berth by passing for a school record 2,475 yards, finishing second in the nation in passing efficiency (157.14 rating), and setting a new league season completion percentage standard (68.5 percent, 189x276, 16 TDs). As a junior in 2001, he helped lead Furman to a 13-2 record and national runnerup finish. Napier finished his career as the Paladins' third all-time leading passer with 4,756 yards and 28 touchdowns. His 64.8 career

completion percentage is also a conference record, and his 147.15 passing efficiency rating ranks second only to **Bobby Lamb**, his former position coach and current Paladin head coach.

◆ **IMPRESSIVE GENES...**Clemson sophomore starting quarterback **Charlie Whitehurst**, who over the years attended many Furman Quarterbacks and Receivers Camps before enrolling at Clemson, appears to have inherited his father David's genes and listened well to the former Paladin standout quarterback. Credited by many as the genus of Furman's well known outstanding quarterbacks tradition, **David Whitehurst '77** starred for the Paladins from 1973-76 before going on the NFL, where he spent six years with the Green Bay Packers. During his Paladin career the 1984 Furman Athletics Hall-of-Fame inductee threw for 3,122 yards and 22 touchdowns but also proved adept as a runner in Furman's option attack by totaling 1,270 yards and 18 scores. As a senior he helped pace Furman to a 17-12 win over N.C. State and 17-10 triumph over league champion East Carolina. His career rushing standard for quarterbacks stood until the 2000 campaign before being surpassed by **Justin Hill** (1,741 yards).

◆ **HERE AND THERE...****David Whitehurst** was recruited to Furman by Paladin head coach **Art Baker** (1973-77), who had served as an assistant coach at Clemson under **Frank Howard** (1965-69). Baker also hired **Bobby Johnson** as an assistant coach at Furman following a fine collegiate career as a receiver and defensive back for the Tigers (1970-72). Johnson, who later recorded two stints at Clemson in 1981 (as an academic advisor) and in 1993 (as defensive coordinator under **Ken Hatfield**), served as head coach at Furman (1994-01) and compiled a 60-36 record, two Southern Conference titles, and a national runnerup finish in 2001 before being named head coach at Vanderbilt in December of 2001. Clemson Director of Strength Training **Joey Batson** spent three years in the same capacity at Furman (1994-96) before joining the Tigers' staff. **George Bennett**, the executive director of IPTAY, Clemson's athletics fundraising organization, served as Furman's athletics director from 1986-89.

◆ **IT'S THE PANTS...**Furman and Clemson combined for one of the most colorful uniform stories in sports history during the 1960 season. On Oct. 8 of that year Clemson wore water repellent pants in a 21-7 afternoon home win over Virginia. After the game, the pants were shipped to Furman, where the Hurricane (as Furman was known at that time), wore them that night in a 25-23 triumph over William & Mary. Furman head coach **Bob King** said after the win, "After those big Clemson boys got out of those pants, some of our guys had a hard time making them stay up, and we had to tape the legs of the pants for several players."

◆ **ANYBODY SEEN THE END ZONE?...**Although Furman and Clemson have only played nine times since 1961, the Paladins' scoring futility against Clemson, at least as far as touchdowns are concerned, can't be overlooked. The last time a Furman player scored a touchdown against Clemson occurred when quarterback **Billy Canty** crossed the goal line on a three-yard run in the fourth quarter of a 35-6 Paladin loss to the Tigers in 1961. Since then Furman has gone 24 quarters without scoring a touchdown versus Clemson, having tallied only 15 points (five field goals) versus the Tigers' 235 points over the eight-game span.

◆ **MOORE STEPS UP...**Furman junior quarterback **Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.)** delivered solid play in his first career start Saturday in the Paladins' 24-7 victory over Elon, completing 15-of-26 passes for 221 yards and two touchdowns. His scoring strikes covered 41 and 33 yards, and he also tacked on 19 yards rushing to finish the contest with 240 yards in total offense while also averaging 42.3 yards on three punts out of the shotgun formation. For Moore, whose strong play helped Furman roll up 463 yards in total offense, the quality start versus Elon stands in stark contrast to the first start registered by his predecessors **Billy Napier** against East Tennessee State during the 2000 season and **Justin Hill** versus Elon in 1997.

