Besides increasing the school's national visibility and presence in historically one of its top markets for student recruitment, hosting the Falcons also netted the Paladin program two completely renovated practice fields this year. Furman hosted the Falcons training camps from 1971-78.

◆ Furman University's student body sports an average SAT of 1,282 — the **highest** score among Southern Conference schools that annually compete for the league's football crown.

◆ Furman University was recently ranked No. 42 among the nation's Top 50 liberal arts colleges, according to the annual rankings released by *U.S. News and World Report* magazine. Furman is the **only** Southern Conference school that competes for the league's football championship ranked in the nation's Top 50.

THE SERIES

In a series that got its start in 1928 in Greenville with a 15-0 Chattanooga win, Furman holds an 19-13 advantage. Furman have won the last eight meetings and 13 of the last 15 clashes with Chattanooga, including a 35-7 decision last year in Greenville. Two years ago the Paladins rolled to a 42-10 win in Chattanooga. Chattanooga's last win in the series came in 1994 by a 34-20 score. Furman sports a 10-6 record versus the Mocs in Chattanooga and 9-7 record in Greenville.

In Greenville: Furman leads 9-7
In Chattanooga: Furman leads 10-6

LAST MEETING

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Hindley Brigham rushed for 114 yards and two touchdowns to power NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 35-7 Southern Conference win over Chattanooga at Paladin Stadium.

Brigham scored on runs of 1 and 58 yards to help Furman take control of the contest and post its eighth straight win over Chattanooga. The victory also earned Furman a bid to the NCAA I-AA playoffs — the Pala-

dins' school record fourth straight and 12th overall.

"This was a scary game coming in because Chattanooga had won their last two and had nothing to lose, but I thought we handled it well after a slow start," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We got a big turnover in the third quarter, and that jump started our offense and we played well after that. Our defense played extremely well."

A 7-yard touchdown pass from Billy Napier to Isaac West on the Paladins' first possession gave Furman a 7-0 lead at the 10:52 mark of the first quarter.

Chattanooga battled back to tie the game after moving 90 yards in 18 plays for a 5-yard touchdown pass from Ryan McCann to Jason Jones at the 6:52 juncture of the second quarter.

Furman, however, regained the lead a short while later after defensive tackle LeBryan Sperling recovered a fumble at the UTC 35. A 19-yard pass from Napier to Isaac West moved the Paladins to the 1 before Brigham ran off right guard into the end zone to give Furman a 14-7 lead with only 37 seconds remaining in the half.

The Paladins capitalized on another Chattanooga turnover in the third quarter to add to their advantage. An interception and 26-yard return by cornerback Rodney Johnson to the UTC 30 led to a 1-yard touchdown run by fullback Corey Tant to make it 21-7.

Furman padded its lead later with a 58-yard run by Brigham off an option pitch and a 5-yard touchdown pass by backup quarterback Bo Moore to split end James Thomas.

Furman outgained Chattanooga 339-219 in total offense and rolled up 240 yards on the ground to the Mocs' 54. The Paladins also recorded a season high three sacks.

Paladin quarterback Billy Napier, who completed 12-of-15 passes for 94 yards and a score, hit sophomore split end Isaac West for six completions for 70 yards. Senior flanker Bear Rinehart, meanwhile, caught five passes for 24 yards to establish a new Furman season receptions record, eclipsing the previous standard of 53 receptions set by Robbie Hahn in 1967.

Furman's defense, which did not allow UTC to cross midfield in the second half, was paced by sophomore linebacker Mike Killian with eight tackles.

NOTING THE PALADINS

◆ **IT'S DOWN TO THIS...**After starting the season 4-1 and rising to as high as No. 5 in the NCAA I-AA polls, Furman has dropped four of its last five games to fall to 5-5 on the year and is now unranked for the first time since early in the 1999 campaign. The Paladins now need a victory on Saturday versus Chattanooga to extend the program's consecutive season winning streak to five. Furman has endured only two losing campaigns since 1980: 1994 (3-8) and 1998 (5-6).

◆ **FRUSTRATION CENTRAL...**Counting Furman's 7-6 loss to Wofford on Saturday, the Paladins have dropped four Southern Conference games this year by a total of 10 points.

◆ **TURNOVER TALES...**While turnovers for once didn't determine the outcome of Saturday's loss to Wofford, one can't get past the elephant in the room when discussing the Paladins' 2003 season. For starters Furman has committed 26 turnovers this year (17 fumbles, 9 interceptions) — the highest total since 1997 when the Paladins suffered 31 miscues (19 fumbles, 12 interceptions) in 11 games on the way to a 7-4 season. In the face of Furman's turnovers, opponent miscues, especially of late, have been sparse, and that's almost hard to comprehend when considering the Paladins sport the SoCon's and one of NCAA I-AA's most dominant defenses (tops in SoCon in scoring, total, passing, and pass efficiency defense). In the last four games, opponents have suffered only two turnovers (fumbles), and both of those came in the Paladins' 30-10 win over East Tennessee State on Oct. 25. The Citadel (10-9 loss), Georgia Southern (29-24 loss), and Wofford (7-6 loss), meanwhile, played mistake free football against the Paladins, who recorded their last interception in the fourth quarter of a 19-13 win over Western Carolina on Oct. 5 — a streak of 20 quarters without a pickoff. On the year, Furman opponents have committed 21 turnovers (12 fumbles, 9 interceptions), giving the Paladins a -0.50 turnover margin on the season, which ranks fifth in the SoCon. In the last four contests, however, Furman has a -1.50 in turnover margin.

◆ **MORE STATISTICAL ANOMOLIES...**Furman's defense dominated Wofford like no other Terrier foe this year, with the exception of Air Force, limiting the Terriers to only seven points (23.2 yards below season average) and 180 yards total offense (151.1 yards below season average). The Paladins, meanwhile, managed only six points against Wofford despite racking up 343 yards in total offense. The total offense differential on Saturday continued a frustrating trend the Paladins are all too accustomed to in 2003, that of pounding out more yardage than opponents in losses. It all started in a 13-10 loss to Appalachian State, which the Paladins outgained 253-225. And in a 29-24 loss at Georgia Southern, Furman rolled up 448 yards to the Eagles' 379. Wofford's seven points also represented the lowest total ever by a winning opponent in Paladin Stadium (1981) and lowest by a winning opponent in Greenville since 1970 when East Carolina beat Furman 7-0 in Sistine Stadium.

◆ **SEEING RED IN THE RED ZONE...**Furman ranks only seventh in the Southern Conference in red zone offense efficiency (28x41, 68.3 percent) in 2003, and the Paladins have committed a league high eight turnovers inside the opposition's 20-yard line (6 fumbles, 2 interceptions).

Two of the eight came in the Paladins' 29-24 loss to Georgia Southern on Nov. 8, and three others were registered in the Paladins' 13-10 setback to Appalachian State on Oct. 11. In Saturday's loss to Wofford, Furman advanced into the red zone three times but only managed to post six points with a pair of field goals. The other chance ended on a missed 28-yard field goal attempt.

◆ **SENIOR SCARCITY**...Furman counts just five seniors on this year's squad, only two of whom are among its starting 22. The Paladins, however, are well stocked with juniors (22) and sophomores (27). Furman's offensive and defensive starting lineup against Chattanooga will likely feature two seniors, 12 juniors, seven sophomores, and one redshirt freshmen.

