THE GAME

Furman kicks off the 2003 season on Saturday when it hosts new Southern Conference member Elon at Paladin Stadium in a 7:00 p.m. game televised by Comcast/Charter Sports Southeast (CSS). The contest will highlight Paladin Club/Hall-of-Fame Night at Furman and represent the league conference debut for the Phoenix, who will be making their fifth consecutive trip to Greenville since 1999. The August 30 season opener marks the earliest inaugural in Furman football history and first time since 1974 the Paladins have opened the season versus a conference opponent (vs. VMI, 0-7 loss).

LAST MEETING

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- A two-hour lightning delay didn't faze NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman as quarterback Billy Napier threw for 237 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Paladins to a 57-7 romp over Elon and hand head coach Bobby Lamb his first collegiate victory.

Napier connected with split end Isaac West on three of his four touchdown strikes, including a 78-yarder on the Paladins' first offensive play to give Furman a quick 7-0 lead. The duo later hooked up on scoring tosses covering 71 and 11 yards to help put the Paladins ahead 35-0 after the first quarter.

"I told the guys in the locker room that we should start every game at 9:00 p.m.," said Lamb after his team was forced to wait two hours before kickoff due to lightning and heavy rains. "I was really proud of the defense after what happened last week (versus Vanderbilt). Offensively our plan was to go up top. When Billy hit Isaac striding, that really got us going and jump started us for a big first half."

"It was bang, bang so quickly in the first quarter that we really didn't have much of a chance to get in the game," said Elon coach Al Seagraves. "They gashed us and took us to the wood shed early."

Furman's 35-point first quarter matched the highest scoring quarter in school history, and West's three touchdown receptions tied a school record held by two others. Napier, who completed 8-of-10 passes, exited the game along with many of Furman's offensive starters early in the second quarter after fullback Al Means' 1-yard touchdown plunge put the Paladins ahead 42-0 at the 12:11 mark.

The Paladins, who found the end zone on their first six possessions, closed out the first half scoring outburst when backup quarterback Bo Moore connected with Brian Bratton on a 9-yard touchdown pass with 0:36 left to make it 49-0.

Elon avoided the shutout when James Murdaugh hit Kyle Belkoski on a 23-yard touchdown pass with 1:32 left in the game.

Furman, which turned to reserves for the entire second half, rolled up 542 yards in offense, including 327 through the air. West's three receptions went for touchdowns and accounted for 160 yards, and redshirt freshman tailback Brandon Mays paced all rushers with 88 yards on 15 carries.

NOTING THE PALADINS

- ♦ FURMAN TO KICK OFF 98TH SEASON...The 2003 season opener against Elon will mark the 98th season of football at Furman. The first school in South Carolina (along with Wofford) to play football, Furman since 1889 has rolled up a 508-387-38 record. A member of the Southern Conference since 1936, Furman has captured a record 11 league championships (1978, '80, '81, '82, '83, '85, '88, '89, '90, '99, & '01). In 1988 the Paladins became the first Southern Conference team and only private school to ever win an NCAA I-AA national title by defeating Georgia Southern 17-12 in Pocatello, Idaho.
- ♦ THE NEWCOMER AND VETERAN...Saturday's Furman-Elon game represents the Southern Conference debut for Elon, the league's newest member. For the Paladins, meanwhile, the clash will mark the 376th conference game in Furman history.
- ♦ SOCON MAN...As head coaching tenures go, Bobby Lamb '86, who is beginning his second season at the helm of the Paladin program, certainly doesn't qualify as a veteran, but when factoring in total years of association with Southern Conference schools, he could rightfully be considered the dean of league head coaches. For Lamb, 40, the 2003 campaign will mark his 22nd season at Furman. That tenure includes four seasons as a player (1982-85), 16 years as an assistant coach (1986-01), and one season as head coach (2002). No other league mentor can match that length of service to a league school.
- ♦ FAMILY...Very few coaching staffs can claim to be as close and know the school at which they work better than Furman's. That's because the Paladins' entire coaching staff, with the exception of wide receivers coach Drew Cronic and defensive backs coach Jeff Farrington, is composed of Furman graduates who enjoyed fine playing careers for the purple and white before entering the coaching ranks. Furman's staff includes defensive ends coach Julius Dixon '90, defensive line coach Allen Edwards '92, tight ends coach Ben Hall '00, offensive line coach Clay Hendrix '86, head coach Bobby Lamb '86, running backs coach Tim Sorrells '81, and defensive coordinator/linebackers coach Steve Wilson '77. All told, the Paladins' current coaching staff sports 81 years of collective coaching service at Furman and, counting playing tenures, has combined for 109 seasons of experience at the university.
- ♦ FURMAN LOOKING TO IMPROVE IN SEASON OPENERS...Counting last year's 49-18 loss to Vanderbilt, Furman is only 3-7 in its last 10 season openers. Furman's mediocre success in recent season inaugurals can be attributed, in part, to the competition, as six of the last 10 season openers have included Clemson (1994, '96, & '98), Georgia Tech (1995), Wyoming (2001), and Vanderbilt (2002). Despite its recent struggles, Furman owns a 54-41-2 overall record (.567) in season openers over the years. Furman reeled off 20 straight season opening wins from