◆ **QUALITY DEPTH ON DISPLAY...**Furman's depth in the receiver corps was on display in the Paladins' 24-7 triumph over Elon. With leading returning receiver split end **Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.)** and two-time All-Southern Conference tight end **Willis Sudderth (Lilburn, Ga.)** sitting out the first of three games due to suspensions, the Paladins turned to junior flanker **Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.)** and sophomore split end **Brian Stone (Nashville, Tenn.)** for production, and the duo delivered in a big way. Despite nursing a sore shoulder, Bratton responded with five receptions for 89 yards and a touchdown, and Stone, who joined the program in the spring following a year at the University of Florida, added six catches for 82 yards and a touchdown. In addition to the receptions, Bratton reeled off a reverse for 32 yards, and Stone scored a second touchdown on a 20-yard reverse run to cap a very strong season opener for the Paladins' two starting wide receivers.

◆ **NOT YOUR ORDINARY COMEBACK...**When Furman sophomore tailback **Brandon Mays (Arden, N.C.)** underwent surgery on Oct. 30, 2002, for ulcerative colitis and spent two weeks in the hospital, a return to football looked bleak. After having approximately 90 percent of his large intestines removed and dropping from a pre-illness weight of 190 pounds to 140, he endured two more procedures in early 2003, including reconstructive surgery. Unable to take part in spring practice in March due to his condition, he nonetheless attended every practice and offered consistent encouragement to his teammates. Through dedicated rehabilitation and the fortune of advanced medicine, Mays regained 52 pounds (to 192), strength, and endurance, and completed his comeback by rushing 11 times for 49 yards and catching one pass for nine yards in Saturday's 24-7 win over Elon. Prior to his illness a year ago he had appeared in four games and rushed 18 times for 96 yards. As a prep at T.C. Roberson, he ran for 4,406 and 50 touchdowns in his career and was named *Asheville Citizen-Times* Offensive Player-of-the-Year after totaling 1,961 yards and 20 touchdowns his senior year.

◆ **DEFENSE SHINES VERSUS ELON...**Although its defense was, in essence, "flying blind" due to Elon's offensive scheme change from a year ago, Furman made some impressive adjustments at halftime on the way to a solid overall performance in the season opener. In the first half the Paladins yielded 175 total yards and seven points to the Phoenix, but in the second half it was a totally different story as Furman's defense pitched a shutout and limited Elon to only one first down and 56 total yards. The dominance was also reflected in time of possession as the Paladins controlled the football for 18:51 to Elon's 11:09 over the final 30 minutes of action.

◆ **"GENERAL" MARSHALL...**For the fourth straight year Furman's placekicking chores will be handled by **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)**, a preseason All-Southern Conference selection who in on the verge of establishing himself as the most productive kicker in Furman football history. In Saturday's season opener, Marshall, in addition to making all three PATs, knocked down a key 41-yard field goal on the last play of the first half to give the Paladins' a 10-7 halftime lead. A year ago he converted 12-of-15 field goals and 39-of-42 PATs to lead Furman in scoring with 75 points. In three seasons he has connected on 36-of-45 field goal attempts (.800) and 131-of-140 PATs (.936) on the way to 239 points, which ranks second on the school's kick scoring ledger, only nine points behind Jason Wells (248 points, 1996-99). Furman's record holder for most consecutive field goals made (12), Marshall also handles kickoffs for the Paladins.