◆ **PALADIN "D" TOPS SOCON**...Although Furman counts only one senior starter on defense in end **Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.)**, the Paladins have been particularly strong on the defensive side of the football this year. Heading into Saturday's game versus Chattanooga, Furman leads the Southern Conference in four of the five major statistical categories: scoring defense (13.4 ppg), total defense (265.4 ypg), passing defense (119.0 ypg), and passing efficiency defense (94.8 rating). In the only other category, rushing defense (146.4 ypg), the Paladins rank third. Furman's defensive improvement this year has been significant across the board as the below comparisons illustrate:

◆ **PALADIN "D" AMONG BEST IN NATION**...Furman heads into Saturday's game against Chattanooga with a defense ranked among the best in NCAA I-AA: passing defense (119.0/1st), total defense (265.4 ypg/3rd), scoring defense (13.4 ppg/4th), and passing efficiency defense (94.8/5th).

◆ **CUTTING OFF THE SECOND HALF SPIGOT**...Amazingly Furman has surrendered just 32 second half points in 10 games this season but are only 5-5 on the year. Topping that is the fact that the Paladins have allowed only six points in the third quarter (two field goals by Appalachian State and Georgia Southern) this fall.

◆ **SOLID SECOND HALF DEFENSE**...While Furman stubbed its toe in back-to-back losses to Appalachian State and The Citadel in mid-October, losing both games by a combined total of four points, the Paladin defense could hardly be blamed. Against Appalachian State, Furman limited the Mountaineers to one field goal and 93 total yards in the second half, including no first downs, 10 plays, and only 10 yards total offense in the fourth quarter. The next week against The Citadel, the Paladins recorded a second half shutout and limited the Bulldogs to only 125 yards in total offense over the third and fourth quarters. In a 30-10 win over East Tennessee State on Oct. 25, Furman surrendered only one touchdown and 66 yards total offense to the Buccaneers in the second half. The paltry 19 second half points yielded by Furman's defense in the last five games (one touchdown, four FGs) followed a blocked punt and four-play, six-yard drive by Appalachian State (34-yard field goal), a shanked punt and eight-play, 30-yard drive by East Tennessee State (1-yard touchdown plunge on fourth down), and three Georgia Southern drives, two of which followed a Furman fumble at the 50 and an Eagle kickoff return to the GSU 46. The Paladins shut out Wofford in the second half on Saturday, limiting the Terriers to 89 total yards in the second half on only 25 plays.

◆ **KILLIAN REACHES NEW CAREER HIGH**...Furman junior middle linebacker **Mike Killian (Atlanta, Ga.)** paced the Paladins with a game high 15 tackles and a blocked field goal in Saturday's 7-6 loss to Wofford, helping limit the Terriers to only 180 total yards. Two weeks ago he recorded a career high 19 tackles in the Paladins' 29-24 loss at Georgia Southern. The Southern Conference's leading tackler this season and headliner of the league's top defensive unit, Killian has 123 stops through 10 games. In addition, he has four tackles-for-loss, three forced fumbles,

three fumble recoveries, an interception, and blocked field goal. As a redshirt freshman in 2001, he started nine games at defensive end and totaled 42 tackles before being switched to linebacker, where he registered 101 stops a year ago.

◆ **PALADIN POINTERS**...Junior **Stephen Schroeder (Mauldin, S.C.)** earned his first career start on Saturday against Wofford, starting at right tackle for sophomore **Brian Laggis (Stockbridge, Ga.)**, who had been sidelined for much of the week due to illness. Wofford's 7-6 win snapped a four-game Furman series winning streak, marked the Terriers' first win in eight trips into Paladin Stadium (1-6-1), and represented the Terriers first triumph in Greenville since 1970.

◆ **KEEP THAT FLAG IN YOUR POCKET**...Furman heads into Saturday's game against Chattanooga as the league's least penalized team (43 penalties for 369 yards).

◆ **MARSHALL MAKES HISTORY**...Furman senior **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** became the Southern Conference's all-time kick scoring leader against Wofford on Saturday when he converted a 26-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter, breaking the old standard of 302 points held by Western Carolina's **Kirk Roach (1984-87)**. Now with 304 points, he ranks second in Furman overall scoring history, trailing only Louis Ivory (1998-01, 318 points). In a 19-13 Furman win over Western Carolina on Oct. 4, he converted a career high four field goals, including a pair from 42 and 43 yards. Marshall leads the Southern Conference in kick scoring with 71 points, having converted a league leading 16-of-19 field goals (.842) and 23-of-23 PATs. For his career he has drilled 51-of-63 field goal attempts (.809) and 151-of-160 PATs (.945).

◆ **MARSHALL PICKED FOR ALL-STAR CLASSIC**...Furman senior placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** will compete in The Football Network (TFN)/Division I-AA All-Star Classic game on Tuesday, Dec. 30 at Lockhart Stadium in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

◆ **BURANT A FORCE IN THE MIDDLE**...One factor in Furman's solid defensive work this year has been the strong play of junior nose guard **Michael Burant (Lexington, Va.)**. In the Paladins' 30-10 win over East Tennessee State on Oct. 25, Burant fashioned his most productive game as a Paladin, recording a career high eight tackles, a tackle-for-loss, and a pass deflection. That topped an earlier career high seven-tackle performance, including two for-loss, in a 28-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6. The eight tackles versus the Tigers were the most by a Paladin nose guard since **B.J. Pate** notched nine stops in a 31-28 win over Chattanooga in 1998. Counting his six tackles in Saturday's 7-6 loss to Wofford, through 10 games he has 47 tackles, including seven for-loss, two pass deflections, and a fumble recovery. He totaled 23 stops in an injury plagued 2002 campaign that saw him register action in only eight contests.

◆ **RAVENELL GAINING NOTICE**...Furman redshirt freshman defensive end **Roy Ravenell (Goose Creek, S.C.)**, Furman's top candidate for Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Year honors, had a major coming out performance against Appalachian State on Oct. 11 with a season high 10 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, two forced fumbles, and a sack — all of which helped him earn his first career start against The Citadel, against whom he registered seven tackles, including two-for-loss, and a sack to help key another solid Furman defensive effort. That continued in Furman's 30-10 triumph over East Tennessee State on Oct. 25, when he tallied five tackles and a tackle-for-loss. Through 10 games this year, he has 45 tackles, six tackles-for-loss, a league leading four forced fumbles, two sacks, and an interception. His pickoff came in a 45-0 win over Gardner-Webb and represented the first interception by a Paladin defensive lineman since 1996. A former Shrine Bowl selection from Stratford High School, he began his Furman career as a middle linebacker before getting moved to defensive end last spring. That move was due in large measure to the coaching staff's desire to improve the squad's pass rush. As the aforementioned pass rush chart indicates, it looks like Ravenell's position switch was right on cue.

◆ **STAPP STEPPS IN**...Furman redshirt freshman quarterback **Josh Stepp (Pelion, S.C.)** stepped in for injured junior quarterback **Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.)** against The Citadel on Oct. 18 and almost led the Paladins to victory. Earning his first career start after totaling only four series' of experience in two games (two each vs. Gardner-Webb and Appalachian State), the young lefthander completed 9-of-19 passes for 119 yards and also rushed for 43 yards on 13 carries. His most impressive work of the game came on a 13-play, 80-yard fourth quarter drive that saw him scramble for a touchdown on a fourth-and-goal play from the Citadel 3 with 3:06 to go. His start against the Bulldogs was the first by a redshirt freshman quarterback since **Justin Hill** registered three starts late in the 1997 campaign.

◆ **AND UP**...Redshirt freshman quarterback **Josh Stepp (Pelion, S.C.)** followed up his first career start versus The Citadel with an impressive outing in the Paladins' 30-10 win over East Tennessee State on Oct. 25. Against the Buccaneers, Stepp completed 10-of-14 passes for 208 yards and a touchdown, and also rushed for 25 yards and another score on the way to earning Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Week honors. His touchdown pass covered 21 yards to **Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.)**, and his scoring run also went for 21 yards in the fourth quarter to help the Paladins pull away. The young Paladin lefthander is the second Paladin signal caller in recent years to earn Shrine Bowl MVP honors as a high school senior — a feat also accomplished by **Justin Hill** (1997-00) while at Greer (S.C.) High School.

