THE GAME

NCAA I-AA ninth-ranked Furman will renew a rivalry with one-time Southern Conference foe Richmond this Saturday when the two square off for the second straight year but for only the second time since 1977. The Paladins were idle last Saturday following a 28-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6; Richmond, meanwhile, dropped its season opener at 11th-ranked Delaware, 44-14, on Saturday. The Furman-Richmond contest will highlight Tobacco Free Kids Night at Furman and will include a fireworks show sponsored by Publix following the game.

THE SERIES

In a series that got its start in 1922 with a 13-0 Richmond win in Greenville, the Spiders own a 15-8 advantage over the Paladins. Last year, in the first clash between the two schools since 1977, Furman claimed a 17-7 win at Richmond to snap a three-game series losing streak to the Spiders, who have won 10 of the last 13 meetings with the Paladins. along with Furman joined the Southern Conference in 1936, exited the league following the 1975 season before later joining the football-only Yankee Conference, which was incorporated into the Atlantic 10 Conference in the mid 1990s. Saturday's game will mark the Spiders' first visit to Greenville since 1976, when Richmond topped Furman 13-9 at Sirrine Stadium. In all games played in Greenville, the Spiders are 7-3 versus Furman; in Richmond, the Spiders sport an 8-6 record against the Paladins.

LAST MEETING

RICHMOND,VA. (Sept. 21, 2002) -- Billy Napier threw for 219 yards and rushed for 27 yards and a key fourth quarter touchdown to lead NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman to a 17-7 win over 22nd-ranked Richmond.

Napier completed 19-of-26 passes to pace Furman's offense, but it was his I-yard sneak into the end zone with 10:38 left in the game that broke open a 10-7 contest and gave the Paladins a 17-7 lead. Furman's decisive drive covered 69 yards in 10 plays and included a 32-yard run by tailback Toreico O'Neal to the Spiders' 3-yard line.

The key fourth quarter score came two possessions after the Paladins stopped Richmond on downs at the Furman I. Trailing 10-7, the Spiders' Danny Young picked off a Napier pass and returned it I I yards to the Paladins' 34. Three plays later quarterback D'Arcy Wills connected with Dan McNair for 20 yards to the Furman 8. Two rushes by Lee Williams and a run by Wills moved the ball at the I, but Wills was stopped a foot short of the goal line on fourth down.

In the first meeting between the Paladins and Spiders since 1977, Furman grabbed an early 7-0 after taking the opening kickoff and moving

71 yards in 11 plays for a 4-yard touchdown run by tailback Hindley Brigham.
Richmond answered on its first possession by marching 81 yards in
15 plays for a 1-yard touchdown plunge by Wills to knot the game at 7-7.

Late in the first quarter Furman suffered a big blow when sophomore split end Isaac West, the Southern Conference's leading receiver, sustained a fractured collarbone. West, who the previous week caught three touchdown passes in the Paladins' 57-7 win over Elon, was sidelined for three games.

With its speedy wide receiver out of the contest, the Paladins turned to senior All-Southern Conference flanker Bear Rinehart, and he responded with a career high nine receptions for 94 yards, including a pair of catches covering 25 yards to help set up a 39-yard Danny Marshall field goal midway through the second quarter to give Furman a 10-7 advantage.

Furman's goal line stand highlighted a scoreless third quarter that saw the Paladins' offense saddled with poor field position, starting a pair of drives at the 3 and 1 yard lines.

Not until its third possession of the second half was Furman able to grab good field position following a 10-yard punt return by Rinehart to the Paladin 31, which initiated the Paladins' decisive 69-yard touchdown drive

Furman outgained Richmond 385-249 and displayed solid balance, rushing for 166 yards and passing for 219. Other than one interception, the Paladins played error free football and recorded their first penalty free game since the 1995 season in a 24-3 win over The Citadel in Charleston.