◆ **“SIR CAM” NEWTON**...Furman junior All-Southern Conference free safety **Cam Newton (Bennettsville, S.C.)** got his season off to a quality start Saturday in the Paladins’ 24-7 win over Elon, recording seven tackles, an interception, and a forced fumble on the way to earning league defensive player-of-the-week honors. For Newton, the interception was his seventh in 13 career starts, and the forced fumble stopped an Elon drive at the Paladin two-yard line. A year ago he headlined a Paladin secondary that saw him register 57 tackles, nine pass deflections, and a team leading six interceptions (along with All-America cornerback **Rodney Johnson**). Newton’s six pickoffs in 2002, the second highest total in the league, were especially impressive because they came in the face of a near anemic Paladin pass rush that netted a conference low eight sacks. His younger brother, **Syvelle Newton**, is a high profile freshman this fall at South Carolina.

◆ **THE EXPERIENCE FACTOR**...Furman counts only five seniors on its 2003 squad but is well stocked with juniors (22) and sophomores (27). Excluding junior tight end **Willis Sudderth (Lilburn, Ga.)** and junior split end **Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.)**, who will sit out the Paladins’ first three games due to suspensions, Furman’s offensive and defensive starting lineup against Clemson will feature only 10 returning regulars from a year ago. The biggest deficiency is on offense, where the Paladins’ lineup has combined for only 36 career starts. All told, Furman’s lineup Saturday will include three seniors, 11 juniors, and eight sophomores. In Furman’s season opening 24-7 win over Elon, nine Paladins earned their first career starts.

◆ **NEW FACES ON OFFENSIVE LINE**...Furman’s biggest rebuilding task in 2003 clearly lies on its offensive front, where the Paladins return only two starters from a year ago. That number was down to one for the season opener against Elon as junior center **Craig Morgan** was sidelined after missing much of the preseason with a concussion, leaving junior left tackle **Ben Bainbridge** as the only returning regular from a year ago. Recording their first career starts against the Phoenix were sophomore guards **Clayton Dyson** and **Patrick Covington**, and sophomore right tackle **Brian Laggis** — the three of whom entered the season with a combined total of 318 snaps among them. Sophomore **Corey Stewart** earned his second consecutive start at center after posting a start in the Paladins’ 2002 season finale versus Villanova to finish with 203 play participations as a true freshman. As youthful as Furman appears on its offensive front, its worth remembering that the Paladin offensive line is under the guidance of **Clay Hendrix**, one of the league’s most respected assistant coaches and developer of 20 All-Southern Conference linemen, 10 All-Americans, and four SoCon Jacobs Blocking Award winners in his 15 seasons on the Furman staff.

◆ **LOOKING FOR A PASS RUSH**...One of Furman’s top priorities in 2003 is to improve its pass rush, which last year netted a league low eight quarterback takedowns in 12 games. Looking to improve on that number will be senior defensive end **Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.)** and junior defensive end **Travis Jones (Greenville, S.C.)**. Poole, who registered two of the Paladins’ eight sacks a year ago, has seven career takedowns and needs only three more to crack Furman’s career sacks ledger. Jones, meanwhile, takes over for graduated defensive end **Eddie Overdyke**, who finished his tenure with 10 quarterback takedowns, good for a tie for eighth all-time at Furman. In addition to a talented linebacking corps that is certain to be used in its share of blitz schemes, the Paladins could get a lift from impressive redshirt defensive end **Roy Ravenell (Goose Creek, S.C.)** in its bid to pressure opposing quarterbacks.

◆ **CONSISTENTLY COMPETITIVE**...Furman owns a solid 40-13 record (.755) in its last 53 games, and in only three of the 13 losses have the Paladins been beaten by more than seven points.

◆ **SOCON MAN**...As head coaching tenures go, **Bobby Lamb**, who is now in his second season at the helm of the Paladin program, certainly doesn’t qualify as a veteran, but when factoring in total years of association with Southern Conference schools, he could rightfully be considered a dean of league head coaches. For Lamb, 40, the 2003 campaign marks his 22nd season at Furman. That tenure includes four seasons as a player (1982-85), 16 years as an assistant coach (1986-01), and one season as head coach (2002). No other league mentor can match that length of service to a league school.