1920-40, including triumphs over Virginia (13-10, 1923) and Duke (13-7, 1927; 6-0, 1928), among others.

◆ PALADINS IN PRESEASON POLLS...A consensus preseason second place Southern Conference pick by league head coaches and media, Furman also recently earned No. 8 and No. 9 national rankings in Sports Network and ESPN-USA Today NCAA I-AA preseason polls. - ♦ PALADIN STADIUM PUNCH...Furman enjoys a true home field advantage at Paladin Stadium, where since 1981 (22 seasons) the purple and white have compiled a 110-29-1 record (.789). Over the past three campaigns, Furman has been especially tough at home, having registered a 19-2 mark (.905). Included in that stretch is an 11-1 record (.917) versus Southern Conference opposition. Going back to 1998, the Paladins are 16-1 (.941) against league competition in Paladin Stadium.
- ♦ THE EXPERIENCE FACTOR...Furman counts only five seniors on its 2003 squad but is well stocked with juniors (22) and sophomores (27). Excluding junior tight end Willis Sudderth (Lilburn, Ga.) and junior split end Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.), who will sit out the Paladins' first three games due to suspensions, Furman's offensive and defensive starting lineup against Elon will feature only 10 returning regulars from a year ago. That youth is evident in the number of total career starts in the Paladins' probable starting 22 against the Phoenix. The biggest deficiency is on offense, where the Paladins' lineup has combined for only 25 career starts. All told, Furman's starting lineup Saturday includes three seniors, 11 juniors, and eight sophomores.

- ◆ FATHER FIGURES...Junior Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.), Furman's projected starting quarterback against Elon, appears set to carry on the Paladins' well established tradition of producing successful signal callers who are the sons of high school head coaches. Starting with **Tim Sorrells** (1977-81) and also including **Bobby Lamb** (1982-85), **Philly Jones** (1991-95) and, most recently, Billy Napier (1999-02), Furman has enjoyed noteworthy success with quarterbacks who played for their fathers. Sorrells, who starred under his dad, Fred Sorrells, at Jefferson County (Tenn.) High School, quarterbacked Furman to Southern Conference titles in 1980 & '81. Lamb, a former standout at Commerce (Ga.) High School under his father, Ray Lamb, later helped lead Furman to a conference championship and NCAA I-AA runnerup finish in 1985. Jones, a three-year starter for the Paladins, played for his dad, Phil Jones, at Winder-Barrow (Ga.) High School, and Napier enjoyed a solid prep career under his father, Bill Napier, at Murray County (Ga.) High School before coming to Furman, where he directed the Paladins to 2001 league title and national runnerup finish. Moore, meanwhile, fashioned a fine prep tenure for his father, Kenny Moore, at Morgan County (Ga.) High School before joining the Furman program in 2001.
- ♦ LOOKING FOR A PASS RUSH...One of Furman's top priorities in 2003 is to improve its pass rush, which last year netted a league low eight quarterback takedowns in 12 games. Looking to improve on that number will be senior defensive end Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.) and junior defensive end Travis Jones (Greenville, S.C.). Poole, who registered two of the Paladins' eight sacks a year ago, has seven career takedowns and needs only three more to crack Furman's career sacks ledger. Jones, meanwhile, takes over for graduated defensive end Eddie Overdyke, who finished his tenure with 10 quarterback takedowns, good for a tie for eighth all-time at Furman. In addition to a talented linebacking corps that is certain to be used in its share of blitz schemes, the Paladins could get a lift from impressive redshirt defensive end Roy Ravenell (Goose Creek, S.C.) in its bid to pressure opposing quarterbacks.
- ♦ "SIR CAM" NEWTON...Furman junior All-Southern Conference free safety Cam Newton (Bennettsville, S.C.) headlines a Paladin secondary following a stellar 2002 campaign that saw him register 57 tackles, nine pass deflections, and a team leading six interceptions (along with All-America cornerback Rodney Johnson). Newton's six pickoffs, the second highest total in the league, were especially impressive because they came in the face of a near anemic Paladin pass rush that netted a conference low eight sacks. His younger brother, Syvelle Newton, is a high profile freshman this fall at the University of South Carolina.
- ♦ NOT YOUR ORDINARY COMEBACK...When Furman sophomore tailback Brandon Mays (Arden, N.C.) underwent surgery on Oct. 30, 2002, for ulcerative colitis, and spent two weeks in the hospital, a return to football looked fairly bleak. After having approximately 90 percent of his large intestines removed and dropping from a pre-illness weight of 190