Brigham paced all rushers with 60 yards on 14 carries, and sophomore Brian Bratton stepped in for the injured West to nab five catches for 60 yards. Sophomore linebackers Mike Killian and Cedrick Ritter paced Furman's defensive effort with 11 and 10 tackles respectively, with Ritter also adding a tackle-for-loss, a fumble recovery, and a pass deflection.

NOTING THE PALADINS

- ♦ FLASHBACK...Current Furman defensive coordinator Steve Wilson was a senior linebacker for the Paladins the last time Furman and Richmond last met on the football field in Greenville (Sirrine Stadium, Oct. 23, 1976). Wilson was sidelined for the Richmond contest with a knee injury, and the Paladins lost 13-9 on the way to a 6-4-1 record that year in the Spiders' last season as a member of the Southern Conference.
- ♦ SUCCESS VERSUS THE OLD DOMINION...Since 1980, Furman has fashioned a 30-2 record against teams from Virginia, and the Paladins are currently riding a 12-game winning streak against teams from the Old Dominion. Over two thirds of Furman's 30 victories over Virginia programs since 1980 have been registered against former Southern Conference member VMI (21-0), with the others coming over Liberty (3-0), James Madison (2-0), Richmond (1-0), and William & Mary (3-2). The Tribe's 28-26 triumph over the Paladins in Greenville in 1994 marked the last time a team from Virginia downed Furman. Since that contest, Furman has recorded back-to-back wins over the Tribe (52-6 in 1999; 34-10 in 2000), nine consecutive wins over VMI, and a 17-7 triumph over Richmond last year. During the aforementioned winning streak, Furman has outscored

the opposition 43.0 to 13.2.

- ♦ TOUGH AT HOME OF LATE...Since 1999 Furman has posted a 24-4 record in Paladin Stadium (.857). That stretch includes a 22-2 regular season worksheet (.917) and 16-1 slate (.941) versus Southern Conference competition. Included in that time frame was a 14-0 record against league foes that, when added to a 31-28 triumph over Chattanooga in the 1998 season finale, accounted for a school record 15-game conference home winning streak before being halted last year.
- ♦ NEW CENTURY: SAME WINNING TRADITION...After posting the second most successful record in NCAA I-AA in the 1980s (83-23-4, .773), Furman registered a solid 66-48-1 mark (.578) in the 1990s. Now three-plus seasons into the new century, the Paladins are 30-1 I this decade (.732), which ranks seventh among NCAA I-AA scholarship-based programs who compete for the national championship.

- ♦ LONG TIME COMING...When junior flanker Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.) scored on a 20-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.) in the second quarter of Furman's 28-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6, it represented the first touchdown scored by Furman against Clemson since the fourth quarter of a 35-6 loss to the Tigers in 1961, covering a span of eight-plus games (33 quarters). The 11-point loss to the Tigers marked the Paladins' narrowest setback in the series since a 28-21 decision in 1949. Trailing 28-7 at intermission, Furman outscored Clemson 10-0 over the final two quarters.
- ♦ MARSHALL KNOCKING ON HISTORY'S DOOR...In converting two PAT attempts and a 40-yard field goal in Furman's 28-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6, senior All-Southern Conference placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) moved closer to becoming the most productive kicker in Furman football history. With 244 career points, he is only four points shy of current record holder Jason Wells (248 points, 1996-99) and currently ranks seventh in conference kick scoring history. Marshall, who connected on a 41-yard field goal in the Paladins' season opening 24-7 win over Elon, has proven to be quite an offensive threat in his fine Paladin career, having made good on 37-of-46 field goal attempts (.804) and 133-of-142 PATs (.937) since 2000. Last year he converted 12-of-14 field goals on the way leading Furman in scoring with 75 points. In addition he holds the school record for most consecutive field goals made (12), which he accomplished over two seasons (2000-01). He has made nine of his last 10 attempts, including three from 40+yards.