◆ **FAMILY**...Very few coaching staffs can claim to be as close and know the school at which they work better than Furman’s. That’s because the Paladins’ entire coaching staff, with the exception of wide receivers coach **Drew Cronic** and defensive backs coach **Jeff Farrington**, is composed of Furman graduates who enjoyed fine playing careers for the purple and white before entering the coaching ranks. Furman’s staff includes defensive ends coach **Julius Dixon ‘90**, defensive line coach **Allen Edwards ‘92**, tight ends coach **Ben Hall ‘00**, offensive line coach **Clay Hendrix ‘86**, head coach **Bobby Lamb ‘86**, running backs coach **Tim Sorrells ‘81**, and

defensive coordinator/linebackers coach **Steve Wilson '77**. All told, the Paladins' current coaching staff sports 81 years of collective coaching service at Furman and, counting playing tenures, has combined for 109 seasons of experience at the university.

◆ **FATHER FIGURES**...Junior **Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.)**, Furman's starting quarterback, appears set to carry on the Paladins' well established tradition of producing successful signal callers who are the sons of high school head coaches. Starting with **Tim Sorrells (1977-81)** and also including **Bobby Lamb (1982-85)**, **Philly Jones (1991-95)** and, most recently, **Billy Napier (1999-02)**, Furman has fashioned noteworthy success with quarterbacks who played for their fathers. Sorrells, who starred under his dad, **Fred Sorrells**, at Jefferson County (Tenn.) High School, quarterbacked Furman to Southern Conference titles in 1980 & '81. Lamb, a former standout at Commerce (Ga.) High School under his father, **Ray Lamb**, later helped lead Furman to a conference championship and NCAA I-AA runnerup finish in 1985. Jones, a three-year starter for the Paladins, played for his dad, **Phil Jones**, at Winder-Barrow (Ga.) High School, and Napier enjoyed a solid prep career under his father, **Bill Napier**, at Murray County (Ga.) High School before coming to Furman, where he directed the Paladins to 2001 league title and national runnerup finish. Moore, meanwhile, fashioned a fine prep tenure for his father, **Kenny Moore**, at Morgan County (Ga.) High School before joining the Furman program in 2001.

◆ **BROTHER ACT**...Furman's 2003 squad features three sets of brothers: **Hindley** and **Grant Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.)**, twins **Josh** and **Justin Stepp (Pelion, S.C.)**, and **Lockwood** and **Austin Holmes (Jacksonville, Fla.)**. Hindley, a senior tailback, transferred to Furman in 2001 following two seasons at Baylor and last year paced the Paladins in rushing with 762 yards and five touchdowns. Grant, a sophomore flanker/return specialist, joined the Paladin program this fall after spending the 2002 campaign at Vanderbilt, where he lettered as a true freshman. Josh Stepp, the 2001 Shrine Bowl MVP, is redshirt freshman quarterback who will compete for backup action this fall. Brother Justin, meanwhile, should see plenty of action at flanker and return specialist this year. Lockwood Holmes will serve as a reserve cornerback and on special teams this fall while Austin will likely redshirt this fall, also as a cornerback.

◆ **IMPRESSIVE LINEAGES**...Sophomore linebacker **Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.)** is the brother of former Clemson All-America linebacker **Chad Carson**. Andrew's father, **Tom Carson**, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, **Earle Carson**, was an end, three-year letterman, and an honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, **M.A. Carson**, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, **Tom Carson**, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who served as captain of Furman's 1931 squad. True freshman defensive end **Turner Burton (Birmingham, Ala.)** sports a strong Alabama Crimson Tide heritage. His great-grandfather, **Fred Sington**, was a two-time All-America offensive tackle at Alabama, member of the Tide's 1930 national championship team, 1955 inductee into the National Football Foundation Hall-of-Fame, and member of the Alabama Sports Hall-of-Fame. Two of Burton's uncles, **Dave Sington (1956-58)** and **Fred Sington, Jr. (1958-59)**, also played football for Alabama.