- pounds to 140, he endured two more procedures in early 2003, including reconstructive surgery. Unable to take part in spring practice In March due to his condition, he nonetheless attended every practice and offered consistent encouragement to his teammates. Through dedicated rehabilitation and the fortune of advanced medicine, Mays has regained 52 pounds (to 192), strength, and endurance, and appears set to complete his near miraculous comeback as he heads into the season opener against Elon as the Paladins' backup tailback behind starter Hindley Brigham. Prior to his illness a year ago he had appeared in four games and rushed 18 times for 96 yards. As a prep at T.C. Roberson, he ran for 4,406 and 50 touchdowns in his career and was named Asheville Citizen-Times Offensive Player-of-the-Year after totaling 1,961 yards and 20 touchdowns his senior year.
- ♦ BROTHER ACT...Furman's 2003 squad features three sets of brothers: Hindley and Grant Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.), twins Josh and Justin Stepp (Pelion, S.C.), and Lockwood and Austin Holmes (Jacksonville, Fla.). Hindley, a senior tailback, transferred to Furman in 2001 following two seasons at Baylor and last year paced the Paladins in rushing with 762 yards and five touchdowns. Grant, a sophomore flanker/return specialist, joined the Paladin program this fall after spending the 2002 campaign at Vanderbilt, where he lettered as a true freshman. Josh Stepp, the 2001 Shrine Bowl MVP, is redshirt freshman quarterback who will compete for backup action this fall. Brother Justin, meanwhile, appears to have the inside track to start at flanker against Elon. Lockwood Holmes will serve as a reserve cornerback and on special teams this fall while Austin will likely redshirt this fall, also as a cornerback.
- ♦ IMPRESSIVE LINEAGES...Sophomore linebacker Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.) is the brother of former Clemson All-America linebacker Chad Carson. Andrew's father, Tom Carson, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, Earle Carson, was an end, three-year letterman, and an honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, M.A. Carson, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, Tom Carson, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who serve as captain of Furman's 1931 squad. True freshman defensive end Turner Burton (Birmingham, Ala.) sports a strong Alabama Crimson Tide heritage. His great-grandfather, Fred Sington, was a two-time All-America offensive tackle at Alabama, member of the Tide's 1930 national championship team, 1955 inductee into the National Football Foundation Hall-of-Fame, and member of the Alabama Sports Hall-of-Fame. Two of Burton's uncles, Dave Sington (1956-58) and Fred Sington, Jr. (1958-59), also played football for Alabama.
- ♦ LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON...Senior placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Sophomore cornerback Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.) is the son of former Furman wide receiver Norman MacDonald (1972-74).
- ♦ PALADINS AND GAMECOCKS...Furman starting senior defensive end Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.) is the son of 1981 University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back George Rogers. Furman true freshman Ryan McKie (Simpsonville, S.C.) is the son of James McKie, who was also a running back and former teammate of Rogers at USC. McKie's cousin, B.J. McKie, was a basketball standout for the Gamecocks.
- ♦ NEW FACES ON OFFENSIVE LINE...Furman's biggest rebuilding task this year lies clearly on its offensive front, where the Paladins return only two starters from a year ago. That number may actually be down to one for the season opener against Elon, as junior center Craig Morgan is listed as doubtful after missing much of the preseason with a concussion, leaving junior left tackle Ben Bainbridge as the only returning regular from a year ago. Expected to get their first career starts against the Phoenix are sophomore guards Clayton Dyson and Patrick Covington, and sophomore right tackle Brian Laggis the three of whom have a combined total of 318 snaps among them. At center sophomore Corey Stewart appears to be in line to step in for Morgan, which he did in the Paladins' 2002 season finale versus Villanova to finish with 203 play