- ♦ MARSHALL PICKED FOR ALL-STAR CLASSIC...Furman senior placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) has been selected to play in The Football Network (TFN)/Division I-AA All-Star Classic game on Tuesday, Dec. 30 at Lockhart Stadium in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. The game will be broadcast by TFN nationally and on regional sports networks around the country to an estimated audience of 35 million people.
- ♦ MOORE STEPPING UP...Furman junior quarterback Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.) delivered solid play in his first career start in the Paladins' 24-7 victory over Elon on Aug. 30, completing 15-of-26 passes for 221 yards and two touchdowns. His scoring strikes covered 41 and 33 yards, and he also tacked on 19 yards rushing to finish the contest with 240 yards in total offense while also averaging 42.3 yards on three punts out of the shotgun formation. Although he threw for only 80 yards in the Paladins' 28-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6, he did complete 10-of-15 passes and a touchdown. Two games into his career as a starter, he has connected on 25-of-41 pass attempts (61.0 percent) and three touchdowns (no interceptions) and owns a league best 146.79 pass efficiency rating.
- ♦ NOT YOUR ORDINARY COMEBACK...When Furman sophomore tailback Brandon Mays (Arden, N.C.) underwent surgery on Oct. 30, 2002, for ulcerative colitis and spent two weeks in the hospital, a return to football looked bleak. After having approximately 90 percent of his large intestines removed and dropping from a pre-illness weight of 190 pounds to 140, he endured two more procedures in early 2003, including reconstructive surgery. Unable to take part in spring practice In March due to his condition, he nonetheless attended every practice and offered consistent encouragement to his teammates. Through dedicated rehabilitation and the fortune of advanCed medicine, Mays regained 52 pounds (to 192), strength, and endurance, and completed his comeback by rushing 11 times for 49 yards and catching one pass for nine yards in the Paladins' 24-7 win over Elon in the season opener on Aug. 30. Prior to his illness a year ago he had appeared in four games and rushed 18 times for 96 yards. As a prep at T.C. Roberson, he ran for 4,406 and 50 touchdowns in his career and was named Asheville Citizen-Times Offensive Player-of-the-Year after totaling 1,961 yards and 20 touchdowns his senior year.
- ◆ QUALITY DEPTH IN RECEIVING CORPS...Furman's depth in the receiver corps was on display in the Paladins' season opening, 24-7 triumph over Elon. With leading returning receiver split end Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.) and two-time All-Southern Conference tight end Willis Sudderth (Lilburn, Ga.) sitting out three games due to suspensions, the Paladins turned to junior flanker Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.) and sophomore split end Brian Stone (Nashville, Tenn.) for production, and the duo delivered in a big way. Despite nursing a sore shoulder, Bratton responded with five receptions for 89 yards and a touchdown, and Stone, who joined the program in the spring following a year at the University of Florida, added six catches for 82 yards and a touchdown. In addition to the receptions, Bratton reeled off a reverse for 32 yards, and Stone scored a second touchdown on a 20-yard reverse run to cap a very strong season opener for the Paladins' two starting wide receivers. Bratton followed up his work against Elon with two receptions for 33 yards in the 28-17 loss to Clemson, including a 20-yard touchdown catch. He also led the Paladins in rushing against the Tigers with 11 carries for 41 yards and a score.
- ♦ NEW FACES ON OFFENSIVE LINE...Furman's biggest rebuild-

ing task in 2003 clearly lies on its offensive front, where the Paladins headed into the preseason with only two returning starters from a year ago. That number was reduced to one in early August when junior center Craig Morgan (Huntington, W.Va.) was sidelined with a concussion, leaving junior left tackle Ben Bainbridge (Oklahoma City, Okla.) as the only returning regular from a year ago. Bainbridge has been joined in the starting lineup in Furman's first two games by four sophomores, including guards Clayton Dyson (North Augusta, S.C.) and Patrick Covington (Charlotte, N.C.), and right tackle Brian Laggis (Stockbridge, Ga.) — the three of whom entered the season with a combined total of 318 snaps among them. Sophomore Corey Stewart, meanwhile, earned only his third consecutive start at center versus Clemson after posting an emergency start (for Morgan) in the Paladins' 2002 season finale versus Villanova. As youthful as Furman appears on its offensive front, its worth remembering that the Paladin offensive line is under the guidance of Clay Hendrix, one of the league's most respected assistant coaches and developer of 20 All-Southern Conference linemen, 10 All-Americans, and four SoCon Jacobs Blocking Award winners in his 15 seasons on the Furman staff.