◆ **LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON**...Senior placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** is the son of former Paladin defensive end **Tommy Marshall (1974-76)**, who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Sophomore cornerback **Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.)** is the son of former Furman wide receiver **Norman MacDonald (1972-74)**.

◆ **PALADINS AND GAMECOCKS**...Furman starting senior defensive end **Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.)** is the son of 1981 University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back **George Rogers**. Furman true freshman **Ryan McKie (Simpsonville, S.C.)** is the son of **James McKie**, who was also a running back and former teammate of Rogers at USC. McKie's cousin, **B.J. McKie**, was a basketball standout for the Gamecocks.

◆ **PALADINS IN PRESEASON POLLS**...A consensus preseason

second place Southern Conference pick by league head coaches and media, Furman also recently earned No. 8 and No. 9 national rankings in Sports Network and ESPN-USA Today NCAA I-AA preseason polls. The Paladins finished the 2002 campaign ranked ninth nationally.

◆ **2003 FURMAN HALL-OF-FAME INDUCTEES**...Two former football standouts were among five athletic greats who were enshrined in Furman's Athletic Hall-of-Fame prior to last Saturday's Furman-Elon game. All-South Carolina offensive tackle **Jack Summers '47** and All-America linebacker **Kota Suttle '93**, were joined by All-America golfer **Jen Hanna '98**, All-America soccer defender **Pete Santora '98**, and four-time All-Southern Conference linkster **Todd White '90** in composing this year's class of inductees.

JACK SUMMERS '47 — Football (1941, 42, 46)...Lexington, N.C....offensive guard/tackle...three-year letterman...first team All-South Carolina selection and honorable mention All-Southern Conference/All-America in 1942 before having career interrupted by WWII...served in Army Air Corps before returning to Furman for 1946 season... '42 Furman team went 3-6 against rugged schedule that included a 6-0 win over South Carolina...lost to Virginia Tech (7-6), Wake Forest (14-6) and Clemson (12-7)...also lost to Georgia, Tennessee, and Miami... '46 team played Alabama, Auburn, South Carolina, Georgia, Clemson, and Georgia Tech, among others, when Southern Conference included many present members of the SEC and ACC...participated in 1946 Blue-Gray All-Star Classic...following

graduation served as head football coach at Fountain Inn (1947-48), Cheraw (1949-55), and Sumter (1956-60)...served as elementary school principal in Sumter from 1960-64 and assistant superintendent of School District 17 (Sumter City Schools) from 1964-80...died May 28, 1980.

PETE SANTORA '98 — Men's Soccer (1994-97)...defender...four-year letterwinner...four-year starter...first team NSCAA All-America selection in 1996 and in '97 (was the first 1st team All America in Furman soccer history)...Southern Conference Player-of-the-Year in 1997...NSCAA All-South Region selection in 1995 (3rd team), '96 (1st team), and '97 (1st team)...participant in the 1997 Umbro Select All-Star Game...three-time all-conference selection — 1994, 1996, 1997...named to the SoCon All-Tournament Team in 1995...two-time SoCon Academic Honor Roll member...scored 12 goals and recorded nine assists for 33 points over his career as a defender...team posted three conference regular season and three tournament championships during his tenure, including wins over Louisville, Clemson, South Carolina, Florida International, Wake Forest, and Vanderbilt...1996 squad finished season ranked 16th in the nation...1997 team finished 19th nationally...following graduation played two seasons of

professional A-League soccer with the Albuquerque Ghekos and Jacksonville Cyclones...currently resides in Atlanta, Ga., where he is the founding partner of Nacional, LLC, a national soccer camp organization.