◆ **MOORE RETURNS**...Junior quarterback **Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.)** returned to the starting lineup versus Georgia Southern on Nov. 8 after missing the East Tennessee State (Oct. 25) and Citadel (Oct. 18) contests due to a high ankle sprain sustained in the second half of the Paladins' 13-10 loss to Appalachian State on Oct. 11. Moore's return to action produced some positive results as he completed 15-of-24 passes for 165 yards while also rushing 12 times for 93 yards and a touchdown. The

258 yards in total offense marked a new career high as did the 93 yards rushing. In Saturday's 7-6 loss to Wofford, he threw for 206 yards (19-of-28, 1 INT). Through 10 games, he now has 1,213 yards passing on the season and ranks second on Furman's rushing ledger with 277 yards.

◆ **BRIGHAM ON THE CHARTS**...Furman's lone senior starter on offense, tailback **Hindley Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.)**, currently the Southern Conference's third leading rusher, recorded his fifth 100-yard rushing performance of the season and eighth of his career in the Paladins' 29-24 loss to Georgia Southern on Nov. 8 by rushing 11 times for 127 yards and a touchdown, which came on a career best 80-yard burst in the first quarter. Brigham's touchdown run was the longest by an opponent in Paulson Stadium history, the longest by a Paladin since Lamar Rembert's 83-yard TD sprint in a 37-10 win over The Citadel last year, and the longest by a Paladin in a road game since Robbie Gardner covered 88 yards in a 38-28 win over Marshall in 1984. Brigham's work versus Georgia Southern and a 74-yard outing versus Wofford improved his team season leading tally to 897 yards. In the Paladins' 19-13 win at Western Carolina on Oct. 14, he ran a career high 28 times for another career high 137 yards. His other 100-yard outings this year include a pair of 110-yard workdays against both Elon (24-7 win) and Richmond (31-17 win) and a 126-yard performance versus East Tennessee State (30-10 win). He needs 103 yards versus Chattanooga to record only the 12th 1,000-yard rushing season in Furman history and 111 yards to top the 2,000-yard plateau — a feat achieved by only seven players in Furman history.

◆ **WEST, BRATTON ON THE CHARTS**...Junior wide receivers **Isaac West (Augusta, Ga.)** and **Brian Bratton (Martinez, Ga.)** both rank among the school's career receiving leaders as detailed below. Counting his eight catches for 92 yards in Saturday's 7-6 loss to Wofford, through 10 games Bratton has caught a team leading 42 passes for 573 yards and four touchdowns, rushed 19 times for 149 yards (7.8 ypc.) and two scores, and averaged 21.5 yards on 20 kickoff returns. He was named Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Year and All-America as a return specialist in 2001 after leading the nation in kickoff returns (37.2 avg., 3 TDs).

◆ **“SIR CAM” NEWTON**...Furman junior All-Southern Conference free safety **Cam Newton (Bennettsville, S.C.)** got his season off to a

quality start in the Paladins' 24-7 win over Elon on Aug. 31, recording seven tackles, an interception, and a forced fumble on the way to earning league defensive player-of-the-week honors. In the Paladins' 19-13 win over Western Carolina on Oct. 4, he came up big again with his second interception of the season and subsequent 28-yard return that set up the Paladins' lone touchdown of the game. The pickoff against the Catamounts was the eighth of his career. He also blocked a field goal in the second half to help the Paladins preserve a 19-7 lead. He has 54 tackles in nine games. A year ago he headlined a Paladin secondary that saw him register 57 tackles, nine pass deflections, and a team leading six interceptions (along with All-America cornerback **Rodney Johnson**). Newton's six pickoffs in 2002, the second highest total in the league, were especially impressive because they came in the face of a Paladin pass rush that netted a conference low eight sacks. His younger brother, **Syvelle Newton**, is a freshman football player this fall at the University of South Carolina.

◆ **FURMAN LINEBACKERS MAKING THE PLAYS**...Furman's linebacking corps appears to be living up to its billing as the possibly league's strongest group as through eight games the Paladins' three leading tacklers are linebackers. Leading the way is junior **Mike Killian (Atlanta, Ga.)** with a Southern Conference leading 123 tackles. Next are junior All-Southern Conference performer **Cedrick Ritter (Fairfax, S.C.)** and sophomore **William Freeman (Swansea, S.C.)**, who have contributed 72 and 68 tackles, respectively. Senior All-Southern Conference performer **Keito Whetstone (Orangeburg, S.C.)**, meanwhile, has contributed 39 stops despite being sidelined for three games after sustaining a sprained ankle in the Paladins' 28-17 loss to Clemson on Sept. 6. In his absence, Freeman, in his first career start, stepped in and registered a career high 14 stops, including two tackles-for-loss, in the 31-17 triumph over Richmond on Sept. 20 on the way to earning Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Week honors. Since 1975 Furman has produced 21 first team All-Southern Conference linebackers — the most of any league school.

◆ **STEPPIN' OUT**...The 57-yard punt return for a touchdown by redshirt freshman **Justin Stepp (Pelion, S.C.)** in the 45-0 whitewash of Gardner-Webb on was the second in as many seasons for the Paladins, who last year got a 66-yard return for a score by Bear Rinehart, who led the Southern Conference in punt returns in 2002 with a 14.9 average.

◆ **GUTSY START**...Furman opened its Sept. 20 game against Richmond with a gutsy play — an onside kick, which the Paladins' **Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.)** recovered at the Spiders 48. From that point Furman drove 33 yards to the Richmond 15 for a 32-yard field goal by **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** for an early 3-0 lead.

◆ **NOT YOUR ORDINARY COMEBACK**...When Furman sophomore tailback **Brandon Mays (Arden, N.C.)** underwent surgery on Oct. 30, 2002, for ulcerative colitis and spent two weeks in the hospital, a return to football looked bleak. After having approximately 90 percent of his large intestines removed and dropping from a pre-illness weight of 190 pounds to 140, he endured two more procedures in early 2003, including reconstructive surgery. Unable to take part in spring practice in March due to his condition, he nonetheless attended every practice and offered consistent encouragement to his teammates. Through dedicated rehabilitation and the fortune of advanced medicine, Mays regained 52 pounds (to 192), strength, and endurance, and completed his comeback by rushing 11 times for 49 yards and catching one pass for nine yards in the Paladins' 24-7 win over Elon in the season opener on Aug. 30. Prior to his illness a year ago he had appeared in four games and rushed 18 times for 96 yards. As a prep at T.C. Roberson, he ran for 4,406 and 50 touchdowns in his career and was named *Asheville Citizen-Times* Offensive Player-of-the-Year after totaling 1,961 yards and 20 touchdowns his senior year.

◆ **SOCON MAN**...As head coaching tenures go, **Bobby Lamb**, who is now in his second season at the helm of the Paladin program, certainly doesn't qualify as a veteran, but when factoring in total years of association with Southern Conference schools, he could rightfully be considered a dean of league head coaches. For Lamb, 40, the 2003 campaign marks his 22nd season at Furman. That tenure includes four seasons as a player (1982-85), 16 years as an assistant coach (1986-01), and one season as head

coach (2002). No other league mentor can match that length of service to a league school.