- ♦ BURANT GAINING NOTICE...Junior nose guard Michael Burant (Lexington, Va.) has gotten off to a solid start this year. In the season opener he tallied five tackles in the Paladins' 24-7 win over Elon. In game two he notched a career high seven stops, including two-for-loss, in the Paladins' 28-17 setback at Clemson. The seven tackles versus the Tigers were the most by a Paladin nose guard since B.J. Pate notched nine stops in a 31-28 win over Chattanooga in 1998. With 12 tackles through two games, Burant is over halfway to the 23 stops he collected an injury plagued 2002 campaign that saw him register action in only eight games.
- ♦ SACK 'EM UP...One of Furman's biggest goals in 2003 is improving its pass rush, which last year ranked last in the Southern Conference with only eight sacks. After failing to record a sack in the 24-7 season opening win over Elon on Aug. 30, Furman notched a pair of takedowns in the 28-17 loss at Clemson. Linebacker Cedrick Ritter (Fairfax, S.C.) and strong safety Daniel South (Snellville, Ga.) accounted for sacks of Tiger quarterback Charlie Whitehurst. Also looking to contribute to Furman's pass rush will be defensive ends Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.) and Travis Jones (Greenville, S.C.). Poole, who registered two of the Paladins' eight sacks a year ago, has seven career takedowns and needs only three more to crack Furman's career sacks ledger. The Paladins could get a lift from impressive redshirt defensive end Roy Ravenell (Goose Creek, S.C.) in its bid to pressure opposing quarterbacks.
- ♦ LINEBACKERS MAKING THE PLAYS...Furman's linebacking corps appears to be living up to its billing as the league's strongest group as through two games four of the the Paladins' five leading tacklers are linebackers. Leading the way is junior middle linebacker Mike Killian (Atlanta, Ga.) with a team leading 22 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, an interception, forced fumble, and pass deflection. Against Clemson he tallied II stops, including a tackle-for-loss, and an interception. Next is junior weakside linebacker Cedrick Ritter (Fairfax, S.C.), a 2002 All-Southern Conference performer, with 17 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, and a sack. Ranked fourth on the team in tackles is senior strong side linebacker and returning all-conference standout Keito Whetstone (Orangeburg, **S.C.**) with 15 stops and a pass deflection, and following him is versatile sophomore William Freeman (Swansea, S.C.) with 12 tackles and pass breakup. All told Furman's linebackers have accounted for 66 tackles, four tackles-for-loss, a sack, an interception, a forced fumble, and three pass deflections in two games.
- ♦ "SIR CAM" NEWTON...Furman junior All-Southern Conference free safety Cam Newton (Bennettsville, S.C.) got his season off to a quality start in the Paladins' 24-7 win over Elon, recording seven tackles, an interception, and a forced fumble on the way to earning league defensive player-of-the-week honors. For Newton, the interception was his seventh in now 14 career starts, and the forced fumble stopped an Elon drive at the Paladin two-yard line. Counting his nine tackles against Clemson, he has 16 tackles in two games. A year ago he headlined a Paladin secondary that saw him register 57 tackles, nine pass deflections, and a team leading six interceptions (along with All-America cornerback Rodney Johnson). Newton's six pickoffs in 2002, the second highest total in the league, were

especially impressive because they came in the face of an anemic Paladin pass rush that netted a conference low eight sacks. His younger brother, **Syvelle Newton**, is a high profile freshman this fall at South Carolina.