participations as a true freshman. As youthful as Furman appears on its offensive front, its worth remembering that the Paladin offensive line is under the guidance of **Clay Hendrix**, one of the league's most respected assistant coaches and developer of 20 All-Southern Conference linemen, 10 All-Americans, and four SoCon Jacobs Blocking Award winners in his 15 seasons on the Furman staff.

◆ CONSISTENTLY COMPETITIVE...Furman owns a solid 39-13 record (.750) in its last 52 games, and in only three of the 13 losses have the Paladins been beaten by more than seven points.

♦ "GENERAL" MARSHALL...Furman's placekicking chores will be handled by Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.), a preseason All-Southern Conference selection who in on the verge of establishing himself as the most productive kicker in Furman football history. A year ago he converted 12-of-15 field goals and 39-of-42 PATs to lead Furman in scoring with 75 points. In three seasons he has connected on 35-of-44 field goal attempts (.795) and 128-of-137 PATs (.929) on the way to 233 points, which ranks second on the school's kick scoring ledger, only 15 points behind Jason Wells (248 points, 1996-99). Furman's record holder for most consecutive field goals made (12), Marshall could very well find himself serving as the team's punter, as well as handling kickoff duties, this fall.

Furman's Athletic Hall-of-Fame prior to Saturday's Furman-Elon game. All-South Carolina offensive tackle **Jack Summers '47** and All-America linebacker **Kota Suttle '93**, will be joined by All-America golfer **Jen Hanna '98**, All-America soccer defender **Pete Santora '98**, and four-time All-Southern Conference linkster **Todd White '90** in composing this year's class of inductees.

JACK SUMMERS '47 — Football (1941, 42, 46)...Lexington, N.C....offensive guard/tackle...three-year letterman...first team All-South Carolina selection and honorable mention All-Southern Conference/All-America in 1942 before having career interrupted by WWII....served in Army Air Corps before returning to Furman for 1946 season...'42 Furman team went 3-6 against rugged schedule that included a 6-0 win over South Carolina...lost to Virgina Tech (7-6), Wake Forest (14-6) and Clemson (12-7)...also lost to Georgia, Tennessee, and Miami...'46 team played Alabama, Auburn, South Carolina, Georgia, Clemson, and Georgia Tech, among others, when Southern Conference included many present members of the SEC and ACC...participated in 1946 Blue-Gray All-Star Classic...following graduation served as head football coach at Fountain Inn (1947-48), Cheraw (1949-55), and Sumter (1956-60)...served as elementary school principal in Sumter from 1960-64 and assistant superintendent of School District 17 (Sumter City Schools) from 1964-80...died May 28, 1980.

♦ FALCONS AND FURMAN...Furman has served as the summer training camp home of the Atlanta Falcons for the past four seasons and will continue to do so for at least the next two years. Lauded by head coach Dan Reeves as the best training camp site he's experienced in his long tenure in the NFL, Furman benefits greatly from its partnership with the the Falcons. Besides increasing



the school's national visibility and presence in historically one of its top markets for student recruitment, hosting the Falcons has also netted the Paladin football program two completely renovated, irrigated practice fields this year. Furman also hosted Atlanta Falcons training camps from 1971-78.

♦ PALADINS IN THE PROS...Furman currently has four former standouts on NFL rosters. Linebacker Orlando Ruff '99 is beginning his fifth season in the professional ranks and first as a member of the New Orleans Saints following four campaigns with the San Diego Chargers, and safety John Keith '00 is entering his fourth season with the San Francisco 49ers. Paladin standout tight end Luther Broughton '97, meanwhile, was signed by the Green Bay Packers in the preseason after sitting out the entire 2002 season. A six-year veteran, his



career includes two stints each with the Philadelphia Eagles and Carolina Panthers. The other Paladin in the NFL is wide receiver **Des Kitchings '00**, who is currently with the St. Louis Rams — his fourth NFL team following short stops with the Kansas City Chiefs, New York Jets, and Indianapolis Colts.