◆ **FAMILY**...Very few coaching staffs can claim to be as close and know the school at which they work better than Furman's. That's because the Paladins' entire coaching staff, with the exception of wide receivers coach **Drew Cronic** and defensive backs coach **Jeff Farrington**, is composed of Furman graduates who enjoyed fine playing careers for the purple and white before entering the coaching ranks. Furman's staff includes defensive ends coach **Julius Dixon '90**, defensive line coach **Allen Edwards '92**, tight ends coach **Ben Hall '00**, offensive line coach **Clay Hendrix '86**, head coach **Bobby Lamb '86**, running backs coach **Tim Sorrells '81**, and defensive coordinator/linebackers coach **Steve Wilson '77**. All told, the Paladins' current coaching staff sports 81 years of collective coaching service at Furman and, counting playing tenures, has combined for 109 seasons of experience at the university.

◆ **FATHER FIGURES**...Junior **Bo Moore (Madison, Ga.)**, Furman's starting quarterback for the first six games prior to injury, appears set to carry on the Paladins' well established tradition of producing successful signal callers who are the sons of high school head coaches. Starting with **Tim Sorrells (1977-81)** and also including **Bobby Lamb (1982-85)**, **Philly Jones (1991-95)** and, most recently, **Billy Napier (1999-02)**, Furman has fashioned noteworthy success with quarterbacks who played for their fathers. Sorrells, who starred under his dad, **Fred Sorrells**, at Jefferson County (Tenn.) High School, quarterbacked Furman to Southern Conference titles in 1980 & '81. Lamb, a former standout at Commerce (Ga.) High School under his father, **Ray Lamb**, later helped lead Furman to a conference championship and NCAA I-AA runnerup finish in 1985. Jones, a three-year starter for the Paladins, played for his dad, **Phil Jones**, at Winder-Barrow (Ga.) High School, and Napier enjoyed a solid prep career under his father, **Bill Napier**, at Murray County (Ga.) High School before coming to Furman, where he directed the Paladins to 2001 league title and national runnerup finish. Moore, meanwhile, fashioned a fine prep tenure for his father, **Kenny Moore**, at Morgan County (Ga.) High School before joining the Furman program in 2001.

◆ **BROTHER ACT**...Furman's 2003 squad features three sets of brothers: **Hindley** and **Grant Brigham (Birmingham, Ala.)**, twins **Josh** and **Justin Stepp (Pelion, S.C.)**, and **Lockwood** and **Austin Holmes (Jacksonville, Fla.)**. Hindley, a senior tailback, transferred to Furman in 2001 following two seasons at Baylor and last year paced the Paladins in rushing with 762 yards and five touchdowns. Grant, a sophomore flanker/return specialist, joined the Paladin program this fall after spending the 2002 campaign at Vanderbilt, where he lettered as a true freshman. Josh Stepp, the 2001 Shrine Bowl MVP, is redshirt freshman quarterback. Brother Justin, meanwhile, is seeing plenty of action at flanker and as a punt return specialist. Lockwood Holmes serves as a reserve cornerback and member of special teams while Austin will likely redshirt this fall, also as a cornerback.

◆ **IMPRESSIVE LINEAGES**...Sophomore linebacker **Andrew Carson (Newnan, Ga.)** is the brother of former Clemson All-America linebacker **Chad Carson**. Andrew's father, **Tom Carson**, played football at Georgia Tech, and his grandfather, **Earle Carson**, was an end, three-year letterman, and an honorable mention All-American at Furman (1928-30). A great uncle, **M.A. Carson**, was a two-time letterwinner as an offensive guard at Furman (1926-27), and another great uncle, **Tom Carson**, was an All-South offensive tackle selection and three-year letterman who served as captain of Furman's 1931 squad. True freshman defensive end **Turner Burton (Birmingham, Ala.)** sports a strong Alabama Crimson Tide heritage. His great-grandfather, **Fred Sington**, was a two-time All-America offensive tackle at Alabama, member of the Tide's 1930 national championship team, 1955 inductee into the National Football Foundation Hall-of-Fame, and member of the Alabama Sports Hall-of-Fame. Two of Burton's uncles, **Dave Sington (1956-58)** and **Fred Sington, Jr. (1958-59)**, also played football for Alabama.

◆ **LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON**...Senior placekicker **Danny Marshall (Atlanta, Ga.)** is the son of former Paladin defensive end **Tommy Marshall (1974-76)**, who later served as an assistant coach on the Furman staff for eight years (1986-93), during which time the Paladins captured three conference titles and the 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship.

Sophomore cornerback **Jon MacDonald (Greer, S.C.)** is the son of former Furman wide receiver **Norman MacDonald (1972-74)**, and sophomore quarterback **Matt Cain (Easley, S.C.)** is the son of former Paladin assistant and current Vanderbilt offensive coordinator **Ted Cain (1971-73)**.

◆ **PALADINS AND GAMECOCKS**...Furman starting senior defensive end **Brandon Poole (Columbia, S.C.)** is the son of 1981 University of South Carolina Heisman Trophy winning running back **George Rogers**. Furman true freshman **Ryan McKie (Simpsonville, S.C.)** is the son of **James McKie**, who was also a running back and former teammate of Rogers at USC. McKie's cousin, **B.J. McKie**, was a basketball standout for the Gamecocks.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Bo Moore passed for 221 yards and two touchdowns to lead NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 24-7 Southern Conference win over Elon in front of 9,174 fans at Paladin Stadium in the season opener for both teams.

The game marked the Southern Conference's debut for Elon (0-1, 0-1 SoCon), the league's newest member, and the earliest conference clash for Furman (1-0, 1-0 SoCon) since 1974.

Making his first collegiate start, Moore, a junior from Madison, Ga., completed 15-of-26 passes and added 19 yards rushing in helping the Paladins to the 17th conference home win in their last 18 games. His touchdown passes covered 41 yards to Brian Bratton and 33 yards to Brian Stone.

"We knew it was going to be a battle playing a Southern Conference game right out of the gate," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We handled Elon pretty well the last two years, but we knew they would come in here fighting, and they did. It was battle, but we're very happy right now."

"We came down here to win a ball game, and obviously we didn't get that done," said Elon head coach Al Seagraves. "We made some improvements from last year, and our kids really battled. We'll learn some things from this game, and we'll become a good football team."

Furman rolled up 463 yards in total offense to Elon's 263 and limited the Phoenix to only 56 yards and one first down in the second half.

Furman scored on its second possession of the contest, covering 68 yards on four plays highlighted by Moore's 41-yard strike to Bratton to give the Paladins a 7-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

Elon knotted the game at 7-7 with a 10-play, 66-yard march that culminated with a 32-yard burst up the middle by freshman fullback Chad Nkang at the 10:17 mark of the second period.

The Paladins regained the lead on the last play of the first half when senior Danny Marshall drilled a 41-yard field goal to make it 10-7, capping an efficient 42-yard, seven-play drive that consumed the half's final 43 seconds.

Furman carried its momentum into the second half, taking the opening kickoff and moving 66 yards in five plays for a touchdown. A pair of Moore completions to Bratton covered 26 yards, and another to Grant Brigham for 20 yards gave the Paladins the ball at the Elon 20. On the next play, Stone, a sophomore transfer from the University of Florida, took a reverse around left end for the score at the 12:36 mark of the third period and 17-7 lead.

Moore connected for his second scoring strike of the contest in the fourth quarter when he found Stone open in the corner of the end zone for a 33-yard strike on a fourth-and-16 play at the 10:55 juncture to make it 24-7.

Stone finished the game with six catches for 82 yards, and Bratton registered five receptions for 89 yards. Senior tailback Hindley Brigham headlined Furman's 242-yard ground attack with 18 rushes for 110 yards.