- ♦ THE LIFE OF RILEY...Redshirt freshman strong safety Shelton Riley (Charlotte, N.C.) stepped in for the ailing Daniel South (Snellville, Ga.) and tallied eight tackles and a pass deflection in his first career start in the Paladins' 28-17 loss to Clemson. Another newcomer who registered quality play against the Tigers was redshirt freshman defensive end Roy Ravenell (Goose Creek, S.C.), who tallied four tackles and a pair of forced fumbles.
- ♦ THE EXPERIENCE FACTOR...Furman counts only five seniors on its 2003 squad but is well stocked with juniors (22) and sophomores (27). Excluding junior tight end Willis Sudderth (Lilburn, Ga.) and junior split end Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.), who are sitting out the Paladins' first three games due to suspensions, Furman's offensive and defensive starting lineup against Richmond will feature only 10 returning regulars from a year ago. The biggest deficiency is on offense, where the Paladins' lineup has combined for only 47 career starts. All told, Furman's lineup against the Spiders this Saturday will include three seniors, 11 juniors, and eight sophomores.

- ♦ SOCON MAN...As head coaching tenures go, Bobby Lamb, who is now in his second season at the helm of the Paladin program, certainly doesn't qualify as a veteran, but when factoring in total years of association with Southern Conference schools, he could rightfully be considered a dean of league head coaches. For Lamb, 40, the 2003 campaign marks his 22nd season at Furman. That tenure includes four seasons as a player (1982-85), 16 years as an assistant coach (1986-01), and one season as head coach (2002). No other league mentor can match that length of service to a league school.
- ♦ FAMILY...Very few coaching staffs can claim to be as close and know the school at which they work better than Furman's. That's because the Paladins' entire coaching staff, with the exception of wide receivers coach Drew Cronic and defensive backs coach Jeff Farrington, is composed of Furman graduates who enjoyed fine playing careers for the purple and white before entering the coaching ranks. Furman's staff includes defensive ends coach Julius Dixon '90, defensive line coach Allen Edwards '92, tight ends coach Ben Hall '00, offensive line coach Clay Hendrix '86, head coach Bobby Lamb '86, running backs coach Tim Sorrells '81, and defensive coordinator/linebackers coach Steve Wilson '77. All told, the

Paladins' current coaching staff sports 81 years of collective coaching service at Furman and, counting playing tenures, has combined for 109 seasons of experience at the university.