TODD WHITE '90 — Men's Golf (1987-90)...Spartanburg, S.C...four-time All-Southern Conference selection and team MVP...honorable mention All-America selection in 1989...won four individual tournament championships during his career, including 1988 Wofford Invitational and '88 Southern Conference Championship and 1989 and '90 Furman Intercollegiates...member of '88 Southern Conference championship team...participated in 1989 NCAA Tournament and NCAA East-West Team Matches...honorable mention All-American selection in 1989...ranks third on Furman's career stroke average chart with a 73.85 mark...won 1990 South Carolina Amateur and 1991 state amateur match-play championship...1995 United States Open participant...currently teaching at Dorman High School in Spartanburg, S.C., where he also serves as golf coach.

◆ **FALCONS AND FURMAN**...Furman has served as the summer training camp home of the Atlanta Falcons for the past four seasons and will continue to do so for at least the next two years. Lauded by head coach Dan Reeves as the best training camp site he's experienced in his long tenure in the NFL, Furman benefits greatly from its partnership with the the Falcons. Besides increasing the school's national visibility and presence in historically one of its top markets for student recruitment, hosting the Falcons has also netted the Paladin football program two completely renovated, irrigated practice fields this year. Furman also hosted Atlanta Falcons training camps from 1971-78.



◆ **PALADINS IN THE PROS**...Furman currently has two former standouts on NFL rosters. Linebacker **Orlando Ruff '99** is beginning his fifth season in the professional ranks and first as a member of the New Orleans Saints following four campaigns with the San Diego Chargers, and safety **John Keith '00** is entering his fourth season with the San Francisco 49ers. GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Bo Moore passed for 221 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 24-7 Southern Conference win over Elon in front of 9,174 fans at Paladin Stadium in the season opener for both teams.

The game marked the Southern Conference's debut for Elon (0-1, 0-1 SoCon), the league's newest member, and the earliest conference clash for Furman (1-0, 1-0 SoCon) since 1974.

Making his first collegiate start, Moore, a junior from Madison, Ga., completed 15-of-26 passes and added 19 yards rushing in helping the Paladins to the 17th conference home win in their last 18 games. His touchdown passes covered 41 yards to Brian Bratton and 33 yards to Brian Stone.

"We knew it was going to be a battle playing a Southern Conference game right out of the gate," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We handled Elon pretty well the last two years, but we knew they would come in here fighting, and they did. It was battle, but we're very happy right now."

"We came down here to win a ball game, and obviously we didn't get that done," said Elon head coach Al Seagraves. "We made some improvements from last year, and our kids really battled. We'll learn some things from this game, and we'll become a good football team."

Furman rolled up 463 yards in total offense to Elon's 263 and limited the Phoenix to only 56 yards and one first down in the second half.

Furman scored on its second possession of the contest, covering 68 yards on four plays highlighted by Moore's 41-yard strike to Bratton to give the Paladins a 7-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

Elon knotted the game at 7-7 with a 10-play, 66-yard march that culminated with a 32-yard burst up the middle by freshman fullback Chad Nkang at the 10:17 mark of the second period.

The Paladins regained the lead on the last play of the first half when senior Danny Marshall drilled a 41-yard field goal to make it 10-7, capping an efficient 42-yard, seven-play drive that consumed the half's final 43 seconds.

Furman carried its momentum into the second half, taking the opening kickoff and moving 66 yards in five plays for a touchdown. A pair of Moore completions to Bratton covered 26 yards, and another to Grant Brigham for 20 yards gave the Paladins the ball at the Elon 20. On the next play, Stone, a sophomore transfer from the University of Florida, took a reverse around left end for the score at the 12:36 mark of the third period and 17-7 lead.

Moore connected for his second scoring strike of the contest in the fourth quarter when he found Stone open in the corner of the end zone for a 33-yard strike on a fourth-and-16 play at the 10:55 juncture to make it 24-7.

Stone finished the game with six catches for 82 yards, and Bratton registered five receptions for 89 yards. Senior tailback Hindley Brigham headlined Furman's 242-yard ground attack with 18 rushes for 110 yards.

The Paladin defense got a game high nine tackles from junior line-backer Mike Killian, who also contributed two tackles-for-loss, a forced fumble, and a pass deflection.