The Paladin defense got a game high nine tackles from junior line-backer Mike Killian, who also contributed two tackles-for-loss, a forced fumble, and a pass deflection.

Clemson 28, Furman 17

September 6, 2003

Memorial Stadium

Attendance: 70,000

CLEMSON, S.C. – Charlie Whitehurst passed for 301 yards and two touchdowns to lead Clemson to a 28-17 win over NCAA I-AA nationally seventh-ranked Furman in front of 70,000 fans at Memorial Stadium.

The victory marked Clemson's 28th consecutive victory over Furman but proved to more difficult than several recent verdicts over the Paladins, the Tigers' oldest football rival. Trailing 28-7 at intermission, Furman battled back with two scores and shutout Clemson in the second half for its closest loss in the series since a 28-21 setback in 1949.

"I was pleased with the effort of our team," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We came here to win the game. I'm not going to sugarcoat it all; we came in here to try to win the football game. We felt like we could, and we got a good effort in the second half. If we had gotten some execution in the first half, then there is not telling what would have happened."

Whitehurst completed 23-of-31 pass attempts, and connected on a 72-yard strike to Airese Curry in the first quarter to stake the Tigers to a 14-0 lead. In addition, he was credited with a freakish nine-yard touchdown pass to Duane Coleman with less than a minute to go in the first half to stretch the Tigers' advantage to 28-7.

On the play Whitehurst's pass was batted by Furman defensive end Travis Jones and gathered in by Clemson offensive tackle William Henry, who advanced the ball five yards before fumbling at the Furman nine. At that point Coleman scooped up the ball and ran it into the end zone with 41 seconds to go in the half.

Coleman's score capped the game's decisive stretch for the Tigers, who earlier took advantage of a Furman fumble to extend their lead to 21-7 lead when J.J. Howard picked up a fumbled option pitch by Furman quarterback Bo Moore and returned it 17 yards for a touchdown at the 4:58 juncture of the second quarter.

After a scoreless third period, Furman made it a 28-14 game with a 12-play, 66-yard drive that ended when Brian Bratton took a quick pitch from Moore and beat the Clemson defense to the corner of the end zone for a three-yard touchdown run at the 12:10 juncture.

After denying the Tigers a first down on the ensuing possession, Furman covered 26 yards on seven plays but on a fourth and seven play settled for a 40-yard Danny Marshall field goal with 7:50 remaining in the game to make it 28-17.

A Derrick Hamilton 66-yard kickoff return gave Clemson the ball at the Furman 32, but the Paladins' defense stiffened and Clemson's Aaron Hunt missed a 48-yard field goal with 6:40 to go.

Furman, however, couldn't maintain its offensive momentum after a 13-yard pass from Moore to Bratton gave the Paladins a first down at their 47. After losing yardage on first and second down, Moore had to cover a bad snap over his head on third down for a 16-yard loss back to the Furman 25, forcing a punt.

Clemson outgained Clemson 425-174 in total offense, but the Tigers were penalized 11 times for 111 yards in the contest. The Tigers managed only 124 yards on the ground on 40 rushing attempts.

Furman broke a 42-year touchdown scoring drought midway through the second quarter when Moore connected with Bratton on a 20-yard scoring strike to get the Paladins on the board. Bratton, who accounted for both Furman scores, finished the game with two receptions for 33 yards and a team high 41 rushing yards on 11 carries.

Mike Killian paced Furman's defense with 11 tackles and an interception, and Cedrick Ritter added 10 tackles and a sack. Cam Newton contributed nine stops for the Paladins, and nose guard Michael Burant recorded a career high seven tackles, including two for loss.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Fullback Al Means scored two fourth quarter touchdowns, including a 47-yard bolt with 1:20 left in the game, to lift NCAA I-AA nationally ninth-ranked Furman to a 31-17 win over Richmond in front of 12,452 fans at Paladin Stadium.

Means, a junior from Charlotte, N.C., snapped a 17-17 deadlock on a 1-yard touchdown plunge with 4:40 left in the game and broke a pair of tackles on the 47-yard run, the longest of his career, to seal the contest. His second score came after Furman stopped Richmond on downs at the Spiders 49 with 2:18 remaining in the game.

The game was the first between Furman (2-1) and Richmond (0-2) in Greenville since 1976, when the Spiders were then a member of the Southern Conference.

"It certainly took a long time before we got this one in the barn," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "Richmond battled us all the way, but we were very inconsistent offensively until our final two possessions. I thought our defense played well after the first series when they ran it down our throats. We got after them pretty good after that."

"We really didn't seem to stop them when we needed to," said Richmond head coach Jim Reid. "I thought we played hard but weren't physical enough. This was a very physical game."

Furman outgained Richmond 383-278 and totaled 244 yards on the ground behind senior tailback Hindley Brigham's 20-carry, 110-yard performance. Means finished the game with 74 yards on 10 carries. Paladin placekicker Danny Marshall, meanwhile, contributed seven points and, in the process, become Furman's all-time kick scoring leader with 251 points.

Furman opened the game with a little deception, recovering its own onside kick at the Richmond 48 and advancing the ball to the Spider 15, where Marshall booted a 32-yard field goal to give the Paladins a 3-0 lead.

Richmond came right back with an impressive 15-play, 84-yard drive that included a critical 29-yard leaping reception by Stacy Tutt at the Furman 17. Four plays later Kenny Dantzler scored on a 6-yard run to give the Spiders a 7-3 lead at the 4:29 mark of the first half.

A 21-yard punt return by Justin Stepp to the Richmond 36 set up Furman's next score. Two plays into the second quarter Paladins quarterback Bo Moore connected with Brian Bratton for a 20-yard touchdown pass to make it 10-7.

After stopping the Spiders on a fourth-and-nine play at the Furman 35, the Paladins put together an 11-play, 65-yard drive that resulted in a 1-yard touchdown run by Brigham for a 17-7 lead with 3:35 remaining in the half.

Richmond used an interception and 11-yard return by linebacker Kyle Kupchak to the UR 44 to set up the final score of the first half. After three plays netted only four yards, the Spiders got a break when Furman was flagged for roughing the kicker, giving Richmond a first down at the Paladins 44. Four plays later Joseph Fore drilled a 47-yard field goal on the final play of the half to make it 17-10.

After a scoreless third quarter, the Spiders knotted the game at 17-17 when Richmond quarterback and University of Virginia transfer Bryson Spinner hit David Edwards on a 4-yard scoring strike at the 7:41 mark, capping a 13-play, 68-yard drive.

Furman, however, answered by covering 66 yards in six plays, helped along by a 21-yard run by Moore and a 32-yard pass from Moore to tight end John Rust to the Richmond 1, setting up Means' go-ahead score.

The Paladins got a game high 14 tackles each from linebackers Mike Killian and William Freeman. Richmond paced by linebacker Lance Gray's 13 stops.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Hindley Brigham rushed for two touchdowns and propelled a ground attack that rolled up 389 yards in leading NCAA I-AA eighth-ranked Furman to a 45-0 win over Gardner-Webb.

Brigham, a senior tailback from Birmingham, Ala., scored on runs of 4 and 6 yards to help Furman take a 14-0 lead, and the Paladins rode a strong defensive effort, limiting Gardner-Webb (3-2) to 220 total yards, to notch the program's second shutout in the last nine games.

Furman's punishing rushing performance came despite six turnovers, including five in the second half after building a 24-0 halftime lead. The Paladins, however, also forced six Bulldog miscues.

"We won a game with six turnovers; I didn't that was possible," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "I thought in the first half we played pretty well, particularly on defense, but the second half was really sloppy with all the turnovers. We made several big plays when we needed them and rushed for almost 400 yards. That's pretty good, but we've still got plenty of work to do."