- ◆ FATHER FIGURES...|unior Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.), Furman's starting quarterback, appears set to carry on the Paladins' well established tradition of producing successful signal callers who are the sons of high school head coaches. Starting with Tim Sorrells (1977-81) and also including Bobby Lamb (1982-85), Philly Jones (1991-95) and, most recently, Billy Napier (1999-02), Furman has fashioned noteworthy success with quarterbacks who played for their fathers. Sorrells, who starred under his dad, Fred Sorrells, at Jefferson County (Tenn.) High School, quarterbacked Furman to Southern Conference titles in 1980 & '81. Lamb, a former standout at Commerce (Ga.) High School under his father, Ray Lamb, later helped lead Furman to a conference championship and NCAA I-AA runnerup finish in 1985. Jones, a three-year starter for the Paladins, played for his dad, Phil Jones, at Winder-Barrow (Ga.) High School, and Napier enjoyed a solid prep career under his father, Bill Napier, at Murray County (Ga.) High School before coming to Furman, where he directed the Paladins to 2001 league title and national runnerup finish. Moore, meanwhile, fashioned a fine prep tenure for his father, Kenny Moore, at Morgan County (Ga.) High School before joining the Furman program in 2001.
- ♦ BROTHER ACT...Furman's 2003 squad features three sets of brothers: Hindley and Grant Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.), twins Josh and Justin Stepp (Pelion, S.C.), and Lockwood and Austin Holmes (Jacksonville, Fla.). Hindley, a senior tailback, transferred to Furman in 2001 following two seasons at Baylor and last year paced the Paladins in rushing with 762 yards and five touchdowns. Grant, a sophomore flanker/return specialist, joined the Paladin program this fall after spending the 2002 campaign at Vanderbilt, where he lettered as a true freshman. Josh Stepp, the 2001 Shrine Bowl MVP, is redshirt freshman quarterback who will compete for backup action this fall. Brother Justin, meanwhile, is seeing plenty of action at flanker and as a punt return specialist. Lockwood Holmes serves as a reserve cornerback and member of special teams while Austin will likely redshirt this fall, also as a cornerback.
- ◆ IMPRESSIVE LINEAGES...Sophomore linebacker Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.) is the brother of former Clemson All-America linebacker Chad Carson. Andrew's father, Tom Carson, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, Earle Carson, was an end, three-year letterman, and an honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, M.A. Carson, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, Tom Carson, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who serve as captain of Furman's 1931 squad. True freshman defensive end Turner Burton (Birmingham, Ala.) sports a strong Alabama Crimson Tide heritage. His great-grandfather, Fred Sington, was a two-time All-America offensive tackle at Alabama, member of the Tide's 1930 national championship team, 1955 inductee into the National Football Foundation Hall-of-Fame, and member of the Alabama Sports Hall-of-Fame. Two of Burton's uncles, Dave Sington (1956-58) and Fred Sington, Jr. (1958-59), also played football for Alabama.
- ♦ LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON...Senior placekicker Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.) is the son of former Paladin defensive end Tommy Marshall (1974-76), who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship. Sophomore cornerback Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.) is the son of former Furman wide receiver Norman MacDonald (1972-74), and sophomore quarterback Matt Cain (Easley, S.C.) is the son of former Paladin assistant and current Vanderbilt offensive coordinator Ted Cain (1971-73).
- ◆ PALADINS AND GAMECOCKS...Furman starting senior defensive end Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.) is the son of 1981 University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back George Rogers. Furman true freshman Ryan McKie (Simpsonville, S.C.) is the son of James McKie, who was also a running back and former teammate of Rogers at USC. McKie's cousin, B.J. McKie, was a basketball standout for

the Gamecocks.

♦ PALADINS IN PRESEASON POLLS...A consensus preseason second place Southern Conference pick by league head coaches and media, Furman also recently earned No. 8 and No. 9 national rankings in Sports Network and ESPN-USA Today NCAA I-AA preseason polls. The Paladins finished the 2002 campaign ranked ninth nationally.

♦ 2003 FURMAN HALL-OF-FAME INDUCTEES...Two former football standouts were among five athletic greats who were enshrined in Furman's Athletic Hall-of-Fame prior to the Paladins' season opener versus Elon on Aug. 30. All-South Carolina offensive tackle Jack Summers '47 and All-America linebacker Kota Suttle '93, were joined by All-America golfer Jen Hanna '98, All-America soccer defender Pete Santora '98, and four-time All-Southern Conference linkster Todd White '90 in composing this year's class of inductees.

JACK SUMMERS '47 — Football (1941, 42, 46)...Lexington, N.C....offensive guard/tackle...three-year letterman...first team All-South Carolina selection and honorable mention All-Southern Conference/All-America in 1942 before having career interrupted by WWII....served in Army Air Corps before returning to Furman for 1946 season...'42 Furman team went 3-6 against rugged schedule that included a 6-0 win over South Carolina...lost to Virgina Tech (7-6), Wake Forest (14-6) and Clemson (12-7)...also lost to Georgia, Tennessee, and Miami...'46 team played Alabama, Auburn, South Carolina, Georgia, Clemson, and Georgia Tech, among others, when Southern Conference included many present members of the SEC and ACC...participated in 1946 Blue-Gray All-Star Classic...following graduation served as head football coach at Fountain Inn (1947-48), Cheraw (1949-55), and Sumter (1956-60)...served as elementary school principal in Sumter from 1960-64 and assistant superintendent of School District 17 (Sumter City Schools) from 1964-80...died May 28, 1980.

