Daniel Koppelman

Escapement If the phrase "experimental 21st century music" makes you want to hide in a corner, Daniel Koppelman's got just the thing. Escapement, a CD and DVD package, pushes the boundaries of contemporary composition and makes it accessible and, yes, enjoyable. Pulling from classical, jazz, and electroacoustic experience, Daniel uses tools ranging from acoustic grand piano to Cycling '74 Max/MSP to create compelling, hybridized textures and soundscapes. Acoustic and electonic elements integrate beautifully, as do diatonicism and dissonance. Engaging, intelligent, and unpretensious, Koppelman's collection is a testament to how cool "serious" contemporary music can actually be. Michael Gallant



BILL EVANS TRIO

The Complete Village Vanguard Recordings, 1961



Hearing these tracks for the first time from my car stereo felt inappropriate the way drinking Cristal from a Styrofoam cup feels inappropriate. This box set is jazz piano gold and deserves both your undivided attention and the best sound system you can get your hands on. There are plenty of classics here — "My Romance" (check out our transcription on page 54 and lessons on page 50), "Milestones," and "Solar," to name a few — and supported by Scott LaFaro on bass and Paul Motian on drums, Bill stretches out beautifully over every one of them. As an extra treat, you can hear multiple interpretations of the same song as played in different sets; for example, a previously unreleased take of "Gloria's Step" is included here. The Vanguard Recordings is as close as many of us will get to hearing this keyboard legend enchant a downtown club, and it's an experience not to be missed. Her piano work tends toward the spare side for most of the tunes, punctuating more than dominating, though a delicate "White Christmas" features an assured, chord-melody piano lead. The Clayton/Hamilton lazz Orchestra gives a tight performance throughout, making the disc's strong arrange ments sound easy and providing excellent accompaniment for Diana's alto vocals. A Peace of My Mind



The multitalented Ockerman finally steps out from

his keyboard chair with the Doobie Brothers to deliver his first solo CD. He penned most of the tunes, which cover an eclectic mix of rock, gospel, soul, and New Orleans funk, and plays wicked keys — tons of kick-ass B-3 plus Rhodes, synths, and piano - and guitar. Among those joining him in this celebration of song are bassist Tiran Porter and saxman/vocalist Cornelius Bumpus (both of the Doobie Brothers), Joseph "Zigaboo" Modeliste (the Meters), brassman Mic Gillette (Tower of Power), Jerry Miller (Moby Grape), and a variety of vocal artists. HOWARD JONES

Revolution Of The Heart



At first listen, Jones may no longer seem the innova-

tor he was 20 years ago. Club beats seem to predominate, as do the conventions of modern dance music. But keep the disc on repeat for a while and you start to hear classic Jonesy touches and much often startling invention within the strict boundaries of the dance genre. His capacity for beautiful melodies that stay with you is larger than ever. The relentlessly chirpy, lyrical optimism for which many derided his early releases has given way to a realist's outlook that nonetheless sees hope in the dark. Dickey Betts & Great Southern: Back Where it All Begins



In 2004, the first-ever DVD from founding Allman Brothers Band

guitarist Dickey Betts was recorded live at the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and features Betts and his band rocking through classic Allman Brothers songs in front of a packed house. Keyboardist Michael Kach is exceptional throughout, handling B-3 and keys on all the Gregg Allman and Chuck Leavell parts with solid grooves and seasoned chops. The camera angles on Kach are so good that you can pick up on his licks and runs, giving you a great primer in southern rock keyboard stylings.