"We stopped them on their first possession, but a penalty on fourth down gave them a first down and they took advantage," said Gardner-Webb head coach Steve Patton. "You just can't make the number of mistakes we did against a Top 10 team and expect to win."

Furman jumped out front on its first possession, taking advantage of a fourth down offsides penalty on Gardner-Webb for a first down on a 9-play, 79-yard march that ended on a 4-yard touchdown run by Brigham.

The Paladins increased the advantage to 14-0 on Brigham's second score of the contest, a 6-yard run with less than a minute into the second quarter, to cap a 6-play, 51-yard drive.

Furman reeled off 10 straight running plays on its next possession, including a 24-yard sprint by quarterback Bo Moore to the Gardner-Webb 16, to set up a 10-yard scoring run around left end by backup tailback Lamar Rembert that made it 21-0 with 8:40 to go in the first half.

A Danny Marshall 24-yard field goal 14 seconds before intermission extended the Furman margin to 24-0.

Both teams committed a pair of third quarter turnovers before Furman's Brian Bratton took an option pitch and bolted 52 yards for a touchdown at the 2:13 juncture of the quarter for a 31-0 lead.

The Paladins added two more scores in the fourth period, including a 44-yard interception return by Shelton Riley and Justin Stepp 57-yard punt return.

Furman's ground attack, which featured 12 ballcarriers, was paced by junior quarterback Bo Moore with 12 rushes for 84 yards. Moore also threw for 96 yards, completing 10-of-17 passes but with two interceptions. His favorite target was Bratton, who collected a game high six receptions for 50 yards while also rushing for 58 yards.

Gardner-Webb was paced offensively by quarterback Nick Roberts, who completed 14-of-23 passes for 100 yards. The Bulldogs entered the game averaging 30.8 points per game.

Junior linebacker Mike Killian topped Furman's defense with 13 tackles and a fumble recovery, and sophomore linebacker William Freeman, the league's reigning defensive player-of-the-week, tallied 10 stops, a tackle-for-loss, and a sack.

CULLOWHEE, N.C. - Danny Marshall kicked a career-high four field goals to lead NCAA I-AA seventh-ranked Furman to a 19-13 victory over Western Carolina at E.J. Whitmire Stadium.

Marshall made field goals of 42, 30, 43 and 22 yards to move into third place on the Southern Conference all-time kick scoring list with 273 points, and tailback Hindley Brigham highlighted a Paladin ground attack with a career high 137 yards in helping Furman to its sixth straight triumph over the Catamounts and third consecutive win in Cullowhee.

"It's always good to win, especially on the road in conference play," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb, whose team moved into first place in the league play with the victory. "It's never easy up here. We had a number of chances to put the game out of reach, but we let Western Carolina hang around, and that forced us to make some big plays in the last few minutes to win the game. I thought our defense was outstanding."

Bo Moore, Furman's junior quarterback from Madison, Ga., completed 14-of-18 passes for 219 yards in the contest and ran for the Paladins' lone touchdown, but it was his 43-yard pass to Brian Stone on a third-and-17 play from the Furman 33 with 2:30 to go that sealed the outcome.

The Paladins outgained Western Carolina 389-230 and limited the Catamounts to only 59 rushing yards on 21 attempts. Furman's defense, meanwhile, contained Western Carolina quarterback Brian Gaither, limiting him to only 16 completions in 34 attempts while picking off two passes. Furman hogged the football for 38:51 to Western Carolina's 21:09.

Furman fell behind early when a fumbled option pitch was recovered by Western Carolina's Rod Dunlap at the Paladin 30. From there the Catamounts covered the distance in seven plays and scored on a 4-yard run by Manny DeShauteurs to grab a 7-0 lead.

Furman answered with an eight-play, 55-yard scoring drive that included a 31-yard run by Brigham. Six plays later, Marshall hit the first of his four field goals, from 42 yards, to make it 7-3.

Furman regained possession following the Cats next offensive possession when free safety Cam Newton intercepted a Gaither pass and returned it to the WCU 7. Moore capped the short drive with a four-yard touchdown run at the 5:20 mark, giving the Paladins a 10-7 lead.

Furman extended its advantage to 13-7 with a 30-yard Marshall field goal with 1:46 to go in the first half, capping a 13-play, 74-yard drive.

A fumbled punt return by Western Carolina and recovery by Brad Bell at the Catamount 30 set up the Paladins' next score, which came four plays later when Marshall knocked through a 43-yard field goal with 1:43 left in the half to make it 16-7.

Western Carolina drove to the Furman 24 on its second possession of the second half, but Paladin defensive end Brandon Poole halted the scoring threat when he blocked a 41-yard field goal try by Chris Vought.

Furman padded its lead to 19-7 in the final seconds on the third quarter on a 22-yard Marshall field goal.

The Paladins appeared to be set to put the game away after redshirt freshman strong safety Shelton Riley intercepted a pass at the WCU 27, but, after advancing to the Catamount 9, a bad snap from center and incomplete pass attempt by holder Jeremiah Van Dora gave the Cats the ball on downs.

From there Western Carolina put together its most impressive drive of the contest, moving 91 yards in eight plays for a 22-yard touchdown pass from Gaither to Xavier Godard with 10:28 left in the game. The PAT was blocked and Furman led 19-13.

The Paladins came right back with a nine-play, 72-yard possession that included a 54-yard Moore strike to Isaac West to the Western Carolina 3, but three running plays lost nine yards, and Danny Marshall's 26-yard field goal was blocked by Albert Reid with 3:22 to go.

The Cats, however, could not take advantage and were forced to punt five plays later with 5:40 still left in the game.

Starting at its own 27, Furman turned to Brigham, who broke off a 13-yard run to get to the Furman 40. Later, facing a third-and-17 situation at its own 33, Moore connected with Stone for a 43-yard pass and a first down to the Western Carolina 24, enabling Furman to run out the clock.

Mike Killian, the league's leading tackler coming into the contest, led Furman with eight tackles and tackle-for-loss, and Cedrick Ritter tallied six stops for the Paladins. Newton added four stops, an interception, and pass deflection while nose guard Michael Burant continued to play solid ball with a pair of stops, including one-for-loss, and pass deflection.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Erik Rockhold booted two field goals and defensive end K.T. Stovall recorded nine tackles, three sacks, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery to lift Appalachian State to a 13-10 win over NCAA I-AA nationally fifth-ranked Furman at Paladin Stadium.

Rockhold's 42-yard field goal gave the Mountaineers an early 3-0 lead, and his second effort, from 34 yards in the final minute of the third quarter, put Appalachian State ahead 13-7, but it was poor execution by Furman in the red zone that delivered the win to the Mountaineers.

Five times in the second half Furman initiated possessions in Appalachian State territory, but the Paladins managed only three points. Two drives ended in fumbles at the ASU 10 and 16, and a third possession netted a 27-yard Danny Marshall field goal with 2:40 to go in the game, but only after Furman, trailing 13-7 at the time and with backup quarterback Josh Stepp on the field, had driven to the Mountaineer 1 before being penalized for illegal substitution on second down.

Both teams lost four fumbles, but it was Appalachian State that took most advantage of the turnovers.

A Stovall sack and fumble recovery at the Furman 40 helped put the Mountaineers on the board. After a 13-run by Alan Atwater to the 27, Rockhold's 42-yard field goal gave Appalachian State a 3-0 lead less than four minutes into the game.

In the second half, with the Mountaineers nursing a 10-7 lead, Jon Chasteen blocked a punt by Furman's Jeremiah Van Dora at the Paladin 23, and the Mountaineers turned it into a Rockhold 34-yard field goal with 39 seconds left in the third quarters and 13-7 advantage.