PETE SANTORA '98 — Men's Soccer (1994-97)...defender...fouryear letterwinner...four-year starter...first team NSCAA All-America selection in 1996 and in '97 (was the first 1st team All America in Furman soccer history)...Southern Conference Player-of-the-Year in 1997...NSCAA All-South Region selection in 1995 (3rd team), '96 (1st team), and '97 (1st team)...participant in the 1997 Umbro Select All-Star Game...three-time all-conference selection — 1994, 1996, 1997...named to the SoCon All-Tournament Team in 1995...two-time SoCon Academic Honor Roll member...scored 12 goals and recorded nine assists for 33 points over his career as a defender...team posted three conference regular season and three tournament championships during his tenure, including wins over Louisville, Clemson, South Carolina, Florida International, Wake Forest, and Vanderbilt... ♦ FALCONS AND FURMAN...Furman has served as the summer training camp home of the Atlanta Falcons for the past four seasons and will continue to do so for at least the next two years. Lauded by head coach Dan Reeves as the best training camp site he's experienced in his long tenure in the NFL, Furman benefits greatly from its partnership with the the Falcons. Besides increasing the school's



national visibility and presence in historically one of its top markets for student recruitment, hosting the Falcons has also netted the Paladin football program two completely renovated, irrigated practice fields this year. Furman also hosted Atlanta Falcons training camps from 1971-78.

♦ PALADINS IN THE PROS...Furman currently has two former standouts on NFL rosters. Linebacker Orlando Ruff '99 is beginning his fifth season in the professional ranks and first as a member of the New Orleans Saints following four campaigns with the San Diego Chargers, and safety John Keith '00 is entering his fourth season with the San Francisco 49ers. Paladin standout tight end Luther Broughton '97, meanwhile, was recently cut by the Green Bay Packers, as was wide receiver Des Kitchings '00 from the St. Louis Rams roster.

Paladin Stadium Attendance: 9,174

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Bo Moore passed for 221 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 24-7 Southern Conference win over Elon in front of 9,174 fans at Paladin Stadium in the season opener for both teams.

The game marked the Southern Conference's debut for Elon (0-1, 0-1 SoCon), the league's newest member, and the earliest conference clash for Furman (1-0, 1-0 SoCon) since 1974.

Making his first collegiate start, Moore, a junior from Madison, Ga., completed 15-of-26 passes and added 19 yards rushing in helping the Paladins to the 17th conference home win in their last 18 games. His touchdown passes covered 41 yards to Brian Bratton and 33 yards to Brian Stone

"We knew it was going to be a battle playing a Southern Conference game right out of the gate," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We handled Elon pretty well the last two years, but we knew they would come in here fighting, and they did. It was battle, but we're very happy right now."

"We came down here to win a ball game, and obviously we didn't get that done," said Elon head coach Al Seagraves. "We made some improvements from last year, and our kids really battled. We'll learn some things from this game, and we'll become a good football team."

Furman rolled up 463 yards in total offense to Elon's 263 and limited the Phoenix to only 56 yards and one first down in the second half.

Furman scored on its second possession of the contest, covering 68 yards on four plays highlighted by Moore's 41-yard strike to Bratton to give the Paladins a 7-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

Elon knotted the game at 7-7 with a 10-play, 66-yard march that culminated with a 32-yard burst up the middle by freshman fullback Chad Nkang at the 10:17 mark of the second period.

The Paladins regained the lead on the last play of the first half when senior Danny Marshall drilled a 41-yard field goal to make it 10-7, capping an efficient 42-yard, seven-play drive that consumed the half's final 43 seconds.

Furman carried its momentum into the second half, taking the opening kickoff and moving 66 yards in five plays for a touchdown. A pair of Moore completions to Bratton covered 26 yards, and another to Grant Brigham for 20 yards gave the Paladins the ball at the Elon 20. On the next play, Stone, a sophomore transfer from the University of Florida, took a reverse around left end for the score at the 12:36 mark of the third period and 17-7 lead.