"The bottom line is we didn't execute offensively," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "Defensively we played great and kept getting the ball over and over with a chance to do something, but we just couldn't get over the hump and get it in the end zone. We stepped out of bounds at the six going in on our next to last possession; we fumbled at the 1-yard line; we dropped a touchdown pass in the end zone; and we screwed up with the substitution penalty. When you miss opportunities like we had that's how you lose games."

Furman forged a 253-225 advantage in the defensive struggle and appeared set to grab command in the game's first seconds when Brian Bratton returned the opening kickoff for a touchdown, but it was called back when the Paladins were penalized for an illegal block. Three plays later Stovall sacked Furman quarterback Bo Moore, leading to Rockhold's 42-yard field goal.

A 51-yard run by tailback Hindley Brigham to the Mountaineer 25 and 19-yard burst by Lamar Rembert to the Mountaineer 6 keyed Furman's first score of the game, which came three plays later when quarterback Bo Moore connected with Isaac West on a 6-yard scoring strike to make it 7-3 lead with 9:03 in the first quarter.

Furman's problems in the red zone began shortly thereafter when the Paladins failed to capitalize on a fumble recovery by Cedrick Ritter at the Appalachian State 24. A 20-yard pass from Moore to Bratton moved the Paladins to the Mountaineer 2, but ASU's Daniel Traylor stripped Furman fullback Al Means of the ball, and it was recovered by Corey Lynch at the line of scrimmage to end the Paladin threat.

Midway through the second quarter Appalachian State mounted its most impressive drive of the game, covering 80 yards in 10 plays for a 1-yard touchdown plunge by quarterback Richie Williams and a 10-7 lead with 4:26 to go in the half.

Furman's frustration continued in the third period when the Paladins failed to take advantage of a Roy Ravenell fumble recovery at Mountaineer 14-yard line. Two plays later ASU's Corey Lynch claimed his second recovery of the game at the Mountaineer 10.

From there Appalachian State drove to the Furman 39, but a Williams fumble halted the advance. The Mountaineers, however, came up with a decisive special teams play when Chasteen broke in from the left side and blocked Van Dora's punt to set up what proved to be Rockhold's game winning 34-yard field goal.

Furman's offensive woes overshadowed a strong Paladin defensive effort that limited the Mountaineers to no first downs and 10 total yards in the fourth quarter. Freshman defensive end Roy Ravenell tallied a season high 10 tackles, two tackles-for-loss, two forced fumbles, and a sack.

The Citadel 10, Furman 9

CHARLESTON, S.C. — Nehemiah Broughton rushed for 159 yards to pace The Citadel, but it took a missed Furman extra point in the waning moments of play to help the Bulldogs hold on for a 10-9 Southern Conference win over the Paladins in front of 17,041 fans at Johnson Hagood Stadium.

Broughton, a junior running back from North Charleston, S.C., headlined an effective Citadel ground attack that totaled 236 yards, but the difference in the game came down to a bad snap on a PAT attempt after Furman redshirt freshman quarterback Josh Stepp scrambled on fourth down for a 3-yard touchdown run with 3:06 to play to make it 10-9. The snap bounced once to holder Jeremiah Van Dora, who couldn't gather it in for placekicker Danny Marshall. Van Dora's attempt to scramble ended when he was tackled by Marcus Cohen.

The victory snapped a four-game Furman series winning streak and marked only the second Bulldogs' triumph over the Paladins in the last nine games. It also was The Citadel's first win over Furman in Charleston since 1993. The setback marked the Paladins' first back-to-back losses in league play since 1998.

"We just came up a little short again. That's been the story two weeks in a row," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "We didn't execute the snap on the extra point. It was low, and we just couldn't pick it up and kick it through. I was proud of my team going out in the second half and competing. It was a very physical game like it always is with The Citadel, but you have to give them credit where it is due. They drove 99 yards on us in the first half for the touchdown against our defense. They ran it on us really well and did a heckuva job. I have to commend coach Ellis Johnson and his staff for that."

Trailing 10-0 at intermission, Furman got on the board on the next to last play of the third quarter when Danny Marshall drilled a 29-yard field goal to make it 10-3, capping a 12-play, 59-yard drive.

The Citadel appeared primed to take control on the contest on the ensuing possession, utilizing 13 consecutive running plays, including eight by Broughton, to move to the Furman 10, but a penalty and two-yard loss pushed the Bulldogs back to the 17, where Blake Vandiver's 35-yard field goal failed with 8:05 to go.

Taking over the 20, Furman mounted its most effective offensive possession of the game. Using runs by Lamar Rembert covering 11 and 10 yards and a 39-yard pass from Stepp to Isaac West, Furman drove to the Bulldog 2. After getting stuffed on two plays, Furman finally got into the end zone when Stepp, on a fourth and goal play at the 3, scrambled around left end and into the end zone for the score to make with 10-9.

After the missed PAT, Furman failed to recover the onside kick, and the Bulldogs effectively ran down the clock and used a 40-yard punt by Travis Zobel to the Furman 16 with only 12 seconds left in the contest.

After a scoreless first quarter, The Citadel got on the board with an impressive 14-play, 99-yard drive that ended when quarterback Willie Simmons scrambled around left end and into the end zone for a 3-yard touchdown run with 8:04 to go in the first half.

The Bulldogs appeared to be set to take the 7-0 lead into halftime, but a costly Furman turnover in the final seconds led to the game's decisive points. After starting a possession at its own 2 with 1:36 to go before intermission, Furman picked up a huge first down with a 9-yard run by Stepp to the 18. Two plays later, however, Stepp's pass was picked off by Travis Hodge and returned to the Furman 21. On first down a Simmons pass attempt was nearly intercepted by Furman linebacker William Freeman, but three plays later Travis Zobel booted a 33-yard field goal with only five seconds left on the clock for a 10-0 advantage.

Taking over for junior quarterback Bo Moore, who sustained a high ankle sprain in the second of the Paladins' 13-10 loss to Appalachian State a week ago, Stepp completed 9-of-19 passes for 119 yards and rushed for 43 yards on 13 carries.

In addition to Broughton big rushing effort, The Citadel got 76 yards passing from Simmons, the former Clemson and fifth-year senior transfer.

The Citadel outgained Furman 312-244, but the Paladins tossed a shut out and limited the Bulldogs to only 101 total yards in the second half.

GREENVILLE, S.C. — Josh Stepp passed for 208 yards and a touchdown and ran for another to lead NCAA I-AA 22nd-ranked Furman to a 27-10 win over East Tennessee State in Southern Conference football action Saturday afternoon at Paladin Stadium.

Stepp, a redshirt freshman quarterback from Pelion, S.C., making only his second career start, completed 10-of-14 passes, including a 21-yard scoring strike to Brian Bratton, and later added a 21-yard scoring run in the fourth quarter to pace Furman (5-3, 3-2 SoCon) to its fourth straight triumph over East Tennessee State (3-5, 0-4 SoCon).

The contest represented the final meeting between the two schools following East Tennessee State's decision to terminate its football program following the season. Furman claimed the all-time series 23-7.

"My hat's off to Paul Hamilton," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb. "He's doing a great job with that team. They could have quit at any time today, but they hung in there and battled us all the way. I thought our defense, however, was the difference. They came up big, and our offense finally came through with some points in the second half. Josh Stepp grew up a lot today. He made plays with his arm and his legs."

"I felt like our team could come in here and compete and have a chance to win," said East Tennessee State head coach Paul Hamilton. "I really think five or six plays today determined the game. We gave up too many third and longs, and offensively we had a lot of chances to score but didn't capitalize."