Moore connected for his second scoring strike of the contest in the fourth quarter when he found Stone open in the corner of the end zone for a 33-yard strike on a fourth-and-16 play at the 10:55 juncture to make it 24-7.

Stone finished the game with six catches for 82 yards, and Bratton registered five receptions for 89 yards. Senior tailback Hindley Brigham headlined Furman's 242-yard ground attack with 18 rushes for 110 yards.

The Paladin defense got a game high nine tackles from junior line-backer Mike Killian, who also contributed two tackles-for-loss, a forced fumble, and a pass deflection.

Clemson 28, Furman 17 September 6, 2003

Memorial Stadium Attendance: 70,000

CLEMSON, S.C. – Charlie Whitehurst passed for 301 yards and two touchdowns to lead Clemson to a 28-17 win over NCAA I-AA nationally seventh-ranked Furman in front of 70,000 fans at Memorial Stadium,

The victory marked Clemson's 28th consecutive victory over Furman but proved to more difficult than several recent verdicts over the Paladins, the Tigers' oldest football rival. Trailing 28-7 at intermission, Furman battled back with two scores and shutout Clemson in the second half for its closest loss in the series since a 28-21 setback in 1949.

"I was pleased with the effort of our team," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We came here to win the game. I'm not going to sugarcoat it all; we came in here to try to win the football game. We felt like we could, and we got a good effort in the second half. If we had gotten some execution in the first half, then there is not telling what would have happened."

Whitehurst completed 23-of-31 pass attempts, and connected on a 72-yard strike to Airese Curry in the first quarter to stake the Tigers to a 14-0 lead. In addition, he was credited with a freakish nine-yard touchdown pass to Duane Coleman with less than a minute to go in the first half to stretch the Tigers' advantage to 28-7.

On the play Whitehurst's pass was batted by Furman defensive end Travis Jones and gathered in by Clemson offensive tackle William Henry, who advanced the ball five yards before fumbling at the Furman nine. At that point Coleman scooped up the ball and ran it into the end zone with 41 seconds to go in the half.

Coleman's score capped the game's decisive stretch for the Tigers, who earlier took advantage of a Furman fumble to extend their lead to 21-7 lead when J.J. Howard picked up a fumbled option pitch by Furman quarterback Bo Moore and returned it 17 yards for a touchdown at the 4:58 juncture of the second quarter.

After a scoreless third period, Furman made it a 28-14 game with a 12-play, 66-yard drive that ended when Brian Bratton took a quick pitch from Moore and beat the Clemson defense to the corner of the end zone for a three-yard touchdown run at the 12:10 juncture.

After denying the Tigers a first down on the ensuing possession, Furman covered 26 yards on seven plays but on a fourth and seven play settled for a 40-yard Danny Marshall field goal with 7:50 remaining in the game to make it 28-17.

A Derrick Hamilton 66-yard kickoff return gave Clemson the ball at the Furman 32, but the Paladins' defense stiffened and Clemson's Aaron Hunt missed a 48-yard field goal with 6:40 to go.

Furman, however, couldn't maintain its offensive momentum after a 13-yard pass from Moore to Bratton gave the Paladins a first down at their 47. After losing yardage on first and second down, Moore had to cover a bad snap over his head on third down for a 16-yard loss back to the Furman 25, forcing a punt.

Clemson outgained Clemson 425-174 in total offense, but the Tigers were penalized 11 times for 111 yards in the contest. The Tigers managed only 124 yards on the ground on 40 rushing attempts.

Furman broke a 42-year touchdown scoring drought midway through the second quarter when Moore connected with Bratton on a 20-yard scoring strike to get the Paladins on the board. Bratton, who accounted for both Furman scores, finished the game with two receptions for 33 yards and a team high 41 rushing yards on 11 carries.

Mike Killian paced Furman's defense with 11 tackles and an interception, and Cedrick Ritter added 10 tackles and a sack. Cam Newton contributed nine stops for the Paladins, and nose guard Michael Burant recorded a career high seven tackles, including two for loss.