Both teams traded field goals to open the contest before Furman used a fumble recovery by Mike Killian at the Buccaneer 21 to set up the game's first touchdown. A 1-yard plunge by fullback Brandon Berry with only seven seconds left in the first quarter gave the Paladins a 10-3 lead.

In the second quarter Furman extended its advantage to 17-3 when Stepp, on a third down and 14-play, connected with Bratton for a 21-yard touchdown strike at the 11:26 mark.

Primus Glover's fumble recovery on the second half kickoff gave East Tennessee State the ball at the Furman 26, but the Buccaneers failed to convert the scoring opportunity when, on a fourth-and-one play at the Paladin 3, Cam Newton stopped the Bucs' Andrew Nuckolls for no gain.

Two possessions later Glover's second fumble recovery of the contest and 22-yard return gave ETSU the ball at the Furman 15, but the Buccaneers failed to score again when a bad snap from center on a 31-yard field goal attempt was downed at the Furman 39.

Later in the quarter the Buccaneers finally cashed in on a Furman miscue, taking advantage of a 14-yard punt to the Paladin 30. Turning to running back Gaven Varner for six consecutive rushes, East Tennessee State covered the 30 yards in eight plays for a touchdown, which came on a 1-yard plunge by Varner on a fourth-and-goal play to make it 17-10 with 14:05 to go.

Furman responded with a 57-yard kickoff return by Daric Carter to the Buccaneer 23, and four plays later Danny Marshall converted his second field goal of the contest, a 38-yard effort, to increase the Furman advantage to 20-10.

Two possessions later Furman took control of the game. A Stepp 35-yard pass to Bratton to the ETSU 45 was followed by back-to-back completions to Isaac West covering 10 and 16 yards. Two plays later Stepp scrambled up the middle 21 yards and into the end zone to complete a five-play, 80-yard drive that gave the Paladins a 27-10 lead at the 4:08 mark.

A sack and fumble recovery by Travis Jones at the East Tennessee State 13 led to a Marshall 20-yard field goal — his third of the game — at the 1:45 juncture.

Furman outgained East Tennessee State 399-174 in total offense and got a game high 126 yards rushing by senior tailback Hindley Brigham. Killian and Michael Burant paced the Paladins' defensive effort with eight tackles each. Marshall's three field goals and three PATs improved his career scoring total to 292 points, leaving him only 10 points shy of the Southern Conference career kick scoring record currently held by Western Carolina's Kirk Roach (302 points, 1984-87).

STATESBORO, GA. -- Sean Holland kicked five field goals to tie a school record and Georgia Southern took advantage of Furman turnovers for a 29-24 victory in front of 14,562 fans at Paulson Stadium.

Holland, who missed one field goal attempt, was successful on kicks of 37, 20, 38, 31 and 25 yards to equal Reed Haley's mark set against The Citadel in 1994.

The Southern Conference win assured Georgia Southern of a winning season and all but eliminated Furman from NCAA I-AA playoff contention.

"I told the kids in the locker room we're probably out of it playoff-wise," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb whose team lost despite compiling 448 yards total offense and averaging 7.9 yards per play.

The Paladins fumbled the ball twice inside the Georgia Southern 20 in the second half, and it proved to be too much to overcome against the Eagles who turned in one of their more solid efforts of the season.

Jermaine Austin, the leading rusher in the Southern Conference, had 136 yards on 25 carries despite not starting due to a knee injury suffered against East Tennessee State. Austin scored on a three-yard run in the second period as he pushed his league leading total to 1,325 on the season.

Furman's defense was giving up only 125 yards per game rushing and was leading the league in total defense and points allowed. Georgia Southern, however, proved to be too much as it had 298 yards rushing and finished with 379 yards total.

Quarterback Chaz Williams had 105 yards rushing for the Eagles and completed 5-of-8 passes for 81 yards. The Paladins got 127 yards from Hindley Brigham, 108 of them in the first quarter when he broke loose for a career best 80-yard scoring run after the Eagles had gone in front 3-0.

Georgia Southern led 20-17 at the half as the Eagles got second quarter scores from Kevin Anderson and Austin along with a second Holland field goal.

Furman quarterback Bo Moore had a one-yard touchdown run and Danny Marshall kicked a 22-yard field goal before Holland got his 20-yarder with 41 seconds left to put the Eagles on top for good.

Georgia Southern got a field goal off its opening drive of the second half and Holland put his team up 26-17 before Lamar Rembert scored on a 38-yard scamper to make it 26-24 and keep Furman's hopes alive with 8:16 to play.

The Eagles, however, took the ensuing kickoff and benefited from a fumbled option pitch that was ruled an incomplete pass at the Furman 37 to set up Holland's final field goal of the contest.

GREENVILLE, S.C. — The NCAA I-AA fourth-ranked Wofford Terriers wrapped up a perfect Southern Conference season by holding off the 25th-ranked Furman Paladins 7-6 in front of 12,745 fans at Paladin Stadium.

The Terriers sealed the victory after Furman failed to handle a low snap on a what would have been a game winning 51-yard field goal attempt by Danny Marshall with 1:17 left in the game. The Paladins drove 34 yards to the Wofford 32, but Marshall never got a chance to kick the ball after the snap bounced to holder Jeremiah Van Dora, who was tackled for a 13-yard loss.

The victory halted a four-game Wofford losing streak to Furman and marked the Terriers' first victory in Paladin Stadium and first triumph in Greenville since 1970.

"This was a great, tough, hard-nosed, old fashioned football game," said Ayers. "This gave us a taste of the playoffs. Furman is great team. Our kids were are able to go hard the whole game. Offensively, we were just hunting and pecking, and we had some opportunities but let them get away. We've got a bunch of kids that nobody believed in, except us. It's all come together this year, and it's unbelievable."

"That last play summed it up for us this year," said Furman head coach Bobby Lamb, whose team dropped its fourth conference game of the season by a combined total of 10 points. "It's been a very difficult year, and I was at a loss for words in there after the game. Offensively and defensively we gave such a great effort and played extremely hard, but we just didn't take advantage of our opportunities in the red zone and on special teams. That's been our problem all year."

The defeat was especially frustrating for Furman's defense, which mangled Wofford, limiting the Terriers to only seven points and 180 yards total offense, some 23 points and 150 yards below their respective season averages. The Paladins also controlled the football for 35:32 to Wofford's 24:28. The Terriers' seven points were the lowest total ever in an opponent victory in Paladin Stadium.

The Terrier defense set up the game's first score when linebacker Josh Smith stopped Furman's Brandon Berry for no gain on a fourth-and-two play from the Paladin 45. From there, the Terriers moved 45 yards in 10 plays for the game's only touchdown, which came on a fourth down, 1-yard touchdown plunge by quarterback Jeff Zolman with 8:52 left in the first quarter.

Furman made it a 7-3 game with a 19-yard Danny Marshall field goal with 3:56 to go in the first quarter to complete a 12-play, 72-yard drive.

The Paladins moved 71 yards to the Wofford 11 on their final possession of the first half, but Marshall missed a 28-yard field goal, keeping it a 7-3 game.

Marshall got a second chance later in the contest when he converted a 26-yard attempt with 14:09 left in the contest and, in the process, become the conference's all-time kick scoring leader with 304 points.

Furman's Hindley Brigham led all rushers with 74 yards on 19 carriers, and Paladin quarterback Bo Moore completed 19-of-28 passes for 206 yards. The Terrier defense, led Jim Thurman's 11 tackles, limited Furman to only two field goals in three red zone penetrations. The Paladins were paced defensively by linebacker Mike Killian with 15 stops and a blocked field goal.
